## City Council Calls Second Airport Referendum For March First

The Clarendon City Council met in regular session Tuesday night and called a second airport referendum election instead of a Bond Election as requested by petitions presented to the council a few weeks ago.

The Council felt that a referendum election would answer the question as well as a Bond Election but would save the City some \$1500 extra expense by not taking the bond route for such a small sum.

It was pointed out that taxes would have to be increased around 20 per cent to pay for the City's share of the airport construction with a pay-out period of only five years as compared with 20 years on the bond issue and a greater sum for interest than would be required over the 5 year period.

The first airport referendum election was held November 23, 1968 at which time 404 ballots were cast with the issue being defeated 208 to 196 votes. The difference between that election and the one now called is that the council has outlined the 20 per cent raise in taxes that it will cost local taxpayers if they want to build the airport. In the first election it was stated that "it will not cause an increase in taxes".

## Price Appointed To Congressional Subcommittee

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price received Subcommittee appointments on both the House Agriculture Committee and the Science and Astronautics Committee before the Lincoln Day recess of Congress.

On the Agriculture Committee, he will serve on two subcommittees — Cotton and Livestock and Grains. On the Space Committee, he was assigned to Advance Research and Technology which includes the NERVA or nuclear propulsion rocket program.

Price planned for visits in the district during the week-long Lincoln Day recess but cancelled these visits on orders from his doctor. He entered Bethesda Naval Hospital February 3 for surgery to correct an abdominal hernia. His doctors told the Congressman he would probably be released from the hospital by the following Sunday, February 7 and be confined to his home for most of this next week.

Price said he would be in contact with his office from the hospital and his home for day to day constituent requests and services. He expected to be back on full-time duty before legislative programs are considered by either of his Committees or the House.

## INTERMURAL GAMES AND ACTIVITIES PLANNED AT COLLEGE

Dean Beryl Clinton announced this week that a rather extensive program of intermural games and activities has been planned for college students for the spring semester with Coach Lawrence Overcast as the program director and Charles Meador as the student coordinator.

The activities have been planned for hours following afternoon classes and will include competition in checkers, dominoes, permissible card games, horseshoes, washers, volley ball, basketball, soft ball, etc. A monthly talent contest will be held for dorm students also.

Along with the activities program on the more serious side, Tutor Sessions have been planned for 5 nights each week in the study hall with qualified students present to assist any student that is having problems in any subject area. The student tutors will be on a volunteer basis.

## March 4 Is Deadline To File For Public School Trustee

Saturday, April 5 is the date set for the election of trustees for the Clarendon School Board and March 4th is the deadline for filing for a position on the ballot as a candidate for the two positions to be filled on the above date.

The two board members whose term expires at this time are Fred Chamberlain and Warren Hardin. Chamberlain has definitely stated that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

Bill Mooring, who has been serving as president of the board, resigned at the last meeting and Warren Hardin is the acting president at present.

At the last meeting, Superintendent Arling Cordell's contract was extended for two years and the contracts of High School Principal Jeff Walker and Jr. High Principal, Stina Cain, were extended for another year.

Any person interested in becoming a candidate for the board may sign up at the school business office by March 4th.

The City Election date to elect a Mayor and two Aldermen has been set for Saturday, April 5. The deadline for filing for a place on the ballot is March 4.

## NEWS FROM CITY HALL

In the City Council meeting Tuesday night the aldermen called for an airport election to be held March 1st. They were advised that sufficient time did not remain for a bond election within the limits of the federal and state grants. Therefore another referendum election was called. Also, legal fees and printing of the bonds would cost an additional \$1500.00 for a \$35,000.00 bond election. It was the opinion of the aldermen that a referendum election would be simpler and less expensive.

The airport would be financed from the city general fund and taxes. It was estimated that an increase of 20 per cent in taxes for a period of only five years would pay the necessary amount, without the issuance of bonds for \$35,000.00. It is the opinion of the city council that if the airport is constructed with the aid of the grants, it would best be done in this manner.

A city election was called for April 5th. This year the position of mayor and two aldermen are up for re-election. To date only the Mayor has filed for re-election and Dr. Chas. E. Deyhle has stated he would be a candidate for re-election as Alderman. Deadline for filing is March 4th.

