## Seal Coat Contracts Let By Highway Dept.

A contract for seal coat work on 182 miles of highways in the Childress district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee, and will be in Hardeman, Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Knox and Motley counties.

J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Tye was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$362,571.20.

Vance L. Castleberry of Childress is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 120 working days.

The work includes the following in Donley County: From Hedley north 5.1 miles. From FM 1260 east 6.0 miles.

## Planning Is Needed For Irrigation

In planning an irrigation system a person should determine the need for irrigation, the feasibility for irrigation, the most practical method of water application, and the type of delivery system to be used. Irrigation is primarily a means of supplementing the climatic factors which affect the growth habits and requirements of plants. The system should be operated to supply the crops with the needed amount of water at the right time to get maximum production. The cropping system plays a big part in planning an irrigation system. Utilization of water for the crops to be grown should not be greater than the source of the available water to get maximum production. The depth of the soil should be considered for water holding capacity for the crop to be grown and frequency of water application.

A practical method of applying the water is determined by the slope of the land and the texture of the soil. On land with less than one foot fall per hundred feet and fine to very fine textured soil can be row or flood irrigated without too much expense in land preparation. On steeper slopes more expense can be expected for land preparation. The coarse textured soils which take water fast are more suitable for sprinkler irrigation and are generally subject to erosion when any water movement is involved.

If you have any questions in planning an irrigation system contact your local Soil Conservation District Office.

## Contracts Let For Highway Construction

A contract for highway construction in the Childress District has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee, and will be in Foard, Hall, Donley and Wheeler Counties.

Jagoe-Public Company of Denton was awarded a contract for hot mix asphalt concrete pavement and seal coat shoulders on sections totaling 82 miles. Low bid was \$941,169.53.

V. L. Castleberry of Childress is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 120 working days.

The work includes: From IH 40 to US 287 in Clarendon; From 9.0 miles south of Clarendon to Hall County line; From Donley County line to SH 256.

## Human Development Center Will Be Dedicated Feb. 12

The Amarillo State Center for Human Development, Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation's newest facility for the mentally retarded, will be dedicated Wednesday, February 12, at 10 a.m., Chairman Horace E. Cramer, M.D., Austin, announced.

Diagnostic and evaluation clinic, family counseling, referral aid, classes for pre-school and post-school retardates, and day care for the severely and profoundly retarded are among the Center's resources for the 26-county area.

The new Amarillo facility includes space for medical and dental examining areas, speech, hearing and physical therapy, recreational and vocational training, eight classrooms, and indoor and outdoor play areas.

Since January, 1968, satellite operations have been conducted in Childress, Pampa, Borger, Dalhart, and Dimmitt. In September, 1968, classes were begun in Dumas, Perryton, Tulia, and Clarendon.

Advisory committees have been active in each community. They have been responsible for publicizing the program, arranging for parents' appointments, recruiting and screening teacher applicants, and coordinating volunteers to assist staff and provide transportation.

The public is invited to attend the dedication services and to tour the Center.

The Bulldogs took a sizeable lead late in the second half; however after the Bulldogs lost two key men on fouls, the Wranglers brought the game down to a photo finish. The game ended in regulation time with the Bulldogs leading and South Plains receiving a bonus free throw which could have tied the game. Sledge made the first and missed the second.

The Bronchos are Number 1 in District play at this time.

