## Jeanice Weatherly leaves the Press


#### Abstract

Jeanice Weatherly, the editor of the Clarendon Press for five years, is leaving the newspaper business to begin another paper shuffling business, working for the US Postal Service. Mrs. Weatherly began her newspaper career with the Clarendon Press in the summer of 1975 when she worked as a Clarendon Press in the summer of 1975 when she worked as proof reader and editor. For family reasons, she But the ink couldn't dry in her veins and when in 1977 the paper called to ask if Jeanice could do some part time work, she gladly accepted. The job began as a part time help putting ads together and helping out in general. The editor at that time was Lowell Carleson who quit when he was offered a job time was Lowell Carleson who quit when he was offered a job on his home town paper. Ruth Hancock became the editor for on his home town paper. Ruth Hancock inecame the awhile with Jeanice working to fill in the spaces.


Mrs. Hancock's responsbilities at the Farmer's State Bank began to require more time than she had to give and still keep her job as editor, so the editor position became available.
Jeanice Weatherly was the most likely candidate for that position and 1978 when Helen Woody purchased the paper, deaniee was the editor of the Clarendon Press.

## MEDICAL DON'TS

Many problems related to taking medicines can be avoided or lessened in effect if we follow a few simple rules:

1. Do not take other people's medicines! What is good for one person is not always good for another.
2.Do Not take nonprescription (over-theCounter) medicines without consulting your physician or pharmacist. Although usually safe, they can casue problmes in combination with certain prescription medicines or with various health problems.
2. Do Not rely on medicines to relieve every ache, pain, or symptom. Many conditions will mend without treatment.
3. Do Not stop taking medicines for chronic diseases just because you feel better or symptoms disappear . . .see your physician.
4. Do Not mix alcohol with medicines! Although there is usually no ill effect, certain medicines are dangerous when taken at the same time alcohol is consumed.
5. Do Not keep old medicines in your home. With time, they lose their effectiveness and can even degarde to harmful chemicals. Safely dispose of old medicines.

Plan now for Quail Habitat Landowners interested in
seeing more bobwhite quail on their property can take steps now to improve quail habitat. Carl Frentress. a Texas
Parks and Wildlife Parks and Wildife Depart-
ment biologist from Athens, said many techniques for habitat improvement are relatively easy and inexpen-
sive sive. "Quail prefer areas where at least part of the acreage each year," ${ }^{\text {F Frentress said. }}$ "This is one reason quail often do well in cropland areas. Even where livestock
grazing is the primary land use, there are many improvements which can be done in the spring and summer to help sustain quail popula Frentress continued. "Keeping fertilizer away
trom fencerows.
thickets bushpiles and the edges of the woods will reduce plants such as quail food plants such as goatweed,
partridge pea, vetch and the partridge pea, vetch and the
like," he said discing strips around the sites of fields or open woods will encourage such plants to grow. Patches of moderately dense bunchin size should be retained for nesting cover.
Quail also require escape vegetation. Woody plants such as wild plum can be dug planted, as can low-growing grapevines, rattan or blackberry". Frentress said this is done best during the winter when the plants are dormant. of food plots there should be woody cover within 100 yards," he said. Frentress said more intensive quail lished by using domesticated varieties of seed-producing plants. These include OK game bird pea, wild game
feed milo, Japanese millett, browntop millet, seasbania, kobe lespedeza, and bahia
grass. Some of the McAnears grass. Some of the MeAnears
have had good success using soybean along the fence rows as well. Discing of the seedbed is recommended for all these.
Green Green forage plants also are important for quail and
other wildlife species as well, Frentress continued. "While quail utilize many native winter greens, this type of

clover. This plant is a valuable addition to spring pastures and is an excellent soil builder."
