Farm News

1968 ACP Allotment

At the present our allocation for ACP is exhausted. Producers with outstanding approvals are encouraged to report as soon as practices are completed so that any unused funds can be allocated to someone else.

New Grower Wheat Allotment

The final date to request a "New Grower" wheat allotment is July 1, 1968. In order to be eligible for a new grower allotment, the operator or the owner must not have an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm. Also, the operator must derive at least 50 per cent of his income from the farm and must have had at least two years wheat growing experience in the past five years.

Reclassification of Wheat

Should you lose your wheat by hail or some other natural disaster to the extent that no grain or forage crop remains, prior to harvest you may have that acreage taken out of wheat classification. You must make a written request to the County Committee and pay the cost of making a farm visit to measure the acreage before plowing.

Cotton Destroyed by Natural Causes

June 15 has been set as the final date producers are required to replant cotton in Donley County. This does not mean producers cannot replant after June 15. It only means that cotton does not have to be replanted later than that date to be eligible for price support payments. Acreages that are destroyed after June 15 must be reported to this office early enough to permit inspection of the area.

Greenbelt Lake Rises Over Six Feet

The big runoff Sunday night from the rain of water spout proportions that fell on the Greenbelt watershed Sunday afternoon netted a total rise of 6 and 35 hundredths feet at the dam.

This now brings the depth of water at the dam to 47 feet which is 27 feet above the screened outlet for the Greenbelt Water Authority water supply.

The big intake of water really spread the lake out and backed it up the main river channel. Many favorite bank fishing spots were covered and a new shoreline formed. A beautiful sight is to drive to the west side of the lake and see the numerous islands that have been formed at the head of the lake.

Prior to run-off Sunday, the lake contained some 8,000 acre feet of water. Now it has over 12,000 acre feet and feeder creeks are still running above normal.



Stormy conditions that hung over the area the greater portion of Sunday finally turned loose its fury late Sunday afternoon to give the Martin to Goodnight area a damaging blow, but brought smiles to those waiting for a downpour that would help fill Greenbelt Lake.

The lake rose 6.35 feet but the damage was extremely heavy and amounted to thousands of dollars in loss of crops and damage to land as wide trenches were cut in terraces and lakes formed which will prevent replanting for quite some time. Hail and high wind accompanied the storm to destroy much in addition to the excess water.

The storm covered an area just west of Martin to Goodnight and north thru Jericho and eastward south to Alameed. Goodnight received over 3 1/2 inches; Hubert Rhoades reported 3.40 at Ashtola; 2.50 fell at the Country Club and Jericho received around 3 inches. Wheat in that area was heavily damaged or destroyed. Practically all row crops were lost in the entire area.

Two tornadoes were sighted in the Goodnight area during the day Sunday and made storm cellars a popular place. The high wind accompanying the storm east of Ashtola took the roof off a barn at Vera Lewis' place where race horses are trained and the famous Vic Mon stallion was killed when the roof fell on him.

Various lakes dotted the Ashtola area with a large one covering a large portion of the old Ashtola townsite area. Hubert Rhoades almost needed a boat to leave his place Monday morning. Along the highway to the east of Ashtola, broad lakes can be seen on the Horace Green and Van Knox farms.

The storm was lighter toward town with only 27 inch falling here and only a sprinkle at Lelia Lake. The moisture total here for June so far is 2.31 inches and an even 11 inches for the year.

Farmers in the stricken area certainly need lots of sunshine so they can start their planting job all over again. Some plan to replant cotton while others will be turning to soy beans and other crops which will have a better chance of making.

**WATCH FOR COMMON GARDEN PROBLEMS**

Good gardening is more than pulling weeds and watering, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. A "green thumb" gardener is not a person who is just lucky in growing plants, but one who has a general knowledge of plants and how to bring the best out of them.

Gooch suggests that plants be checked often for signs of insect damage. Sucking insects such as aphids, thrips, and other "bugs" will cause yellowing, stunting, wilting, and under severe infestations can cause death. Should the populations of sucking insects become too

serious either diazinon or malathion can be used effectively. Holes in leaves, stems, and fruits indicate that chewing insects have been busy. Beetles, grasshoppers, and caterpillars are the most common pests of this type. Carbaryl, (Sevin), DDT, diazinon, malathion, methoxychlor, and rotenone are good controls for chewing insects.

Insects in the soil are also harmful, especially to seeds and young, growing plants. To combat maggots, cutworms, white grubs, and other soil insects, the soil should be treated with chlordane about four weeks before planting with 10 percent dust, wettable powder or 74 percent emulsion in water.