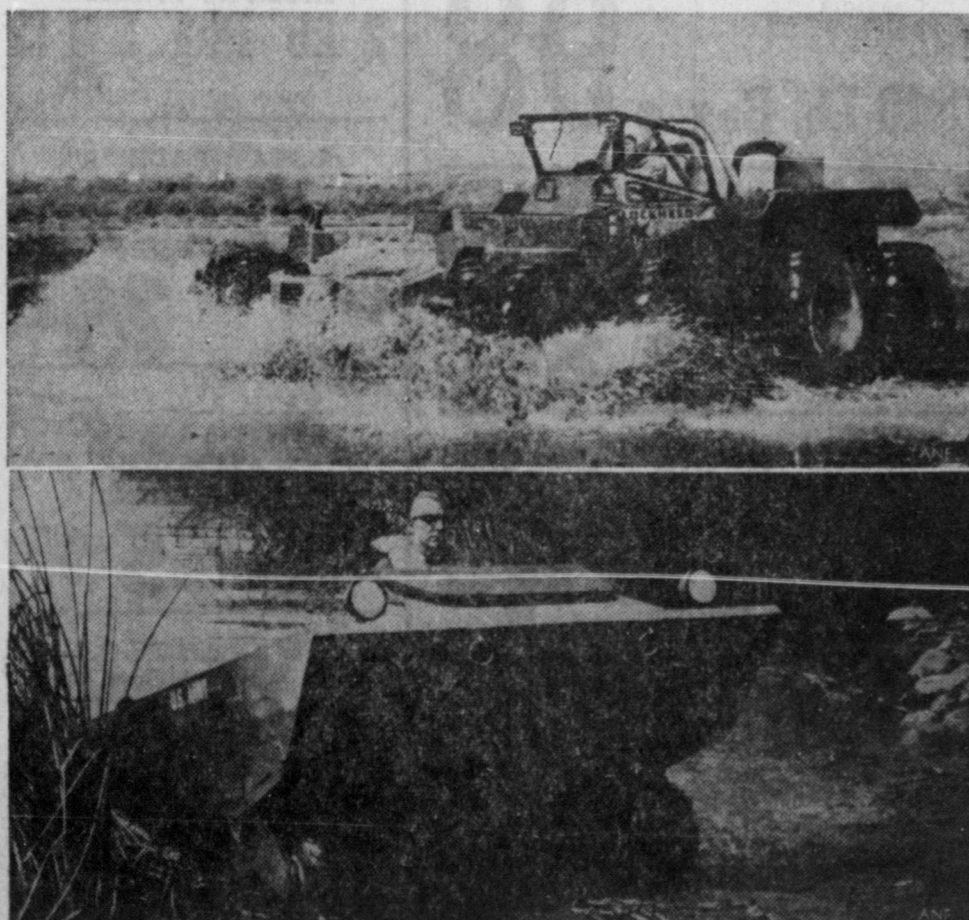

## FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN CALIFORNIA

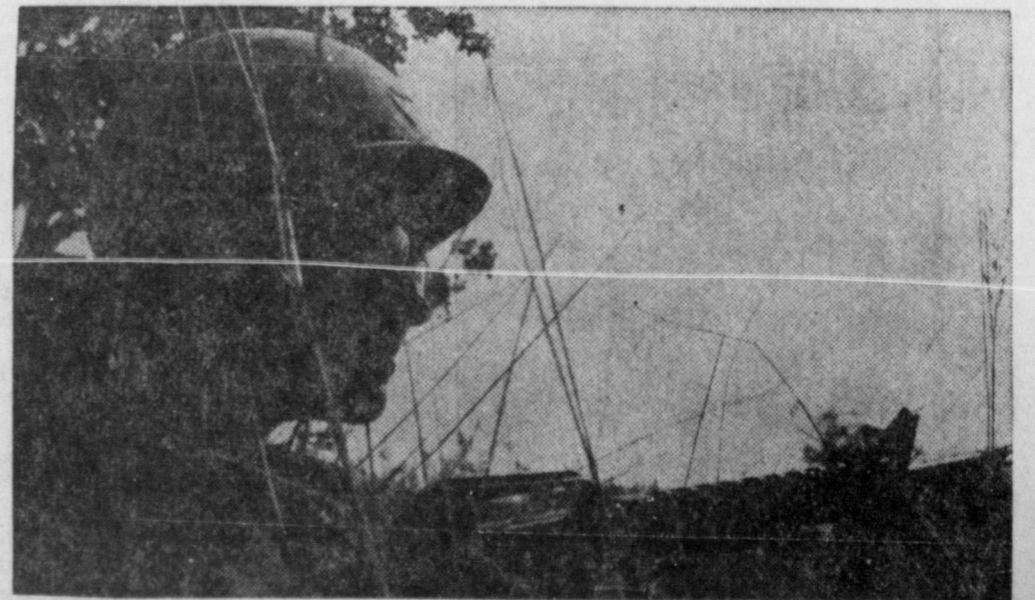

Sponsors of unsuccessful 1968 efforts to legalize liquor by the drink in Texas will take another tack this session. Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso and Rep. Cletus Davis of Houston will propose that a constitutional amendment on the question of open bars be submitted to Texas voters.

And since Gov. Preston Smith endorsed the constitutional amendment approach in his campaign platform and the State Democratic Party platform, he is expected to support the Christie-Davis plan.