During the past four years as your mayor, I have tried to keep my promises; keep you informed, operate the city in a more business-like manner, have an honest property valuation. In the first two, I think that I've succeeded. In the last, I have not. My decision to run for a third year term is based on our current situations. First, our city is in turmoil over the airport referendum. I want to unify the city, not start dissension. Second, our city is on the brink of great expansion, I think I can help. Third, more civic leaders need to come forth and help.

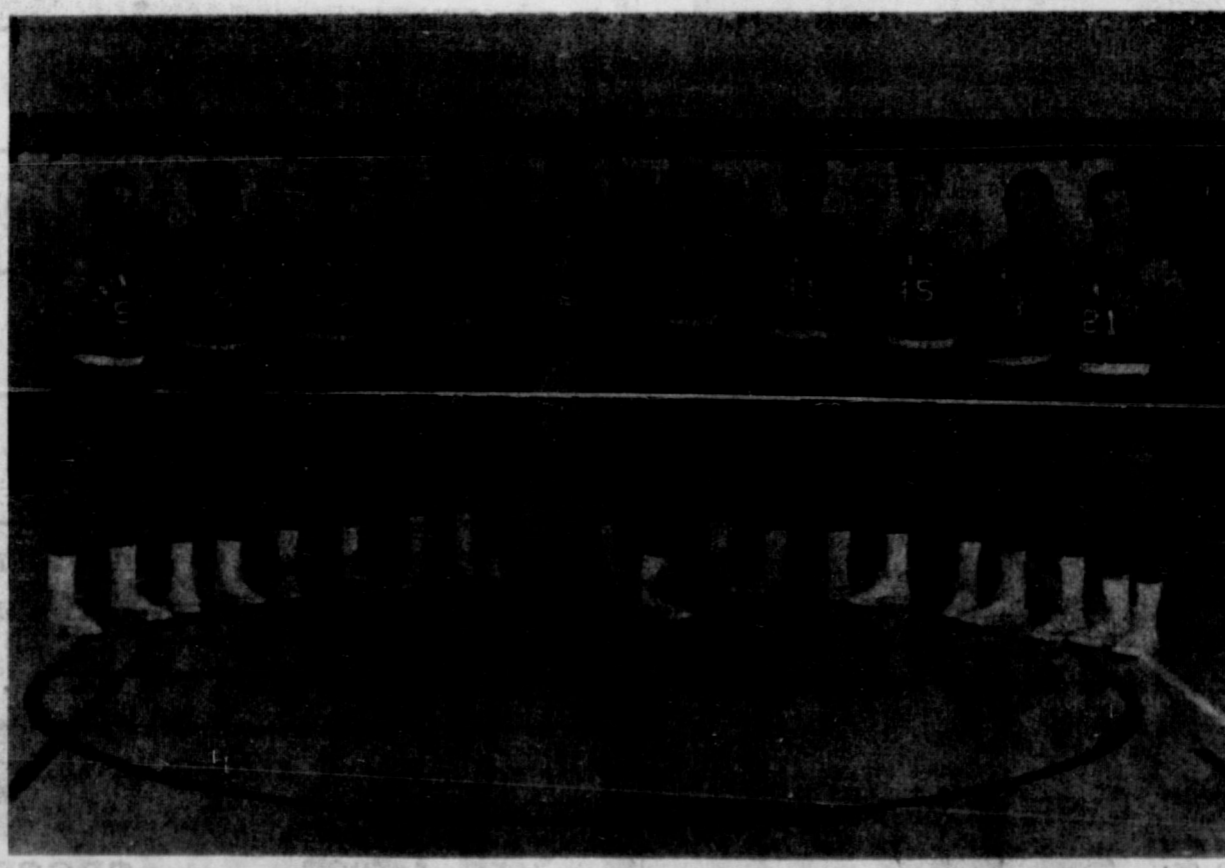
## ENTERS HOSPITAL

**ON BUYING A FEED GRINDER**

Before investing in a feed grinder, consideration should be given, says W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, to the kind or kinds of material the feeder has available for livestock feed and the type of ration to be fed. The most common types are the roller and hammer mills. A third type, the knife mill — it does a job similar to the hammer mill, is also available but is not too common, says the engineer. The two most popular types are available in automatic models with handling equipment.

