KEEP FOLIAGE ON INDOOR PLANTS CLEAN

Foliage on indoor plants can be kept clean and attractive with little extra care, reminds County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Leaves which collect dust from the air may be cleaned once or twice a month with a camel hair brush or a damp cloth or sponge. Bruising or kinking the leaf surface will cause discoloration and blemishes and care should be exercised when handling the leaves. A high shine can be obtained on the foliage by gently brushing the surface with a soft cheesecloth or a soft fine brush as the plant's natural oils and waxes

A mild soap and warm water solution will remove excess soil and make polishing simpler, according to the agent. If a commercial leaf polish s used the plants should be watered several hours before us-

could result in foliage burn. Avoid the use of oil of any kind when cleaning or polishing leaves, Gooch stresses.

Plants with "hairy" leaves are more difficult to care for. An occasional syringing with clean warm water will not only help keep the leaves clean, but will
