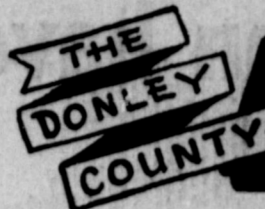

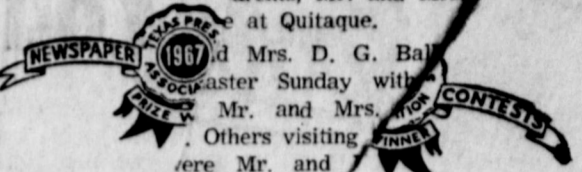

Mayor And Aldermen Installed Mon. Nite

A total of 266 votes were cast in the City election held Saturday with Dr. Richard L. Gilkey being re-elected Mayor with 189 votes. His opponent, James D. Crawford received 72 votes.

Dr. Chas. E. Deyhle was re-elected Alderman with 147 votes and a new candidate, Glen Wallace also received 147 votes.

The newly elected city officials were installed in a called meeting of the Council Monday night at which time the votes were canvassed by the council.

Voting ran quite light in the school trustee election Saturday. Warren Hardin was re-elected to the Board with 147 votes and L. P. (Bud) Moore pulled the same number of votes to go on as a new member of the board.

In the County School Board election, W. R. Christal received 159 votes for trustee-at-large.

You can purchase your city dog tag and have your animal vaccinated for rabies for the reduced price of \$3 if you take your dog to the City Hall Friday.

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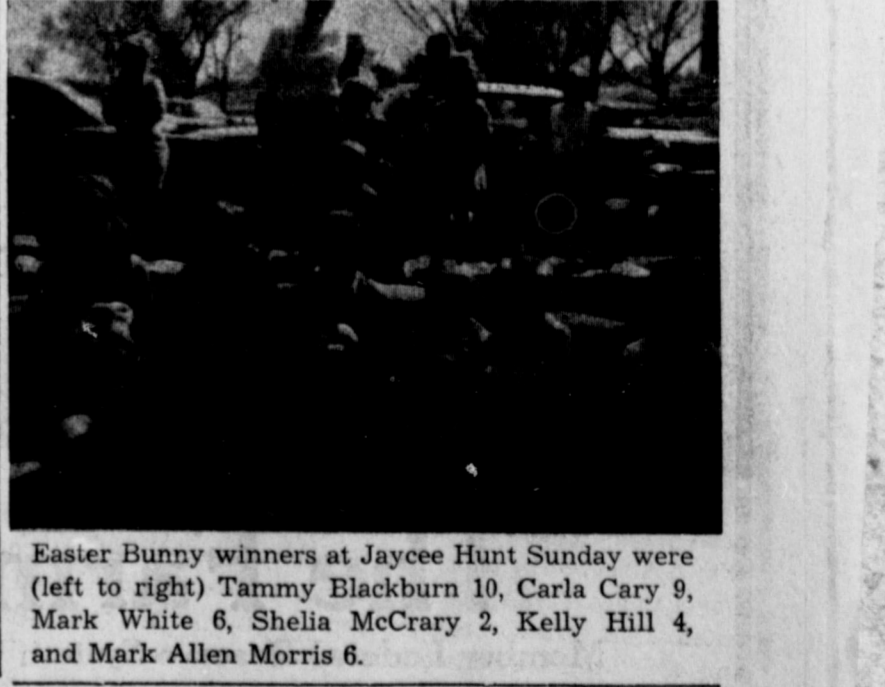

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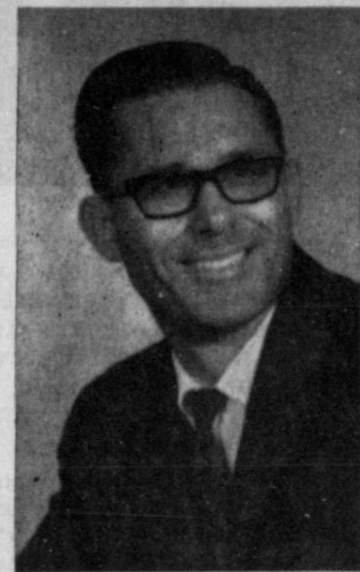

THE LEGISLATIVE LOFT

When the controversial Governor's Report on Education went before the Texas House Committee on Education, it stimulated more spectator interest than any other issue presented to a House Committee this session.

The report, which was written by former Gov. John Connally's Committee on Public School Education, was submitted to committee March 25. It's being carried through the House by Rep. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi as House Bill 300.

An overflow crowd gathered in the House to hear 19 witnesses testify against the report on the initial day of hearings. Twenty-five witnesses paraded before the committee to speak in favor of the report. Although favorable witnesses outnumbered opponents, many opponents filed affidavits to testify, but left before the hearings ended. The hearings lasted 10 hours,

starting at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday and ending 1:30 Wednesday morning, before proposals were sent to a subcommittee. The session closed with a definite rural-urban break as expected.

As a member of the seven-man subcommittee, I'm one of five members representing rural areas.

The report's controversy stems from two areas: 1) proposed compulsory consolidations of all schools with less than 2,600 students, 2) proposed market value tax as opposed to the present economic index system.

Hale said he would delete required consolidation from the bill and substitute some type of financial incentive. Despite Hale's assurances consolidation remained the prime target of opposing witnesses.

Most opponents of the new tax proposals claimed that ranchers and farmers would be ruined or put out of business by taxation. They stressed that farm and ranch land may be high, but productivity and income is low.

Prior to the committee hearings legislators were denied access to the proposed tax figures. Needless to say, this didn't help matters any. Rural legislators are still at a loss as to how the figures were established. In areas where real value had

Social Security Report Of Earnings Due

"April 15th is an important date for social security beneficiaries who worked in 1968," Travis C. Briggs, district manager of the Amarillo social security office, said.

"For beneficiaries who worked and earned over \$1,680 last year, this is the deadline for making an annual report of earnings," he said. "The report is not required," Briggs said, "of anyone who was age 72 or older during the entire year. People of that age may earn as much as they can and still be entitled to all their social security benefits."

"The annual report," Briggs explained, "is used to determine the correct amount of social security benefits payable for 1968. A beneficiary who earned \$1,680 or less is entitled to benefits for all 12 months. If earnings were over \$1,680, some or all of the benefits are not payable. But regardless of how much a person earns, he will get his social security benefit for any month in which he earns wages of \$140 or less and is not actively self-employed."

"Most beneficiaries will receive the report from the mail," Briggs said, "but for those who

did not, the report is still due by April 15th. The social security office will be glad to send the form to anyone who calls, writes, or visits the office and asks for it," Briggs said.

"If a beneficiary would like help in completing the report," Briggs added, "he should visit the social security office, bringing with him the W-2 form his employer gave him. Beneficiaries who were self-employed in 1968 should bring a copy of their 1968 tax returns," Briggs said.

The social security office for this area is located at 1006 South Adams in Amarillo. The phone number is 376-5151. Hours of operation are 8:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and until 6:30 p.m. on Thursdays.