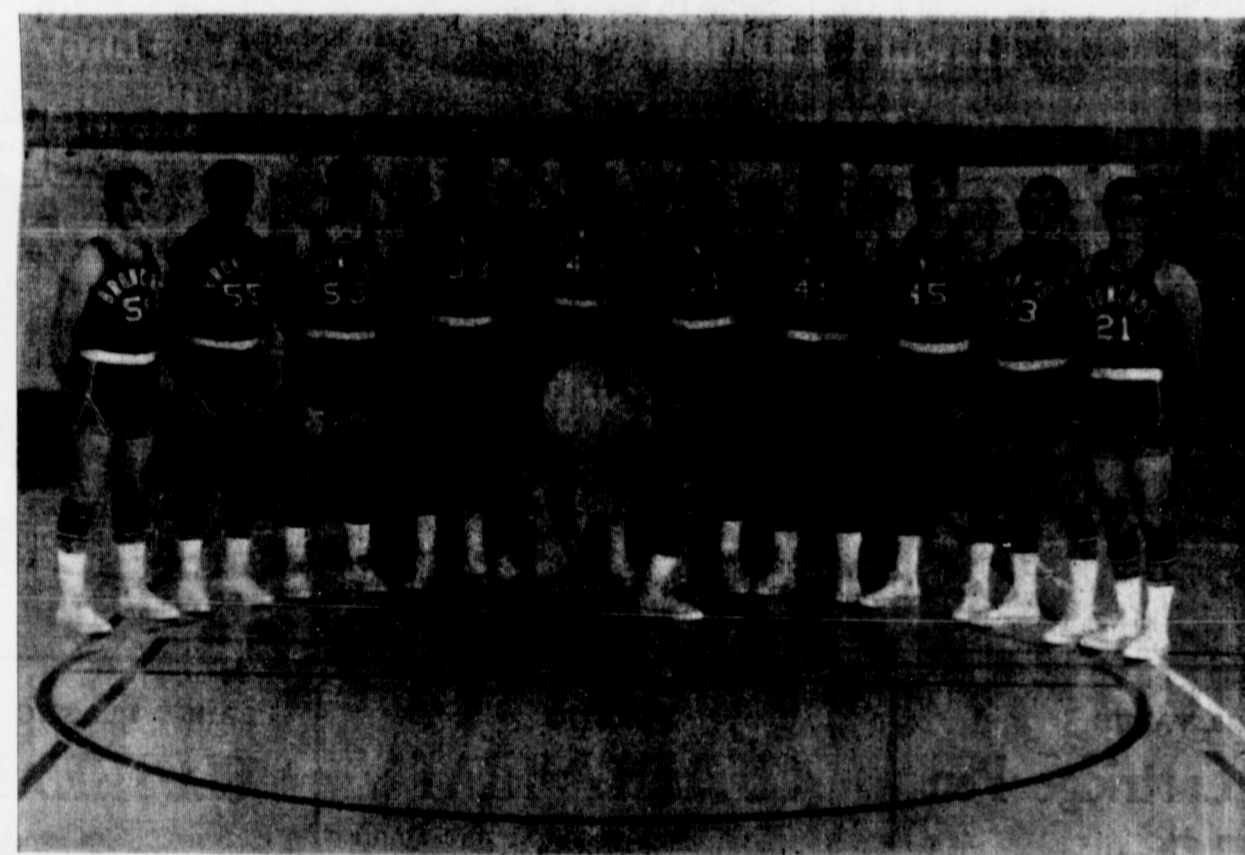

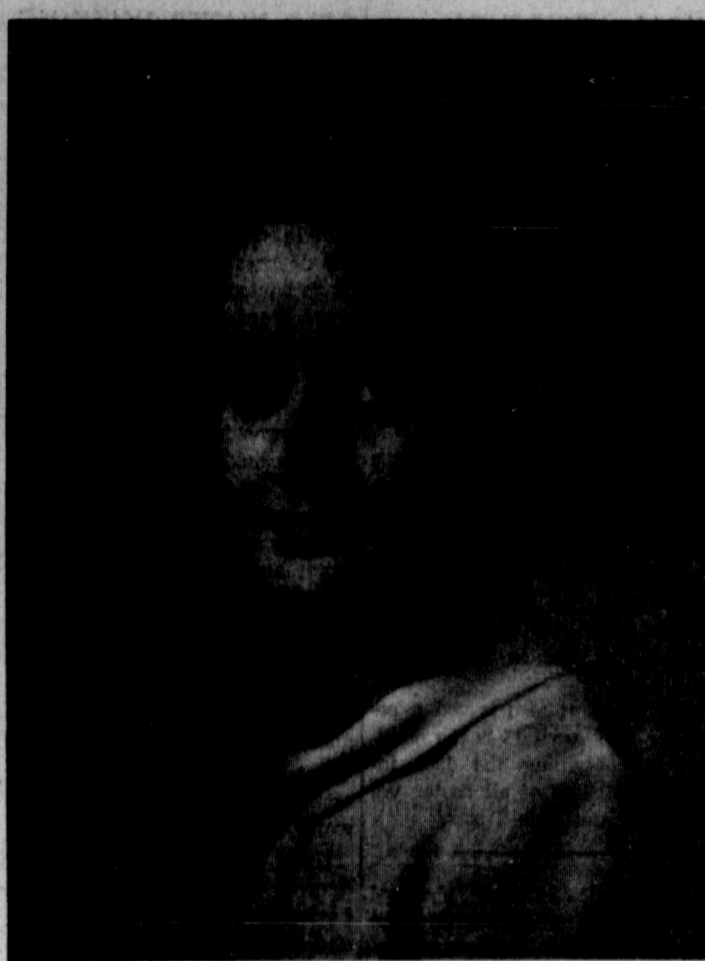

## KEEP FOLIAGE ON INDOOR PLANTS CLEAN

Foliage on indoor plants can be kept clean and attractive with a little extra care, reminds County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Leaves which collect dust from the air may be cleaned once or twice a month with a camel hair brush or a damp cloth or sponge. Bruising or kinking the leaf