

Mr. Kennedy was born in Hutto, Texas. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Kennedy moved to the Lelia Lake community on 1912. He married Anne Cagle in Clarendon on June 12, 1924

His banking career began in 1921 at the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Lelia Lake. In 1924 he became associated with the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. of Clarendon, retiring as Vice-President in 1974 after 50 years of service. He continued to serve on the Board of Directors and as inactive Vice-President.

He was a deason and trustee of the First Baptist Church Clarendon. Mr. Kennedy was a veteran of World War I. He was a past master of the Masonic Lodge No. 700 and a member of all other Masonic Bodies including Khiva Temple and Scottish Rite. He was a past patron of the Order of the Eastern Star.
