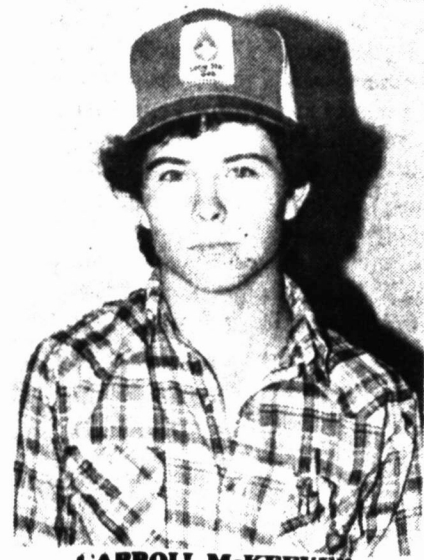

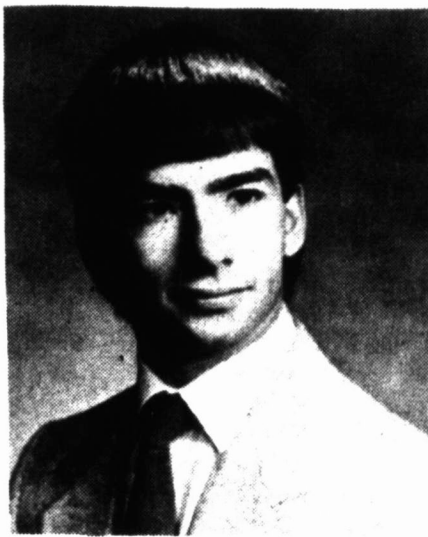

As an outstanding 4-H member for eight years, he was a district delegate, county council president and club president. He received the Gold Star Award and was high point individual in district horse judging competition. He was a member of the parade and rodeo drill teams and had horse, beef and fund-raising projects.

While in high school, Lee was senior class reporter and Future Farmers of America treasurer. He also participated in UIL writing contests and was active in the National Honor Society.

Lesia, daughter of Mitchie and Denny Fuston, recently graduated in the top ten in her class at Clarendon High School. She was a 4-H member for nine years, serving as club president, county president and district second vice president. Lesia placed first in the district in horse judging and compiled an award-winning beef record book.

McGuire and Edwards attend science symposium

The 400 selected Texas high school science students and teachers who attended the sessions were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding scientists.

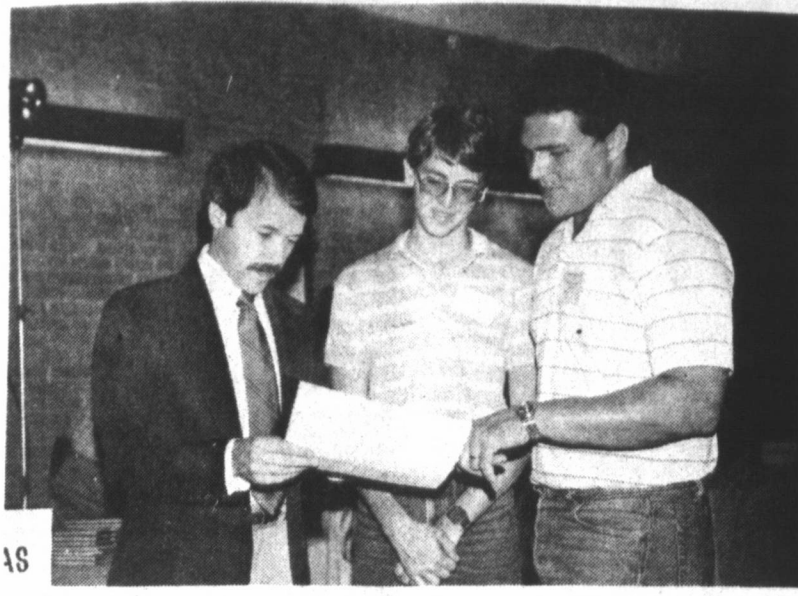
The symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the Foundation's sponsoring companies. WTU paid all expenses for the 26 students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of energy. Currently, the foundation and the University are sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research

aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the productions of electric power.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of energy science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of energy present.

There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Clarendon can be justly proud of their high school for having been chosen as one of the 150 schools in the state invited to send students and teachers to the symposium.

EMS receives new ambulance

After several months of planning, negotiating, and waiting, Clarendon has received a new ambulance. The new unit is a 1986 Ford Type II High Top Van conversion. From the outside, citizens will have a difficult time distinguishing between the new unit and the present main unit as they were both built by the same company and have the same type markings and emergency lighting system. However, the new unit has a slightly different interior configuration and color combination. Some modifications in the cabinetry have been made to accommodate equipment needs and usage. The interior is done in light and dark brown earthtones. It did not come equipped since it will be used to replace the 1978 Chevrolet unit which was purchased on the matching grant program new. This unit now has over 83,000 miles on it and since the addition of Advanced Life Support equipment, is very crowded and difficult to work out of. Plans are to sell this unit. All of the equipment out of the Chevy will be transferred into the new unit. The new ambulance will be used as the main, or first out, unit and the present main unit will become the backup. The present main unit is a 1982 model and has over 64,000 miles on it. It was purchased new in 1982. The price of the new ambulance started out at a base price of

\$31,000 but thanks to Paramedic Phillip Vargas and much negotiating and agreeing to add some equipment himself, the final cost was only \$26,085. Phillip will be adding some equipment such as fog lights, spotlights, etc. with him providing the labor. It was decided that much of the purchase price could be saved in this way.

