CC Aggie Club Rodeo Set For Friday And Saturday, April 4-5

Plans are complete for the fifth annual Clarendon College Aggie Club Rodeo to be held at the Donley County Fair Grounds in Clarendon Friday and Saturday, April 4-5. Evening performances will begin at 7 p.m. with the Saturday afternoon events beginning at 2 p.m. This year's producer will be Loyd Barb of Beaver, Okla.

Books opened March 16 and closed at noon March 31. A limit of two head in each boy's event has been placed with students between the ages of 14 and 21 years participating. Over 100 contestants representing 8 colleges and three states have entered this year's events. There will be bull riding, Waddie-bronc riding, ribbon roping, tie down calf roping, girl's goat tying and girl's barrel racing.

Over thirty buckles will be awarded during the two day event and after the final performance the top individual in the over-all average will be presented a buckle for each event. The All-Around Cowgirl will receive a buckle qualifying by scoring points in a minimum of one riding event and one roping event. The All-Around Cowgirl will also receive a buckle qualifying by performing in both girl's events.

This year's queen contest will be held Saturday, April 5.

There will be dancing on Friday and Saturday nights following performances with music by

the Jay Riley Western Band of Amarillo. Admission to the dances at the Red Brick Gym will be \$1.50 Stag or \$2.50 per Couple. Admission to the Rodeo will be \$1 for Adults and 50¢ for Students.

Members of the Aggie Club will appreciate the full support of the community and surrounding area.

City And School Trustee Elections Slated For Saturday, April 5

Saturday, April 5th, will be a busy day for city and county voters with two elections taking place on that date.

The City election will be held at the City Hall with voting from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. City Voters will choose a mayor and two aldermen. Sam Lowry is the election Judge and clerks are Darlene Spier, Katherine Kent and Lee Tyler.

Candidates for Mayor include incumbent Richard L. Gilkey and James D. Crawford. Candidates for Aldermen are incumbent Chas. E. Deyhle and new contestants Buddy Ford, Glenn Wallace, Roland Hill and C. J. Lohoefer. Voters will elect two Aldermen from the above slate of candidates.

Thirteen absentee ballots had been cast in the City election prior to the deadline Tuesday.

In the Independent School District election to be held Saturday also, there are three candidates for the two places on the board. They are incumbent Warren Hardin, John Wayne Stepp and L. P. (Bud) Moore.

In the election for County School Board members, there are no contested races with Billie Christal running for re-election, County-at-large, G. W. Estlack for re-election Precinct 2 and A. B. Spalding for re-election Precinct 3. All county voters will be eligible to vote for the County-at-large office but voters of their respective precincts only will vote for the other two candidates in Precincts 2 and 3.

The school trustee election will be held in the Youth Center building west of the Post Office. Voting hours will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Election Judge will be Willard Skelton. Up to Tuesday afternoon only five voters had cast absentee ballots.

Be sure and go to the polls Saturday and cast your ballots. It is your duty as a voter to help select the person or persons to guide the affairs of your city and school.

