CC Second Semester Registration Begins Monday, January 27

College students were burning midnight oil during this week making ready for semester tests Monday through Wednesday and the faculty will be burning the lamps grading tests and term projects to evaluate the work done for the semester today so grades can be mailed on Friday to render a verdict to parents and students.

The second semester gets underway Monday, January 27, when all students are scheduled to register for classes beginning Tuesday — both day and evening.

Expected enrollment is about 300 students in both regular and night classes. There are over 90 scheduled class offerings for day classes plus laboratory time on the agenda with various classes scheduled Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

Fifty or more new students are expected to enter Clarendon College for the first time this semester. Of this number, several are students transferring from larger institutions to get the individual attention and assistance available at Clarendon College. Others are returning veterans who have completed their military obligation and now wish to continue an education with assistance through the Veterans Administration Education program available at Clarendon College, while others are students who thought staying home would be fun until all their friends left for college in the fall and life at home was no challenge.

Registration will continue through Feb. 5 but all are warned of the late start and hard make-up schedule to catch up days missed when registering late.

Reservations for rooms in both the boys' and girls' dorm should be made by noon Monday, January 27. Adults are invited to investigate the course offering to alert themselves of this changing world and accept the challenge of keeping up with the younger generation, stated Dean Beryl Clinton.

Sophomore students whose last name begins A through W will register Monday, January 27 from 8:30 to 10:30; N-Z register from 10:30 to 12:00; Freshmen register as follows: A-M, 1 to 2:30 p.m.; N-Z, 2:30 to 5 p.m. Evening school and day students follow the same schedule.

COTTON CLASSING NEWS

Cotton harvest in the Panhandle is coming to a close with gins caught up and only a few bales remaining in the fields. The release this week will be the final one put out by the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Memphis.

There were 8,054 samples processed the past week to bring the total to 183,370 bales for the season thus far.

Quality declined. Light spotted grades accounted for 44 per cent and spotted grades for 41 per cent. Staples were predominantly 31/32 though the percentage dropped to 59. Mike readings showed 52 per cent in the 3.5 to 4.9 range.

The market remained steady this week on most active qualities. Price ranged from 17.73 to 18.47. Cottonseed remained at \$49 per ton.

Dr. J. Gordon Stewart Dies Monday Night

Dr. John Gordon Stewart, prominent Osteopathic Physician, died Monday night in Groom Memorial Hospital following a lengthy illness. His body will be taken to Restland Crematory in Dallas by Murphy Funeral Home for cremation Friday morning.

Dr. Stewart was born October 21, 1909 at Great Falls, Montana. He graduated from the Osteopathic College at Kirksville, Mo. in 1933 and moved to Clarendon to make his home in 1941 after starting his practice at Beggs, Okla. He was a member and faithful worker in the Presbyterian Church and was a member of the Masonic Lodge. He had served as City and County Health Officer and had served as a public school trustee for several years. He was a sustaining member of the Boy Scouts and was a member of the Texas and Panhandle Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons Associations.

In October 1967, Dr. Stewart received recognition from the State Headquarters Selective Service System in appreciation for 15 years of patriotic service to his country as an uncompensated member of the Selective Service System.

It was through his efforts and long hard hours that the Donley County Golf Club continued in operation for the enjoyment of local golf players. He had built three grass greens on the course and kept them maintained as well as beautifying the course.

Dr. Stewart was truly a family physician and has been faithful throughout the years he and his family have made Clarendon their home. During the war years and at other times that our community has been without other doctors, Dr. Stewart added a few more hours to his busy schedule in order to help take care of those needing his services. He had a personality that won the affection of the young and old alike. His kindness and personal interest will be long remembered and cherished by those he served. Our community has suffered a great loss in the death of Dr. Stewart.

It was Dr. Stewart's wish that memorials be made to the church of your choice.

Survivors include his wife, Gurrie Stewart of the home; sons, Larry Stewart of Slidell, La., and Dennis Stewart of Fort Lee, Va.; a brother, Russell Stewart of Seattle, Washington; two sisters, Mrs. Victor Leick of Seattle and Mrs. James Rall of Spokane, Washington.

