## Centennial Countdown - Donley County - First 100 Years

E. E. Carhart came to Old Clarendon in 1880, he brought a printing outfit with him and started the **Clarendon News**, the first paper in the Panhandle. Carhart hauled the printing outfit to Clarendon from Wisconsin in a wagon, it took him about three weeks. The Pease River was up, and he had to

waited two or three days before they could cross.

While helping another outfit their tent burned, causing them to lose some of their supplies.

While crossing the river, they prevailed upon a cow outfit crossing at the same time to help them cross, they

did so by hitching steers to his wagon and horse to help them cross. He arrived in Clarendon about June 17th. He set up his printing outfit with a job press, could only run one page at a time, and even then he had to run the sheet through the press four times. His first shop was in a picket house, and the first

issue was printed July 1880, the paper was four columns wide.

Since there was only two stores in town, most of his advertising was cattle brands for the ranchers.

## Farm loans average for area

Congressman Jack Hightower's office has recently received many calls from Donley County farmers complaining about the problems they are having getting their farm loans renewed from the Farm Loan office. Agriculture advisor to Hightower said from Washington Monday that "There is no real evidence that Donley County is having any more difficulty than other counties in having their loans renewed, but it could be that more farmers in that county have our phone number." Congressman Hightower has received a higher percentage of phone calls and complaints from Donley County farmers than from any other county in his area.

The Agricultural assistant said he will handle individual cases with the Farmers Home Loan Association.

Congressman Hightower has talked to the national office to see whether or not Donley County has indeed a special problem with getting

loans renewed. "We hate to have a special breakdown because that tied the county agency down doing that and then they are not able to dedicate the time necessary to helping the farmers through this hard time," said the Agricultural assistant, but because of the greater number of calls and complaints from Donley County farmers, this is still a possibility. A current list of these farmers denied loan renewal has been given to the national FmHA office for study.

As far as Congressman Hightower knows at this time, there is no investigation underway about the Donley County loan renewal problem.

## Donley farmers question Block

Secretary of Agriculture John Block was in Lubbock Friday to address area farmers and to field questions posed by these worried men concerning the fate of the farmers in these current hard times.

Block said that "These are painful times, but we've lived through bad times before, family farmers will succeed."

"Although there will be casualties, I do not have any number as to how many farmers are expendable," he continued. "Agriculture is the backbone of most of the mid-section of this country. We live on faith in agriculture. We are perpetual optimists. If we were not, a family farm would be extinct."

He said that the announcement of \$600 million in emergency loans reportedly released by the Farmers Home Administration to bail out financially distressed farmers was premature. Block did say, however, that the FmHA has sufficient funds to adequately finance

The set-aside program was fashioned to encourage maximum participation by farmers in the program. The program asks farmers to set aside up to 10% of their land in an effort to decrease production and stabilize farm prices.

## Detoxification task force met

On Tuesday, March 2, the first meeting of the Panhandle Regional Detoxification Task Force will be held in Amarillo. The task force was created by the Regional Alcoholism Advisory Committee early in February for the purpose of coordinating efforts that will lead to an alcoholism detoxification facility to be opened somewhere in the Panhandle.

For several years, members of the Panhandle County Judge's Chemical Abuse Service System, Inc. have talked about the need for a detoxification facility to complement the operations of the Panhandle Alcohol Recovery Center and halfway houses in the Panhandle Area. Judge Billie Christal is a member of this board.

"There is a great need for us to have this type facility," he said, "because so many times our people have to go to Vernon." Judge Christal went on to say that right now it costs 10¢ per capita for us to keep the Panhandle Alcohol Recovery Center and halfway houses. If we had a detoxification facility, it would cost our area less because we would not have to send them so far.

A meeting scheduled for March 5 will have a similar impact on the future of alcoholism treatment and rehabilitation programs in the Panhandle in the near future.