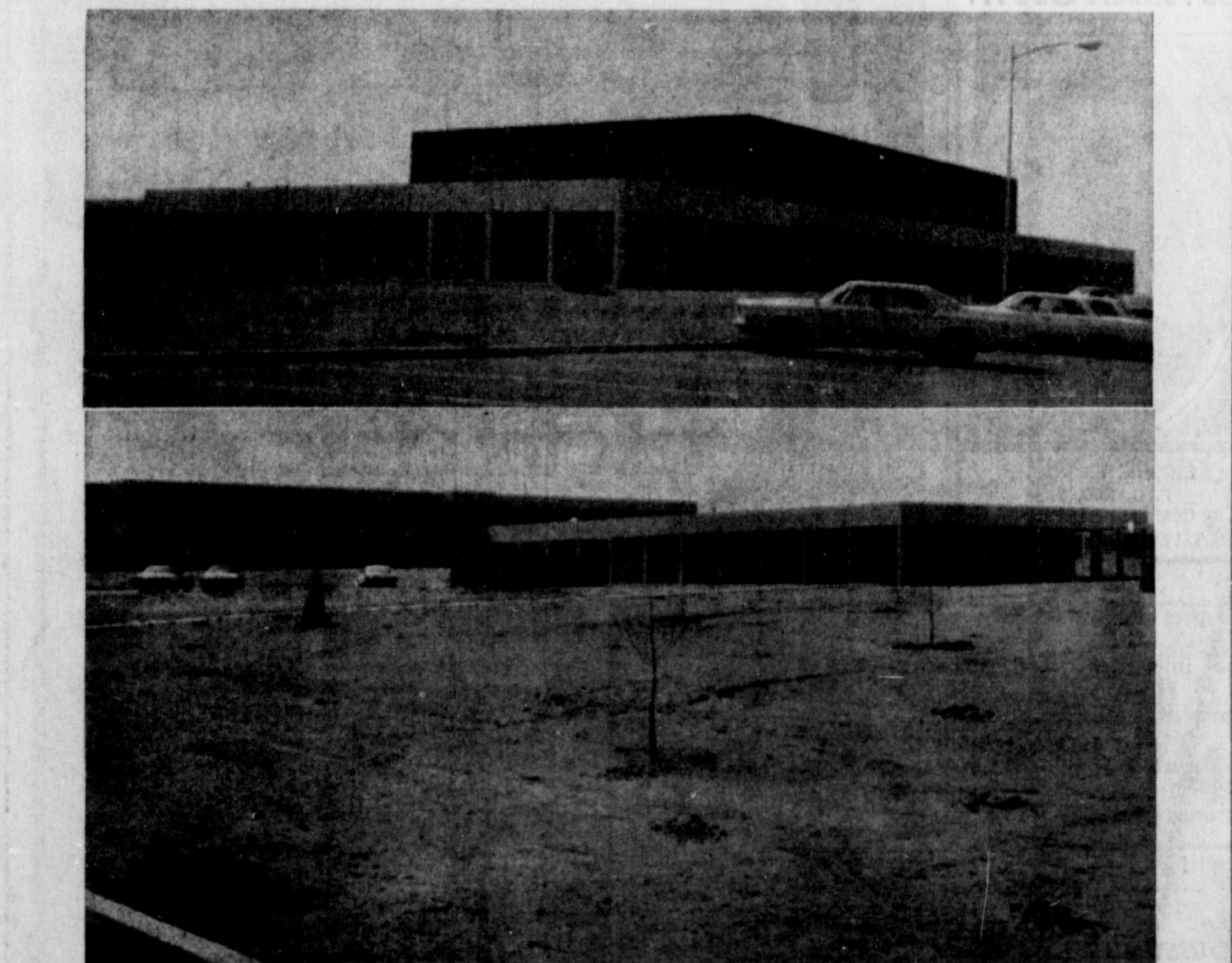

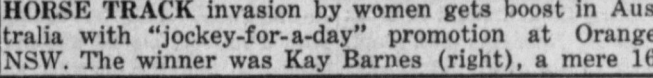

TRAFFIC LAW QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—When meeting an oncoming vehicle at night, at what distance does the law require you to dim your headlights?
A—The law requires you dim your headlights when approaching within 500 feet of oncoming vehicles. A courteous, defensive driver will dim before this.

Q—Does the law require you to dim your headlights when following another vehicle at night?
A—The law requires that you dim your headlights when following a vehicle within 200 feet at night. This does not apply when you are in the act of overtaking and passing.

Q—When and on what type vehicles does the law require safety flaps or guards (commonly referred to as mud flaps)?
A—Every truck, road tractor, truck tractor in combination with a semi-trailer and trailer having 4 or more tires on the rear-most axle shall be equipped with safety flaps of a material and construction prescribed by the Texas Department of Public Safety, located and suspended behind the rear-most wheels and they shall come to within 8 inches of the surface of the road. This does not apply to pole trailers, truck tractors operated alone, nor to trucks on private property. These flaps are required at all times when the vehicle is operated on a public highway.

Q—What is the law regarding mirrors on a commercial vehicle?
A—Every commercial motor vehicle, when operated on a public highway, shall be equipped with a mirror, placed and maintained so that the operator shall at all times be able to see other vehicles approaching from the rear.