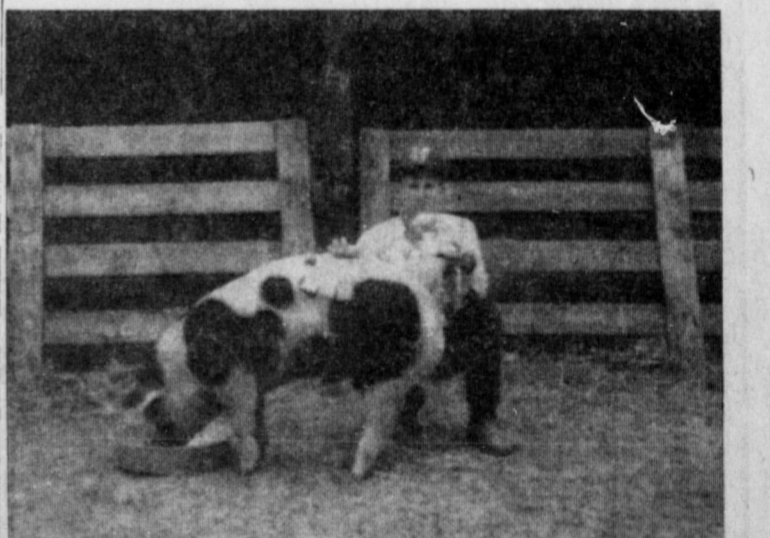
Sayle Nixon Dozier Services Held Sat.

**Winter Grazing Tips
From Extension
Agronomist**

Winter pastures can be better utilized if they are grazed less, Dr. J. Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist at Texas A&M University, reminds livestock producers.

Most winter pastures such as small grains contain high amounts of protein and other nutrients and continuous grazing is usually unnecessary for beef cattle. Approximately one or two hours of grazing per day is sufficient for a beef held on medium growth pastures, he adds.

"Grazing every third or fourth day is also a good practice to follow. Research has shown that limiting the amount of grazing for beef cattle can more than double the profits to livestock producers," Pratt says.

The agronomist points out that it is a different story for dairymen and in many cases stocker producers. In such enterprises where most of the animal pro-

duct is marketed, winter pastures can be used to a greater extent.

Free choice feeding of high-quality hay is usually recommended and can mean extra days of grazing and profits from winter pastures.

Ample fertilization can help raise the usefulness of winter grazing land, Pratt advises producers to start thinking now of topdressing if additional grazing is on the slate for the early spring. A soil test is the best way to determine fertilization and limestone needs, he concludes.

Tax Man Says

Most of us know good and well that we have to file an income tax return between now and April 15. However, if you are well-heeled and have reached the stage in life where you want to give your children, your friends, or others, substantial amounts of money or property, you may have another tax filing problem: Gift tax returns on all the gifts that you made over \$3000 to any one individual

(\$6000 if both spouses gave out of community funds) are due before April 15, 1968, as well as the income tax returns. You have a lifetime exemption for making tax-free gifts amounting to \$30,000 over and above your annual exemption of up to \$3000 (or \$6000 community property). You must, however, file a gift tax return, Form 709, on the \$30,000 worth of gifts. If you need additional information, contact Internal Revenue.