Senator Christie feels that a "sure enough" mixed-drink bill would have better chance of passage by the Legislature than Gov. John Connally's "mini-bottle" bill had last summer, if it would take effect only on statewide voter approval.

But he and Representative Davis are bound to hear arguments that while a referendum on the subject won over a majority of voters in the 1968 primary election, the majority came from big-city residents, and less counties went for the proposition than against.

**TAX POLICY RECOMMENDED**  
—Texas Committee on State and Local Tax Policy, headed by House and Revenue Committee Chairman Ben Atwell of Dallas, came out with some suggestions for providing the \$343 million or so the state will need in new revenue over the next two years, but said it would not make formal recommendation.

Possible sources listed include personal and corporate income taxes, increasing the 3 per cent state sales tax, removing the sales tax exemption on food and taxing certain services.

Committee estimated that a modest personal-income tax (such as Oklahoma's) alone would reap some \$370 million a year.

—Mrs. Emily M. Whiteside of Austin, new associate director of Texas Fine Arts Commission, **JOB EDUCATION PLANS TOLD** —Senate Committee on Vocational Education has proposed a broad program for expanding vocational and technical education in Texas.

Nine key recommendations of the Committee, which conducted a series of public hearings include:

Updating and expansion of public school programs together with technical and technological education and pre-vocational instruction; placing the administration under a Deputy Commissioner for Occupational Education and Technology under Board of Education; creation of an advisory council of 21 on vocational education; continuation of James Connally Technical Institute near Waco and creation of several other similar institutions; adequate funding for school and junior college job programs; counselor training; a cooperative secondary junior college program; licensing and regulation of private trade schools and continuation of the senate study committee.

**SPECIAL ELECTION TALK** —After the Legislature began recovering from the shock of the death of Rep. Dave C. Howard of Uvalde, speculation started about possible candidates for the 49th District place in the House. Representative Howard died in Austin of a heart attack after the first day of his second session in the Legislature. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said, "I knew him as a dedicated public servant, fine gentleman and friend who will be missed in legislative halls." Governor Connally called him "a man of high honor and integrity."

Talk was strong in Austin that Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, prominent rancher who ran unsuccessfully last year for governor and a former House member, will file as a candidate for Howard's vacant place. But Briscoe would not make an official comment.

**TEXAS WATER PLAN** — House Water Study Committee headed by Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake will ask the rest of the Legislature to submit a \$3.5-billion bond issue to Texas voters, to help finance the Texas Water Development Board's \$10-billion Texas Water Plan.

Committee will make a generalized endorsement of the statewide water plan and has asked the private, non-profit Texas Research League to make a study of some sort of special tax which could be levied and dedicated to paying interest and principal on Water Development Board bonds while they are waiting for water uses to develop and help pay off the loans.

**VENDING CURBS EYED** — Amusement vending machine operators should be licensed and prohibited from lending money to tavern keepers, a House Investigating Committee maintains.

Committee urged tough curbs on vending machine firms and taverns. Applicants for beef licenses would be screened to cut out those who have been convicted of felonies and certain types of misdemeanors in the last five years. Vending machine concerns could hold no interest in taverns or lease premises to them.

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert estimates that lawmakers will have more than \$1.2-billion in general revenue to spend on operations for the next two years.

Texas ranks 46th nationally in the average amount of aid to families with dependent children, 35th in aid to the blind, 32nd in old-age assistance and 44th in aid to the partially and totally disabled, according to the State Department of Public Welfare.

Texas Legislative Council has proposed legislation to require training of all police officers, with a state requirement that all officers earn a state certificate.

Governor Smith took a memento with him when he left the Senate — his leather, high-

backed chair, which the 31 senators bought for him through a collection.

Texas Supreme Court refused to reconsider its decision that the state's appeal for hearing in a Midland Sunday closing law case was filed too late. Constitutionality of the law will be tested in a similar San Antonio case.

Third Court of Appeals ruled that sales by an El Paso firm to a Mexican buyer are not exempt from state sales tax.

A uniform statewide system of voting by machine (with the state renting them to counties which don't have their own) and appointment of chief county election officers to supervise registration and voting procedures has been recommended by the Election Code Study Committee.

