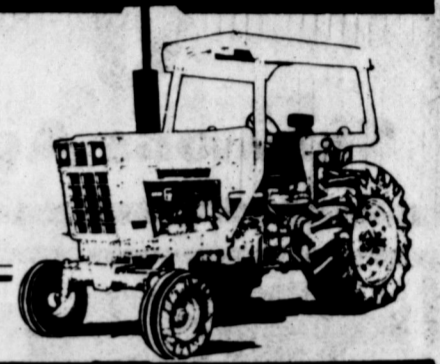

Farm Home Loans

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Harold Sherrill, FmHA county supervisor said today.

Mr. Sherrill asked that those who need farm credit as a result of adverse weather conditions make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at Clarendon.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken county will be accepted by Farmers Home until July 20, 1961, for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation. "Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mr. Sherrill said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

Jeanice Weatherly leaves the Press

Jeanice Weatherly, the editor of the Clarendon Press for five years, is leaving the newspaper business to begin another paper shuffling business, working for the US Postal Service.

Mrs. Weatherly began her newspaper career with the Clarendon Press in the summer of 1975 when she worked as a proof reader and editor. For family reasons, she left her place as at home February of that following year.

But the ink couldn't dry in her veins and when in 1977 the paper called to ask if Jeanice could do some part time work, she gladly accepted. The job began as a part time help putting ads together and helping out in general. The editor at that time was Lowell Carleson who quit when he was offered a job on his home town paper. Ruth Hancock became the editor for awhile with Jeanice working to fill in the spaces.

Mrs. Hancock's responsibilities at the Farmer's State Bank began to require more time than she had to give and still keep her job as editor, so the editor position became available. Jeanice Weatherly was the most likely candidate for that position and 1978 when Helen Woody purchased the paper, Jeanice was the editor of the Clarendon Press.

The part Jeanice enjoyed most about her job was "People. I find people infinitely interesting." Among some of the more interesting people this editor of renown had any dealing with were: Kenny King as the most famous, political figures such as Hightower, Whaley, Hodges, Sarpalius, and people of fame such as Seldon Hale the defense lawyer and Dan True author and TV newscaster awhile back for one of the stations in Amarillo.

There were many benefits to working for the newspaper, but one that Jeanice Weatherly recalls as the best was the fact that the paper was "the nicest place I know of that gave you the chance to visit with people that had once lived here that come though to ask information."

Doing feature stories was the best skill that Jeanice developed while working for the paper and it is one of the things she liked most of her many and sundry duties. "I could only do features on people because they were so cooperative," she said. "A great deal of my information was generously

offered," and gave her a continuous source to draw from for future stories. Her style of writing was unique and special because Jeanice had such good sources to rely upon her background work.

"Journalism is a very powerful media that should be handled with a great deal of care," Jeanice continued, "Things that deal with peoples lives should be researched so the facts are presented to inform the public so that they can choose what they would want to do with those facts." She always presented both sides of any issue with a great deal of research and care lest the readers of her articles become confused or influenced by her own opinion. This is one of the things that made the Clarendon Press a good source of unbiased opinion. "I feel a strong sense of obligation during any time I am writing about a great deal of money that would affect tax payers or would change peoples lives," Jeanice continued.

There will be many who will miss the ready smile, the wealth of information and the confident journalistic style that Jeanice Weatherly always had to offer at the Clarendon Press. Jeanice remarked that she will greatly miss the many friends she developed while working at the paper; people who came in to renew subscriptions that she would otherwise never get to visit with, people who called in information that she would not ordinarily get to hear from, but these are things that come with the change. Jeanice said that hopefully she will be able to renew old contacts through her working at the Post Office.

The home owned newspaper is a dying business and one that the townspeople of Clarendon should be proud and pleased to have. Jeanice remarked that home owned papers give their customers preferential treatment that no other paper could possibly offer and her special treatment of all those who came into the newspaper office will be missed.