It follows naturally then, we should be cementing our relationships with people for our own emergencies if nothing else! But there is another side to consider. Do we qualify to be one of the selective five someone else needs as a friend? We must be to others what we wish them to be to us. This has been the theme of real Christianity all along. Christianity is concerned with every phase of life from birth to the grave. That means the growing up period. It means courtship and marriage. It means rearing children properly. It also means the right use of talents and possessions. Actually, it means right relationships with people all through life. The reward will be deep friendships between us and others. Undoubtedly the writer of Proverbs was well versed in psychiatry, but he called it wisdom. It is still needed today.

# 20,000 duck wings counted

Every year for the past 13 or more, wildlife biologists from both state and Federal agencies gather at Ft. Collins, Colorado high in the Rocky Mountains to collect data on a large collection of water-fowl wings and tails. Dave Dvorak, Wildlife Biologist and supervisor for the Panhandle area recently attended the 1982 Duck

Wing Bee along with Christopher Wheaton, Biologist in Canyon.

The process began last fall as a cooperative venture between the federal agencies and the postal services. Post offices are randomly selected by a computer in the states comprising the central flyway. The postmasters of these selected towns are contacted and given a supply of cards. Whenever a hunter purchases the federal duck stamp one of these cards was given as well. The hunter filled out the card mailed it to the central computer site and these cards were sifted through for a sampling of hunters. These chosen hunters were sent a number of large envelopes. As they killed a duck of any kind or a goose of any kind, they were to remove the wings from the ducks and the tails from the geese, insert them into the envelopes and return them to the address .Ft. Collins, CO.

 one of the many species would be separated into states. Some of the duck sampled were: mallard, teal, pintail, widgeon, Gadwall, spoonbill, wood ducks, and ring necks as well as a variety of diving ducks not common to most hunters. After the duck wings had been broken down into states, they were identified as to age and sex by the feathers. The wings were checked again by a specialist, data was recorded on the envelope, the wings were discarded and the envelope was trimmed into a more manageable, less aromatic tool.

Next, the cards were sorted again into counties of the particular states and data was again recorded. Some wings were kept to study affects of pesticides and herbicides upon them, most were thrown away. But thrifty Zuni Indians from the reservation hauled the wings away to make kachina dolls to sell to the gringos. Data collected will be used to determine the area ratio of harvest to give an idea of the hatch of that species. Also, this information will give an indication of when and where the bulk of the hunting takes place in the various states an the flyway in general.

This process proceeds for each species and for the geese tails as well.

Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado and of course Texas sent representatives to this annual feather

sorting match. "One thing is for sure," Dvorak said wiping down off of his hands, "I can sure as heck age and sex any duck or goose wing now!"

### TAP TREES... MOST ANYWHERE!

You don't have to live in Vermont to tap for maple syrup. The following hardwoods (at least one of which can be found just about anywhere in the U.S. or Canada) have all proved to be reliable producers of sap usable for syrup-making:

Norway Maple (Acer platanoides), Bigleaf Maple (Acer macrophyllum), Red Maple (Acer rubrum), Black Maple (Acer nigrum), Silver Maple (Acer saccharinum), Boxelder (Acer negundo), Canyon Maple (Acer grandidentatum), Sugar Maple (Acer saccharum), Florida Maple (Acer barbatum), Sweet Birch (Betula lenta).

You'll know that "sap's up" when freezing nights are followed by warm—and usually sunny—days. Choose trees that are at least 10" in diameter for single taps, 16" for two taps, and 22" or more for three taps. The spouts (also called spiles) can be made from sections of elderberry, sumac, bamboo, willow, or mullein stem with the pith removed... or you can use crimped pieces of curtain rod or lengths of plastic tubing.

Drill a 3/4"-diameter hole from 2" to 3" deep on the south side of each tree. Be sure you bore at a slightly uphill angle, so the sap can drain downward, and that the hole is at a convenient height.

Hang a clean, rust-free bucket, a plastic milk jug, or some other one- to five-gallon container securely under your spile, making sure it's adequately covered to keep out snow, rain, dirt, etc. Roughly speaking, you can expect 20 gallons of sap a season from each tree, and you'll need about 40 gallons to make 1 gallon of syrup. (Sap sours easily in warm weather, which means you must gather it frequently... keep it cool while it's being stored... and boil it up as soon as possible. Clean plastic trash cans, set in the chilly outdoors, make good holding tanks.)