surface will cause discoloration and blemishes and care should be exercised when handling the leaves.

A high shine can be obtained on the foliage by gently brushing the surface with a soft cheesecloth or a soft fine brush as the plant's natural oils and waxes will produce a gloss.

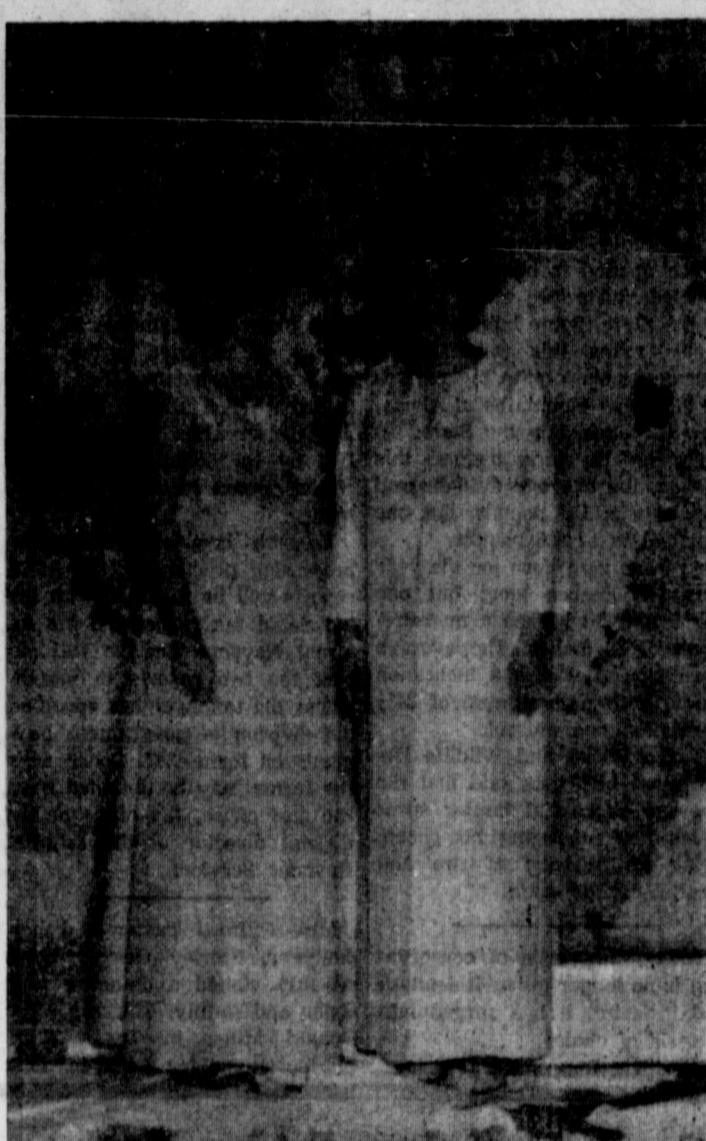
A mild soap and warm water solution will remove excess soil and make polishing simpler, according to the agent.

