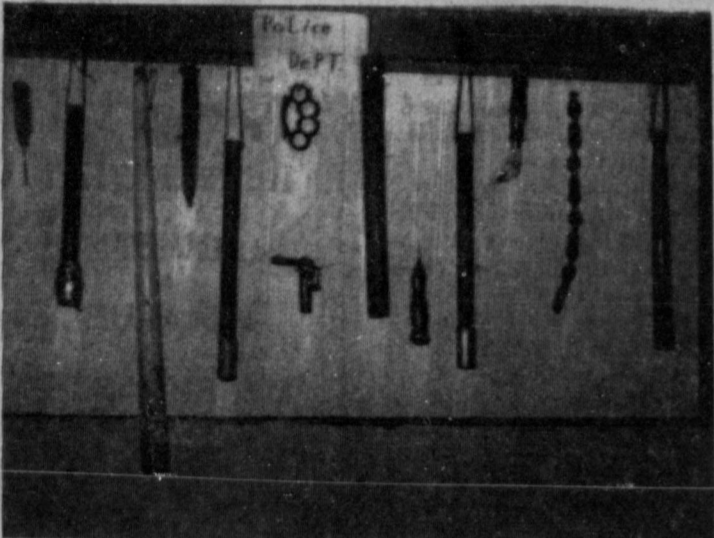

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

Good news on water rates! The Greenbelt will supply water to its member cities for 40¢ per 1,000 gallons. We must, however, buy 174,294,000 gallons (or \$69,717.50) this year. Clarendon will have the lowest water rate of the cities with a \$11.00 water minimum. (9 \$2.00 sewage charge will make the basic city bill \$13.00 to most of us). But for that minimum, you will receive 16,000 gallons of water during the summer (April through September), and during the winter 10,000 gallons (October through March). All water used in excess of the minimum will be sold for 50¢ per 1,000. The new rate will take effect June 1st (with the July 1st water bill). At last we will have water to water the lawns, wash cars, or do whatever we wish.

For several months your City Council has been aware that an increase in water rates would be necessary in order to acquire the water that we needed at lower cost. We have also been aware that we would have to pay our share of the Greenbelt's debt. It simply boiled down to the fact that we could have a little water at a high cost, or a lot at a low cost, either way we would have to pay the \$69,717.50 per year. The Greenbelt decided that we needed more water at a lower rate.

The summer volume was set high by your aldermen. Since we're buying the water, let's use it. It won't be expensive unless you just don't use much water at all. For the big water users (or anyone over 6,000 gallons each month) will pay less under this new system than under last year's rate.

Please, please, watch your dog. Roaming packs of dogs have not only disturbed some citizens, but have attacked one school child. The city officers receive many calls each day concerning packs of dogs, which move so fast that we can't catch up with them. We have more dogs and fewer vaccinated and licensed dogs this year than ever before. This means that firm measures must be taken to protect our children and property. So please don't let your dog become a nuisance or a menace.

Let's all use water. We're buying it. We have to buy it.

COTTON ALLOTMENT TRANSFER REFERENDUM — Producers in Donley County voted not to transfer cotton allotments out of the county for 1970. The final vote tabulation showed 130 in favor of out-of-county transfers and 272 voting against.

This means that cotton allotments may be transferred by sale or lease within the county but can not be transferred to other counties. Cotton allotments may be transferred into this county from other counties which voted to transfer out-of-county.

This will in no way affect ownership transfers which may be made anywhere in the state. This was already authorized by law.

We will begin accepting applications for transfer after July 1, 1969.

AERIAL SPRAYING MESQUITE — The County Committee has established the dates for aerial spraying mesquites as June 1 through July 15.

1969 DIVERTED ACRES — Plots of diverted acres must contain at least one acre except when a series of terraces in a field is given as diverted acres and one of the terraces which would otherwise qualify measures less than one acre. Strips through fields and strips in skip-row planting patterns must be at least four normal rows wide. Plots other than whole fields or subdivisions must be of regular shape with not more than four sides. Acreage must be kept free of weeds.

Greenbelt Lake Nets 30 Inch Rise

According to Frank Drummond, plant engineer, Greenbelt Lake picked up a total of two and one-half feet of water from the rains the past week. This spreads the lake out over many more acres of shoreline and has caused numerous fishermen to change their favorite fishing spots.

This rise in the lake brings the elevation reading to 2637.17 feet, only 26.83 feet below the full reading of 2664.