**PRUNING ROSE BUSHES**

Do not be in a hurry to prune your rose bushes, even though they may be an eyesore in the winter landscape. They may be partially pruned back to prevent damage by the winter wind but the heavy pruning should be done in late winter or early spring just before the major growth begins. Heavy pruning early in the winter will often force new growth during a prolonged warm spell which makes the rose bush extremely vulnerable to a sudden drop in temperature.

GAME ARRESTS TOTAL 1,089

Game management officers for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issued 1,089 citations in November, a slight decrease from the 1,093 citations issued for the same period in 1967.
Hunting violations were the most numerous with 509, with 88 of these being for hunting without a license, 74 for killing or possessing a deer in closed season, and 54 for hunting at night.
Fishing violations totaled 199 with 179 of the citations written for fishing without a license.
There were 91 water safety violations with "failure to have a Coast Guard approved life saving device for each person in the boat" accounting for 57 citations.
Commercial fishing violations numbered 38.
Dispositions of other cases include: juvenile, 28; dismissed, 69; served time in jail, 9; not guilty, 33; one year probation, 3; vol. 4; and money remitted to another state agency, 1.
Fines and court cost accrued to the State totaled \$25,271.13.

## COMMUNITY PROPERTY INCOME TAX FACTOR

Community property can affect taxpayers in a community property state such as Texas, according to James Mallett, Extension farm management specialist at Texas A&M University. Texas taxpayers may find it advantageous to file separate returns.

In Texas, all income received by married taxpayers is considered to be community income and each taxpayer is responsible for one-half of the total. Taxpayers who are divorced during the tax year must report one-half of the community property income acquired prior to the divorce and all the separate income received after the divorce. Taxpayers who married during the tax year may elect to file joint or separate returns, as can those married in a prior year.

Capital loss deductions are limited to the smaller of \$1,000 or the combined taxable income on joint returns in a community property state. However, a husband and wife living in a community property state may file separate returns and both claim a capital loss deduction up to \$1,000 or their taxable income, whichever is smaller, Mallett noted.

Income in a community property state may work against the taxpayer in some cases such as retirement income credit. If one spouse is over 65, he is eligible for retirement income credit. If the other spouse is still earning income, half the earned income is taxable to each taxpayer and thus the earned income may cancel any retirement income credit.

If the individual has circumstances that may be affected by the Community Property laws, write the District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for an explanation or for a copy of IRS Document 5192, Community Property, suggests Mallett.

Color research experts establish and interpret color trends by analyzing retail purchases in various consumer areas from year to year. Computer analysis of sales records of consumer products including paints, carpeting, furniture, draperies, accessories, linens, appliances and automobiles also determine color trends.

## Magazine Features Pesticide Story

"Our Endangered Earth," an article in the January issue of the TEXAS PARKS & WILDLIFE magazine tells of the dangers of indiscriminate use of pesticides.

"Unless restraint and intelligence bring about a more balanced philosophy, he (man) may find himself destroying the very Utopia he is trying to create," says Joe T. Stevens, wildlife biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and author of the magazine article.

Stevens says that on the surface, man's success in the chemical control of insects which cause disease and crop failure has been phenomenal.

"However," says Stevens, "beneath the surface, there is future cause for concern for our future due to the widespread misuse of these pesticides."

"Agricultural pesticides pose an obvious threat to our fisheries resources not only because of the immediate susceptibility of freshwater fish to the toxin, but also because of delayed reactions. Texas waters can remain toxic from one to nine months after introduction of pesticides, and that which penetrates the bottom silt can be restirred any time and repeat the kill."

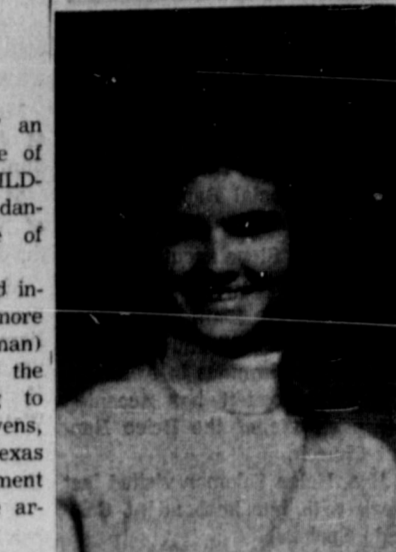

## SOLAR GROOVES FOR THE HOME

A new type of wood siding for homes is being studied by the Forest Products Laboratory of the United States Department of Agriculture. The siding, called "solar-groove", consists of a series of V-shaped grooves machined so that in summer the bottom surface faces the sun and in winter the top surface faces the sun, reports Bonny Lee, Extension housing specialist.

