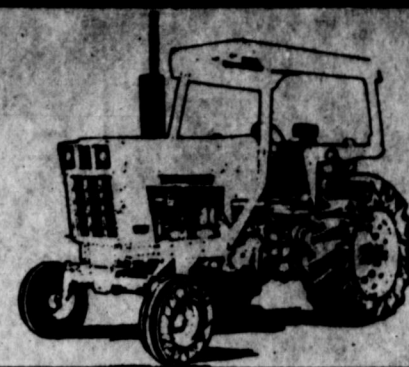

## DISTRICT COURT JURIES GIVES TWO CONVICTIONS

According to testimony from the March 3 court proceedings, the following events took place. On the night of November 26, 1980, Raymond Garcia and his father Louis Garcia and Hermania Vasquez came to the house of Louis Matthews, Clarendon resident. Once inside the home, the two Garcia men were joined by Matthews in a drinking spree. In the course of the evening, Raymond Garcia stabbed Matthews to death. The three, Raymond and Louis Garcia and Hermania Vasquez, took the car belonging to Matthews and fled to Hollis, Oklahoma. It was there that they were apprehended.

Sim Goodall, the defense attorney, tried to prove that drunkenness and the ill effects of his father's example led to the untimely demise of Matthews by Raymond Garcia. Goodall said in his final argument that Garcia committed the crime while drunk and could "not know that his conduct was wrong."

David McCoy, the district attorney, called in ten witnesses against Garcia. Among them were Cecil Woods, the man who found Matthews on Thanksgiving Day, the pathologist, a witness who saw the trio enter the Matthews residence on that fateful evening, a man in Oklahoma who heard Garcia brag about the misdeed, and the officers involved with arresting and investigating the case.

At 9:45 on Wednesday, March 4, the 8 men and 4 women on the jury left the courtroom to discuss the verdict of this trial. At 10:40 the jury returned. The accused, Raymond Garcia faced the judge as the verdict of "guilty of murder" was read to him.

The jury took a 15 minute break before returning to the courtroom to listen to the lawyers plead their side once again in regards to the setting of a "merciful and just" punishment. Goodall urged the jury to consider probation or a minimum of a 10 year sentence. McCoy pointed out that "probation is earning a living, supporting your dependents, keeping away from bad characters and avoiding dangerous actions. Everyone of you has to do the same thing. Is that a punishment?" McCoy ended his remarks by saying, "Only in America do we lock up our

juries and turn loose our criminals."

The jury retired once again to decide the punishment. Raymond had attended school in Clarendon while he and his father had been residents of the city. A jury of Garcia's peers returned with the decision to send Raymond Garcia, age 18, to prison for 50 years.

On Thursday, March 5, proceedings began for the trial of Louis Garcia, the father of Raymond Garcia. The defence attorney for Garcia was Jerry Courtney. The star witness for the D.A.'s office was Hermania Vasquez, wife of Raymond Garcia.

While Vasquez was the star witness, her testimony on numerous occasions was conflicting and confusing.

The jury left the court room to go into deliberation to consider the verdict at 9 a.m. Friday. After long consideration, the jury returned at 11:40 with the verdict of "guilty of involuntary manslaughter". Without a break for lunch, the jury again retired to consider the just punishment for Louis Garcia. After 1 1/2 hours to discuss and consider, the jury reached the decision to give the maximum sentence for manslaughter, 20 years with no probation to the convicted felon, Louis Garcia.

Clarendon's juries both times returned with the stiff sentences murder and manslaughter for both Garcia men. These decisions came after long deliberation. The 6 men and 6 women on the Louis Garcia jury had a difficult time with their decision since their evidence was rather limited. Both juries

had a dual decision to make: to decide the fate of the accused and to protect the laws, the citizens and the rights of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas.

The Donley County Courtroom had not seen a criminal trial for three years. Near the end of February, an assault case was tried and the first week in March, the Raymond Garcia and his father, Louis Garcia murder trials have been conducted. Three cases of such magnitude in as many weeks is not a welcomed event in Donley County.