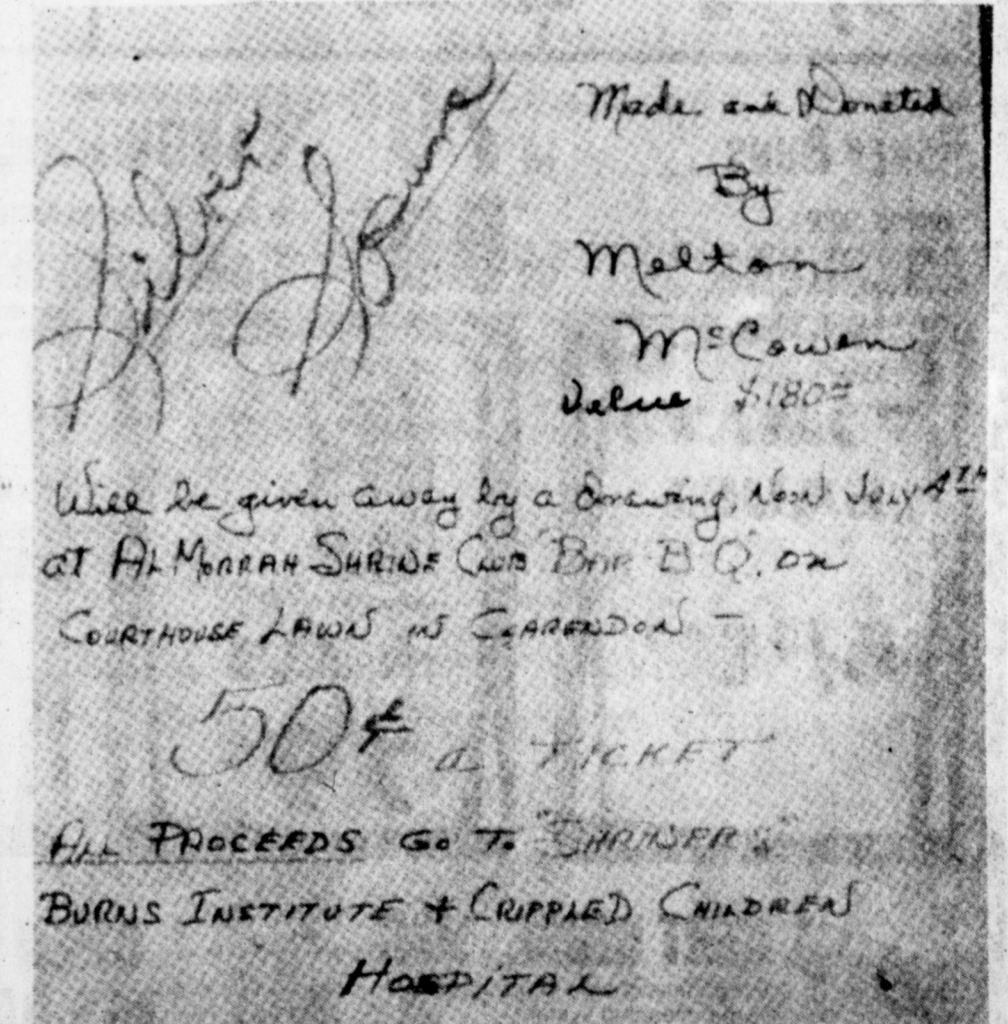

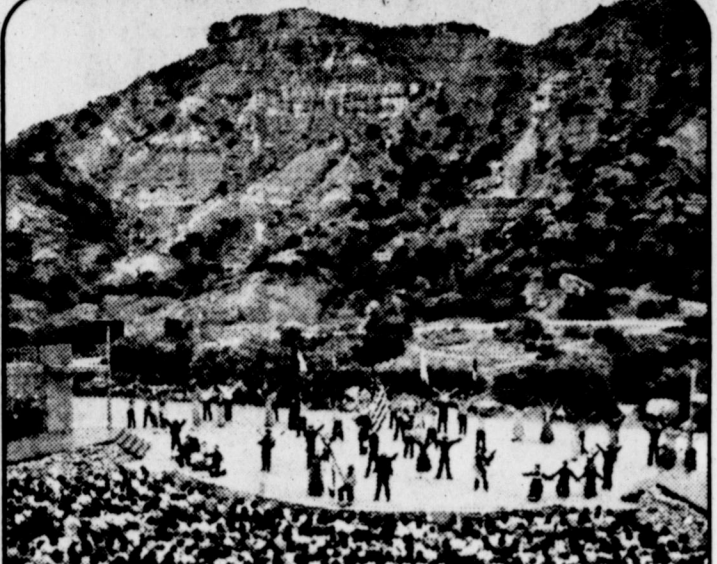
WT AAU Jr. Olympics track & Field Meet

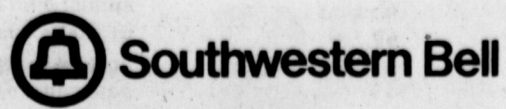

Weatherly, City Secretary of said City, he and they are hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to enter into a contract with West Texas Utilities Company providing for the furnishing by said Company of a street lighting system and electric energy and attendance necessary to operate same in accordance with the proposal submitted by said Company.

RESOLUTION