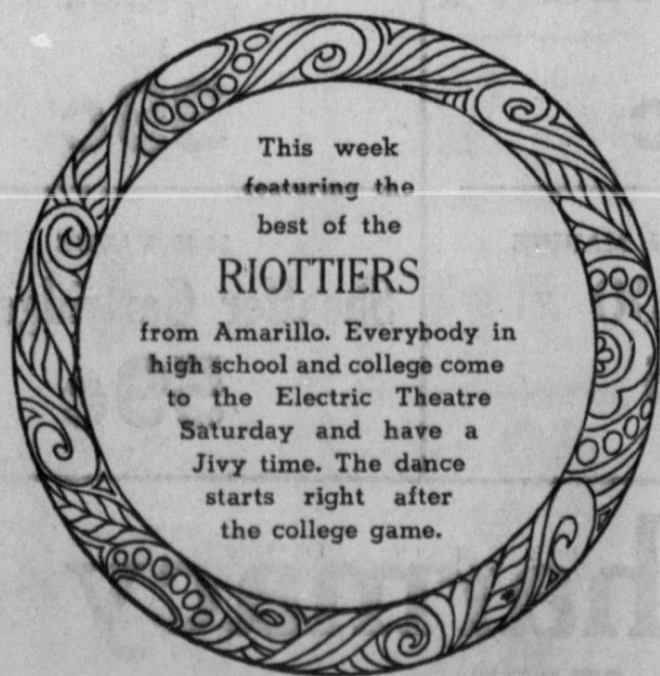

Fresh oranges, grapefruit and tangerines all are in big supply now. In addition to the fresh fruit, good supplies of canned single-strength grapefruit juice also are available.

Production of all three fruits is well above average, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Other foods abundant during January include canned tomatoes and tomato products potatoes and onions, broilers, canned sal-

mon and dry beans. The third largest fall potato output on record is sending big supplies of this food staple to markets now. Production of tomatoes for processing set a new record, as indicated by the large supplies of canned tomatoes and such products as tomato paste, catsup, sauces and soups.

Canned salmon production during 1968 more than doubled that of the previous year. You'll find especially ample offerings of pink and chum salmon.

Dry beans most plentiful now include pea beans, pintos, black-eyes and baby limas, according to USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

High Yield Grass Variety Approved

A new high yielding grass variety has been approved for certification by the State Seed and Plant Board and released for public use. Monty Sowers of the local Soil Conservation reported this week.

Called Selection 75 Kleingrass, it is a palatable, drought resistant tame pasture grass which is being released for certified seed production, Sowers said. SCS and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations joined in the release after both agencies cooperated in making evaluation planting across the state.

Sowers said the newly certified grass is one of the most promising ones developed in Texas in recent years. He pointed out, however, that it will never replace top grasses already in use—it just gives livestock men another good grass to choose from when planting improved pastures.

Selections of kleingrass were introduced in 1951 from a 15- to 18-inch rainfall belt in South Africa for planting at the SCS nursery in San Antonio. After extensive evaluation at the James E. "Bud" Smith Plant Materials Center at Knox City and in soil and water conservation districts across the state, Selection 75 was picked as the one strain best adapted to Texas conditions.

Quail, deer, and other wildlife also find kleingrass attractive. Quail eat the seeds, and deer relish the forage, especially in the early spring when few other plants are green. Breeder's seed are produced at the SCS plant at Knox City. Foundation seeds were grown in 1968 and will be available in 1969 through the Foundation Seed Section, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station. Limited amounts of certified Selection 75 seed will be available in early 1969 for spring plantings.

About 1½ to 2 pounds of pure live seed per acre are usually drilled for broadcast plantings, Sowers said. For row plantings about one pound is used. For further information, contact technicians of the local SCS office located at Clarendon, Telephone 874-2335.

Signups for the 1969 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs is scheduled to begin February 3, 1969, and continue through March 21, 1969. The decision as to whether advance payments will be made is expected prior to the beginning of signups.

1969 WHEAT

In order to participate in the 1969 wheat program, you must certify compliance with the program and divert an acreage equal to 15 per cent of your 1969 allotment. Some producers are confused about this as they think this 15 per cent comes off

of the original wheat allotment. But remember, you can plant all of your allotment and set aside the 15 per cent diversion. This will entitle you to earn certificate payments on 43 per cent of your allotment plus an opportunity to divert an additional amount for payment.

SALMAGUNDI

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is presently conducting a hearing to determine if a statewide ban on the use of DDT should be instituted. Leading the fight against DDT is the Environmental Defense Fund, a nonprofit organization of scientists interested in environmental quality and citizens concerned about conservation. Taking the opposite side are the pesticide industry and pesticide users. The ruling by the Wisconsin Department which is expected in the spring is thought to be of national significance.

Spices in cookery parallel cosmetics in grooming. Both should be subtle in order to achieve a particular effect without becoming too noticeable, says Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.