Let it be known that in Donley County, we do NOT "lock up our juries and turn loose our criminals!"

## Candidates Have Declared for Election

With filing of Herman Green, of Howardwick for place #3 for a seat on the Donley County Hospital Board of Directors candidates have announced for all three places expiring. Dikki Howell and Ernest Barbee, incumbents have announced. Persons wishing to file for a place on the hospital board have through March 13, to fill out applications.

In the city elections in the county, Howardwick has two alderman places to fill and the mayors office expires also. Filing for the alderman places are incumbent Lawrence Whitehead, H.L. Tipton, H.H. Rodgers and Charlie Prickett. (Charlie Prickett's name was omitted from the article last week by

error). For the mayor's seat in addition to incumbent Walden Moore is the name of Jack Dickerson, who has also filed for the mayor's position.

Hedley has two expiring places and a third place vacated when the office holder moved away. Two persons have filed by Tuesday March 3, and W.B. Wiggins, incumbent and Otis Holland are candidates. Filing had closed when Shauna Monroe made her decision to become a candidate. Her name will not appear on the ballot and she will be a write-in candidate to fill the third vacancy.

In Clarendon, three alderman seats will be filled. Two are expiring and one

## Constitutional Limitations on State & Local Taxes

Senator Walter Mengden, Republican from Harris County, has introduced legislation to provide for constitutional limitations on state and local taxes.

S.J.R. 37 provides that any new or increased state tax would be void two years after the date of its enactment unless approved by a majority vote of the people in a statewide referendum.

S.J.R. 38 prohibits cities, counties, school districts, water districts, and other political subdivisions of the state from levying any new taxes or increasing the other political subdivisions of the state from levying any new rate of any existing taxes, unless approved by a vote of the people living in that political subdivision. This legislation would prohibit future increases of property taxes through either the tax rate, the assessment ratio, or the appraised valuation without a vote of the people. Exceptions are provided for increases in appraised valuation because of new construction and for increases in taxes because of increased government expenses that are required by federal law, federal regulation, or federal court order.

"This legislation would put control of taxes directly in the hands of the people," Senator Mengden said. "Government would have only as much money as the people decided to give it. The people could decide to increase their taxes at any time they wanted to do so. But the ultimate decision on taxes should rest directly with the people."

Senator Mengden cited figures from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce (USCC) indicating that in 1979, Texas' per capita total property taxes were \$273.74, which ranked 26th among the 50 states. He also pointed to 1979 figures from the Texas Research League (TRL) indi-

cating that Texas was 14th highest of the 50 states in property taxes on residences and 11th highest of the states in property taxes as a percentage of the valuation of homes.

Neither the USCC nor the TRL had yet compiled comparative figures with other states for 1980. However, the TRL has calculated the 1980 total property taxes for all 3,057 taxing jurisdictions at \$4.2 billion, an increase of \$358 million over 1979 and an actual doubling of total property taxes in Texas since 1974.

"Anyone who thinks Texas does not have high property taxes has simply not looked at the facts," Senator Mengden said. "The people need to be able to immediately say 'no' to higher taxes when they do not want the government extracting more money from them against their will. Government should always be the servant -- not the master -- of the people."

Senator Mengden also introduced SJR 39, to prohibit local governments from issuing "certificates of obligation" without voter approval.

"Currently Article 701 of state law prohibits the issuance of 'bonds' backed by tax revenues without a vote of the people. But cities and counties can get around this requirement for a referendum through Article 2368a.1 by calling bonds 'certificates

of obligation', even though they are backed by tax revenues. It is a blatantly dishonest gimmick to trick the people. My proposal will put a stop to this subterfuge by constitutionally requiring a vote of the people whenever a local government wants to incur debts and pledge tax revenue for the payment of those debts," he said.

