Explorer Scouts plans 180 mile canoe trip

Explorers of Post 437 are planning an adventure to the world's greatest canoe country, from the Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Canoe Base BSA.

The area of the Boundary Waters Canoe Area of the Superior National Forest and the Quetico Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada comprises roughly 4,000 square miles and is commonly used by the explorers.

The base is located in the beautiful Arrowhead country of Minnesota, 22 miles northeast of Ely, Minn. and six, (by water) miles from the United States-Canadian boundary. The site of the base on Moose Lake where the road ends and the roadless wilderness begins.

Clarendon Explorers met Monday, June 8 at 8 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church to finalize plans for the trip.

The departure date has been set for June 15 and sightseeing has been planned for different points of interest along the way.

A high point is the Kansas City Royals-Chicago White Sox baseball game which will be viewed by the courtesy of the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. of Clarendon who have donated tickets to the game.

Other interesting stops will be sightseeing in Kansas City, Des Moines, Iowa; Minneapolis, Minn.; St. Paul and Duluth, Minn.

The Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base is expected to be reached on June 20. From the base the explorers will make the 180 mile trip across the lakes and land to Quetico Provincial Park, Ontario, Canada.

Clarendon boys who will be going are: Lance and Drew Thornberry, Dean Hawkins, Randy White, Mark White, Keenan Shields and Mickey McGuire. Clyde Price, Advisor for the Explorers will also be attending.

This will be the 5th trip for Price, who has been given a leave of absence by Pantex, where his is employed, to make the trip.

Other trips made by Price were in 1950, 1952, 1959, 1978 and 1981 for the 5th time. Allen Estlack and Stina Cain have also made the trip as advisors.

In the past 31 years 26 boys and leaders from Clarendon have made this trip.

Grasshoppers, grasshoppers, everywhere

Grasshoppers are well into their hatch in all areas of Donley County, according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch. Early reports indicate that the problem is already severe and the egg hatch is not complete yet.

Grasshoppers are relatively easy to kill when they are young but become more difficult to control as they near maturity. They are best controlled in their hatching grounds before they begin to migrate over large areas.

Frequently, spot spraying the hatching areas will prevent later widespread damage.

A cost-share control program is available through the animal-plant health inspection Service for large areas of rangeland only. The rangeland must be blocked-up in 10,000 acre or larger units. Ranchers having heavy infestations of grasshoppers and interested in a government cost-share program should contact the County Extension Agent now.

Information on the selection and use of insecticides for control of grasshoppers can be obtained at your County Extension Office.

Low income Senior Citizens may get help in keeping cool in July

Low income families containing members age 65 or older may receive needed assistance in July to help cooling their homes. Under the cooling phase of the federally-funded Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR) proposes to make a one-time-only payment to qualifying Supplemental Security Income, food stamps, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children households.

The program established by Congress in 1980 provided assistance this past winter to approximately 475,000 needy families by distributing \$25 million in benefits. Because of the harsh effect of Texas summer heat on elderly persons, participation will be limited to low income households containing elderly persons.

Under TDHR's plan, those households with elderly persons not receiving an automatic payment, may apply between August 3 and August 31, 1981. Each county in Texas will have a designated location where members of such households can apply.

Those individuals or groups wishing to comment on this proposed plan should

do so by June 9, 1981. Comments should be addressed to Ms. Susan Johnson, Handbook and Procedures Division 444-B, Texas Department of Human Resources, P.O. Box 2960, Austin, Texas 78769.

Much needed moisture across area

Much needed moisture fell across much of the area and in Donley County assuring the farmers of enough moisture to plant crops. Although some places did receive re-

spectable amounts in showers it had been spotty until last week when everyone seemed to receive amounts needed to get the seed in the ground.

May 26, a cloud with damaging hail hit some area farms and damage was to early cotton already up and growing well. J. A. McAnear Sr. reported extensive damage to one of his cotton fields near Brice.

He also reported over 1 1/2 inches of moisture by Wednesday of last week. This was about the same total as he found on the other gauges on his farms.

In the Windy Valley Community Lacy Lee Noble reported 1.45 for the early rainfall of last week. J. C. Woody, at Lelia Lake reported about 1.60 and for Clarendon Tommie Saye measured 1.21.

One of the best reports came from Goodwin Bray, in the Goldston Community with 1.40 on Monday and 2.10 on Tuesday of last week for 3.50 inches.