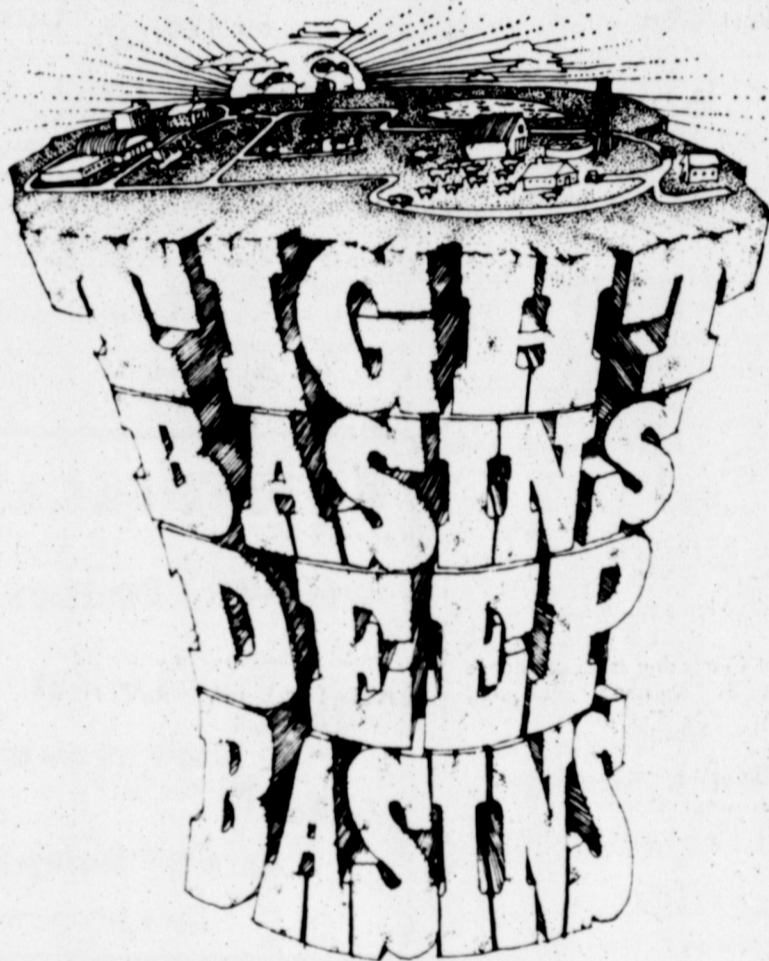

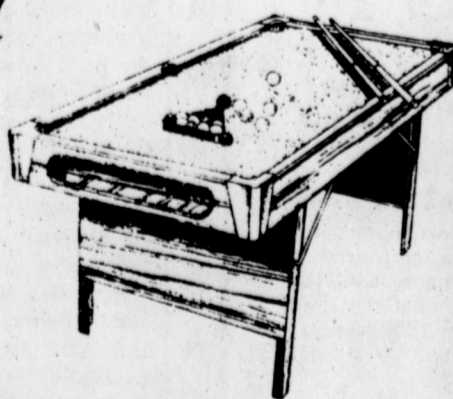

6. Do Not keep old medicines in your home. With time, they lose their effectiveness and can even degarde to harmful chemicals. Safely dispose of old medicines.

Plan now for Quail Habitat

Landowners interested in seeing more bobwhite quail on their property can take steps now to improve quail habitat.

Carl Frentress, a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist from Athens, said many techniques for habitat improvement are relatively easy and inexpensive.