Q—What is the minimum age that a person can obtain a commercial drivers license in Texas?
A—The minimum age is 17 years old provided the person has passed an approved course of driver training. Without driver training the minimum age is 18.

Q—How far can the load on a vehicle extend past the front and the rear of a vehicle without a special permit?
A—No vehicle or combination of vehicles shall carry any load extending more than 3 feet to the front, nor more than 4 feet to the rear.

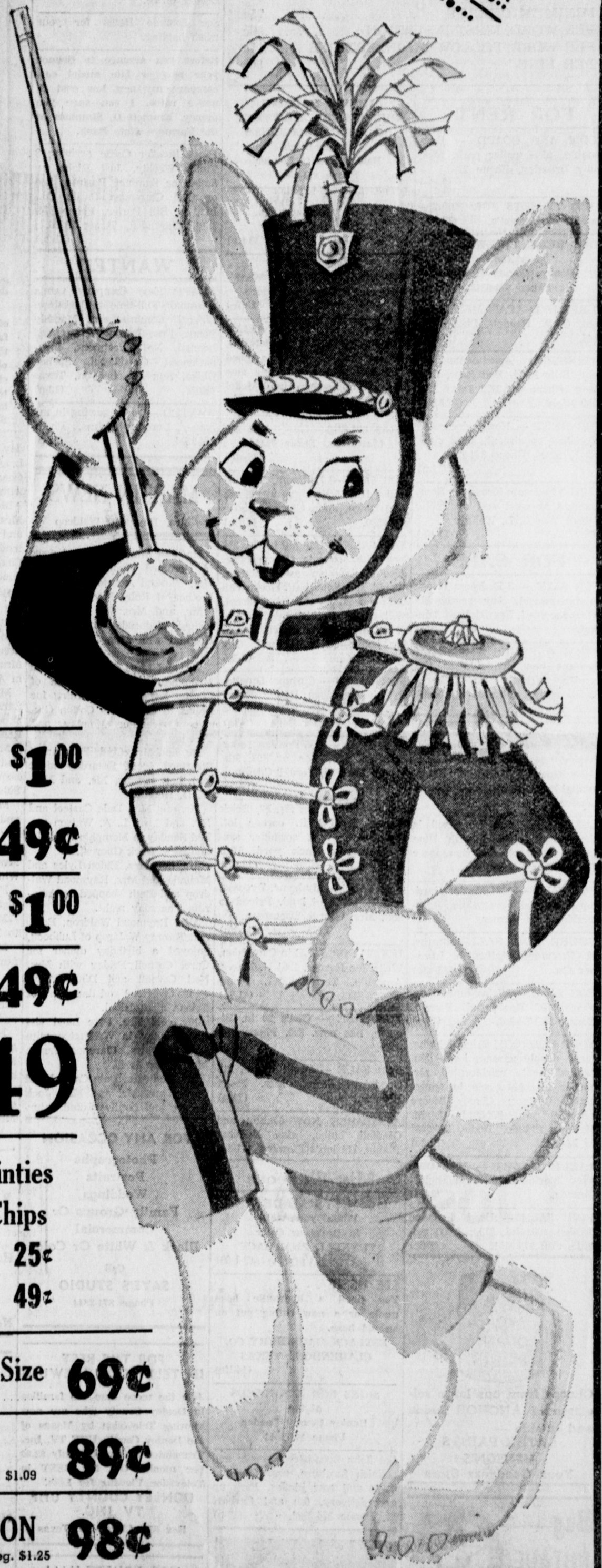

that without the electoral votes of the midwestern farm states, Richard M. Nixon would not be President. Although Texas failed to award Nixon its electoral votes, the Panhandle area did almost solidly support him.

The letter is headed NIXON'S NO. 2 PROBLEM — LOW FARM PRICES and continues:

The economic situation of the American farmers is the worst since the "great depression" and instead of improving, it is worsening. Farm prices are depressed and farm debt is high. Next to ending the war in Vietnam, the most important problem confronting President Nixon is that of extending to farmers and the residents of farm communities the same degree of prosperity as is now enjoyed by people in business and industry, government and the professions. The first step toward carrying out such a program is the inauguration of an honest and comprehensive study of the entire farm situation; a study that will answer three questions: 1) how bad is the farm problem, 2) how did it get that way and, 3) what is required to remedy it.