Other related measures that were introduced by Senator Mengden include S.B. 840, to require the ballot proposition for a bond proposal to list the amount of the bonds to be issued; S.B. 841, to require a vote of the people before the governing body of a city or county can increase its own salaries; and S.B. 842, to exempt the surviving spouse of a decedent from state inheritance taxes.

"It will be very difficult to get the Legislature to pass any of these vital measures because government will not voluntarily restrict its own ability to tax and spend. That's one of the reasons the right of initiative and referendum is needed for the people. Only when the citizens have the right to directly enact legislation through petition and election will state or local powers of taxation be brought under control," Senator Mengden said.

Cost of the printing of pictures is 60c per column and adds \$25 or \$30 to the cost of printing each week. When there are many extra pictures the cost is much

higher. With this new equipment the pictures can be processed here in the office and the 60c per column saved on the cost.

To do this takes more time here as the pictures must be shot and negatives made to work from. IF YOU WANT PICTURES IN THE WEEKS PAPER THEY MUST BE IN OUR OFFICE BY NOON MONDAY. Otherwise the cost of printing the picture will be charged to the person who brings the picture.

## Clarendon College Has New Dean

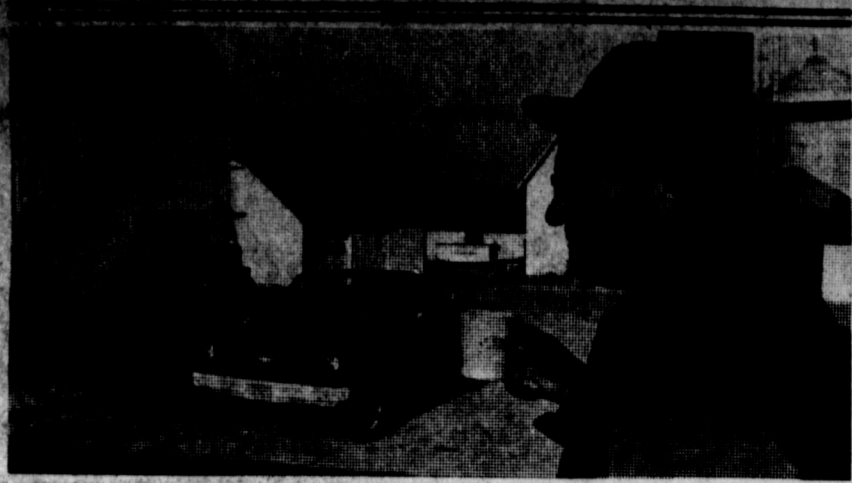
### Ken Martin

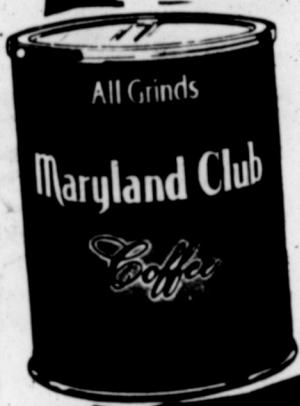

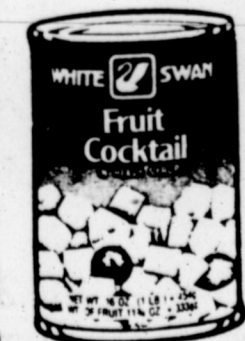

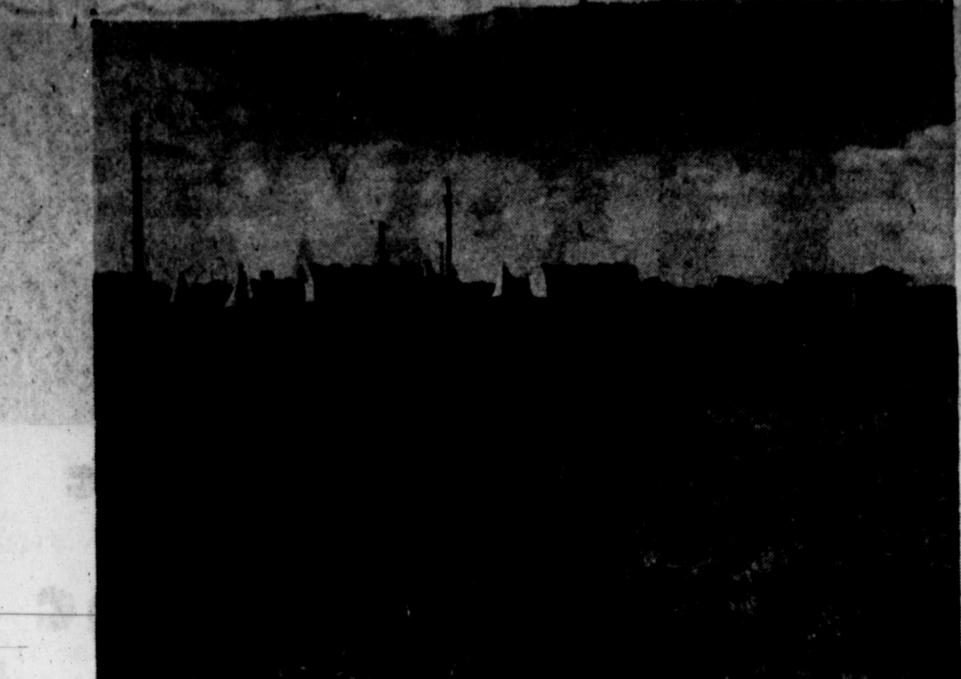

**FISH Tales**

 Clarence Hamilton teaches at Clarendon Jr. College and is proud to be the professor of one of the more unique classes offered at the Athens on the Hill: Fishing. Hamilton could be considered an expert on fishing, particularly fishing for state record Northern Pike. In 1971, Hamilton caught a 13 pound pike from Greenbelt, and became the state record holder. "One