



GAME ARRESTS TOTAL 1.089

Game management officers for he Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issued 1.089 citations in November, a slight decrease from the 1,093 citations issued for the same period in 1967.

Hunting violations were the most numerous with 509, with 88 of these being for hunting without a license, 74 for killing or possessing a deer in closed season, and 54 for hunting at night.

Fishing violations totaled 199 with 179 of the citations written for fishing without a license.

There were 91 water safety violations with "failure to have a Coast Guard approved life saving device for each person in the boat" accounting for 57 citations

Commercial fishing violations numbered 38.

Dispositions of other cases include: juvenile, 28; dismissed, 69; served time in jail, 9; not guilty, 33; one year probation, 3; vol., 4; and money remitted to another state agency, 1.