In conducting the study, there are several avenues of investigation which should be pursued. It should be determined if the Kennedy-Johnson team of "new economists" utilized every possible means of depressing farm prices for the purpose of keeping food costs low while inflating wages and profits in business and industry to create prosperity. For example, did the government repeatedly sell wheat domestically from government stocks for the purpose of depressing wheat prices? Did the government curtail wheat sales to foreign nations and grants in aid to needy peoples in order to keep government held wheat surpluses at high levels? Did it allow increased imports of beef from New Zealand, Australia, and Argentina for the purpose of depressing beef prices in this country? Did it permit increased imports of dairy products from European countries in order to depress dairy farm prices in the U.S.?

Another avenue of the investigation should be devoted to a study of the policies, practices and present financial condition of Farmers Home Administration. Among other items, it should be determined if the policy of Farmers Home Administration has been to grant low cost loans only to those farmers who are unable, on account of their poor financial status, to obtain loans from cooperative or commercial banking agencies. If such is the case, was the policy adopted for the purpose of keeping inefficient and incompetent

farmers on the farms to produce price depressing farm surpluses? Former Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman in a farewell interview with the press stated that loans granted by Farmers Home Administration increased from around 300 million dollars a year to almost one and a half billion in 1968. One phase of the study should be to determine how the billions of government funds loaned out were spent and how much of the total loaned is recoverable.

What action the new government takes in connection with the farm problem is up to President Nixon. He can attack the problem with all of the facilities at his command to attain sound and lasting solutions, or he can gloss it over as did his predecessors. If he should follow the lat-

ter course, he is apt to awaken on the morning of election day, 1972, with a message from the farmers of the nation, "Thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting."

I believe both the President and Secretary of Agriculture understand the urgent and vital need of a substantial increase in farm income and that agriculture must be restored to a sound economic basis.

Members of the House Agriculture Committee, on which I serve, are also acutely aware of the need for a solution to this critical problem. Achieving adequate farm income is the first necessary step in solving not only our rural problems but in a large way can contribute to the solution of the crisis in the cities.

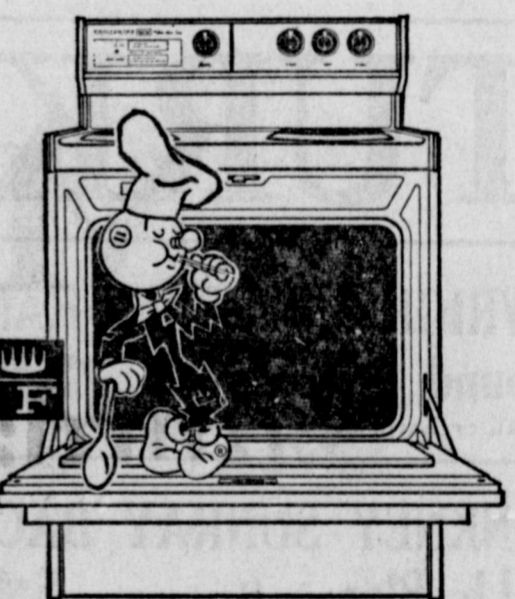

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

Gov. Preston Smith called on the Legislature to patch up a \$71 million hole in his \$261 million new revenue program by raising the cigarette tax to 15 cents a pack and placing a one-half of one per cent gross receipts levy on chemical producers.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin's opinion holding unconstitutional Smith's proposal to apply most school land mineral lease income to current educational operations made supplemental recommendations necessary.

While suggesting alternative revenues, Smith made two other points.

He is having nothing to do with "one-year budgeting" as recommended by former Gov. John Connally in 1967 as a device to postpone a tax bill.

"Serious talk" is being heard in favor of a corporate profits tax, and the day when one will be necessary may not be too long off, although he is not urging one now.

Smith's revenue package calls for placing alcoholic beverages and personal services (like laundry, repairs, parking and cable TV) under the three per cent state sales tax. He emphasized he is dead serious about slapping a \$10 state surcharge on moving traffic violation fines, and he would raise the tobacco products tax to ratios of a decade ago. He also recommends the state sales tax be applied to each lease of rental equipment as well as the original purchase price.