of the main reasons I moved to Clarendon was so I could fish for pike," Hamilton said. In 1973 the state record was finally broken: by Clarence Hamilton! He caught a 13 pound, 4 oz. pike. "I'm not a fancy fisherman. I use the cheapest rod I can find. I used a Zebco 909 reel and 12 pound test line to catch the second fish," Hamilton confessed. His Meppe #2 spinner and Black Bomber Bait were the weapons of choice for both of his fish, but he has a secret weapon in mind for the next one. His record was "stolen" in 1978 when Greenbelt yielded its trophy pike to another fisherman, depriving Hamilton of the crown. If you'd like to see what a prize winning pike looks like, just go into the coffee room of the Farmer's State Bank and take a look, Emmitt Simmons had the fish mounted and it hangs there as a taunt to Hamilton to retrieve his title. Greenbelt is still the only lake in Texas to fish for northern pike. Some were stocked in Buffalo Lake at Canyon, but the conditions there rendered that lake suitable only for waders and mud daubers. One other attempt to transplant pike has been made, but it didn't succeed either. Greenbelt still holds the record but not so Hamilton! One fish came from below Moorings, one from Kelly Creek where two were caught this past summer. "I know where a 25 pounder is and I'm going after it," Hamilton admitted, but he refused to tell where the giant was hiding.

The state law of Texas requires attending a law enforcement school before a permanent certification can be granted. He attended the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy at Amarillo College and received his permanent certification and an expert marksmanship rating May 9, 1980.

During their 33 years in Amarillo, Al and Evelyn were members of Pierce St. Baptist Church (now Second Baptist) from 1944-1952, Temple Baptist Church 1952-1962, and San Jacinto Baptist Church 1962-1977. They now reside at 76 Janny Drive in Howardwick and welcome any inquiry or visit.