Fungi can also be problems on plants around the home and garden. Acti-dione (PM) and sulphur Karathane are recommended for control of powdery mildew, and maneb or captan are effective against black spot. Phaltan is effective for treating either of these fungi.

Gooch reminds gardeners that nematodes can also cause trouble on ornamental plants. "Nematode Killer" and "Nema-X" are good controls for nematodes.

When treating for any of these insects or pests it is important to remember that many of the symptoms could also be caused by soil deficiencies or lack of water.

When fertilizing, only the recommended amount of fertilizer should be applied. The addition of extra amounts of fertilizer can upset the balance of nutrients in the soil and may cause damage to the plants.

A good soaking is better than shallow watering, he says. Don't try to grow too many plants in one area. It is much more attractive and productive to grow only the number of plants you can care for with a minimum of work, Gooch reminds. And maybe you too can be a "green thumb" gardener.





**STATE Capital NEWS**  
BY VERN SANFORD

Texas' Constitutional Revision Commission has completed its series of winter and spring work sessions, rewriting the Texas charter of government. It will not meet again until August.

Any fair analysis of the status of constitutional revision in Texas would have to be based on a note of pessimism regarding the chances for ultimate acceptance of the committee's work to date.

Main problem for the 25 revisionists to overcome was created when the Commission was established — by a divided legislature — in the spring of 1967.

Originally the Commission was to be formed by a joint House and Senate resolution. However, the Senate refused to go along with the plan so the House acted alone. Speaker Ben Barnes named a House Committee. But Lt. Gov. Preston Smith declined to make any appointments. Gov. John Connally gave considerable moral support to the Committee, but now he is a "lame duck" and will not be governor when the Commission submits its report to the legislature next January.

In terms of the substantive proposals for a new constitution, the Commission has been far from decisive to this point.

Reports have been heard from various subcommittees on the executive branch, the judiciary, political subdivisions, taxation and other topics.

These reports have been given tentative approval by the Commission as a whole, but on all votes it was made clear that decisions made now can be reversed during the next slate of meetings this coming fall.

One of the most heated debates in the brief history of the Commission came from a recommendation for the appointments of judges on the Texas Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals by a five-man commission. Voters would either approve or remove them. At present these judges are elected by the people.

Two members of the Commission were particularly forceful in their argument against the proposal.

H. S. (Hank) Brown of San Antonio, president of the Texas AFL-CIO, opposed the measure as being a dangerous trend for a democratic society. Brown argued that the people have a right to elect their judges.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria contended that such a provision

in the revised constitution would insure its defeat when the matter is put to a vote.

Dr. Janice May, government professor at the University of Texas, said Cory and Brown are overlooking the realities of the current system of judicial selection.

"Right now two-thirds of all our judges are initially named by appointment from the governor. Then, as a matter of practice, they run for re-election and are almost always retained in office," she said.

Most of the members of the Commission have expressed some desire to strengthen the hand of the governor. They maintain that a majority of the state agencies are virtually free of his influence and can carry out public policy without regard to his wishes. Opponents of the proposal point out that the governor already has authority to appoint 3,000 office holders.

Commission voted 8-7 to limit the governor to a single term—a procedure which would, in effect, make every Texas governor a lame duck for some undetermined portion of his term in office. Commission also favors providing the governor with a four year term rather than the current two year term.

Tentatively, the group approved a provision which would require the governor to be elected during "off-years" — years without presidential elections.

Many Capitol observers recall that a constitutional revision commission created by the Legislature in 1957 submitted recommendations after several years of meetings, but no action has ever been taken on them.

**Connally Win Certain**

Governor Connally's control of the State Democratic Convention in Dallas on June 11 apparently will be by overwhelming majority.

Will Davis, Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee, says 215 of the 254 county conventions passed resolutions endorsing Connally's favorite son candidacy, and 22 more counties are sending uncommitted delegations to the state convention.

**Special Session**

There will be a hot time in this old town . . . extending from the June 4 opening of the special legislative session until whenever it ends . . . and that is anybody's guess.

Main business, of course, is passing a \$2,500,000,000 appropriations bill to finance state government for the 1969 fiscal year beginning September 1 and approval of about \$125,000,000 in new taxes.

Governor Connally has recommended general revenue spending of \$465,200,000. That would require \$123,800,000 in additional state taxation. Legislative Budget Board proposes a budget of \$471,000,000 from the fund over which the legislature has direct control, which would boost the tax bill to \$129,600,000.

