Christmas in Brice Flats

I can still see the old farm house sitting back from the dirt road all framed in cotton and corn patches, the big tall windmill blowing softly in the cold winter breeze. It had a rain water cistern at the corner with a big zinc bucket

and a rope pulley to draw the water up and down and the old gourd dipper we had hanging by the well to drink from. Warm smoke poured out of the roof from that old pot bellied stove inside, where we used cow chips and

brush for fuel. A big welcome was written all over the place.

Christmas was a wonderful and exciting time of the year for us. A few days before the big day, my Dad and oldest brother would take the old wagon out to the 'brakes' and cut a large mesquite for

our Christmas tree. We would meet them a mile away at the corner gate and drive back home all excited over the thoughts of decorating the tree. On Christmas Eve we all sat on the floor around the tree. We made decorations from ginger bread cookies, crepe paper

and candy dolls and strung long strings of popcorn and cranberries. My Mother cut a large star out of a piece of tin for the shining star on top.

Christmas was approaching and Santa Claus was very near. The night was filled with enchantment and ablaze with the Christmas spirit of old. The longest night of the year was the night before Christmas. We hung our

long black cotton stockings on the back of the rope bottom chairs beside our little iron beds and tried to sleep the night away, but it seemed years before morning...but finally, it came! We jumped out of bed straight to the toys, all nestled underneath the tree. Our black stockings were bursting at the seams...with the queens of the party peeping out the

tops. They were Villa's (my sister) and my dolls with the long blonde curls and flirty eyes that opened and shut, looking as tho' they were just asking for kisses. Further down the old sox were apples, oranges, bananas, nuts, mixed candies and those black 'toe' nuts.

Then came the old fashioned Christmas dinner my Mother had been preparing

for days. She made cakes, cookies, pies and everybody pulled taffy candy all over the place. We had wild turkey with all the trimming. Christmas times were simpler than the glamorous

ones of later days, but far richer. We had the pleasure of living amidst those old colorful scenes.

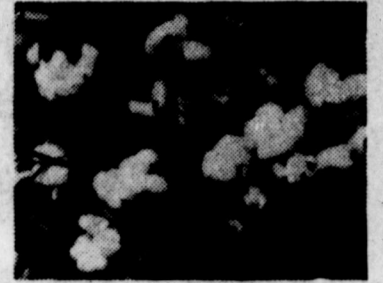

Three from Clarendon arrested in seven county drug bust

In a cooperative effort between the District Attorney's office, the State narcotics officials and the Donley County Sheriff's office, 40 individuals were arrested in a 7 county area this week.

The area covered extended from Clarendon to Wichita Falls, north to Shamrock. Three of those arrested were from Clarendon.

The arrests were made on delivery of narcotic substances, NOT on possession alone. The three from Clarendon were arrested as dealers in narcotic substances as well.

"Now is the time to stand up and say something about dope dealers," says Donley County Sheriff Thompson, "help the law enforcement agencies, support the arrests and don't complain about busting the kids."

The cry has been heard by many. "Get the dealers, leave the kids alone for simple possession!" That is exactly what has been done in this big bust.

Doug Wright from the District Attorney's office said that "David McCoy, the DA, is thrilled with the results of this work."

"We've known about this for a long time, but drug dealers are hard to catch. The State Narcotic Boys came in 8 months ago and got dealers to sell to them. They've done an outstanding job!" Sheriff Thompson had nothing but praise for the tremendous work done by the State Narcotic Agency.

Those arrested were not all juveniles, many were adults up to age 30. This is not always a problem of the young, but it is helped along by the adults of the community as well as the juveniles involved. Apathy is a big problem with the Donley County drug problem.

"This won't by no means stop it," says Doug Wright, "but it'll set a good example for other dealers and would

be dealers in the area."

Drugs are a problem in Clarendon, don't be fooled. Read the Sheriff's Report weekly and see how many are arrested for possession. They get it from somewhere, they buy it from someone, and three of our residents were sellers of these

substances.

Sheriff Thompson plans to crack down on users and dealers. The District Attorney's office has stated that they will prosecute to the limit on drug offenses.

The investigation is continuing. "This is only the beginning of the crack

down", said Wright. Sheriff Thompson hopes the community will support his office in these arrests. You are protecting your young and the community.

"The jail is full now, but we will find room for any more of this type offender," said Thompson.

A WORK DAY is scheduled for Saturday at 9 a.m. Cinder blocks will be cleaned and, if enough show up to help, walls will be erected. All the help you can give will be appreciated.

Water rates go up!

Bill Weatherly, City Manager, announced that effective as of January 1, the city water and sewer charges will go up. The City Aldermen met and have decided that with the deficit so much in the red, the increases must be made.

Water will be increased \$1 per 1000 minimum, it will only go up from \$8 to \$9 as of January 1.