### Tax Board

**Q: Why do we have a property tax? Who does the money go to and for what purpose?**

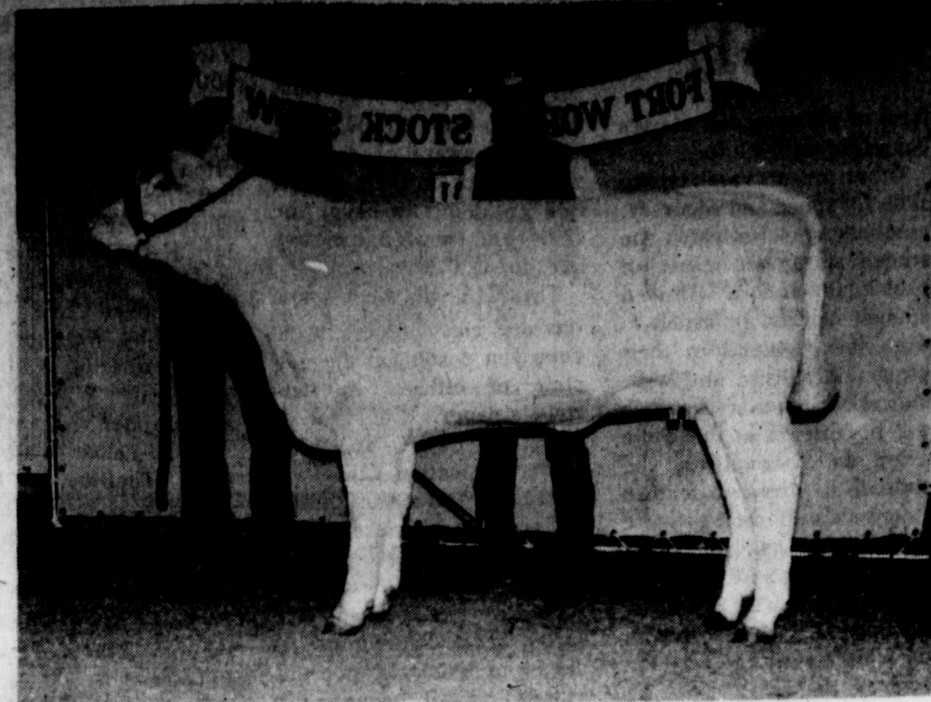
**A:** The property or ad valorem tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas. Cities, counties, school districts and special taxing authorities such as municipal utility districts, junior college districts, etc., collect a property tax to pay for the operation of community services such as fire and police protection, street construction and repair, utilities, and public schools.

**Q: Who controls the property tax?**

**A:** The property tax is the only tax which is locally controlled, locally generated and locally collected. Locally elected and appointed officials--those most responsive to the needs of individual taxpayers--direct the property tax system in Texas.

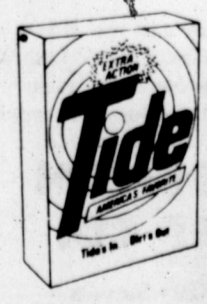

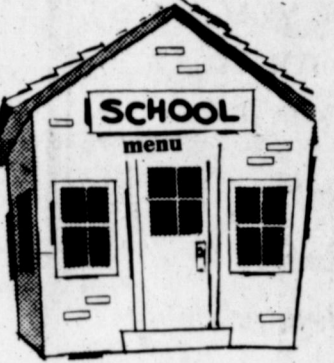

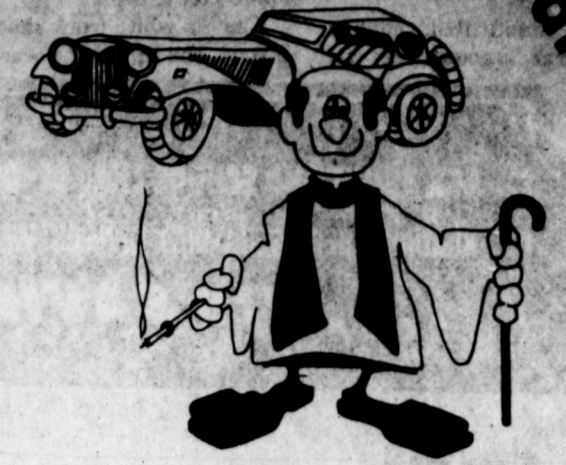

## Those Episcopalians



you only have to live with him

**Are they sort of a private club... Just for the rich?**  
Hal You should be around when the nearest Episcopal parish is trying to finalize its annual budget. You'd know better.