Plan to cook the syrup outside, on a fireplace made of concrete blocks or a metal drum. Construct the "stove" so that the flames lick the bottom of your cooking container... but don't let smoke come in contact with the brew, as it'll affect the syrup's taste and color.

Use a large, flat pan as your boiler, and keep the contents about two inches deep... slowly adding fresh sap as needed. From time to time, skim off the foam that forms on top of the syrup.

After hours of cooking with no apparent change, the syrup will suddenly thicken very quickly... and it must be stirred and watched carefully during this critical stage. When the temperature reaches 7 degrees above boiling, or when the liquid runs off a ladle in thin sheets, the syrup is done. Strain your natural sweetener, while it's still warm, through a heavy felt bag. Reheat it to 160°F... and pack it in sterilized containers with airtight seals, where it will keep indefinitely!

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## It's The Law!



The Texas Legislature has enacted a law that requires you and all other Texas motorists to carry automobile liability insurance beginning January 1, 1982.

Bodily injury coverage of at least \$10,000 per person and \$20,000 for two or more persons per accident must be in force at all times. Property damage coverage must be at least \$5,000 per accident.

Failure to maintain the coverages required by this law will result in a fine of at least \$75.00 for the first offense and a minimum of at least \$200 for any subsequent offense. If you are convicted you may lose your drivers license and motor vehicle registration as well.

After January 1, 1982 law enforcement officers in Texas will ask to see proof of your insurance coverage when investigating a traffic accident or violation. The Department of Public Safety has advised that the following are acceptable forms of this proof:

- Your automobile insurance policy.
  - A photocopy of the declarations page of the policy which contains the policy number, limits of liability, term of the policy, etc.
  - A special identification card that some insurance companies may provide.
- Even though many more Texas motorists will purchase and maintain liability insurance coverage as the law requires, hundreds of thousands of motorists will intentionally violate the law and remain uninsured.

For this reason we urge you to continue to carry uninsured/underinsured motorist coverage on your own policy. This important coverage will give you added protection should you be involved in an accident with an uninsured or underinsured driver.



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### SAVE YOUR VISION

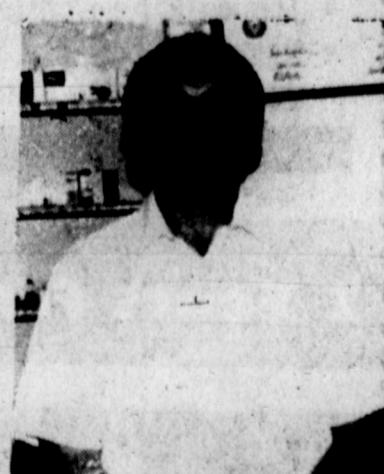
March 1-7 has been designated "Save Your Vision Week". This week which emphasizes the prevention of blindness is sponsored annually by the American Optometric Association. Particular emphasis is given to glaucoma...an eye condition that now affects between one and two million Americans. Recent figures indicate that greater than 50,000 individuals are blind today because of glaucoma. Blindness results from damage to the optic nerve that occurs due to increased pressures within the eyeball.

Of the nearly 200,000 new cases of glaucoma diagnosed each year, only a small percentage can be corrected with eye surgery. The great majority of individuals respond adequately to medications that are either taken by mouth or placed in the eye. The medications taken by mouth reduce formation of fluid within the eye. Those placed in the eye either reduce the formation of fluid or increase the removal of fluid. The net result is a decrease in the pressures within the eye and, consequently, decreased damage to the optic nerve.

Two medicines that have been used for many years in the eye are pilocarpine and epinephrine. In 1978, timolol was approved for use in the eye. Separately or in combination, glaucoma can usually be controlled with the medicines available to us today.

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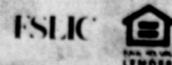
