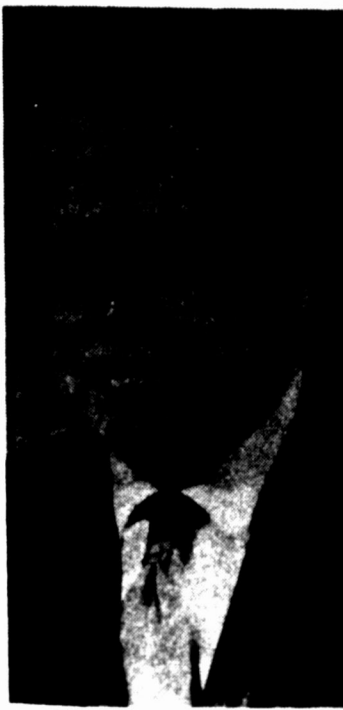

Services for Van Kennedy Held

Van Kennedy died Friday, May 29, 1981 services were held at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon, Sunday, May 31 at 3:00 p.m. The Rev. W. R. Lawrence officiated assisted by Rev. Paul Heil and Rev. Bill Watson. Burial was in the Citizens Cemetery by Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Kennedy was born in Hutto, Texas. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Kennedy moved to the Lelia Lake community on 1912. He married Anne Cagle in Clarendon on June 12, 1924.

His banking career began in 1921 at the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Lelia Lake. In 1924 he became associated with the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. of Clarendon, retiring as Vice-President in 1974 after 50 years of service. He continued to serve on the Board of Directors and as inactive Vice-President.

He was a deacon and trustee of the First Baptist Church Clarendon. Mr. Kennedy was a veteran of World War I. He was a past master of the Masonic Lodge No. 700 and a member of all other Masonic Bodies including Khiva Temple and Scottish Rite. He was a past patron of the Order of the Eastern Star. He was a former member of the Clarendon School Board and a long time member of the Lion's Club American Legion.

Survivors include his wife, a son Richard Van Kennedy of Houston, a daughter Dorothy Anne Bagwell of Claude and two grandchildren, Larry Bagwell of Boulder, Colorado and Susan Bagwell of Beasley Point, New Jersey.

One reason older people take more drugs is that they tend to have long-term illnesses. Rules for proper drug-taking, however, apply equally to the young and the elderly:

--Follow precisely the amount and time schedule of drugs prescribed by your physician.

--Never take drugs prescribed for a friend.

--If you are seeing several physicians for different diseases, inform each one of

ALL the drugs you are taking. Sometimes drugs fight one another and should not be taken together.

--Promptly tell your doctor of any side effects.

--You may find keeping a daily schedule of drugs prescribed and taken is helpful.

FISH TALES

That is a Water Wagon, an invention of Boyd Henton of Amarillo. The Water Wagon is made of styrofoam and is four feet by six feet and ten inches thick.
