The coldest temperature recorded so far this winter was a frigid 4 degrees above zero Tuesday morning. The high Monday was only 32 degree.

Funeral services for William Park Chamberlain, 67, were held Saturday afternoon in the First Christian Church with Rev. Paul Hancock, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with the Murphy Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Chamberlain died Friday afternoon in the Hall County Hospital at Memphis following a short illness. He was born April 25, 1901 in Chicago, Illinois and moved to Donley County with his parents in 1904. He married Norma Evelyn Rhode June 6, 1938 in Clarendon.

In addition to ranching, Mr. Chamberlain was a Paleontologist, associated with the Frick Laboratory, a branch of the American Museum of Natural History, New York City. Digging for relics of animals long since extinct on the High Plains, he uncovered countless hundreds of both partial and complete skeletons and was responsible for the establishing of the Clarendonian Age classification of prehistoric findings in this area.

He was a member of the Texas Historical Society, Donley County Historical Survey Committee and was founder and curator of the Donley County Museum. He was an officer in churches he attended and was a former County Commissioner. He made many contributions to the Museum at Canyon and other museums.

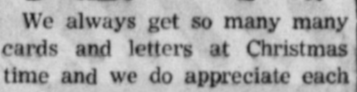

Oldsters Can Draw Social Security Regardless

If you are between 65 and 72 and have not yet applied for your social security benefits because you are still working, you need to consult the social security office right away.

Recent changes in the Social Security Act have made it possible for many people to work and still receive some social security benefits, according to Travis C. Briggs, district manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

Under present law, a beneficiary can earn up to \$1680 a year and still receive all of his social security benefits. If he earns over \$1680 a year, he gives up only one dollar in benefits for each two dollars he earns between \$1680 and \$2880. For every dollar over \$2880, he gives up one dollar in social security benefits.

However, no matter how much he earns in the year, he can still be paid for every month in which he does not earn more than \$140 and is not self-employed, Briggs added.

Report of Payments — During January you will receive Form CCC-182 which shows the total amount you received in payments from the ASCS office in 1968. This form will aid you in the preparation of your income tax return. Check these totals and if they are in error, bring them to our office.

1969 Feed Grain Program — We have not received the details of the 1969 Feed Grain Program. However, it was announced by the Secretary of Agriculture last week. We understand the program will be the same as for 1968 except for the addition of barley as part of the feed grain bases. Price support and diversion rates will remain the same. Further details of the program will be announced soon.

Cotton Release and Reapportionment — If you have a cotton allotment which you do not intend to plant, you may release it for one year to the County Committee to be reapportioned to farmers who request additional cotton. This will preserve the

allotment on your farm if you do not wish to plant it. At the end of the year, it will go back to the farm from which it was released. The final date for releasing or requesting extra cotton has not been set. However, we are accepting applications now.

Agricultural Conservation Program — We are taking applications for cost-share assistance to carry out approved ACP practices on the 1969 Program year budget now. All 1968 practices will be paid within the next few days.