If a commercial leaf polish is used the plants should be watered several hours before using as dry plants tend to absorb the material more rapidly and could result in foliage burn.

Avoid the use of oil of any kind when cleaning or polishing leaves, Gooch stresses.

Plants with "hairy" leaves are more difficult to care for. An occasional syringing with clean warm water will not only help keep the leaves clean, but will also aid in keeping plants free of red-spider mites and mealy bugs. It is important to use water which is warmer than the air temperature as cold water frequently causes leaf spotting, the county agent says.

**AODAD SHEEP HUNTERS BAG 33 ANIMALS**

A total of 97 hunters secured landowner permits for hunting aoudad sheep in the rough Palo Duro Canyon area of the Texas Panhandle this year. They saw 287 animals, but bagged only 33. The aoudad is becoming a respected and prized game animal in the State. Some hunters drove many miles this year for a chance at one of the big natives of the Atlas Mountains of Africa, now established in the State.

Of the 18 rams bagged this season, the average field-dressed weight was 155 pounds, but one weighed in at 205 pounds. Average ram horn for the year was 17.7 inches long, but one big trophy had a horn measurement of 32 inches. The average horn spread was 13.8 inches on rams, with a maximum of 24 1/2 inches on one animal.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists said that the average successful hunter spent seven hours bagging his sheep, firing an average of two and one-half shells each.

**AG JOINT PAYEES CHECK TAX FORMS**

Agricultural producers who receive agricultural payments in behalf of other persons, or that are shared with other persons must notify the Internal Revenue Service on form 4347 with their income tax report, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. Agricultural program payments to joint payees are reported by the United States Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service to the IRS by the identifying number of the person receiving the payment.

Through new electronic data processing procedures, the ASCS reports will be matched with the individual tax report and the Internal Revenue Service will expect the two reports to match, unless the taxpayer has specified the division of government payments on form 4347. Gooch says the forms may be obtained from the post office, tax office or the district director of the Internal Revenue Service.

**RURAL ACCIDENTS ARE INVESTIGATED**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of January according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,275.00.

In comparing the rural traffic deaths of January, 1969 to January, 1968 of the 60 counties which comprise the Lubbock DPS Region there was a 37 per cent increase in deaths.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor stated, "If January is a representation of the next 11 months in Texas, traffic accidents will claim 3,900 lives in 1969, an all time high."

The Sergeant also issued a reminder that April 15 is the deadline for obtaining the 1969 inspection sticker of all motor vehicles registered in Texas.

Use only approved charcoal lighter fluids when starting the fire for outdoor cooking. Gasoline, kerosene and fuel oil are dangerous substitutes because they are highly flammable and explosive.

**COLD WATER WASHING SAFE, HELPFUL**

Cold water washing boasts several advantages: it boosts washing and ironing ease and is safe. Researchers have found cold water washing followed by tumble drying at the standard 160 degrees F will produce little or no bacterial contamination, reports Wanda Meyer, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The washing method produces less wrinkling, especially of washable polyester or nylon knits and permanent press items that wrinkle, if washed in hot water and spun dry.

Mrs. Meyer adds that cold water washing prevents certain stains from setting. Stains such as milk, egg, blood and other protein types can become permanent if washed in hot water.

But, she adds, grease and oil stains are better removed in hot water.

Using cold water lessens the danger of shrinkage, especially in knitted fabrics, chino pants and some un-sanforized items.

Cold water washing also saves hot water for other uses, points out the specialist, and the washing compounds may be used in

hot water. In fact, Mrs. Meyer says they are good in case of heavily soiled items in hot water washing.
