There were no months free from twisters in 1968. The peak tornado months, April, May, and June, produced 13, 48, and 21 tornadoes, respectively. Other totals included January, 2: February, 1; March, 3; July, 4; August, 8; September, 5; October, 8; November, 11; and December, 16.



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
