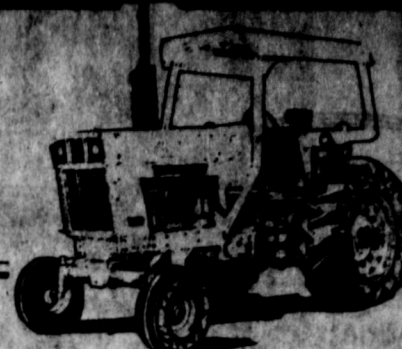

Paul Howard of Canyon and Roy Clements of Amarillo filled fourth and fifth slots. Frank Watson of Dumas came in last.

Steer Roping is a team effort between two ponies and two highly skilled and tense cowboys. Sometimes it is a father and son effort, sometimes it is between two good friends. The happiest friends of this years event were Ted Kyle of Quanah and Ed Workman of Stephenville. Bud Breashers of Shamrock and Rex Long of McLean were the second team. Larry Crump of Clarendon and Doyle Baggett of Claude; Frank Bridwell and Mike Long of McLean; Rick Kyle of Quanah and Vance Vest of Childress; finally, the team that tried the hardest but had less to show for it this year was Perry Lee of Heneretta and Bill Teague of Wynnewood, OK. Better luck next year, cowboys, come back to win.

The Saddle Bronc event is one all of the kids enjoy as much as the bull riding. The winner of this exciting and dangerous event was Mike Mitchel of Newcastle, TX. There was a tie for second between Forrest Henderson

Floral paintings are always a joy to judge because they are so colorful. Konis awarded a blue ribbon to Juanita McAnear, a red Ribbon to Elizabeth Bohannon and a white ribbon to Juanita McAnear.

Portrait painting is a difficult field of art because it requires a keen eye and good judgement as well as a careful hand. The finest portrait present belonged to Juanita McAnear. Second place went to Theresa Topper and Eureka Mays taking third with Eureka Mays taking fourth in the event.

Road Work in Donley County

Work in Donley County is included in a huge highway rehabilitation and improvement program approved recently by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Lewis H. White said the work in this area is part of a statewide effort to modernize roads and highways which are worn out or inadequate for today's traffic.

Area projects include: SH 70, Fr. US 287 in Clarendon, S. to Hall C/L, 13.4 miles with a Seal Coat; US 287, Fr.

E.C.L. of Clarendon, SE. to 0.4 Mi. E. of Hedley, 14.2 miles, Recond. & Resurf. on S.B. Ln.; US 287, Fr. E.C.L. of Hedley, SE. to Hall C/L, 9.9 miles south bound lane, Seal Coat.

The 1982 Rehabilitation and State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program will cost an estimated \$218.9 million.

The program includes improvement and rehabilitation of 5,335.3 miles of state-maintained highways. In all, there are 892 separate projects in 214 counties of the state.

The work includes projects which will upgrade existing highways to handle heavier volumes of traffic, enhance safety, reduce the amount and kind of maintenance necessary and to protect the large public investment in the highways of Texas.

Almost 70 percent of the work is on US- and State-numbered highways in Texas with the remainder being on FM roads.

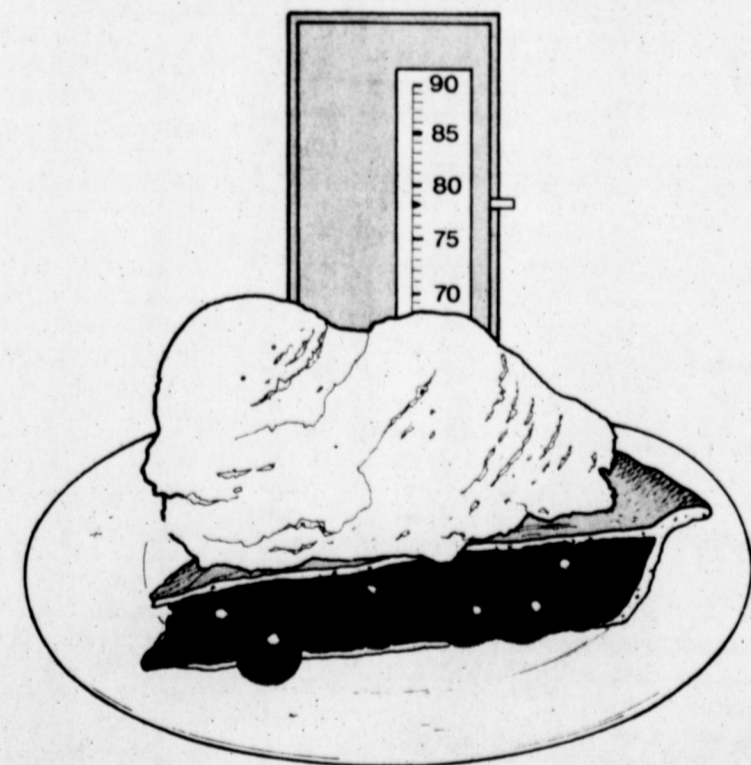


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DAVID GREEN winner of 4-6 year age group.

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Otitis externa is the medical name for what is often referred to as swimmer's ear. In this condition, the ear canal becomes infected and inflamed. The ear canal may itch and a yellow fluid may drain from the ear...this may be visible on pillows upon awakening. Pain is usually experienced when the ear is gently pulled upward and outward.

Is swimming the sole cause of this problem? No. Both swimmers and nonswimmers may be afflicted. Allergy has been implicated in helping to produce infection.

Green Stamps can't be licked for a good prize

Prevention of otitis externa would be preferable to treatment. The use of ear plugs while swimming has been suggested; others argue that this compounds the problem.

Treatment is as simple as placing a drop of mineral oil in the ears to ease inflammation. Burrow's solution on a cotton wick placed in the ear overnight has provided some relief. May physicians recommend that 3% hydrogen peroxide be used to irrigate the ears.

Severe infections may require a physician's care and the use of antibiotic ear drops. An antibiotic given by mouth be required to help clear stubborn infections. Self-care is appropriate (with nonprescription products) to clear mild to moderate infections.