This new charge is \$9 for the first 5000 gallons used, this is your minimum water usage. The rate for the next 5000 gallons is 80c and then 70c per 1000 after that.

Sewer charges will increase from \$2 to \$4, trash will remain the same. This means that your minimum city bill will be increased from \$14 to \$17.

The city water revenue was \$159,052.33 while the expenses for the year were \$173,538.86. This makes a deficit of \$14,486.53.

These rates are effective as of January 1, 1982.

Chamber of Commerce news

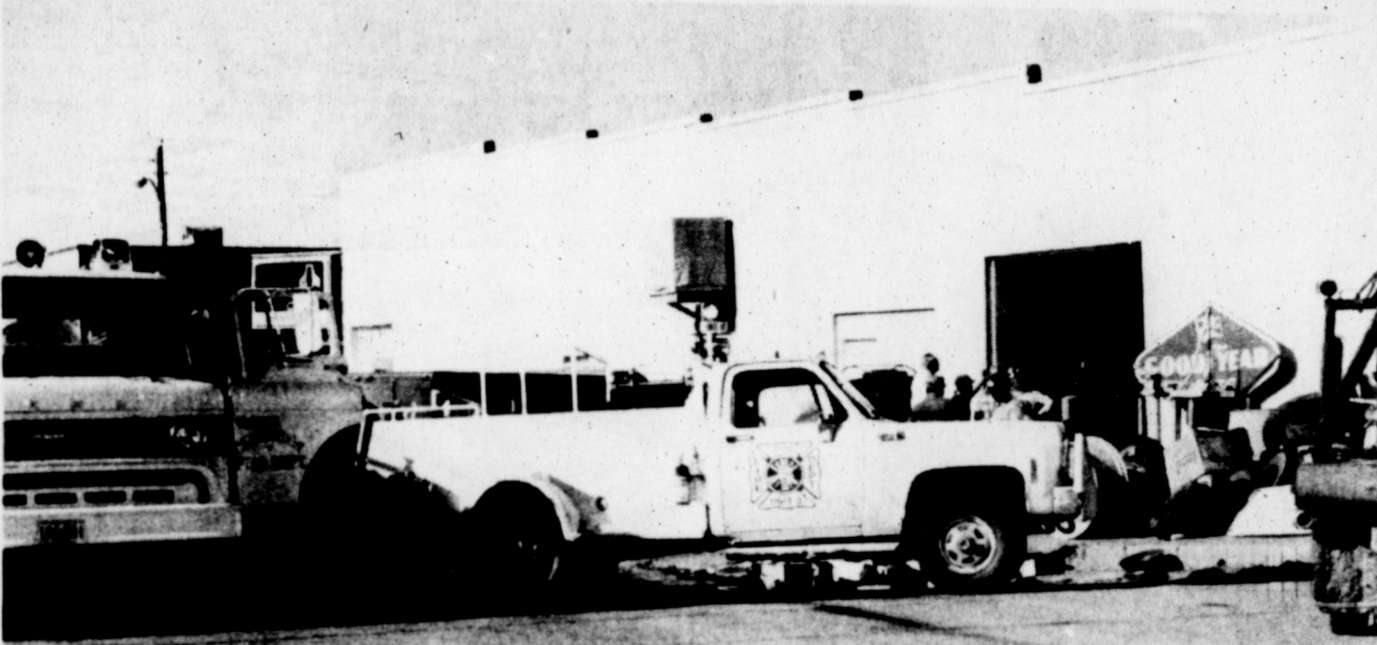
Wil-Mart Convenience Store is the Chamber's newest member. Mr. Jack Daniel is the manager.

Outdoor decoration lights theft is a misdemeanor

"Last year, I had 50 bulbs stolen from my outside decorations," complained one very irate citizen. "I don't put any up anymore because they just get stolen, and who can afford to replace them anymore?" said another. "It's just malicious vandalism," explained a lady. "Last year strings of stolen lights were found on the school grounds simply smashed."

That is what holiday time means to idle hands and small minds. But if you are out of things to do and wonder if it might not be fun to swipe a string of lights or take every other bulb out of someone's outside decorations, remember this: IT IS THEFT! Sheriff J. Thompson advises us all that any theft up to \$200 is a MISDEMEANOR and may receive a mighty stiff fine, even jail!

If you are arrested for stealing only \$5 or \$20 worth of bulbs or ANY outside decorations from a person or businesses property, Judge Billy Christal has said that "the fine for theft of less than \$20 is \$200," and if it is necessary, time may be necessary, the jail can and WILL handle both adults and JUVENILES!

If you steal an expensive decoration or several strands of lights that total from \$20.01 up to \$200, the fine could be and is likely to be \$1000 fine and 6 months in jail or BOTH!!

