Railroad Hearing Is Requested In Area

The Interstate Commerce Commission may institute an investigation into the proposed discontinuance of the Fort Worth and Denver passenger trains between Dallas and Denver advised this week by Congressman Bob Price. If such an investigation is instituted trains would be continued through September 9, 1967 pending hearing at key points such as Amarillo, Childress and Dalhart.

The railroad posted discontinuance notice after the Post Office Department removed railway Post Office cars from the trains on March 31 resulting in \$300,000 annual revenue lost to the line.

In a letter received Wednesday from the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, James H. Eubanks of the Traffic Department stated that the Executive Committee of the Chamber of Commerce had authorized participation in hearings to the extent that evidence be developed bearing on public convenience and the necessity of these trains. Our local Chamber of Commerce entered their protest last week.

If hearings are granted local witnesses will be needed to testify to the actual need and use of these trains. It is hoped that joint discussions and planning may be arranged in advance of any such hearing so that a concerted effort can be made.

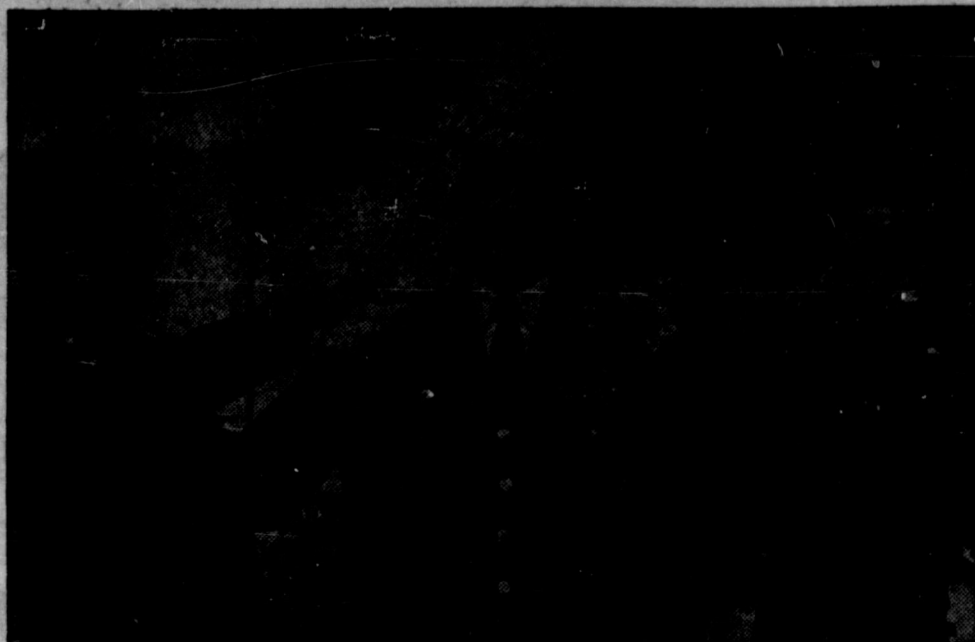

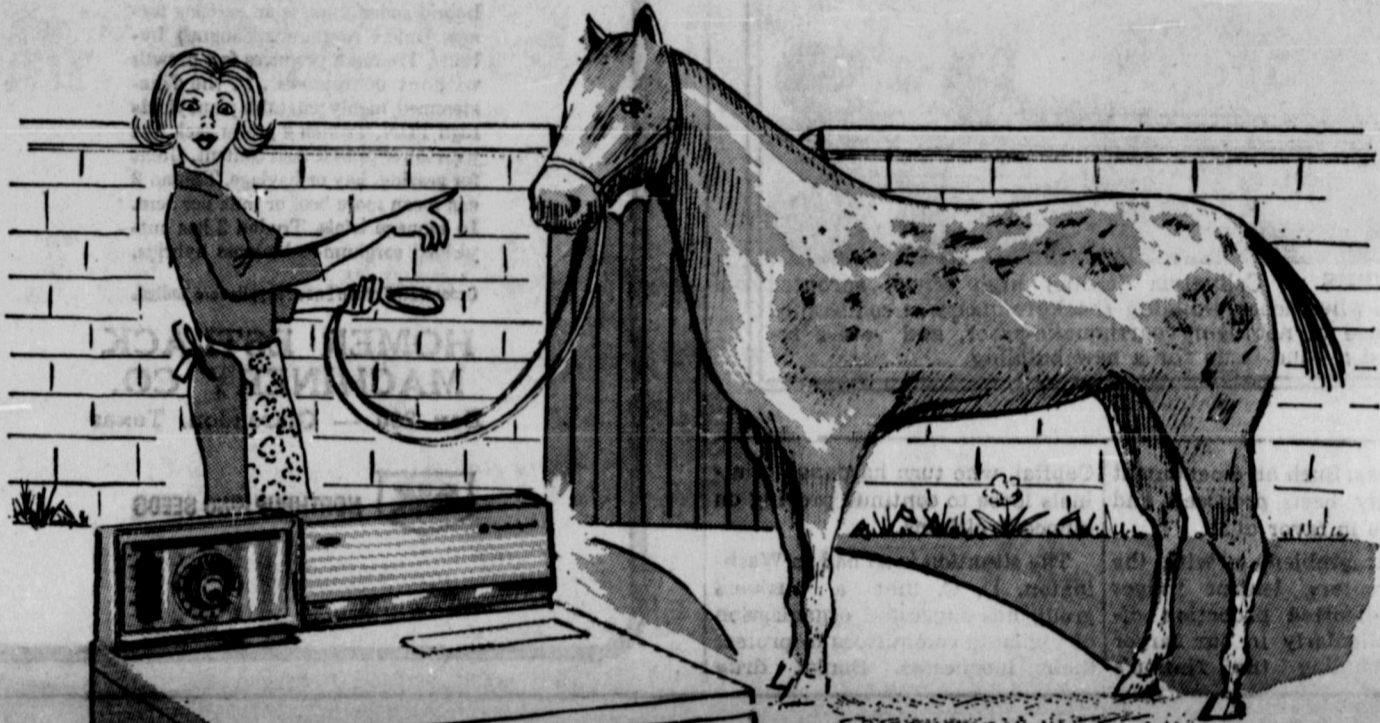

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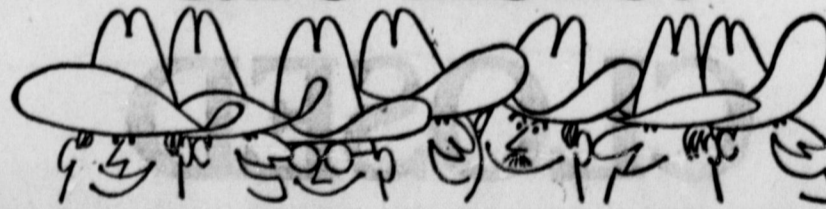
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Washington Report

The House Judiciary Committee has just completed hearings on proposed legislation which would further restrict the sale, ownership and use of small fire-

arms. I participated in those hearings because I do not believe additional laws are necessary. The Secretary of the Treasury already has broad regulatory au-

