Larvae vary in color, somereddish brown. They have a wing spread of about 11/2 inches.

Larvae feed on the fruit and the principal damage is the loss inspect their fields frequently by either of two methods in order to detect any change in bollworm infestations.

One method is to examine the terminal buds (upper three to four inches of the plant) of 100 cotton plants and 100 consecutive eral points in the field. Begin treatment when bollworm eggs and four to five young worms 5 percent of the squares and small bolls have been injured by

The other method for inspecting for bollworms is to make a point to see that their child or whole plant examination (terminals, squares, flowers, or bolls) agement to get the most from of all plants on 10 feet of row in five locations in the field. When larval counts average more than 1.5 larvae per 10 feet of row, begin treatment. Apply insecticides at five-day intervals or less. Check fields closely two to three days following each application for effective control. Where control has not been obtained, repeat

application immediately. Where bollworms are still small and are confining their feeding to very small squares, infestations above the 5 percent level can probably be tolerated without economic damage, says Clymer, When they begin feeding on larger squares, blooms and/or bolls, treatment would be required for a 5 percent infesta-

Once a field is treated with an insecticide that will control bollworms, beneficial insects will be practically eliminated. Therefore,

Adequately fertizenship Seminar at Waco, will lized wheat forage can contain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitrogen on a dry basis.

> Insufficient phosporus can also limit wheat production, the agent points out. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing.

Since phosporus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots, Therefore, preplant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosporus when they are young.

Gooch urges all wheat growers to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the county Extension office.


