Hail And Rain Devastate Crops Over Wide Area Of County

Crop damage was high Wednesday and Thursday nights when storms passed over the Brice area Wednesday night and from Ashtola thru the Chamberlain community Thursday night.

The hail and rain storm Wednesday night in the Brice area was a continuation of the storm that caused so much destruction in Amarillo. Crops were completely wiped out in some places and damage to homes, outbuildings, trees etc. was extremely heavy, with numerous broken window panes reported.

Crops were wiped out or heavily damaged Thursday night as result of a hail storm that extended east of Goodnight thru Ashtola, Martin and Chamberlain communities. The heavy downpour that accompanied the storm caused heavy damage to fields and big lakes of water were standing in fields that were laden with beautiful crops the day before.

Some hail fell here in town but we were on the north edge of the storm. We netted 1.24 inches of moisture from the downpour which brings our monthly total to 4.02 and our yearly total to 10.30 inches. In addition to the other functions of the weather, the temperature soared to a hot 101 degrees Saturday.

Local Man Heads New Road Group

An organization has been formed to work for a scenic highway through the lower end of Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

Two Panhandle law makers and several interested individuals met Friday morning in the director's room of the First State Bank, Memphis, Texas, to form the Palo Duro Scenic Road Association.

James F. Hayes of Clarendon was elected president. State representatives W. S. "Bill" Heatley of Paducah, and Tom Christian of Claude participated in forming the new association which has a goal of seeking state funds to construct a new scenic highway through the lower end of Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

Travis Aaron, district manager of Southwestern Public Service of Amarillo, said that ideally, the planned road would go from a point near Brice at State Highway 256, into the Palo Duro Canyon to connect with the park road which presently goes only part way into the canyon from the north.

Other officers named were Jim Beeson of Memphis, vice-president, and Clifford Farmer of Memphis, secretary-treasurer. The association plans to name representatives from all counties involved as directors in the association.

The association is being formed to promote work and facilitate the drafting of a tentative route over the 56.5 miles involved.

CROPS DESTROYED BY NATURAL CAUSES

Due to the recent rains and hails, many of the crops have been destroyed.

Feed grains which have been lost must be replanted until July 1 to be eligible for program payments. The final planting date for cotton has already past; therefore, cotton does not have to be replanted.

If you have lost your cotton and do not intend to replant it back to the same, be sure and come by the office and talk with us about what can be planted on this land without jeopardizing your payments. You must file an application for acreage credit and receive county committee approval before doing anything to this land.

Wheat destroyed after the final certification date but prior to harvest may be taken out of wheat classification. This land can then be used for other crops or diverted acres. If you have lost your wheat since you cer-

tified and want it reclassified, come in and file your written request.

WHEAT DESTROYED

Some of the wheat which was plowed up with sweeps and chisel type plows may not be completely destroyed. Also, some which was grazed out may be trying to head out. This is probably due to the wet weather, but it should be replowed as soon as possible.

BRUSH CONTROL FROM ANOTHER ANGLE

Research workers at Texas A&M University are trying a new approach to the problem of basal sprouting on mesquite and huisache which have been treated with herbicides. Their system calls for deliberately forcing underground buds to grow before a herbicide is applied. Then the herbicide is sprayed on and catches both the upper part of the tree and sprouts. In laboratory tests it has worked, but Dr. Page Morgan and his associates say the new principle has still got to be proved in field tests. We hope it works.

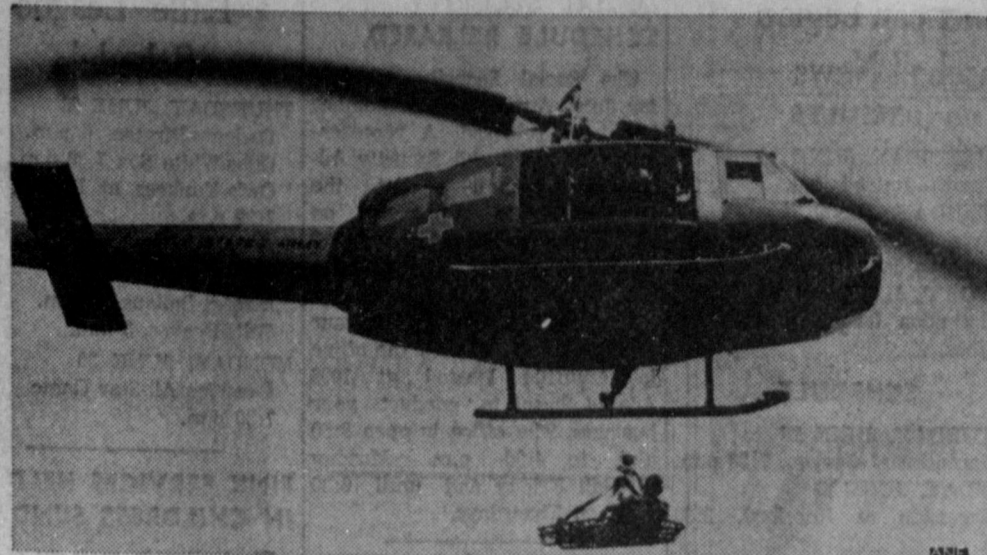

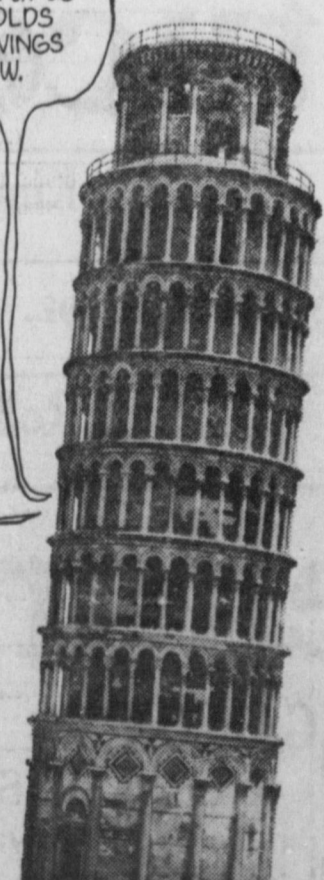

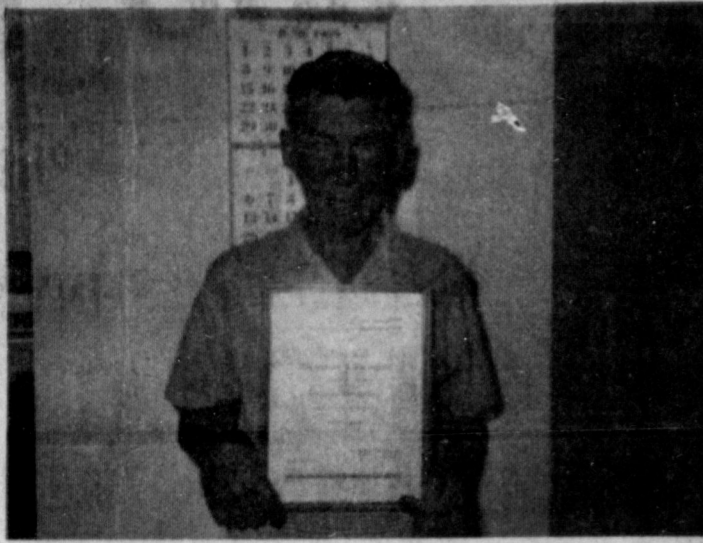