Since last Wednesday, we have received an additional .27 inch of moisture here in town with other areas having larger amounts. This brings the monthly total to 3.30 inches and the total for the year to 7.21 inches. The highest temperature reading so far this month was 89 degrees Monday.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 2a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR9) BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9) BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state. (f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

In turn, retail food prices will go up, she adds.

"Built-in" maid service and packaging are services, but so are check cashing, parking lots, air-conditioned stores and someone to carry your groceries, continues the specialist for Texas A&M.

Consumers ask for conveniences, says Mrs. Clyatt, to save the homemaker time and energy. Employment outside the home, difficulty in getting household help, community responsibilities and recreational activities reduce homemakers' time for food shopping and preparation.

EXTENSION SPECIALIST SAYS CHEMICALS ARE CHEAPER AND BETTER

The favorable moisture conditions indicate excellent prospects for a good cotton crop in nearly all of Texas, reports Fred Elliott, Extension cotton specialist at Texas A&M University. But he added, this also means there will be grass and weeds to control.

In the past, much of the weed control done by the farmers was by hoeing. But now, due in part to the scarcity of hoe hands, but mostly because it is easier, cheaper, quicker, and better than by hand, chemicals are quickly proving themselves. For every dollar invested in herbicides correctly applied, the grower saves several more dollars in reduced production costs, said Elliott.

There are nine weed control chemicals recommended for use as premerges in cotton. All of these can be applied in a band at the time of planting with equipment mounted on the tractor or with the planter. Or, they can be band or broadcast applied as a separate operation immediately after planting.

Two of the chemicals, Planavin and Treflan, can be applied broadcast in the spring, just before planting, but they must be soil incorporated, noted Elliott. They can be sprayed on the beds and incorporated with a Roll-N-Cultivator, row disc, do-all, or roto-tiller.

Incorporation should be shallow. It is very important to know where the incorporated herbicide is and to place the seed at the bottom edge of the zone of incorporation.

There are a number of herbicides available. Therefore, it will be well to study all the materials and learn as much as possible about their use, pointed out the specialist. Each grower can work out a system suited to his land and equipment.

Elliott said further information is contained in B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control and Chemicals", available from the local county agent. He also emphasized the importance of reading and following label instructions to prevent accidents.

Senate filibusters against new college bills may take up much of the remaining days of the legislative session due to close June 2.

A proposal to create a medical school at Texas Technological College in Lubbock brought prolonged oratory from Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso who wanted the school in his home town.

Sen. Don Kennard of Fort Worth warmed up on the Tech bill for an extended effort to delay approval of a University

of Texas at Dallas on property of the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies.

Senate State Affairs Committee voted out other bills to set up upper level (junior-senior-graduate studies) colleges at Midland-Odessa, Corpus Christi and Texarkana and an additional University of Texas dental branch.

State Affairs Chairman Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan emphasized he is opposed to all of the bills and intends to make his

views known on the floor. Moore postponed action on any of the group over the week end by leaving town with the bills locked in a vault — and unreported to the senate floor.

Meanwhile, a House-Senate conference committee coached by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutsaers plowed slowly through the job of writing a one-year budget bill that will necessitate no new taxes.

Gov. Preston Smith spelled out his opposition to such a short-term approach to state governmental budgeting as more clearly in the long run as evidenced by recent experiences with the one-year plan and emphasized he interpreted the Texas constitution to require a biennial appropriations pattern.

By trimming proposed spending and switching some unused surplus in several state funds, a conference committee headed by Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris and Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah believes it can provide the teacher pay raise requested by the Texas State Teachers Association without new taxes.

Smith feels that the state's dollars simply cannot be stretched that far. Barnes thinks they can cover the basic needs of higher education, state hospitals and special schools and state agencies, and still leave \$61.9 million for the first year of the teacher pay raise.

Smith said there was a movement afoot to kill the \$15,000,000-a-year general fund allocation to farm-to-market roads. Barnes said the Senate conferees would not propose taking that program away.

Governor declined to say he will veto the one-year bill. "Several alternatives will be open to the governor," said Smith. "It would not be proper or possible for me to choose one at this time, because I do not know what the circumstances will be."

With adjournment deadline closing in, legislators are getting day and night workouts on literally hundreds of bills.

House finally completed action on a watered-down \$1.25-an-hour minimum wage bill. Amendments sent it back to the Senate. House (See HIGHLIGHTS—Page 5)

earlier approved creation of a dental school for San Antonio, new regulation of coin-operated amusement machines, law banning possession of LSD and other hallucinogenic drugs, higher service charges on large real estate loans, a new upper-level college at Laredo, strengthened rules for transporting migrant workers, elimination of the requirement that jurors be free-holders or house-holders and county civil service systems for major counties.

