Analysis Of Amendments

*** **

Texas residents will be going to the polls August 5, 1969 to decide the fate of nine Constitutional Amendments. Because our Constitution is the instrument guaranteeing our liberties and since it is not simple or easy to revise it, citizens have a great responsibility in voting to adopt or reject proposals such as the nine which are being separately analyzed this week and next in the Donley County Leader.

You, our readers, are asked to study, read as much as you can find in regards to these proposals, give each and every one your serious consideration and thought and by all means, GO VOTE.

The public is constantly being bombarded with proponents for and those against these amendments. This office receives daily a stack of mail stressing the pros and cons of each tending to add confusion to our thinking. All the more reason for studying and thinking as we prepare to VOTE.

The text of the Amendments follows with pros and cons:

AMENDMENT NO. 1 — The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution.

The proposed amendment repeals those sections of the Texas Constitution which after careful study, have been determined to be obsolete and unnecessary. Certain specific sections are named such as the section authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations for support and maintenance of the Texas Centennial adopted in the fall of 1932, or the section allowing three million acres of public domain to be appropriated and set apart for the purpose of erecting the State Capitol. The amendment also provides that repeals be made with the understanding that the repeal shall in no way make any substantial changes in the present constitution, covering obsolescence due to exhaustion of subject matter, pursuant to provision, provisions in conflict with the U. S. Constitution and unnecessary police power provisions. This is said to be a clean-up measure.

However, it has long been argued that our constitution is outdated and that we need an entirely new constitution written. Is this the placing of the foot in the door, so to speak, to bring this about?

AMENDMENT NO. 2 — Would grant the powers and flexibility of operation to the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for present and future economic development of the state. Specifically it broadens the powers of the Water Development Board, increases the constitutionally authorized amount of Water Development Bonds by an additional \$3.5 billion subject to approval of two-thirds majority of the legislature, eliminates the present 4 percent interest rate ceiling on Water Development Bonds, eliminates the 1982 termination date for the WD Fund derived from the sale of WD Bonds, extends the maturity schedules for WD Bonds from 40 to 50 years, and authorizes the Texas WD Board under certain conditions to receive grants and to contract with the U. S., other states, foreign governments and others for acquisition and development of water resources and facilities.

Opposition seems to come from the broad sweep of the State Water Plan and questions about some of its specific provisions. Many are afraid they will lose future water rights under this program. Some are afraid that water which will be brought to their area will not be distributed equitably and some say they are frankly hesitant because of the huge sums of money involved.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 — would authorize the legislature to set the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the

Greenbugs Infest Sorghum Fields

Greenbug infestations in grain sorghum are increasing in many fields in Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. Farmers are encouraged to inspect their fields frequently to detect any damage from the tiny green pests.

The greenbugs are being found mainly on the underside of the lower leaves with some reddening showing as a symptom of damage.

Entomologists give these guidelines for determining the need for treating the greenbugs. Treat plants from emergence to about six inches high when greenbugs and damage are visible on the leaf surface. Treat plants from about the six-inch height to the pre-boot stage before any entire leaves are killed. Treat plants that are in the pre-boot stage and larger when there is a large enough greenbug infestation to cause death to more than the two lower normal-sized leaves.

Additional information on greenbugs and insecticides recommended for controlling them is available at the County Agent's office.

Measurement Service
If you do not wish to measure and determine your own acreage, you can request a measurement service. The cost of this service is \$8.50 per farm plus \$3.00 for each plot over one. You must make your request early enough to allow time for us to measure and compute the acreages before August 15, 1969.

Acreage Reports
Don't forget August 15, 1969! This is the last day to report your crop and diverted acreages. To date, about one-third of the producers have turned in their reports. There are over 450 farms which have not been certified and only three weeks remain before the deadline. You are encouraged to make your report as soon as possible.

It is very important that the acreage be determined correctly. Fifteen percent of the feed grain and fifteen percent of the cotton farms will be selected at random to be spot-checked. If the measured acres differ by more than the applicable variation from the reported acres—producers could lose all payments on all farms. Thus, we urge you to be very careful when measuring your crops.