Actually, this church did acquire a bit of snob appeal during the early days of our nation. English colonists introduced their own Episcopal version of The Church of England. It was only natural that many of these "first comers" became the wealthy landowners, the merchants, the gentry of this young nation.

George Washington, Alexander Hamilton and indeed - three-fourths of the signators of the U.S. Constitution were Episcopalians.

But today, the Episcopal Church represents an exceptionally-broad cross section

of the nation: people of every vocation, social status, race and political persuasion gathered under one roof.

You see, Episcopalians believe strongly that the church is a proper meeting ground for men's differences. Christianity, they say, represents the world's greatest hope for reconciling the divisions between one man and another. You don't have to agree with your fellow man; you only have to live with him.

## Five Reasons to Insure 1981 Crops

With a new government subsidy that pays up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying crop insurance, the best buy in farming today may be the few dollars an acre (tax deductible) that it costs to insure all the other dollars invested in producing a crop.

This advice comes from Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Regional Director of the recently expanded Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Jordan suggests that there are no fewer than five sound reasons farmers should consider insurance this year, even if they have never protected their crop investments in the past.

First, the new policies

offer more protection. Policyholders can insure up to 75 percent of average yields, which in most cases should fully cover the investment in the insured crop plus the cost of the insurance. They can also select, from several choices, the amount they want to be paid for each bushel or pound their crop falls short of the guaranteed production.

Second, the new federal subsidy can reduce the per acre cost of carrying all-risk insurance by as much as 30 percent. The combination of the subsidy and the tax deduction allowed for insurance premiums means the after-tax cost is only a small fraction of the protection provided.

Third, rising production costs mean the dollars and cents risks of crop production this Spring will be sharply higher than a year ago. In the event of crop losses, such as many farmers experienced in 1980, the financial consequences could be disastrous. Many farmers who have felt they could afford to farm without some amount of insurance in the past are now wisely reappraising the risks involved, Jordan said.

Fourth, the USDA disaster payments program, which some farmers have looked to as a solution for insurance, will end after this crop year. Farmers who elect to carry FCIC insurance in 1981 rather than participate in the disaster payment will be eligible for the 30 percent discount plus, if they do not incur a crop loss, an additional 5 percent premium discount in 1982.

Fifth, farmers who insure their crop investment will have an advantage, Jordan predicts, in competing for credit in this Spring's tight money market. The cash flow guaranteed by the policy assures a source of funds for timely loan repayment even in the event of a total crop loss. Moreover, at the option of the policyholder, FCIC policies can be pledged as loan collateral.

## CANCER ANSWER LINE

American Cancer Society

**Question:** "I've read some things about asbestos causing cancer. Now I find that hot water pipes in my basement are covered with it, and the local hardware store sells asbestos in sheets. Just how dangerous is it?"

**ANSWERline:** Asbestos can be dangerous if the dust is breathed even for short periods. It can cause asbestiosis, a crippling lung disease, or lung cancer, or mesothelioma, a cancer of the chest or abdominal lining. However getting cancer from exposure to asbestos is relatively small unless you are a heavy smoker. If you smoke, your risk becomes 90 times greater. Since the link between asbestos and cancer was first made in the 1950's, it is quite possible that water pipes in older houses were

covered with asbestos before the hazard was recognized. Although restrictions have been placed on the use of asbestos since, the main hazard is allowing it to break down into dust that can enter the lungs. If you have asbestos on your water pipes, it is better to wrap them with heavy tape to confine the asbestos, than to stir up its dust by tearing it off the pipes. Asbestos sheets, when they must be used, should be covered with a protective material. Remember that a simple dust mask is not sufficient to filter out asbestos particles. The important thing is to have a tight fit between mask and face, and for the filter to be disposable. Special asbestos masks are available at safety supply stores. It is also helpful to wet down the asbestos with a fine mist or spray while you are working with it.