Smith originally asked a three cent a pack hike in the cigarette tax. Now, he wants to go to four cents (which would raise an additional \$26 million). The gross receipts levy on "those producing chemical products" is estimated to bring in \$45 million.

Reaction to the alternative proposals varied widely. Smith was commended for adding a business tax to his all-consumer program of last month, but some lawmakers didn't like singling out one industry.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher said he is hopeful of early hearings by the Revenue and Taxation Committee on a "major" tax bill.

LEGISLATURE PLOWS ON—At the half-way mark of the 61st legislative session, the House speeded up and the Senate slowed down.

Among major measures advanced by the House were bills to strengthen the governor's power to quell riots and to create a new University of Texas branch at San Antonio.

Other measures increased teacher retirement benefits, broadened resident tuition privileges to college students from military families, provided for distributing state available school fund money on the basis of scholastic population (instead of average daily attendance), changed the name of James Connally Technical Institute near Waco to Texas State Technical Institute and authorized procedure for dissolving 492 inactive water districts.

Creation of a separate commission for rehabilitation services now has approval of both houses, as have bills to place West Texas State University under a separate board of regents and to permit certain types of metal-studded snow tires on highways. A House resolution would make blue topaz the official Texas gem and petrified hardwood the official stone.

Senate passed 33 local bills on a special calendar for non-controversial matters with limited application, but bogged down for hours over the measure to create a state commission to administer a memorial to the late President John F. Kennedy. Senate gave tentative approval to allowing city bus drivers taken under municipal transit systems

before 1964 to retain collective bargaining benefits they had as union members.

Governor Smith signed half a dozen measures including a campus riot control bill and major improvements in workmen's compensation legislation.

COMMITTEES AT WORK—Senate Labor and Management Committee gave three-to-two approval to \$1.25 an hour state minimum wage law. Senate Jurisprudence Committee endorsed the bill to authorize radio and television to carry official legal notices and advertisements — (but not those involving land descriptions).

Senate Youth Affairs Committee heard testimony on SB 281 by Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon that would up the age state courts could declare children dependent from 16 to 18. His bill also forces parents of children under 18 to provide support.

In the Senate Water and Conservation Committee, the \$3.5 billion Texas Water Plan was voted favorably, with little debate and less ceremony. The plan is included in eight Senate bills sponsored by Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells.

American Indians appeared before the Senate State Affairs Committee to favor a bill to help them retain their right to use peyote in their religious rites. Bill was sent back to the Senate with a favorable report.

Senate Jurisprudence Committee heard bills to increase maximum punishment for murder with malice and a trespass bill; both sent to subcommittee.

Senate State Affairs Committee heard Sen. Charles Wilson's bill to create a Texas Public Utilities Commission to regulate public utilities. More testimony is to come on that bill.

Sen. Don Kennard's package of eight conservation bills got consideration from the Senate Parks and Wildlife Committee. Three were sent to the Senate and the rest were sent to a subcommittee.

House State Affairs Committee gave a favorable ear to a bill that would turn over the Texas State Exhibits Building at HemisFair '68 to the University of Texas System. Another bill to force the building and its approximate \$850,000 annual upkeep on the City of San Antonio got a cold reception. Both were sent to subcommittees.

Forty members of the Fort Worth Preservation Committee appeared before the House Parks and Wildlife Committee to favor a bill that would force the highway department or any other state agency to hold a public hearing before going ahead with any condemnation proceedings of historic or park lands.

In the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, HB 72 by Rep. Glenn Kothmann to raise the penalty for possession of LSD to a felony offense was sent to subcommittee.

House Governmental Affairs and Efficiency Committee sent to subcommittee HB 584 by Rep. Dave Finney to give domestic companies an advantage over foreign firms in acquiring state contracts.

In the House Judiciary Committee, HB 581 by Rep. C. L. Ray, Jr. of Marshall that requires non-profit agencies dealing in education to give full disclosure of the way they use money annually was sent to subcommittee.

OIL ALLOWABLE UP — Railroad Commission set for April the highest oil allowable since the Mid-East crisis of 1967—49.9 per cent of potential.