Cotton Loans
Producers who placed 1968 cotton under CCC loans are reminded that July 31, 1969, is the maturity date. Any cotton not redeemed by this date will automatically be forfeited to CCC.

Safety Hasn't Kept Pace On Farm, President Notes

President Nixon, in signing a proclamation designating July 20-26 as Farm Safety Week, noted that although American agriculture has made great strides in production it nevertheless remains the nation's third most hazardous industry.

Mr. Nixon stated that "the strong hands and management skills of our farm people have dramatically increased farm production," and observed that "American agriculture has advanced more in the past 50 years than in all prior history."

"A third as many farmers," Mr. Nixon noted, "are feeding twice as many Americans today as in 1920."

"In addition, America is the world's largest exporter of agricultural products, and our abundance is a powerful force for world peace."

While their accomplishments have dramatically increased production, Mr. Nixon said, "our farm people have suffered a tragic toll of accidents."

The President emphasized that agriculture continues to rank third among American industries in accidental death rate.

"Thousands of farm residents," Mr. Nixon said, "are fatally injured every year and hundreds of thousands disabled. The dollar cost to the nation approaches \$2 billion, but the cost in pain, grief and suffering cannot be measured."

"This terrible waste demands our urgent attention," Mr. Nixon said. "It can be sharply reduced if everyone working in agriculture makes safety an integral part of management planning, a part of every job and every activity, both on and off the job."

Mr. Nixon called on all farm families, and those persons and groups serving or allied with agriculture, to use all possible means for minimizing accident losses at work, in homes, at recreation, and on public roads.

TWO LUBBOCK YOUTH INJURED IN AUTO-TRAIN CRASH

Two Lubbock youth were injured at one o'clock Wednesday afternoon when the pickup they were riding in was struck by a west-bound freight train at the first crossing east of the local depot.

The two youth, Donald Todd, 19 and Norman Massey, 12, were receiving emergency treatment at Adair Hospital at press time. The boys were helping young Massey's father, Marvin Massey, on construction work at the Leo Snoddy home just north of the accident site. He rushed over to assist them when he heard the crash. Todd is a nephew of Massey. All are from Lubbock.

The pickup was totally demolished with parts of the vehicle scattered for several hundred feet. M. C. Allen of Amarillo was the train engineer.