"Quail prefer areas where at least part of the acreage experiences soil disturbance each year," Frentress said. "This is one reason quail often do well in cropland areas. Even where livestock grazing is the primary land use, there are many improvements which can be done in the spring and summer to help sustain quail populations the year round," Frentress continued.

"Keeping fertilizer away from fencerows, thickets, bushpiles and the edges of the woods will reduce competition with quail food plants such as goatweed, partridge pea, vetch and the like," he said discing strips around the sites of fields or open woods will encourage such plants to grow. Patches of moderately dense bunchgrass at least one-tenth acre in size should be retained for nesting cover.

"Quail also require escape cover in the form of wood vegetation. Woody plants such as wild plum can be dug from one location and transplanted, as can low-growing grapevines, rattan or blackberry". Frentress said this is done best during the winter when the plants are dormant.

"For maximum utilization of food plots there should be woody cover within 100 yards," he said. Frentress said more intensive quail management can be accomplished by using domesticated varieties of seed-producing plants. These include OK game bird pea, wild game feed milo, Japanese millet, browntop millet, seasbania, kobe lespedeza, and bahia grass. Some of the McAnears have had good success using soybean along the fence rows as well. Discing of the seedbed is recommended for all these.

Green forage plants also are important for quail and other wildlife species as well, Frentress continued. "While quail utilize many native winter greens, this type of forage can be supplemented with plots of Yuchi arrowleaf clover. This plant is a valuable addition to spring pastures and is an excellent soil builder."

Landowners should consult local agricultural specialists for details prior to planting.

FRUIT MIX ON

The summer heat is on and the kids are begging for things cool to eat and an excuse to come inside to cool off. You are probably out of soft drinks and flavored water, you don't like poking sugar down their throats continuously all summer and you wonder what to do. Right? Well, if that is your quandry, then try out these ideas.

PEANUT BUTTER BANANA POPS

1 C milk
1 ripe banana, cut into chunks

1/2 C creamy peanut butter
1/2 tsp vanilla
chopped nuts

In a blender, combine milk and bananas. Process until smooth. Add peanut butter and vanilla. Blend well. Pour into popsicle molds or tiny paper cups. Freeze until firm, insert a wooden stick into paper cups when mix is partially frozen.

Unmold and serve at once, rolling in chopped nuts if desired. Or keep unmolded pops in a heavy plastic freezer bag until needed.

ORANGE YOGURT POPS

1 can (6 oz) frozen orange or pineapple juice concentrate, partially thawed
1 C evaporated milk
1 C plain yogurt

Combine juice concentrate, evaporated milk and yogurt in blender. Blend until smooth. Pour into freezer molds or paper cups; freeze until firm.

FROSTY DIPPED BANANA

1/2 lb milk chocolate (or 1/4 and 1/4 carob and choc)
8 wooden sticks
4 bananas halved crosswise
1 1/2 C chopped peanuts

In a small, heavy saucepan, melt chocolate over low heat, stir constantly. Do not add any liquid. Remove from heat, transfer to a shallow dish. Insert sticks into banana halves, roll in chocolate, then in nuts. Place on baking sheet, covered with waxed paper, freeze.

If not eaten the same day, wrap in moisture-vapor-proof wrap, store in freezer.

FROZEN CHOCOLATE STICKS

1 pkg regular chocolate pudding mix
1/4 C sugar
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites stiffly beaten
6 wooden sticks
flaked coconut

In a saucepan, combine pudding mix and sugar. Prepare with milk according to directions. Stir in a small amount of hot pudding into egg yolks, return to remaining pudding in pan. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Cover surface with waxed paper, cool.

Fold in egg whites to pudding. Spoon into six 5 oz. paper cups, insert sticks and freeze until firm. Peel off paper to serve and roll in coconut.

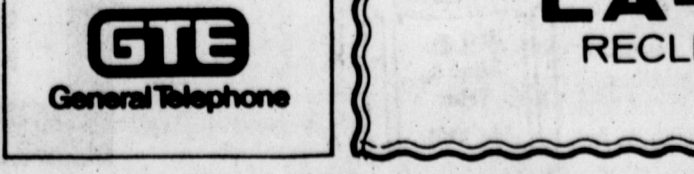