Senate, not so productive due to filibusters, passed three bills to remove legal obstacles to heart and other organ transplants, agreed to creation of a new medical school in Houston and another in an unnamed city, approved a broadened tuition-aid plan for needy students, and proposed submission of a constitutional amendment to abolish the welfare ceiling in 1970 (in event the August 5 vote fails).

Both houses completed action on bills to expand the program of special education for exceptional children between the ages of 3 and 21, make universities out of Stephen F. Austin (Nacogdoches), Southwest Texas (San Marcos), Angelo State (San Angelo), and Sul Ross (Alpine) State Colleges, permit use of Spanish in teaching in the first six grades of public schools by repealing the prohibition against use of a foreign language in public classrooms, create a board to license private detectives, set legislative salaries at \$6,800 a year (if the voters approve a constitutional

amendment at the special election Aug. 5 to permit the increase from the present \$4,800 a year), allow courts to issue driver licenses to persons who drive for a living but have lost their licenses for traffic law infractions (to be used on-the-job only and not for private driving), create the University of Texas Clinical Nursing School at San Antonio, make public agencies liable to persons injured by mistakes of public employees while driving motor vehicles or operating motor-driven equipment, and regulate practice of optometry.

Rep. Renal Rosson, chairman of the House Judicial Districts Committee, says Sen. Murray Watson's bill which combines all requests for new courts and court reorganization will get to the floor of the House before adjournment. Says Rosson, "a subcommittee needs to work on the bill, but it will probably be out of committee next week."

Senator Watson's bill will reorganize the 71st, 124th, 33rd, 35th, 38th, Second 38th, 63rd, 119th, 49th and the 79th Judicial Districts and create the 229th, 236th, 232nd, 159th, 158th, 240th, 243rd, 242nd, 241st, 239th, 237th, 238th, 149th, 168th, 230th, 228th, 227th, 226th, 225th, 194th, 181st and the 192nd Judicial Districts. It also creates or reorganizes the 168th District Court, the 237th District Court and the Court of Domestic Relations for Midland County.

Rep. Glenn Kothmann of San Antonio did not even come close in his effort to submit to the voters a proposal for local-option horse race betting. And the funeral oration of the Kothmann resolution was preached by Rep. David Allred of Wichita Falls. Thirty-three years ago his father, Gov. James V. Allred, kept calling the Legislature into special sessions until horse race betting was repealed. So this week's fight by Representative Allred was a re-run of history.

Finding no reversible error in the Court of Civil Appeals, State Supreme Court upheld the annexation by Pasadena of 576 acres on the Houston ship channel. Annexed farm land of Houston Endowment Inc. is surrounded by unannexed oil company holdings and the foundation contained unequal taxation would result.

High court stuck with its decision upholding forfeiture of 5,000 acres of sulphur leases by Cobra Oil and Gas Corporation in Culberson, Pecos and Reeves counties.

A Lubbock prosecutor argued for Supreme Court reversal of the decision that juveniles charged with offenses have the same

right as adults to be proven guilty "beyond a reasonable doubt."

June oil allowable was boosted by Texas Railroad Commission to 63.5 per cent of potential, highest since 1948 when an all-out effort was made to replenish war-depleted stocks.

Allotment tops periods when foreign imports were shut off due to international crisis.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports bids of more than \$3.5 million were received from mineral leases on far West Texas lands of University of Texas. Total brought the University fund to \$28,049,139.

Lease sale covered 78,000 acres. Actual acreage leased during the auction totalled 66,123, with an average bonus of \$53 per acre. Total of 251 tracts were offered and all but 44 were leased. Tracts were in 11 counties — Gaines, Andrews, Ward, Winkler, Loving, Pecos, Terrell, Reagan, Upton, Crockett and Hudspeth.

Following University lands lease sale, an additional tract of 20,972 acres in Cotton Estate land in Hudspeth and Culberson counties were offered at auction but no bids were received on it.

Parks and Wildlife Department has set hearing June 9 to establish price on sand, marl and gravel fill materials.

Millard K. Neptune of Austin announced his candidacy for state Republican party chairmanship.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports only five of 188 employees quit because of his ban on mini-skirts and long sideburns.

Texas Aeronautics Commission granted a permit to Amistad Airlines to operate between Del Rio and San Antonio.

