**IMPORTANT CHANGE** — The dates for grazing diverted acres has been changed for Donley County.

Producers will be permitted to graze diverted acres through May 14, 1969. Diverted acres may not be grazed this fall until October 15, 1969.

The wheat and barley reporting date for Donley County has also been changed to May 15, 1969. Therefore, May 15 will now be the last date to report wheat and barley acreages to this office.

If you have any questions on this change, please contact the county office.

**COTTON TRANSFER REFERENDUM** — Producers will vote the week of May 5 through May 9 to determine if cotton allotments may be transferred out of the county for 1970. Ballots will be mailed Friday, May 2, 1969. They must be returned or postmarked no later than Friday, May 9, 1969.

**IMPORTANT** — Cotton, feed grain, and wheat must be planted and farmed in a workmanlike manner for the farm to be eligible for payments. This means the carrying out of all operations normal to production of the crop in the area.

## Social Security Student Benefits

Many children of retired, disabled, and deceased workers are now able to stay in school because of social security taxes paid by their parents, according to Travis C. Briggs, Amarillo social security district manager.

Student benefits, a relatively new addition to the social security program, are paid to full-time students in accredited schools as long as the students are unmarried and age 18 to 22. Full-time attendance at a high school, college, business, or vocational school can qualify them for benefits.

"Of course these benefits are based on work covered by social security by a student's parent who either died or is entitled to social security retirement or disability benefits," Mr. Briggs explained.

Benefits are paid 12 months a year (including vacations between semesters) to students whose yearly earnings are \$1680 or less.

Additional information and assistance in applying for benefits are available at the social security office, located at 1006 South Adams in Amarillo. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and remains open until 6:30 p.m. on Thursdays.

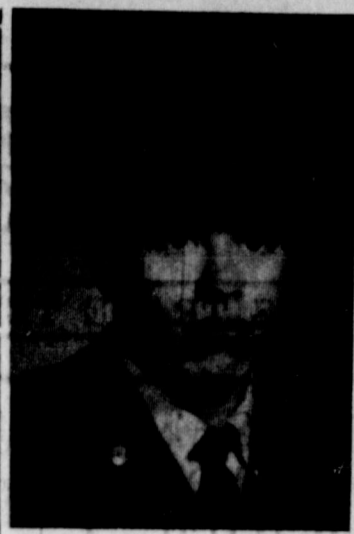

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership. "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature."

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. "(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. "(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. "(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state. "(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. "(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

## Can Frozen Foods Cause Poisoning?

Can you get food poisoning from freezer food? If frozen food thaws out, should it be destroyed? Can you refreeze meat that has thawed out?

State Health Department officials say these questions persist, although frozen foods have become an integral part of modern-day living. Properly stored, handled and prepared, frozen foods will serve you and your family well.

Food poisoning, originating from frozen foods, is a rarity. Processors are careful to prepare and freeze their products at the peak of freshness, insuring that bacteria are at a minimum. The very act of freezing the food suppresses the ability of the bacteria to multiply. Not until food temperatures rise and conditions become favorable to growth of the bacteria do they begin multiplying.

And what about frozen foods that have thawed out... must they be destroyed? Not necessarily. After all, they must be thawed before they can be cooked and eaten. If foods have been thawed only for a short time, they may be safely eaten. The important question is how long they have been thawed and how high the temperature has been.

If the temperature went no higher than 45 degrees, the foods may be maintained at this level safely for several days, but should not be refrozen.

Is it ever safe to refreeze meat that has thawed out? Refreezing meat is permissible if the meat was fresh at the original freezing and if it was thawed for only a short period. There may, however, be some degradation of flavor and quality with the second freezing.

The risk in refreezing cured or smoked meats is greater. These meats may be slightly spoiled even though there is no discoloration, off-odor or other signs of spoilage.

Can you determine the quality of frozen food simply by looking at it? Loss of quality—resulting from improper handling or extended storage—is usually indicated by loss of flavor and color. (This is particularly true of vegetables.) Orange juice, as it deteriorates, tends to separate and "settle out" rapidly when reconstituted. Cream sauces appear curdled and the liquid begins to separate.

To preserve the quality of frozen foods, store them at the lowest possible temperature, and when you transport them from the store to your freezer, do so as quickly as possible. Rising temperatures cause chemical changes which influence the food's flavor and quality.

**Use Of The Soil Survey By Home Builders**

By Jerald O. Crump  
 Soil Conservation Service  
 Today soil surveys are used extensively by both rural and urban people.  
 In fact, soil maps are especially important for urban users. If a farmer uses a soil the wrong way he may suffer losses that year but he can hardly do that if his investment is in a new home. If his foundation is sinking or cracking, this causes years of high repair and maintenance.  
 Developers and home builders can benefit greatly by studying the available soil maps and locating the soils that suit their purpose. Septic tank effluent does not filter through some soils that have a large proportion of clay and filter too fast in coarse sands far below the surface. Unstable soils slip, making foundations and walls crack. Some soils are subject to infrequent flooding. Others are unsuitable for lawns and gardens unless the homeowner is willing to spend large sums of money hauling in topsoil.  
 In counties with large cities

such as San Antonio, community planners have reported savings of as much as 2 million dollars per year in the selection of new home sites. Realtors, home builders, and subdividers can all profit from the soil characteristics given in a soil survey.

**TRAFFIC LAW QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

Q—What vehicles are required to carry flares?  
 A—No person shall operate any motor truck, passenger bus, or truck-tractor upon any highway outside the city limits at night unless there shall be carried at least 3 flares, red electric lanterns, or three portable red reflector units capable of reflecting a red light clearly for a distance of 300 feet.  
 Q—How are these flares or reflectors to be displayed in case of a breakdown?  
 A—One at a distance of approximately one hundred feet in advance of the vehicle, one at a distance of approximately one hundred feet to the rear of the vehicle each in the center of the lane of traffic occupied by the disabled vehicle, and one at the traffic side of the vehicle approximately ten feet rearward or forward thereof.  
 Q—What is a provisional drivers license?  
 A—A provisional drivers license is any original license is-

sued since Jan. 1, 1968 to anyone who is under 21 years of age. The license will be clearly marked across the front with the word provisional. The holder of this license, when convicted of two moving traffic violations within a 12 month period will be subject to suspension.  
 Q—If a person is convicted in another state of a violation that calls for a suspension of drivers license, can he still drive in Texas?  
 A—The Texas Department of Public Safety is authorized to suspend or revoke the license of any resident of this state upon receiving notice of the conviction of such person in another state of an offense which if committed in this state would be grounds for suspension of his drivers license.  
 Q—What is the minimum amount of liability insurance required to satisfy safety responsibility law?  
 A—\$10,000.00 each person, \$20,000.00 each accident and \$5,000.00 property damage each accident. This commonly referred to as 10, 20 and 5.

**WATCH FOR SCREW-WORMS**  
 Veterinarians in USDA's Agricultural Research Service anticipate one of the worst outbreaks in the 7-year history of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. They hope the increased production of sterile screwworm flies may blunt a massive spring buildup. The resurgence is blamed on 17 months of ideal weather for the pests and on relaxed preventive measure by many ranchers. Ranchers are asked to carry on an intensive preventive program in the months ahead. Herds should be inspected regularly, suspected larvae should be collected for identification and all wounds treated with approved smeared.