Many fields have been planted but farmers are hoping for just enough break in the moisture to get everything planted, up and growing.

Not all areas in the county have been represented because contact was not made with some of the persons in these areas. Perhaps this is a sign that work is going along at a pretty good clip!

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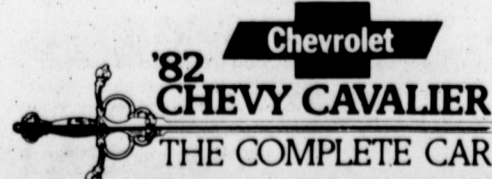

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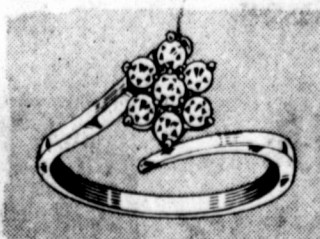

FISH TALES

By KATE BYRDAK

The experimental stocking of newly hatched smallmouth fry at Lake Greenbelt a few weeks ago appears to confirm that it may not be necessary to raise the fish to fingerling size (2-3 inches long) to hatcheries before release.

"Normally when you release fry into a lake which has standing populations of predator fish, mortality is quite high," said hatchery coordinator Bill Rutledge. "But at Greenbelt we stocked 20,000 smallmouth fry only along the riprap of the dam, and apparently many of the fish were able to survive by hiding among the rocks."

He said the chemical rotenone was applied to a small portion of the release area a month after stocking, and hundreds of the tiny smallmouths were found.

Rutledge said the dam riprap apparently is similar to the rock areas normally used by smallmouths to spawn in the wild. Upon hatching, smallmouth fry disappear into the rock crevices for the first few days of their lives.

Thanks to Greenbelt and the help of those involved, this state experiment has been a success that will lead to more lakes being more abundantly stocked with smallmouth bass.

Here is a note from Meredith, the other good Walleye lake in the area. Most people who catch state record-sized fish have endured long hours of discomfort, frustration and just plain hard work to earn their moment of glory.

And then there's Ray Thrailkill. Thrailkill now holds the Texas record for walleye with an 11-pound 5/4 ounce fish from Meredith.

The only inconvenience he suffered was a short interruption of a pinball game. The Amarillo resident was enjoying an evening of pinball at the Fortress Cove Marina on March 3. Almost as an afterthought he baited a rod and reel with a minnow and left the rig in his sailboat moored in a boat stall a few dozen yards from the floating marina building.

Thrailkill landed the fish after a friend told him his rod and reel were about to be pulled into the lake. Spurred by his success, Thrailkill postponed further pinball action and proceeded to catch a seven pounder and a three pounder shortly afterward, according to biologist Joe Kraai of Canyon.

The record fish displaces another Lake Meredith walleye which weighed 10 pounds 14 ounces and was caught in 1978. The new record fish was 31 1/2 inches long and 19 1/8 inches in girth.

Maybe Patten's Landing needs to add a pinball machine so more fishermen can land bigger walleye! Perhaps there is a scientific principal to study here?

A reminder about fishing licenses. Most Texas residents must buy either a \$4.50 resident fishing or a \$8.75 combination hunting and fishing license.

If you are 65 or older and if you are under 17, you don't need a license. All nonresidents, regardless of age, must purchase a non resident license.

An exception to the resident rule is that if you are fishing on property you or your immediate family own, you need no license. Also you need no license if you are fishing in your county of residence with a trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line with no reel or winding device.

You also need not purchase a resident fishing license if you hold a valid Texas commercial fishing license or an exempt fishing license available to disabled veterans or the blind.

Broww a pinball machine and buy a license and let's bring the record catch to Greenbelt!

At those graduations David Sr. was valedictorian of the 8th grade and Carl Jr was valedictorian of the High School.