C. T. McLaughlin of Snyder has been named to energy resources committee of Interstate Oil Compact Commission by Governor Smith.

James H. Milam of Lubbock has taken oath of office as State Securities Board member.

Hart T. Makin of Houston will be general counsel of U. S. General Services Administration.

H. B. Zachary of San Antonio received the third annual governor's Tourist Development award for leadership of HemisFair, '68.

Dr. Marvin C. Schlecte is new assistant commissioner for medical administration for Texas Department of Public Welfare.

Governor Smith proclaimed May Youth Opportunity Month, and called on state agencies and private employers to help provide summer work for disadvantaged young people.



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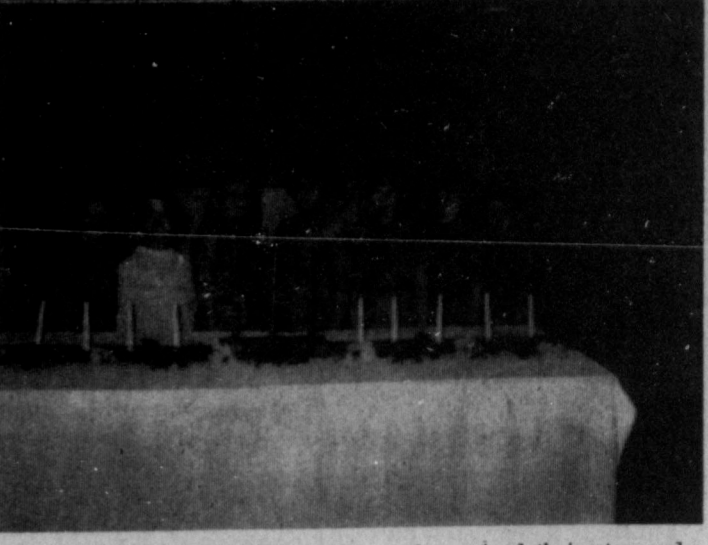

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJRT)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

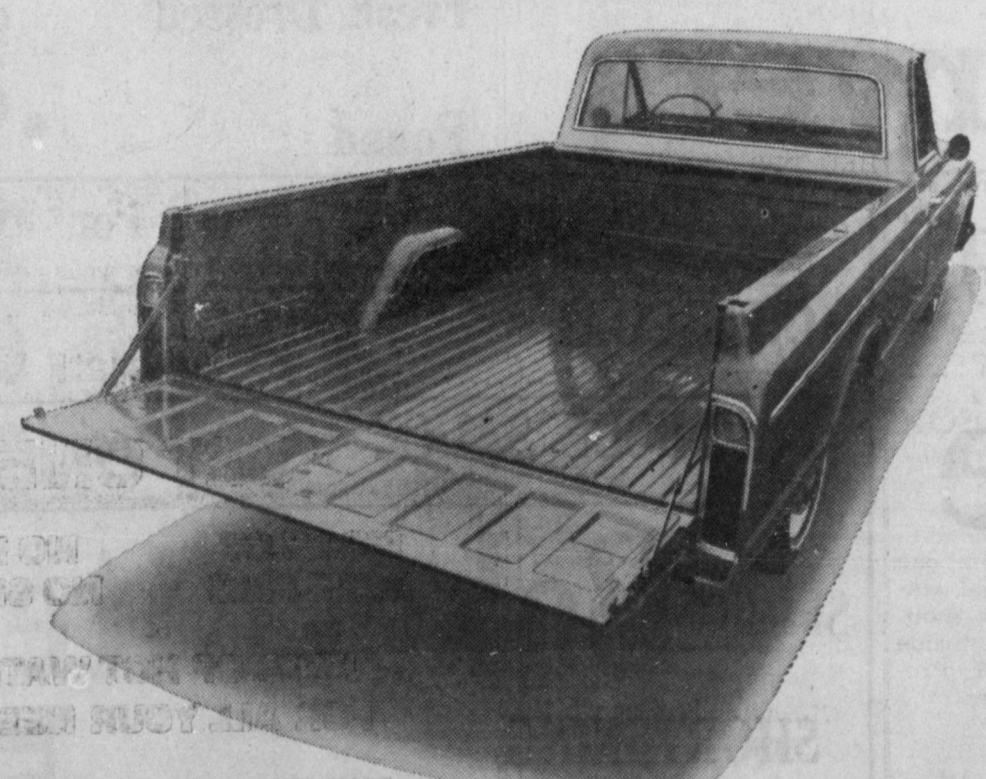
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (or) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