The bottom of the groove is painted with a reflecting coating. The top is painted with an absorbing coating.

In the summer the reflecting surfaces face the sun to reflect the sun and heat, thus cooling the house, says Miss Lay, at A&M. In the winter absorbing surfaces facing the sun cause the sun's heat to be absorbed and warm the house, reducing the need for internal heating.

NOTICE is hereby given that the undersigned intend to apply to the Sixty-First Legislature of the State of Texas for the passage of a law the general purpose, nature and substance of which are as follows:  
Such legislation will create a hospital district under Article IX, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution with boundaries coextensive with the boundaries of Donley County, Texas.  
The legislation will provide that the District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for the needy residing within the District and shall have power through its Board of Directors to issue and sell as the obligations of such hospital district bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition and repair or renovations of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and to levy a tax creating an interest and sinking fund to pay the interest on and principal of such bonds as same mature, to provide for the operation and maintenance of the District and its hospital system and for the purpose of making further improvements and additions to the hospital system, and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefor by purchase, lease or condemnation, provided that said tax shall not exceed 75c on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within District.  
The legislation shall also provide that such District shall not be created unless or until an election is held at which such election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying electors the proposition of whether or not Donley County Hospital District shall be created with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75c on a \$100.00 valuation of taxable property within such District.  
The legislation shall further provide that the management and control of the District shall be vested in a Board of Directors composed of seven members, the initial members of which shall be appointed in the Act creating the District and their successors to the Board of Directors shall be appointed by the Commissioners' Court for staggered terms annually.  
The above enumeration of provisions to be contained in such legislation is not intended to be exclusive but only to express the general purpose, nature and substance thereof. Such legislation will also make other provisions and confer other powers in connection with the general purpose and nature thereof above stated.

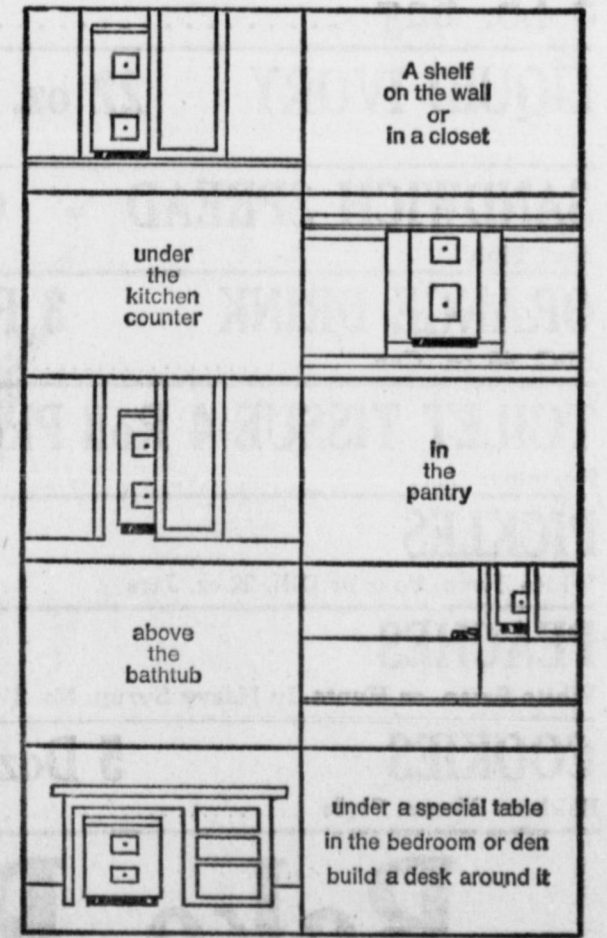

**Vehicle Registration Process Updated**

Inmates of the Texas Department of Correction at Huntsville this month are expected to complete the first phase of a sweeping modernization of Texas motor vehicle records.

The Corrections unit was "hired" by the Texas Highway Department to help with the computerization of millions of vehicle records. Inmates are learning new skills and the taxpayers are netting a substantial savings in the course of the work.