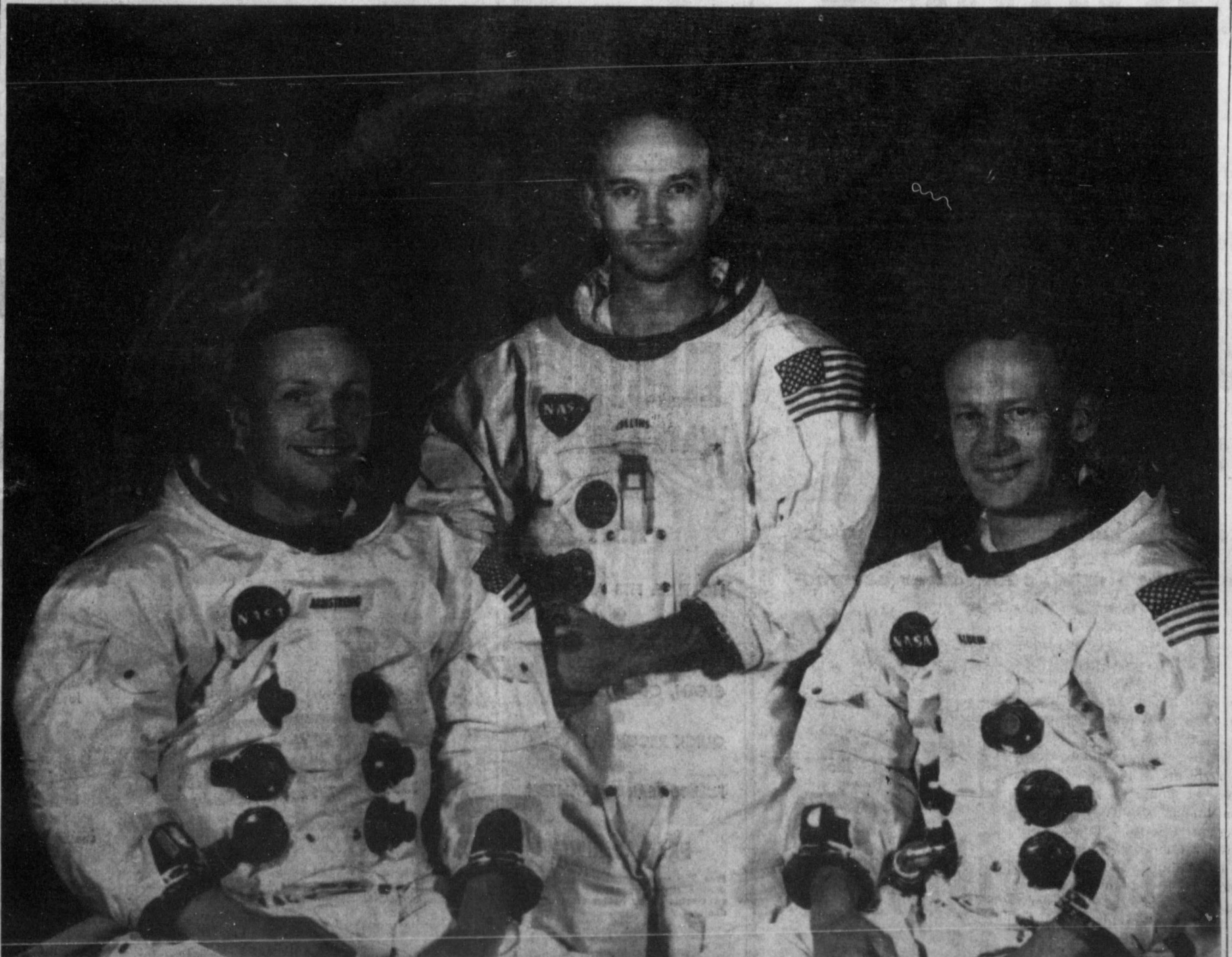
GRANDSON DIES IN DUMAS SATURDAY

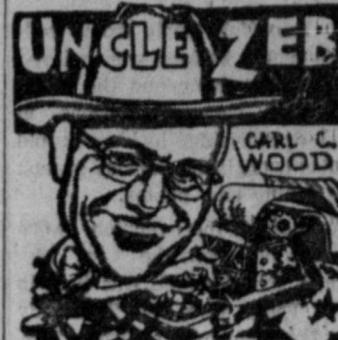

CREEPING MESQUITE CONTROL - The best known method for controlling creeping mesquite for range restoration is with repeated yearly aerial application of 2,4,5-T says G. O. Hoffman, Extension range brush and weed specialist. Recent tests showed that four yearly treatments controlled 98 per cent of the infestation and domestic livestock grazing was increased by 24 per cent. Hoffman's recommendation calls for 0.67 of a pound of 2,4,5-T low volatile ester mixed in 1 gallon of diesel oil and water for a total of 5 gallons of solution per acre.