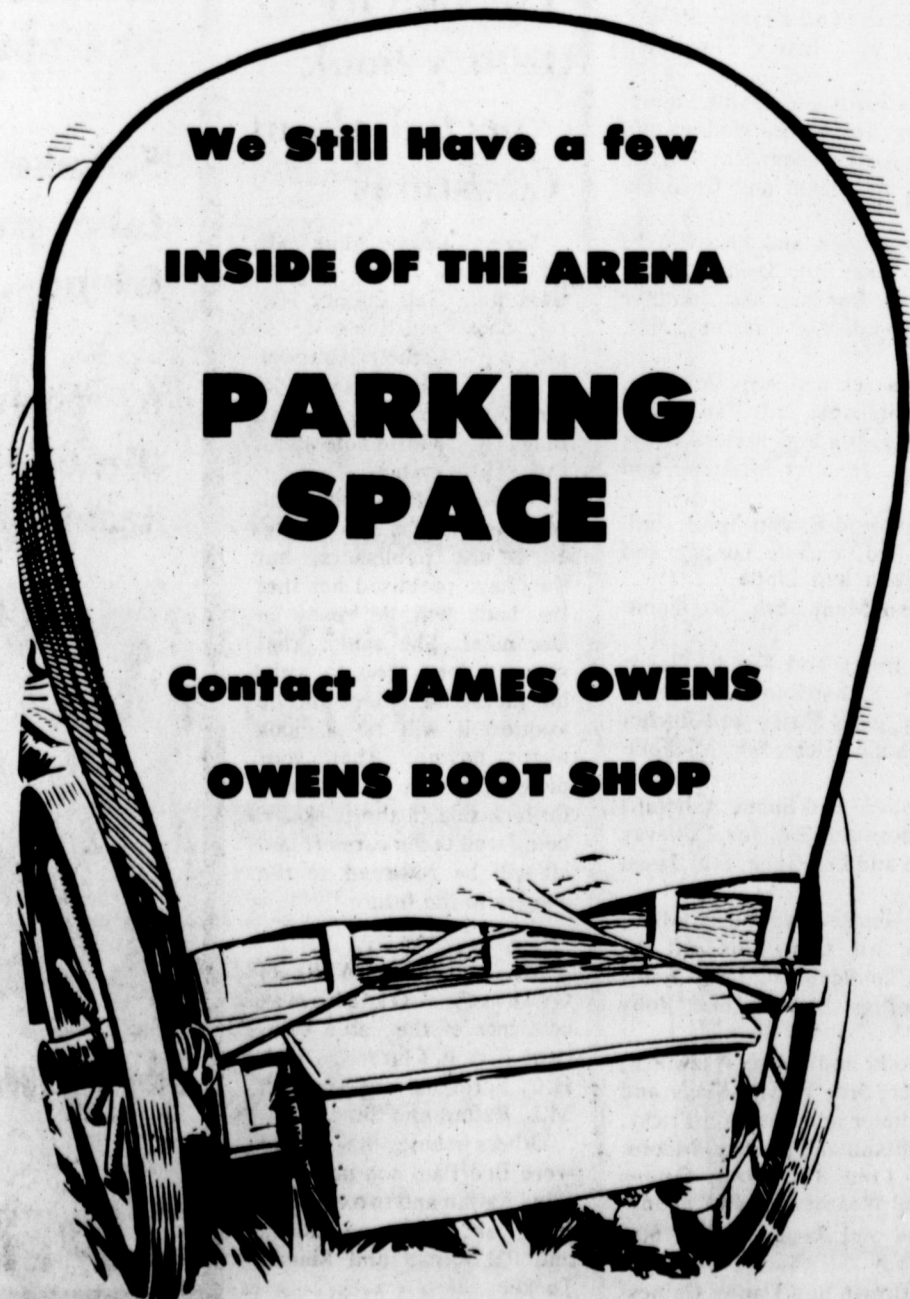

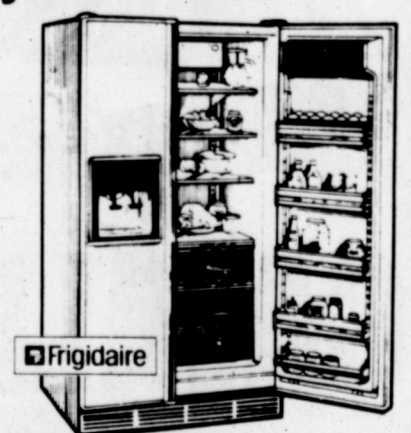

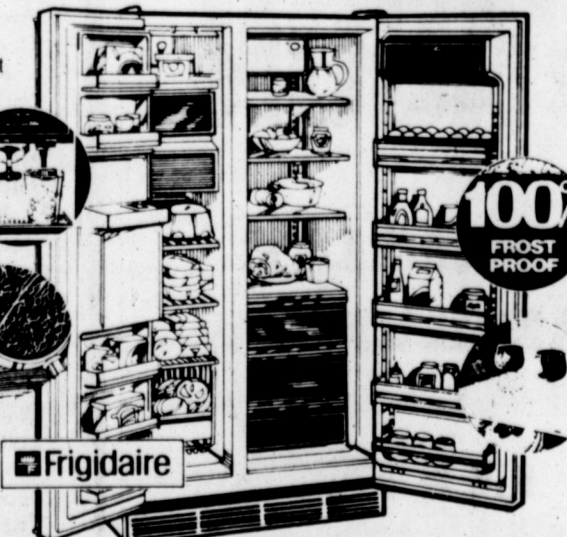

"But what about me and all the other people who live out here in California? I thought that if I watched the program and gave my money to support it that I could call on you for help." "I'm sorry. Senator Bill Sarpalius

Reports

Even with a special session now certain, Senator Bill Sarpalius said today he thought his freshman term was "very successful".

"We introduced 29 bills and 20 of those went to the Governor's desk to become law when he signs them, so we feel like we did what the people sent us here to do," Sarpalius said.

Sarpalius also said he was pleased to be able to keep his pledge to his voters to keep the costs of his office low. His expenses in the Senate were in the bottom one-third during the session.

"Considering how far our district is from Austin, we had to cut a few corners to keep our costs low. But the voters are cutting corners, too," he said.

Sarpalius passed bills to raise the drinking age, to stiffen the law of criminal trespass and to provide for the voluntary licensing of grain samplers. But his forte his session was agriculture.

Sarpalius passed six agricultural laws he classified as significant. These included a codification of the agricultural laws into a single code, enlargement of the Produce Recovery Fund from three to six members, establishment of a clearinghouse for gasohol information, and regulation of pesticides and predators.

The Senator from Hereford was chairman of the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee, and Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby presented him with a special gavel at the end of the session to commemorate his work on agricultural legislation. It was the first time the Lieutenant Governor had made such a presentation.