This action gave substance to the optimistic predictions of "a good year" for oil industry. Market demand next month will permit maximum production of 3,588,447 barrels a day, 220,279 more than for March which operated under 45.6 per cent allowable.

Eight of 13 major producers asked for bigger output, four were satisfied with the March level, and only one requested less.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED—Governor Smith reappointed Brig. Gen. James M. Rose of Austin assistant adjutant general of Texas Air National Guard and Col. Carl F. Schupp II of Austin assistant for the Army Guard.

Franklin G. Moffitt, formerly of Dallas, was named deputy director of Southwestern Region, Office of Economic Opportunity.

Smith designated Mrs. Gene Waugh of Austin as research and information specialist for Texas OEO.

Col. Clarence A. Wilson of Lubbock was elevated to commander

of National Guard's 36th Infantry Brigade with headquarters in San Antonio. He succeeds Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers of Friona who was sworn in last week as Adjutant General of Texas National Guard following confirmation by Senate.

BAY POLLUTION WARNED — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, appearing at hearing on proposed rules for oil drilling in offshore waters, advised a close Railroad Commission watch over operations in bays and inlets as well as the Gulf of Mexico.

Commission examiner took testimony on suggested rules which were prompted by massive oil pollution off the coast of California. Drawing fire, was the proposed requirement that a conductor string of new pipe must be set and cemented at a depth of from 300 to 500 feet below Gulf bed.

A-G OPINIONS — Bill to authorize cities to pay dues to Texas Municipal League is constitutional, Attorney General Martin has held. He added that the expenditure would be for public purpose and therefore proper. In effect, most cities already contribute to the league.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

Former Governor Connally's reappointment of Randall Jackson of Abilene as a member of the State Securities Board was premature. His term expired when Connally's term expired. Governor Smith said he will make a new appointment, or reappoint Jackson.

Held unconstitutional taking of royalties from state-owned submergible lands for current school operations. (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association replied question is so technical as to be "esoteric" and urged Martin to reconsider.)

Informed Calhoun County it has no authority to levy local tax on shell taken by permit from state public waters and removed to another county. Only tax possible, he said, is ad valorem levy

on shell sold but remaining in county on January 1.

WELFARE CHANGE EXPLAINED — State Welfare Department is busily explaining its new system of calculating aid grants (mainly to needy families with dependent children). Adjusted formula goes into effect May 1. It is being presented to beneficiaries in meetings over the state.

Commissioner Burton G. Hackney said the switch had to be made because voters last year turned down an increase in the welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.

Program contemplates calculating "total recognizable needs" of beneficiaries and allotting state payments of about half this amount to AFDC families. Aged, blind and disabled will be little affected.

Preliminary estimates indicate about 11,000 families will get more money, 26,000 will get less, and 2,500 will be cut off altogether.

BRUCELLOSIS CHALLENGE—A McMullen County rancher is challenging the constitutionality of the Texas Animal Health Commission brucellosis program, which requires that cattle owners must sell any stock with brucellosis to slaughter houses.

R. J. Nunley got a temporary restraining order to stop the Commission from quarantining his cattle, which apparently have the disease. A Sinton court was to hear arguments on the issue.

Animal Health Commission is concerned because, if the brucellosis - control program is ruled unconstitutional, then other states likely will prohibit the importation of Texas cattle.

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall named veteran highway engineer Sam Huff to head a new Highway Dept. division combining the major accounting and finance activities of the department.

WHEAT LOANS—For those of you who have a loan on your 1967 or 1968 wheat, you have until April 30 to either redeem the loan, request an extension, or forfeit the grain thus cancelling the loan. Special post card notices have been mailed to all producers with outstanding wheat loans. On the return portion of this card you will be asked to check what you want to do.

ACREAGE REPORTS—Remember that May 1 is the final date for reporting your wheat acreages. In making these reports, please consider the following items:

1. It is very important that these reports be correct.
2. Any acreages determined in the county office using measurements you furnish are not official. To have an official acreage determination it will be necessary for a representative of the County Committee to visit the farm, make any necessary ground measurements, then return to the county office and determine the acreage.
3. If you have any doubt as

to whether or not you can make a correct acreage report, may we urge you to request and pay the cost of official measuring service.