Connally's tax bill calls for an increase of the state sales tax rate from two to three per cent, with cities to get most of the additional revenue in the form of a direct rebate. Many services not now taxed also would be included in the three per cent levy. Statewide tax would do away with one per cent local sales tax now charged in more than 300 cities that contain the vast majority of Texas' population.

Session also is expected to come to grips with the explosive issue of liquor by the drink. A slight majority of the legislators live in districts which approved the May 4 mixed drink referendum by margins ranging from slight to overwhelming. But that's no assurance the measure will pass.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and House Speaker Ben Barnes also are urging Governor Connally to submit riot control bills to the legislators. They

**NEWS FROM**

**Congressman

Congress reacted quickly to the tragedy in Los Angeles. The Crime Bill passed by the House last year and amended by the Senate was already scheduled for approval by the House when Senator Robert F. Kennedy was gunned down.

Efforts by the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee to send the bill to the House-Senate conference where it could be amended by the Senate amendments were decisively defeated. The next day, the House passed the bill by an overwhelming vote.

While there is a firearms section in the bill which I consider too stringent — shotguns and rifles are not included — the choice after the effort to send it to conference was a straight "yes" or "no" vote for the whole bill. The National Rifle Association, although recognizing the objectionable features in the firearms legislation, also recognized the need for a strong bill to help curb crime. NRA, under the cir-

cumstances, did not object to adoption of the bill.

Had the bill gone to conference, the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee would undoubtedly have attempted to substitute much more restrictive gun controls than those actually in the Act. And there undoubtedly will be a renewed effort now for stricter firearms laws.

But in spite of the emotional outcries against firearms those who demand more laws overlook the most important factor in the whole crime problem — the laws we now have are not enforced. Congressman Tom Curtis of Missouri, a Republican who is running for the Senate, made a point of this on the House floor the day the crime bill was considered.

"We do not need more laws," Curtis told House members. "We need enforcement of laws that are on the books. Our Committee on Ways and Means held hearings on this matter two years ago. We had the Attorney General of the United States come before us with examples of guns being sold across borders to criminals, this is against these laws. I think 40 were sold by one operator in Maryland which were shipped to criminals in the District of Columbia. I asked the

Attorney General then whether they had revoked the Federal license that this gun dealer in Maryland had. He had not done that. Had they carried out the law requiring this gun dealer to keep a list by name and address of those to whom he sold the guns? They did not check on that. Did they require these people to identify themselves so that they could not use fictitious names? They had not done that. They had done nothing. To this day the Attorney General of the United States is not enforcing these laws, nor is the Department of the Treasury, which has a part of this jurisdiction for the enforcement of these laws, enforcing them."

Proceeding Curtis, Rep. Paul C. Jones, also of Missouri and a Democrat, was highly critical of the Attorney General and the need for law enforcement. He said "I am referring particularly to the attitude of those in high places — in the executive and in the judicial, and in the legislative branches of our Government — where we apparently have been more interested in protecting and justifying the lawless actions of those who riot, kill, burn, steal, and rape than in protecting the innocent." The wave of fear that grips

the nation's capital and other cities will not be dispelled by a return to law enforcement by all departments of the government. And this new direction must come from the White House before the nation degenerates into a complete state of anarchy. Continued tolerance of violence could spell the end of Democracy in America.

**DEAD LITTER COVER FOR RANGE SEEDING**

In just a few short weeks many farmers and ranchers will be planting their dead litter cover crops. These dead litter crops will be used primarily for protection of young native grass plants to be seeded into them next spring.

The purpose of a dead litter crop is to protect young grass plants from blowing soil particles. These soil particles can cut a young plant off at the ground and almost destroy an entire field of newly planted grass.

The dead litter crops also increase the water infiltration ability of the soil and reduce

the amount of evaporation by providing shade.

The soil temperature is also held at a more constant level. Bare ground is always several degrees hotter than ground which has a plant cover. The lower, more constant temperature provides are a big help to the establishment of the young seedling.

Dead litter cover are usually forage type sorghums such as hegeri and cane. Planting dates are usually by June 20 and not later than July 10. The planting rate should be about 10 lbs. per acre in drilled rows at a depth of one to two and a half inches.

During the growing season, the dead litter crops should be shredded again. In both cases the cut material should be left on the ground.

For best results the dead litter crop should not be grazed because livestock can pack the soil and make it unsuitable for drilling grass the next spring.