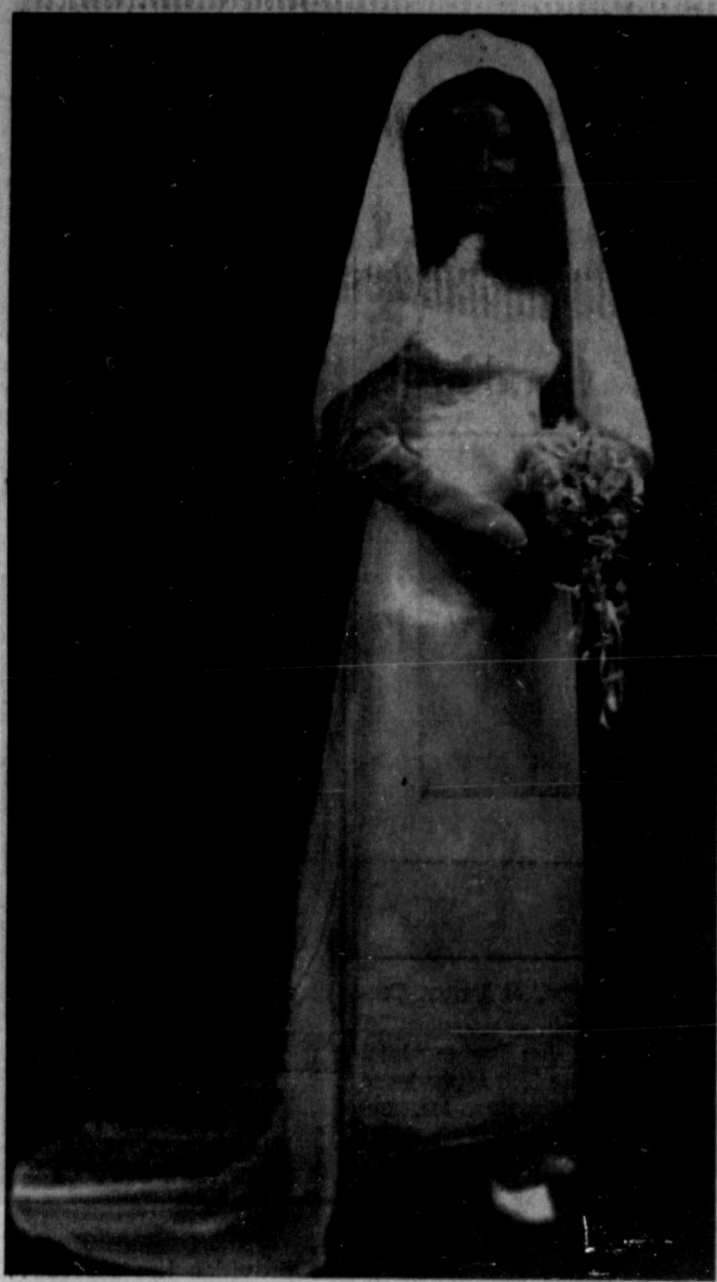

Demand For The Used Home Rises

Used or older homes in well-maintained neighborhoods are gaining in buyer appeal because of limited supply for sale and restricted competition of new houses, generally priced higher.

The combination of increasing demand and diminishing supply makes the climate highly favorable for the family selling a home, says Jane Berry, Extension housing and home furnishings specialist. Environment always has been an important factor, but it currently occupies a particularly prominent place in housing demand.

The average buyer of an existing home is often a previous owner, more sophisticated than the counterpart of the past, she says. Although scientific developments have increased comfort and reduced manual labor in the modern home, location continues to hold priority in home selection to most families.

According to a recent report by the Department of Research of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, demand for older homes had risen substantially in 44 percent of the communities included in the survey. Less than ten percent of the communities reported a decline in the demand for the existing single-family home.

The volume of used homes available for re-sale was down in over 30 percent of the communities, adds Mrs. Berry.