"If it is necessary," adds Judge Christal, "time will be spent in jail."

The sheriff's department personnel will be on the look-out for such thefts and

Judge Christal has stated that he will come down at any time to see to the setting of the fine for these offenders, "regardless of their age, our jail has facilities to handle offenders of either sex and

Roundball Round-Up

The Clarendon Broncos opened their basketball season last Thursday by stumbling out of the blocks in losing to Gruver; but the Broncos recovered in whipping Canadian and Panhandle to gain a consolation trophy at the Spearman Invitational Tournament.

Clarendon was picked seventh in Class AA in two pre-season polls, but the Broncos did little to live up to that rating against Gruver. Going into their first game, Ron Home's hoopsters had worked out only four times, and they looked like it. Clarendon hit only 29% from the floor, had seventeen turnovers and seventeen fouls in losing to the Greyhounds, 53-39. Brad Thompson, Clarendon's only all-District returnee, tossed in eleven points and had nine rebounds while Hosea Hearn added nine more. Bobby Weatheron nabbed seven rebounds.

The following morning,

the Broncos did not play much better, but it was enough to get by Canadian, 48-44. Thompson and Hearn each dumped in 12 points and John Braxton and Bryan Hill controlled the boards as Clarendon took an exciting victory.

The Bronco cagers could still manage only 29% from the field and they allowed Canadian sixteen points from the charity stripe. Nevertheless a strong fourth quarter, led by Hill advanced the Broncos into play off with bi-district football opponent Panhandle.

The first half showed little improvement on the part of the Broncos, although

Clarendon turned the ball over only four times. The Panthers were on top 25-20 at intermission. 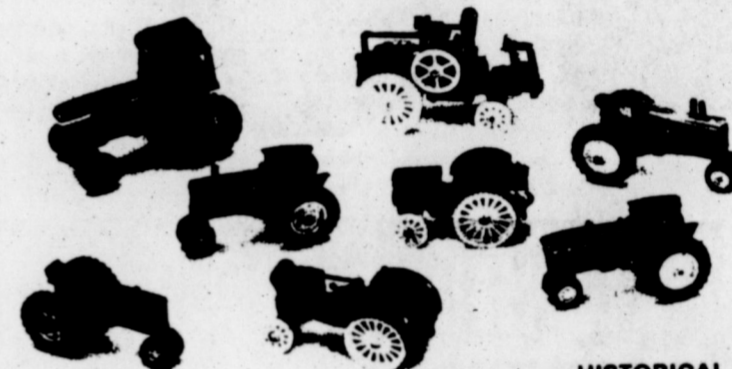

2 TBS granulated sugar.
2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp soda
1/4 tsp salt
3 egg yolks beaten
3/4 cup sour cream
1/4 cup buttermilk
1/4 cup melted and cooled

shortening
1/4 cup melted and cooled butter or margarine
3 egg whites stiffly beaten
Whisk dry ingredients together. Combine yolks, sour cream, buttermilk. Add alternately with dry ingredients the cooled fat.
Stir gently until no longer lumpy, fold in egg whites. Cook in waffle iron.
Makes 10 waffles--Serve with topping:
2 cups (1 lb. can) pitted sour cherries, drained
1/2 cup sugar
1 TBS lemon juice
1 tsp corn starch dissolved in a little water
Combine cherries, lemon juice, sugar in saucepan and bring to boil. Put in dissolved corn starch. (Red food coloring if desired). Cook over low heat until thickened. Translucent. Serve atop waffles.

SIMPLE HOMEMADE TOYS

Here are a few easy-to-make, old-timey toys that can occupy snowbound little ones long enough for you to catch your breath or finish up the chores. The simple, but effective, spool racer is a good plaything to start out with.

You'll need a large wooden spool if you can find one... plastic just doesn't make it! You'll also need a 1/4-inch dowel or stick 3 inches long, a large bead (bigger than the spool's hole), a strong 4-inch rubber band, and two small nails.

Turn the spool on end and drive the two nails into the wood on opposite sides of its central hole... leaving enough of each nail exposed to hold the rubber band. Wrap the band around the nails, thread it through the cylinder and then through the bead, and slip the dowel through the protruding rubber loop. Then simply wind the rubber-band motor, place the toy on a smooth surface, and watch it go!

Another plaything, the "come back" can, may be easily constructed if you simply tie a rubber band through holes punched about an inch or two apart in the center of the bottom and lid of a tin can (a plastic-topped coffee can will work just fine). Then knot a short length of string to the middle of the elastic and fasten a fishing sinker, a small stone, or some other weight to the cord. The toy will "boomerang" back to its original position whenever it's rolled!