## CRIPPLING ARTHRITIS

The term **arthritis** refers to any of several conditions whereby the joints become painful, inflamed, and, sometimes, stiff. The most common form of arthritis is **osteoarthritis** or, as it is frequently termed, **degenerative joint disease**. This is the joint malady that eventually affects most of us to a greater or lesser degree.

**Rheumatoid arthritis**, on the other hand, is not as common and is more destructive. This disease is systemic and involves the joints, muscles, and connective tissues. It is characterized by joint and muscle pain, stiffness that occurs primarily in the mornings, joint inflammation, and fatigue. Joint deformity and crippling may occur over time.

Treatment of rheumatoid arthritis often involves rest, range of motion exercises, the application of heat, and the use of anti-inflammatory drugs. According to most arthritis specialists, common **aspirin** in large doses is the best drug for use in rheumatoid arthritis.

When aspirin cannot be taken or is not very effective, other inflammatory agents are available. Most of these, however, are **more expensive** than aspirin. . . some appear to be **less effective** than aspirin.

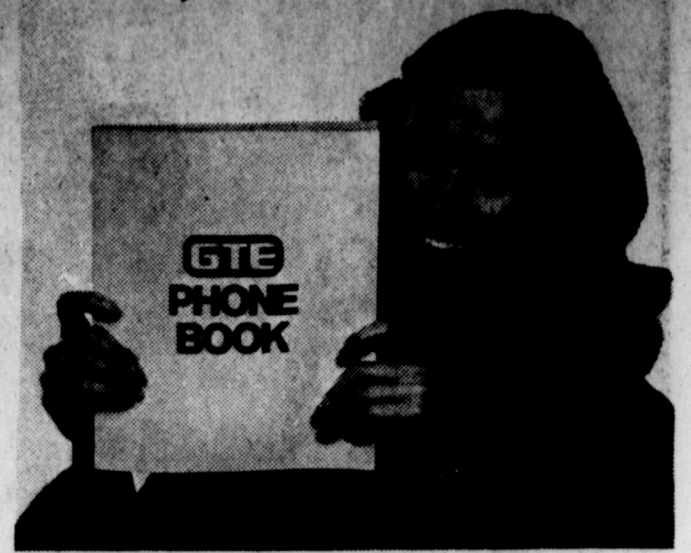
### CC Judging Team Goes to Houston

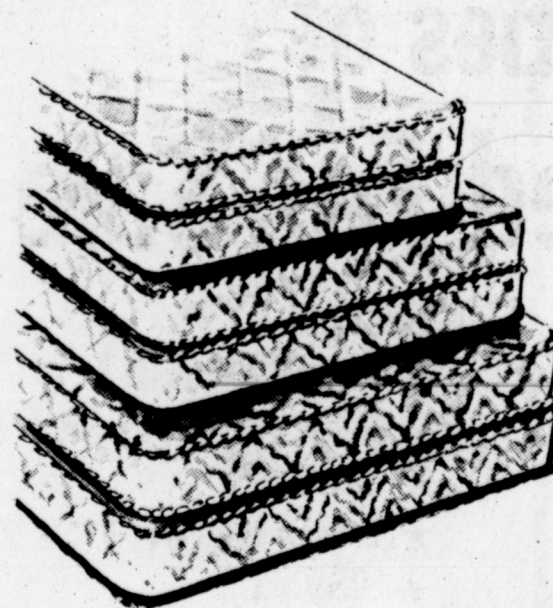

# HEATS ON



By KATIE DVORAK

I am a great opener of cans. Many of my "secret" meals come from a combination of soup and vegetable cans. I recently made a "prize-winning" soup by opening four cans and adding water. I'll share some of my family treasurers with you.