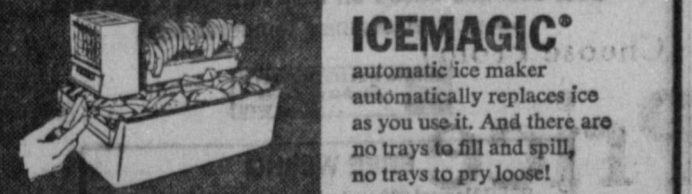

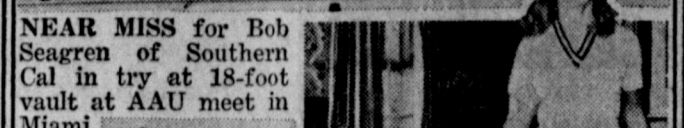

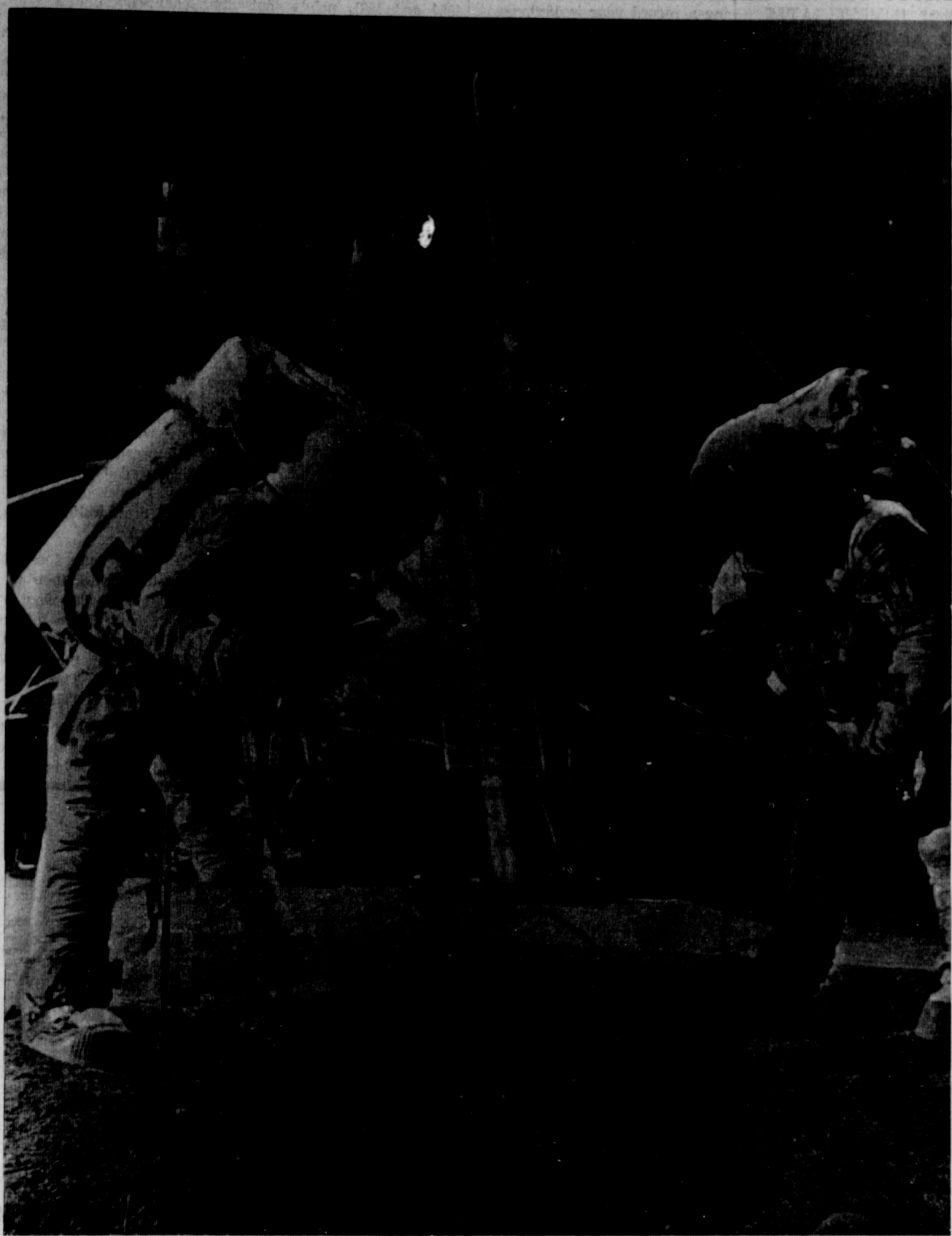

Highlights and Sidelights
From Your State Capitol
By Vera Stanford

AUSTIN, Tex.—It starts all over again Monday (July 28), Legislators will be back at the capitol, finishing up the finance chores they left dangling in their regular session.

Gov. Preston Smith, who called the special session after he rejected lawmakers' no-tax, one-year budget and insisted on adoption of a balanced biennial appropriations bill, apparently will spell out his recommendations on opening day.

Smith has been conducting a series of talks with business and industry leaders, exploring tax ideas. Legislators are expected to have to come up with a revenue measure totalling \$300 million or more.

Governor abandoned the idea of waiting until after the August 5 vote on an \$80 million welfare spending limit and other proposed constitutional amendments. Advisors and legislative leaders told him lawmakers will need every one of the 30 days allotted for the special session to complete the big money job at hand.

