The Lewis girls first came to Donley County when their father, Reverend Leon O. Lewis, a retired Methodist moved to Clarendon to retire in November of 1909. The Lewis family lived in a house which had been owned by Mr. McClelland. The lumber in the house was hauled by ox team from Dodge City, Kansas, and first put up in old Clarendon. It was moved and placed in its present location in new Clarendon. The wood was so hard, that the "modern day" nails of the 1909 era would bend. Old fashioned square nails were used to build the house originially. The house is still standing and is the home of Mrs. F. H. Lumpkin.

Julia Jenkins said that she was nine when they moved to Clarendon. The two girls both went to Clarendon College for their first year of school in town, then they

went to the public school in a new building which had just been erected on the current post office site. It was a fine big two story red brick building with a small two room frame building on each side housing the first and second grades in one and the third and fourth grades in the other. Mrs. N. Bryant, Maggie and Katie Stout were some of their first teachers.

Before the old school house was itorn down, a family by the name of Kutch lived there for awhile.

Irma Osborne graduated from Clarendon College then up about a block from the went to the University of Colorado. In 1925-26 and 1926-27 she taught school at Claude, then went to Lordsburg. Irma went to the Indian Service School at Mescalero,

Apache school. Then she went on to Green River.



Clarendon stomps Canadian 51-7

A balanced offensive attack that exploded for 29 second-quarter points, coupled with a fired-up defensive effort, led by Senior noseguard Billie Perry. boosted the Clarendon Broncos to a 51-7 pounding of the Canadian Wildcats Friday at Bronco Stadium.

The win put the Broncos at 8-0 for the season and 3-0 in district play, setting up a showdown with Wellington, also 3-0, Friday. Canadian dropped to 4-4 and 1-2 following the loss.

The Wildcats struck first in the game, however, when Clarendon bumbled away the first play from scrimmage. Canadian took ten plays to hit paydirt and, after a successful kick, led 7-0.

Canadian appeared sky-high, when, after the ensuing kickoff, they held the Broncos for three plays. Then, in punt formation, Brad Thompson hit John Braxton for a first down in Wildcat territory. Thompson went on to score five plays later, despite having a 20 yard scoring run called back by an inadvertant whistle. He led all rushers with 82 yards on 7

Neither team scored again until early in the second quarter when Thompson capped a 63 yard drive with a five-yard pass to Braxton.

A sack by Perry forced Canadian to punt, and Bobby Weatherton capped the scoring drive with a five-yard plunge. Thereafter, the Broncos seemed unstopable, scoring 45 seconds later on an impressive 24 yard run by David Weatherton, who replaced the injured Hosea Hearn midway through the first quarter. David Weatherton finished the game with a whopping 67 yards on only six attempts. Hearn finished with 19 yards on three carries.

The Broncos tacked on another score when Thompson hit Junior Crump on an 18 yard strike with only 31 seconds left in the half. After an Arlis Thomas kick, the Broncs retired with a 36-7 halftime lead.



National Cattle Breed are named

7 M Polled Shorthorns, James McAnear, Jr., Clarndon, Tx., has been designated an elected delegate to represent Shorthorn and Polled Shorthorn breeders at the annual meeting and convention of the American Shorthorn Association (A.S.A.) in Louisville, Ky., November 15-17, during the North American Internation-

al Livestock Exposition. Voting delegates will be involved in policy decisions made at the meeting that will continue to provide direction for the national beef breed organization into the 1980's.

James W. Shirley, executive secretary-treasurer of the A.S.A., said that the business sessions at this annual meeting will solidify the long range planning that has been done by the breed in the areas of promotion, growth, and development. Figures compiled at the end of the fiscal year show a 10 percent increase in the number of registrations of purebred Shorthorn and Polled Shorthorn cattle and a 16 percent increse in memberships, while "Shorthorn Country", the official publication of the A.S.A., has doubled its volume over the

past three years. The meetings and other activities will be held in conjunction with a National Shorthorn Show with nearly 300 head entered from top Shorthorn and Polled Shorthorn herds across this country and Canada. What is the purpose of the All Savers Certificate?

The All Savers Certificate has been created by Congress as an incentive to save. All the interest on this certificate within prescribed limits - is taxexcluded from your Federal Income Tax. Also, the All Savers legislation was enacted to help housing. It requires that the major portion of the new savings created by this certificate be used for residential and agricultural financing.

How much interest may I earn tax-free?

As the Law now reads, this is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to earn as much as \$2,000 in tax-free interest if you file jointly (\$1,000 for single returns). Any interest earned in excess of these sums is taxable.

What amount may I deposit?

The Tax Act of 1981 stipulates that All Savers Certificates must be made available for a deposit of \$500. However, regulations permit deposits in other amounts. Ask us for complete information.

May I add to my certificate?

No, you are not allowed to add to any existing certificate. Each certificate is issued for one year. You may, however, purchase additional certificates.

What will my annual effective yield be?

Your certificate will have an annual investment yield to maturity equal to 70% of the average investment yield on 52-week Treasury Bills as of the most recent auction date. Thus, when the 52-week treasury rate is 18% your annual effective yield is 12.6% tax free! Treasury bills are auctioned every four weeks, so, check with us for the current rate. Also, discuss with us the maximum deposit that will still be completely free of taxes.

Is my interest rate fixed?

Yes. The rate in effect when you open your All Savers Certificate remains in effect for one year. You know exactly how much income you will receive. Your interest rate will not fluctuate.

May I convert from a 6-Month Certificate to an All Savers Certificate without penalty?

Yes. Regulations permit such a conversion provided the interest rate on the 6-Month Certificate is higher than that of the All Savers Certificate. The transfer must be initiated by the customer.

Is my certificate insured?

Yes. Ask us for specific insurance information.

May corporations or institutions take advantage of the tax-exempt feature?

No. Interest can be excluded from taxation only by individuals, partners or estates that receive certificates due to the buyer's death.

It is possible that this tax-free incentive to save will be extended.

How does the All Savers Certificate help me?

It means you, too, can now earn tax-free interest. This privilege, previously available only to those in a high tax bracket, is now offered to anyone who can set aside funds for one year. What is best, the new savings method reduces your taxes where it counts the most — at the top bracket of your income.

Can any interest earned on an All Savers Certificate in 1981 be included in the general interest and dividend exclusion of \$200 for single taxpayers and

\$400 for joint returns? No. The Tax Act specifies that no interest earned on an All Savers Certificate can be included in the \$200/\$400 exclusion, even if the interest is not tax exempt due to a premature redemption or disposition.

Will the All Savers Certificate help me if I own 6-Month Certificates?

More than likely, but it will depend on your income bracket and the current rates for both types of certificates.