thority to control the sale of firearms through licenses under Federal statutes and the Federal government also has broad regulatory authority over import of weapons and munitions of war. It is not new laws we need, but enforcement of the ones already on the books, especially those dealing with known criminals.

In the State of South Carolina, where the manufacture and sale of hand guns is absolutely outlawed, the rate of homicides and assaults by firearms is among the highest in the country.

New York City, with one of the most restrictive laws dealing with pistols and revolvers, has a crime rate which makes not only the streets, but the homes of its people unsafe from criminal attack.

In my statement to the Committee, I expressed the opinion that what we actually have in this country is a criminal problem rather than a gun problem. And more importantly, we have a problem with strict enforcement of the laws that we have always had, both nationally and locally. If we fail to enforce laws we have had since the 1930's, how can we expect enforcement of new and more restrictive laws. Why would anyone planning to commit a crime pay one moment's notice to any law that says criminals can't own or buy firearms? And a firearm never committed any crime.

Many Panhandle folks purchase firearms by mail and use them to kill livestock predators. Many are also hunters, skeet and trap shooters, rifle and pistol marksmen, who have been national and world record holders. There are also some talented and expert gunsmiths in our area who order most of the high-grade actions for fine rifles and other parts by mail or express. The definition of "firearm" in the proposed bill would prohibit this.