Key legislative leaders have done some spadework on a \$3.6 billion two-year budget for the fiscal period extending through August 31, 1971. No major difficulties are anticipated here, although some hitches could develop.

New court bills also are being drawn in preparation for special session effort to enact a measure to replace the courts measure vetoed by Smith last month as reaching his desk too late.

Courts Speak
A patient can still collect on a hospital insurance policy, even if most of his expenses are paid by Medicare, says the State Supreme Court in agreeing with the appellate court in an Abilene case.

A serum company is liable for damages in the death of 25 registered calves in Ochiltree County, says the Supreme Court in backing a trial court. Court found that antibiotic given the calves for a respiratory ailment was unfit for use.

A Waco seed company's failure to protest its tax assessment before the board of equalization did not deprive it of the right to challenge the valuation in court, the High Court said in a decision upholding the Waco Court of Civil Appeals but reversing the trial court.

Supreme Court has agreed to hear an application by the El Paso Times on a libel case by a former UT-El Paso professor. Dr. Richard Trexler claims he was libeled by a letter published in the Times. Trial court found no actual malice or damages, but the appeals court said the jury got the wrong definition of

actual malice and ordered a retrial, which the Times appealed. Court upheld an appeals decision that Deaf Smith County landowner Vada White and others would have to start over in a land condemnation suit involving Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America.

Dallas man, convicted of slaying a school girl, got a new trial by order of the Court of Criminal Appeals, because his lawyers were not given an advance list of prospective jurors.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed conviction of a Galveston man for possessing narcotics paraphernalia because the trial court permitted testimony on information given the police by a drug buyer.

Governor Smith named to the new Credit Union Commission Wilfred S. McKinnon of Baytown, Robert W. Mitchell of Longview,

Pete G. Gooch of Fort Worth, R. C. Morgan of El Paso, Walter V. Duncan of Richardson and Glenn D. Johnson of Houston.

Smith is setting up a 27-member Governor's Health Advisory Committee to work with the Texas State Comprehensive Health Planning Agency and has arranged a two-day orientation program.

Ralph Rettig of El Paso was named to the Texas Water Development Board to fill a vacancy on the Board's weather modification advisory committee. He replaces the late C. B. Ray of El Paso.

Governor Smith named six legislators to attend the Southern Regional Educational Board's legislative advisory council meeting in Hot Springs, Arkansas. Senators named were Bill Moore of Bryan, Jim Bates of Edinburg and Jack Hightower of Vernon. Representatives were Hillary B. Doran of Del Rio, Don Cavness of Austin and Frank Calhoun of Abilene.

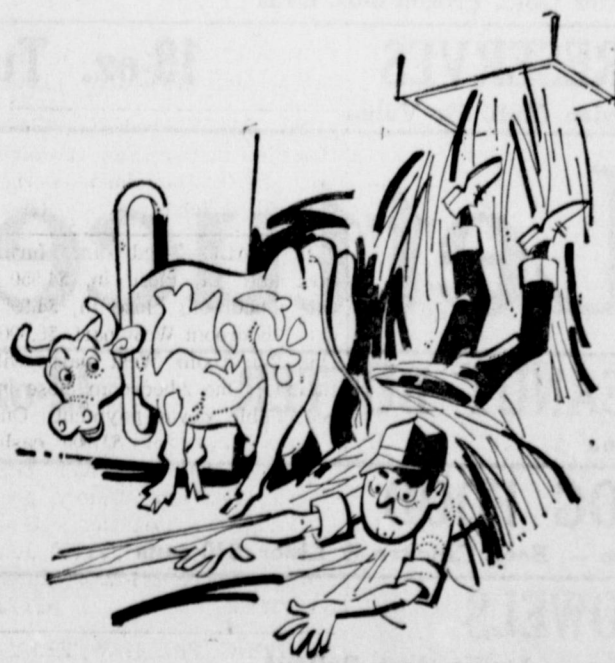

TRAFFIC LAW QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Is a drivers license required and what is the minimum age a boy or a girl can obtain a license to operate a motor scooter or motorcycle?