**VEGETABLE SOUP**  
2 cans Veg-all  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1 can cream of onion soup  
1/4 C barley or rice  
4 cans of water  
2 tsp beef bouillon  
1/4 lb browned, small cubes of meat

Brown meat and season well with salt and pepper and onion salt while cooking. Dump all ingredients into a crock pot or Dutch Oven and turn on medium. Walk away until hungry.

**WILMA'S CHICKEN ENCHILADAS**  
1 can boned chicken or turkey (large can) or 3 cans of Hormel's boned chicken or turkey  
1 can of cream of chicken soup  
1 small can chopped green chilies  
1 cup sour cream  
1 small onion-chopped  
1 1/2 - 2 C grated Colby cheese  
small flour tortillas

Mix together everything except tortilla and 1/2 C cheese. Put 2-3 TBS of mix in each tortilla, roll and fasten with a toothpick. Place in a 9x13 pan. Add a little milk to the remaining mix to make creamy and pour over the tortillas. Top with remaining 1/2 C cheese and bake at 325 for 20 minutes.

**CROCK OF BEANS N FRANKS**  
1 packages of 1 lb. franks  
1 can (1 lb.) lima beans, drained  
1 can (15 oz.) kidney beans, drained  
1 can (1 lb.) pork and beans in tomato sauce  
1/2 C chopped onion  
1 TBS shortening  
3/4 C brown sugar, packed  
1/2 C catsup  
2 tsp vinegar  
1 tsp salt  
1 tsp dry mustard (optional)  
1/8 tsp pepper

Cut franks into bite-sized pieces, combine with beans in 2 1/2 qt. casserole. Melt shortening in skillet, add onion and cook until tender (I frequently use dehydrated onions and omit this step, soak them in 1/4 C warm water first). Stir in brown sugar and catsup, vinegar and seasonings. Add to bean mix, stir well. Cover and bake 45-50 minutes at 350.

**TURKEY OR CHICKEN GRAVEY IN 2 SECONDS**  
1 can of cream of chicken soup  
1/2 can water  
Mix and pour over chicken or heat separately with giblets.

**FARMERS SOUP**  
1 can Veg-all or one package mixed frozen vegetables  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1 can stewed tomatoes  
1 can pinto beans or Ranch Style Beans (I sometimes like to substitute Ranch Style Black Eye Peas with Chilies)  
1 can new potatoes, NOT drained  
1 can corn, NOT drained  
2 tsp beef bouillon  
2 cans of water  
season to taste  
Dump all of these ingredients into a crock pot or Dutch oven, heat on medium and enjoy. You may like to add barley or rice, if desired.

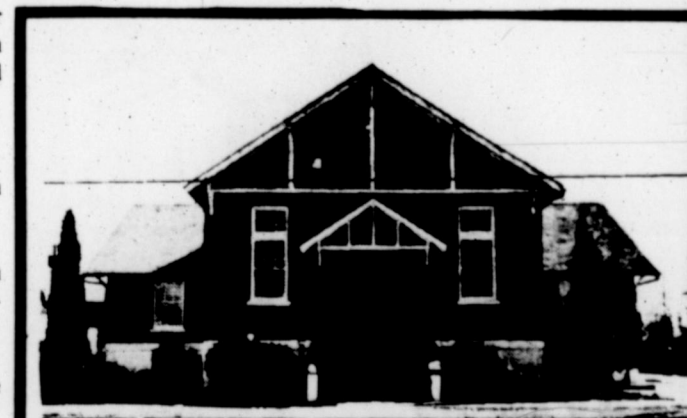

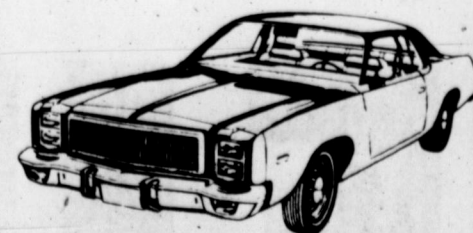