Involved in the project are the matching of approximately 6.5 million 1968 vehicle registration records with current certificates of title, and converting the com-

bined records by a typing operation into a format suitable for electronic input into computer storage.

Conversion to data processing will increase the efficiency of vehicle registration. By late in 1969, owners of more than seven million vehicles in Texas will receive computer-printed registration renewal forms. One copy of the form will be validated by the local county tax assessor-collector and returned to the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division. This copy will then be placed in a document scanner that "reads" the information and automatically updates registration data in computer storage. Another copy will serve as a receipt for the vehicle owner, and a third will be filed in the county tax office.

Also late in 1969, the Division and other authorized agencies will be able to retrieve any current registration or title record electronically in a matter of seconds. This capability particularly will be valuable to law enforcement personnel. While following a vehicle a patrolman will be able to identify the owner by means of his radio and the police teletype keyed to Motor Vehicle Division's computer storage. Ultimately, the system will be coordinated with similar equip-

ment in other states in a nationwide network for clearing titles and tracing stolen cars.

However, the chief concern is to simplify the renewal of vehicle registrations and applications for title, or to provide more efficient service for vehicle owners in Texas.

More than 500 inmates at Huntsville are working on the records. They were selected on the basis of aptitude, and they received special instruction to prepare them for the work.

Spokesmen for the Motor Vehicle Division say the bulk of the 1968 records were converted ahead of schedule. What remains now is only miscellaneous "clean up" work.

Early in February, with receipt of the first 1969 registration data from county tax offices, work will begin to update the master records, using the 1969 data.

Vehicle owners should make certain their correct residence mail address appears on 1969 registration records. This will make renewal of registration for 1970 simple and virtually automatic.

**IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions**

Q—Where can I get copies of the new tax forms?

A—Most taxpayers should receive their income tax forms in the mail early in January. Forms will also be available at local IRS offices as well as in many post offices and banks.

If you receive a form in the mail, please use it when you file your tax return. It contains identifying information to help avoid mistakes that delay processing and refunds.

The Form 1040 tax package that you received in the mail has a two-part pre-addressed label that shows the taxpayer's name, address and Social Security number. If you do not use the form sent you, peel off the top label and put it on the form you file. The card Form 1040A is pre-printed with the taxpayer's name, address and Social Security number.

Q—Were there any changes in the tax law last year I should know about when I file my 1968 return?

A—Adoption of a surtax in 1968 was the major change. This sur-

tax will increase the amount of income tax most individuals will pay for 1968 by 7½ per cent. A line has been added to the tax form to help taxpayers make this calculation and it is explained in the instructions that come with the tax form.

Q—Do I have to include Social Security benefits when I add up my income for the year?

A—Social Security benefits are not taxable. However, they do have to be included when determining if the support test has been met for a dependent.

For example, if a widow had no other income but Social Security benefits of \$1,200 during 1968 and she spent it for her own support, it will be necessary for anyone claiming her as a dependent to provide more than \$1,200 towards her support for the year.

Q—Where can I get a copy of the new Farmer's Tax Guide, Publication 225?

A—Contact your local IRS office or county extension agent for a free copy.

Q—I want to get my return in as soon as possible so I can get my refund. Do I have to wait until my boss gives me my W-2? I have my own record of wages and tax withheld.

A—A copy of your W-2 form must be attached to your tax re-

turn. Many taxpayers had their refunds delayed last year because they forgot to do this.

The law requires employers to issue W-2 statements to their employees by January 31. Many issue them sooner so you should have your W-2 Form shortly.

Q—I don't think my medical expenses were more than 3 per cent of my income in 1968. Does that mean I can't deduct my Blue Cross payments?

A—One-half of your medical insurance premiums up to a maximum of \$150 may be deducted even though your total medical expenses do not exceed 3 per cent of your income. Therefore, you may deduct part of your Blue Cross premium if you itemize.

Information to help you figure out your medical expense deduction is given on page 7 of the 1040 instructions. Mistakes in handling medical insurance premiums occurred frequently on tax returns last year. To avoid mistakes, read the instructions carefully.

Q—Last year I bought a bull at an auction. If I keep it for breeding purposes do I use its costs to figure depreciation?

A—Yes, generally the basis for depreciation of purchased livestock held for draft, dairy

or breeding purposes is cost. However, special rules apply if purchased livestock are included in inventory.
