





New Mailing Address For Wage, Excise Tax Returns

trict office. Envelopes addressed to the service center are included in the tax-forms package mailed to

Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said that mailing tax returns directly to the service center will save the government several million dollars a year in shipping and handling costs. Congress enacted the direct mail requirement in 1966 and IRS is introducing it in stages.

Currently, the requirement applies to employers' wage and excise returns. Forms 941 and 720. in Northern Texas. Railroad retirement tax returns, CT-1 and CT-2 also should be sent directly to the service center.
