GAS COMPANY ACCEPTS RATE AND REFUND OF COMMISSI

WPA Grant of \$15,000 For Clarendon Schools

The local school board is said to have the assurance of a WPA grant of some \$15,000 within the next few weeks. This money will be supplemented with thirty percent of local funds, and will be used in repairing school property.

Plans include remodeling roofs, floors, ceilings and other necessary requirements to maintain the value of the school property.

It is learned on good authority that the plans have favorable consideration and will be approved in their turn.

In improvements of this nature, the federal appropriation amounts to seventy percent of the estimated cost of the work to be done. The local contribution may be materials, trees for campus improvement and many other things other than the actual cash.

The school board is merely taking advantage of an opportunity to improve the school property at a time when needed, and when it can be done without taking any school money to get the job done.

NINE SMALLPOX CASES REPORTED IN CITY

After a skip of one day, Tuesday, the city-county health office today reported two additional cases to bring the total to nine and to throw Clarendon into another flurry of excitement over the Smallpox epidemic.

Rumors flying rampant over the week-end placed the number of cases from 14 to 21 to send thousands of persons crowding into doctor's waiting rooms for vaccinations.

The city health officer placed the actual number of cases at seven Monday and nine today.

All Clarendon physicians urged this morning the vaccination of every person who has not received vaccine within the past five years.

Some of the cases are in the rural districts. Officials expect no epidemic if quarantine regulations are strictly adhered to, they say. Some cases are to be found in most every town on the Denver, many of them having far more than Clarendon, and few if any deaths. All cases here are reported as of a mild form.





The amount needed is so small that its cost is insignificant compared with its value to both the dam and the embryo.

The sorghums, both grain, are notably deficient in minerals. Old dry forage is less digestible than new, and experiments indicate that it is also more deficient in other respects than that from last season's harvest. If stacked roughage carried over from the 1937 crop must be fed, and green pasture is lacking, it should be heavily supplemented with the highly nutritious grains and proteins.

There is likely to be little trouble in calving or lambing if the dams are kept in vigorous health and condition during the last few months of gestation, but weak dams mean weak offsprings as well as danger that the dam herself may be unable to withstand the strain of giving

The same general principals hold good for sows, with the extra precaution being on guard against wet or cold at farrowing time. The good husbandman makes his own "good luck" by watching his animals closely and being on hand when the crisis occurs. If they don't freeze to death from exposure in the first half hour, little pigs may get pneumonia and die later.

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