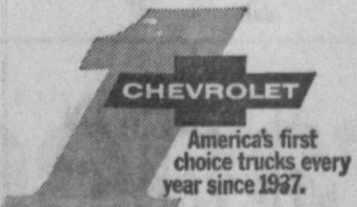

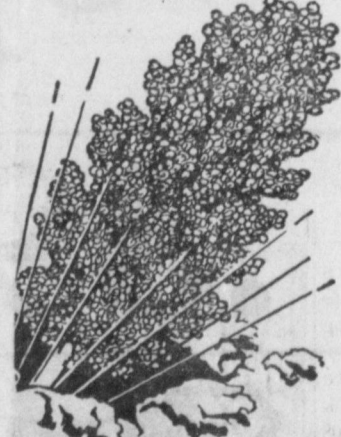

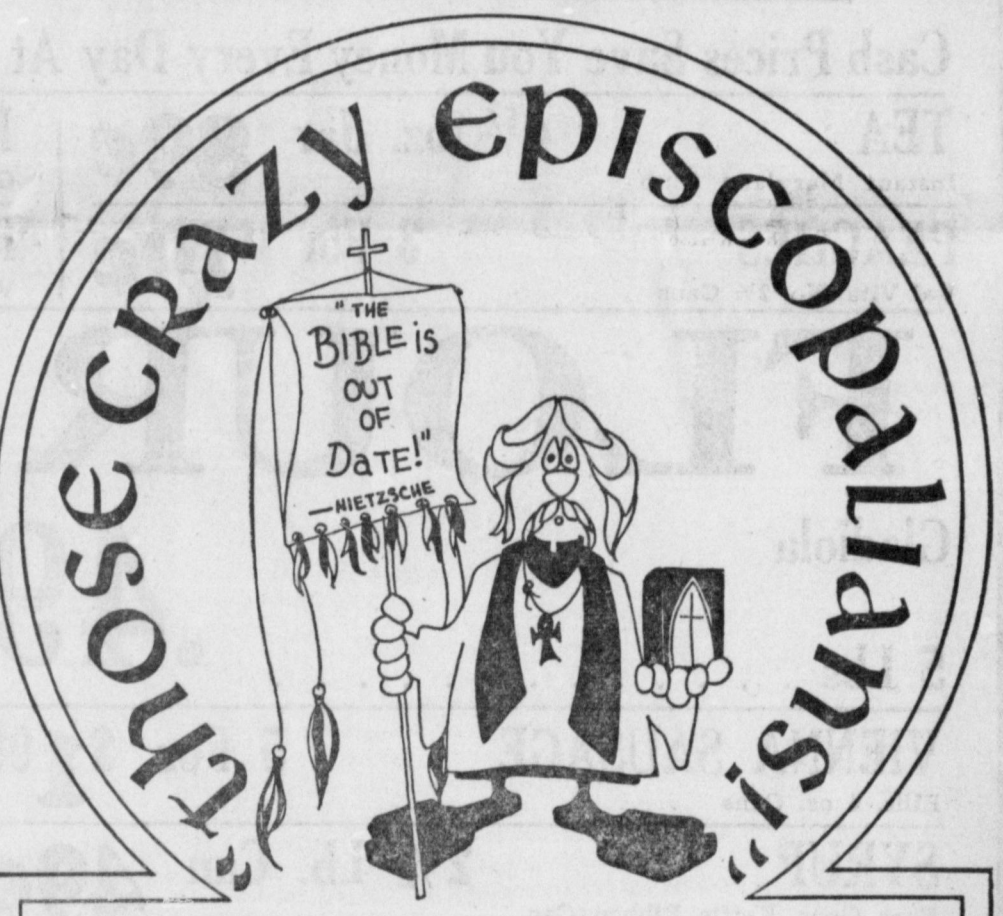

Use Of The Soil Survey By Engineers

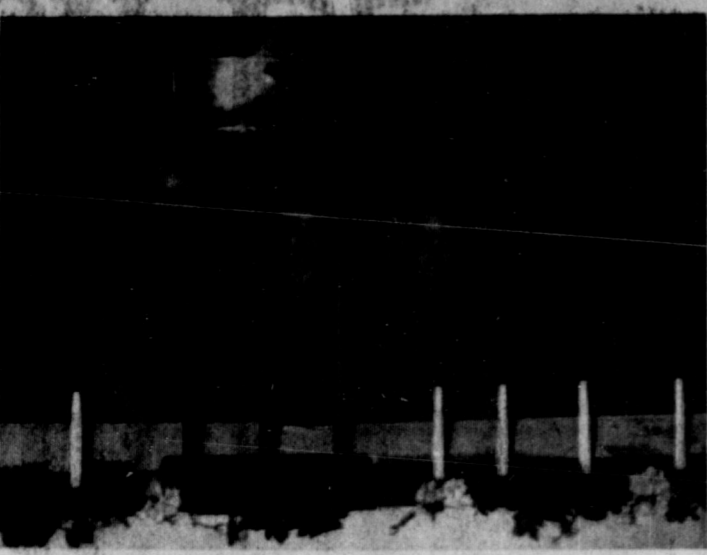

Engineers use soil surveys such as the one being made in Donley County now in many ways. Some of these are judging sites for buildings, highways, dams, and conservation structures.

For example, an engineer wouldn't want to use a porous soil to build a dam or a pond. At the same time he wouldn't want to lay a highway on a soil that shrinks and swells to the extent of cracking the highway surface.

In this county engineers frequently use the soil survey in determining water intake rates for irrigation systems. Stability of conservation structures such as waterways and terraces can be predetermined from the soil characteristics derived from the soil survey.

If an engineer needs sand, gravel, or caliche the survey tells him where he can probably find it.

Sometimes the engineer's purpose is just the opposite of the farmer's. While the farmer is usually concerned with making the soil take in as much water

as possible, the highway engineer is concerned with keeping out as much as possible.

But the engineer and farmer both are interested in the basic properties of the soil, so both can be helped by the soil survey.

MOSQUITOES AND RAINS GO TOGETHER

Due to the heavy and frequent rains throughout most of the state, mosquitoes are a problem in nearly all parts of Texas, says John G. Thomas, Extension entomologist at Texas A&M University.

Their persistent attack cause farm animals to lose weight through continual biting and annoyance. Some species of mosquitoes transmit diseases such as malaria and yellow fever to man, encephalitis to man and horses and heartworm to dogs.

Mosquitoes breed primarily in the spring, summer and fall months, but in extreme South Texas, they may reproduce throughout the year. They pass through four stages of development — egg, larva, pupa, and adult. All mosquitoes require water to produce their young, as females lay their eggs on water or in places that later become flooded, said Thomas.

In warm weather, the eggs of most species hatch in two or three days. However, some species require a drying period. They may remain dormant for many months, then hatch within minutes after being flooded by a spring or summer rain, or a tide, noted the entomologist.