"Agriculture is very important in our district, and many people in our district thought the Legislature had ignored agricultural problems in the past. We know the importance of farming and ranching, but our work is not finished yet. We have sponsored three interim studies. One relates to agriculture. It will study pesticides, grain elevator explosions and bonding, family farm security and other subjects.

"We also will study the criminal justice system, particularly the Texas Youth Council. In the third study, we plan to look at the routes and methods of narcotics traffic. So our job did not stop with the end of the session, even without the special session later this summer," Sarpalius said.

The freshman Senator had high praise for the people in the Panhandle district. "We were very pleased with the response we got by mail, telephone calls and visits from the people in our district. We owe our success this session to people who are interested in state government and who want to have a voice in the direction this state is going. They made a big difference for all of us," he said.

One Sarpalius project which did not pass this term is a motor fuels tax exemption for gasohol. "Time ran out on us on that. We had enough support to pass the bill but there was a filibuster against it late in the session. We will push for better tax treatment for gasohol during the special session. If we can't get it then, we plan to try again next time," he said.

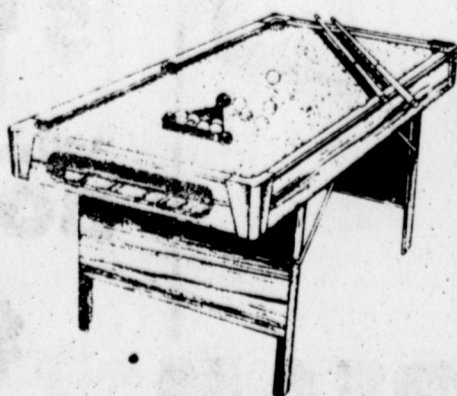

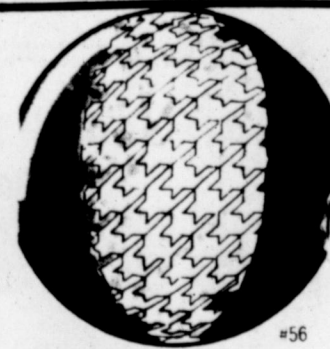

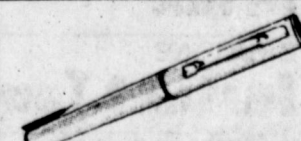