And, to make Grandma's old-time finger trap, cut a 6" X 12" piece of heavy paper and make two 8"-long lengthwise slits, about 2" apart, down the middle. Then, starting at the slitted end, roll the paper into a tube with an inside diameter of approximately one-half inch, glue the joint, let it dry... and tell someone that you want him or her to help you with a "magic trick". Ask your assistant to stick both index fingers into the tube. Then ask him or her to pull them out. And, finally, listen to your victim howl when that proves all but impossible!

Here's just one more... the hummer button. All you need is string, large buttons, and two 3-inch lengths of rounded wood for the handles. Make holes 1 inch from each handle end. Thread the holes in the handles and the buttons with string so the buttons are in the middle... between the two handles. Twist the string tightly, and—when the handles are pulled apart—the buttons will spin and hum.

Proposed national conservation program

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announces a proposed national conservation program to deal with the serious resource conservation problems ahead for American agriculture.

Four points highlight the program, according to Jim Donaho, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS), at Clarendon are:

- Setting soil and water conservation priorities;
- Strengthening the role of local and state governments in conservation planning;
- Increasing budget coordination and cooperation between USDA agencies; and
- Targeting more USDA conservation assistance to critical problems and areas.

This program is the proposed response to the Congress required by the Soil and Water Resources Con-

servation Act of 1977 (RCA), reports Donaho. It is based on an extensive appraisal of the condition of the nation's soil and water resources and an analysis of future trends.

Highest national priority in the proposed conservation program is reducing soil erosion to maintain the long-term productivity of agricultural land. Second priority is reducing flood damages in upstream areas. Other priority activities are conserving water and improving water supply and quality, community-related conservation, improving fish and wildlife habitat, and increasing the use of organic waste.

The program is the USDA response to the Soil and Water Resource Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state have a supply of the leaflet that summarizes the program and that contains a pre-addressed, postage-paid response form.

The offices also have a reference copy of the full report of the program and draft environmental impact statement.

Details of the new program are presented in the RCA Revised Draft Program Report and Environmental Impact statement available for reference use at SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state. The two USDA offices also have leaflets that summarize the program and that contain the postage-paid, pre-addressed response form.

Comments on the proposed new program are encouraged. They must be mailed to George C. Marks, SCS State Conservationist, P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503 before January 15, 1982.

Retail Food

Prices

USDA has reported the components of retail food prices as follows: labor, 31% farm value, 31% packaging, 8%; transportation, 6%; profit, 4%; fuel and power, 4%; other, 16%. The 1981 preliminary total marketing bill is reported at \$197 billion up 10.3% from 1980 and 23.2% from 1979. Thus, the food marketing bill is 69% of total cost (for domestic farm foods purchased for consumption both at home and away from home--1981 estimate).

The forecast for prices received by farmers for 1981 is 140% of what it was in 1967. Prices paid by farmers were 150% of the 1967 level.

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SWEET NEWS

Artificial sweeteners play an important role in the lives of many Americans.

Diabetics, for example, rely on artificial sweeteners to make sugarless foods more tasty. Weight conscious individuals often substitute artificial sweeteners for sugars in order to reduce intake of excess calories.

Since the removal of cyclamate from the market, saccharin has remained as the artificial sweetener commonly found in foods and beverages. Saccharin has no calories. Many people believe saccharin's sweetness is not similar to that of sugar; some sense an unpleasant aftertaste...often bitter.

The G. D. Searle Company has recently announced that the Food and Drug Administration has approved its request to market **aspartame**...a new artificial sweetener that is "sweet news" for the many Americans who rely on such products. Aspartame is about 200 times sweeter than sugar. Compared to sugar, aspartame has essentially no calories (sugar contains about 16 calories per teaspoonful). Best of all, "sweetness tests" at several universities have revealed that foods and beverages sweetened with aspartame has about the same sweetness characteristics as those sweetened with sugar. SWEET NEWS!

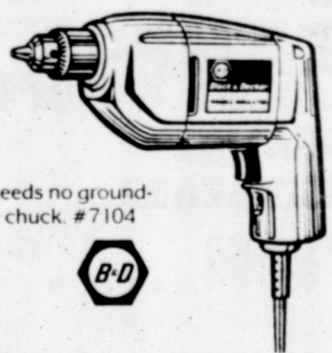
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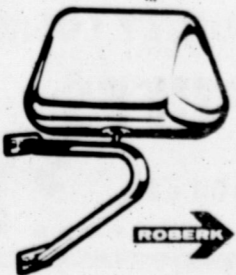
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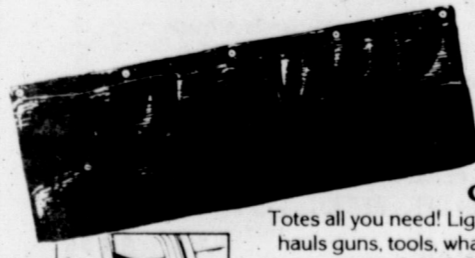
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