Effective mosquito control is often a complex and expensive task, frequently requiring the cooperative efforts of individual home owners as well as such groups as industry, agriculture, state and local governments, pointed out Thomas.

Home owners should take every precaution to prevent the pests from breeding on their premises by eliminating standing water. Some of the more com-

mon problems are dripping outdoor faucets and leaky pipes, puddles resulting from evaporating cooler drainage, and tin cans and other articles which might trap and hold even small quantities of water. The proper use of insecticides around the home also aids in controlling mosquitoes.

Those engaged in agriculture, particularly where irrigation is involved, should observe proper

water management in preventing mosquito breeding. Wise use of irrigation water and proper drainage to prevent standing water will aid greatly in reducing mosquito numbers. Treat fish ponds with nonleaded gasoline, and stock tanks with kerosene, said Thomas.

portion of "rammers" among the drinking drivers was significantly greater than the proportion among the non-drinking drivers.

Researchers also conclude that the higher a driver's blood alcohol concentration, the greater the likelihood he had initiated a crash in which he is involved. The contribution of a driver with an alcohol content of .15 has been rated by one Canadian researcher as 42 times that of a non-drinking driver.

The Texas Safety Association, which has endorsed proposed legislation designed to remove drunken drivers from the streets and highways of the state, emphasized that there is no reason to believe that the Lone Star State's drunk drivers have more control behind the wheel than the drunk drivers of the other states and Canada.

TSA called Senate Bill 74, which would require breath tests for violators suspected of drunk driving, a first step toward saving some 500 lives a year in Texas.

Drunks Sock It To Sober Drivers

Drunk drivers may be taking the lives of more safe and sober Texans than many folks realize, the Texas Safety Association reported today, noting that several recent studies reported by the U. S. Department of Transportation indicate that most drivers killed in accidents caused by drinking drivers have not been drinking at all.

One two-year California study shows that 80 per cent of the drivers killed by drunk drivers had no alcohol content in their blood. Another research report shows that the drinking driver runs into others four times as often as he is run into. The pro-