There are provisions in the bill such as restrictions on the acquisition of bazookas, cannons and the like, which are desirable. But the National Firearms Act now regulates fully automatic weapons such as submachine guns and also sawed-off shotguns and could be amended to include lar-

ger weapons. Such an amendment has already been proposed and I would be in favor of it.

The real problem is with the lax prosecutors, lenient judges and faint-hearted probation officers, particularly in our larger cities, including the Nation's

Capital, who turn hardened criminals loose to continue preying on innocent citizens.

The situation is so bad in Washington, D. C. that a business group has suggested organization of vigilante committees to protect their businesses. Banks, drug

stores, and other businesses are hijacked daily here in broad daylight. Such acts, even the many involving needless murder and maiming no longer make the front page of the newspaper and many of them are not reported at all.

The problem has become so serious, that it now seems not only a duty but an obligation to have

a pistol, rifle or shotgun in the house for the protection of one's family. I don't believe we want such laws in the Panhandle, and I, for one will continue to oppose any further restrictions on the sale, ownership, or use of such firearms by law-abiding citizens for any legal use.

Motion was made by John Jones with a second by Gene White that J. G. McAnear be appointed Mayor pro-tem. Motion carried.

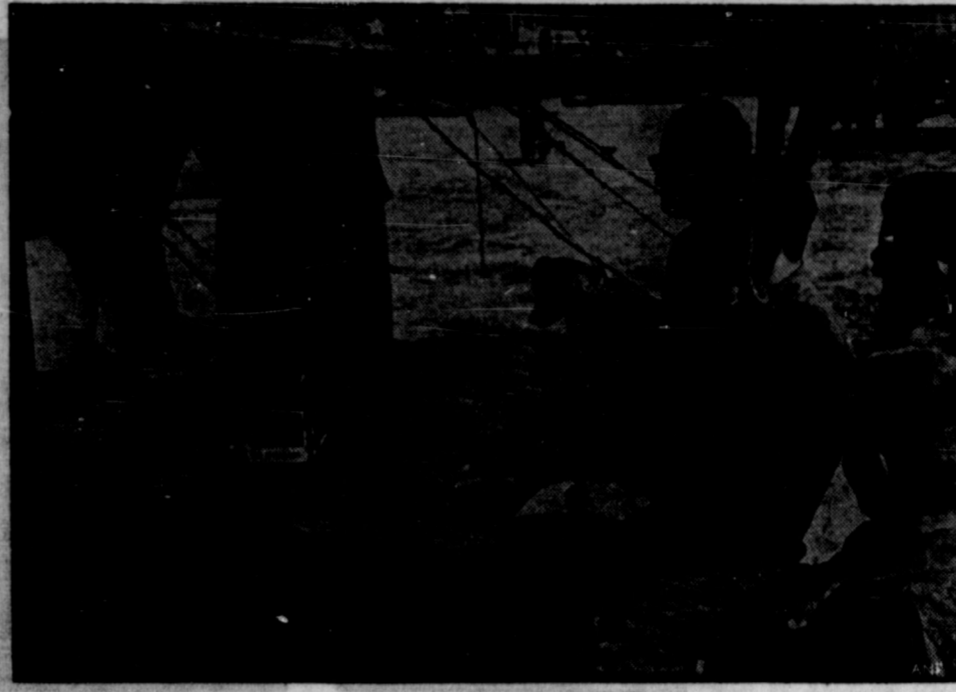

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Once again, a measurement service is being offered by this office. This service is for measuring 1967 row crops and diverted acres. If you're interested, stop by the office and talk with us. The cost of the service will vary according to the number of plots to be measured.

COTTON ALLOTMENT TRANSFER

Cotton producers will vote again this year on whether to allow cotton to be transferred out of the county due to sale or lease. If approved by at least two-thirds of those voting, it will permit out-of-county transfer of cotton allotments.

Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters on record May 12, 1967. Marked ballots must be delivered to the county office or postmarked not later than May 19. Ballots will be counted on May 23, 1967, at 9:00 a.m. at the Donley ASCS County Office. Any interested party may witness the vote count.