A. A drivers license IS required to operate any type of motor scooter or motorcycle. The minimum age is 15 years and this will be a restricted license for operating a motorcycle which does not exceed 5 brake horsepower. To operate a motorcycle over 5 brake horsepower requires a regular license. Any person with the new drivers license (with color picture) must take a written examination plus the drivers test on a motorcycle to operate a motor scooter or motorcycle regardless of horsepower. Any one still holding the old type license (without picture) may still legally operate any type motorcycle, until they re-new for the new type license.

Q. Who is required to wear safety helmets?
A. No person may operate or ride as a passenger on a motor-

cycle on any public street or highway unless he wears protective headgear which has been approved by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Q. What should you do if you damage an unattended or parked vehicle?
A. You must locate the owner if possible or leave your name and address, name of the owner of the vehicle which you were driving and a statement of the circumstances in or on the damaged vehicle where the owner will find it.

Q. How close can or should you follow another vehicle?
A. The driver of a motor vehicle shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard for the speed of such vehicles and the traffic upon and the condition of the highway. A good rule of thumb is to allow one vehicle length for each ten miles per hour of speed you are traveling.

AUTO INSURANCE & TEENAGE DRIVERS

Parents of teen-age drivers, especially boys, should be prepared to pay up to triple their regular rates for auto insurance.

The cost of an under 20-year-old boy who is the principle driver of a second or third car in the family runs about three times the rate registered in the parents' name, according to an Extension home management specialist.

The rate is about double the adult cost if he merely drives the family car "with permission," Linda Jacobsen adds.

Records show that youthful drivers are more careful of the family car than their own, and during this period they can build up a good record which will be an advantage with later rates.

Girls aren't quite as expensive: a policy covering a 17-year-old girl as principal driver costs about 50 percent more than the standard adult rate, going down to 10 percent excess at age 20. But surveys indicate that girls are getting more careless at the wheel the Texas A&M University specialist says.

For boys, penalty premiums start to drop at age 20, decreasing annually to 10 percent at age 29. Miss Jacobsen adds that teenagers who have taken an ac-

credited driver education course save about 10 percent.

PATROL INVESTIGATES FARM ACCIDENTS

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of June, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$2,405.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1969 shows a total of 21 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 16 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$13,910.00.

During the first six months of 1969 in Texas there were 1,470 traffic deaths, or two less as compared to the 1,472 traffic deaths for the same period of 1968. However, if past trends continue the last six months will probably exceed the first six months; as a matter of fact, the last six months of 1968 there were 2,009 traffic deaths.

The Sergeant stated, "With an all time record of 49 traffic deaths over the 4th of July weekend, we are not only well ahead in comparison to the beginning of the second six months in 1968, but well on our way to establish-

ing a record year in 1969.

Economist Sees Inflation As Greatest Enemy of Agriculture

Farmers and ranchers, perhaps more so than any other group of Texans, have a strong stake in seeing inflation curbed, believes W. E. Black, Extension economist in marketing, Texas A&M University. Texas agriculture has much to gain from national policies that control inflation, he adds.

Inflation hits farmers and ranchers going and coming. It increases the cost of the things used to produce, and cheapens the dollars they have left, explains Black. The inflated dollar does not go as far in buying the things he needs for his family to live. In the meantime, farm prices and farmer incomes are held down by heavy production.

In short, the agricultural producer is caught in a squeeze between the prices paid and the prices received.

Prices of production goods farmers use seldom decline. For example, prices of farm machinery have risen every year since 1955. Prices of motor vehicles also rose except for a slight dip in

1960 and 1961, points out the economist.

Farm production costs have increased steadily since 1953. It appears that nearly all of the expected increase of \$2 billion in farm production expenses this year will be the result of higher prices rather than the result of greater quantities of input items purchased, Black noted.

Inflation at home, he adds, also make it harder for U. S. farm products to get into foreign markets.

Therefore, Black sees inflation as one of the greatest enemies of Texas farmers and ranchers, both as a hindrance to U. S. farm exports and as a tightener of the cost-price squeeze.