On Friday, June 6, local businessman Troy Skinner, as well as EMT Steve Smith, and Paramedic Patrick Robertson left at 9:00 a.m. from the Clarendon airport to fly to Hutchinson, Kansas to pick up the new ambulance. Due to some fog problems, they were stranded in Oklahoma for a little over an hour waiting for the fog to lift and then proceeded to Hutchinson arriving there shortly after noon. Troy donated the use of his plane, his fuel, and his time at no cost to fly Steve and Patrick to Kansas. The two left Hutchinson at approximately 2:00 p.m. and arrived back in Clarendon at approximately 10:30 p.m. The drive back was 430 miles and total expenses were less than \$90.00 which saved them almost \$400 which the company would have charged to deliver the ambulance to Clarendon. Both crew members took the day off of work and donated their time to drive the unit back.

Crew members estimate it will take from 10 to 14 days to have the

new unit fully operational and in service. Donley County should be proud of the high quality of emergency medical equipment they have available to them, much of which has been purchased with donations. The ambulances are owned by the city, county, and hospital district and are staffed with volunteers which saved the taxpayers a large amount of money every year. They trade ambulances approximately every four years or when the need arises making the units taken out of service approximately 8 years old. As always, citizens are welcomed and encouraged to look at the new unit or any of the equipment or ask any questions they may have at any time by contacting any of the board, staff, or crew members.

When the new ambulance was picked up, it was paid for in full due to the planning of the Associated Ambulance Authority Board. They have been placing funds in reserve for the past four years in anticipation of this purchase. Because of their planning, neither the city, county, or hospital district had to contribute; no

tax money was used for the purchase; and none of the purchase price had to be financed.

On Saturday, June 14, the radios were hooked up and equipment was transferred to the new unit, putting it in service at approximately 6:00 p.m. that evening. Working on the changeover were Delbert Robertson, Phillip Vargas, Connie McAnear, Jim Sharrar, and Patrick Robertson. Sheriff's Deputy Gary Thomas also assisted. The first response in the new ambulance was at 1:28 a.m. on Sunday morning when a patient from Amarillo was transported from Allsup's to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center.

Clarendon residence designated National Landmark

Many dream dreams but few have the imagination and determination to make them come true. The purchase and restoration of the Martin-Lowe house in Clarendon, Texas has been for Dr. Zell R. SoRelle a dream materializing before her eyes.

After retiring from years of study and teaching linguistics, Zell was still very much alive with energy and ambition to do something worthwhile with her future. She wanted and needed a purpose for the coming years. So, after careful discussion with her husband Jack and daughter, Sarah, she decided to sell their home on Ong in Amarillo, return to her birthplace of Clarendon, buy an early-day residence of Victorian architecture and restore it...not only to restore it but to have it registered as an historical landmark. Thus her sails were set and her course charted.

The Martin-Lowe house on the corner of West Fifth and Taylor streets became the object of restoration. Built in 1904 by F.D. Martin, a local merchant, it was sold in 1910 to James M. Calhoun, a descendant of John Calhoun, a U.S. statesman and vice-president [1825-1832]. Four years later, it was purchased by R.H. [Bob] Muir and wife Emma Alice. Until 1926, when the house was

bought by S.W. [Sam] Lowe and wife Lilac, it was the home of the Muir family.

The architectural description of the house as set forth in the application for national designation is both meticulous and lovely. "Numbered among its distinguishing characteristics are the bay areas, the encircling veranda on the north and east sides, the conical roof which has a striking needle-like finial, the exterior cypress clapboard siding on the first story and an elaboration of patterned shingles on the entire upper portion. The original lightning rods and weather vanes, as well as the imposing-center chimney, make the house stand tall and majestic with a true awareness of its splendid legacy to the town of Clarendon and the Panhandle."

And today, except for a fringe [frieze] of spindles and fan brackets along the upper edge of the wrap-around porch, the exterior remains unaltered, but the interior has received tender loving care. Worthy of mention as to structural features on the inside are the three hand-carved imported Italian mantles and the columned archways.

While others offered to contract the restoration, Zell SoRelle chose to be the supervisor of this project so everything would be just as she

envisioned it. Thus, the work began. And, for the past five years, much careful planning, research, tireless daylight hours, and wakeful nights have combined to bring this old two and a half story house back to its original Victorian quaintness. Alas, the electrical wiring and plumbing had to be checked first. Then, a few minor repairs made, the woodwork cleaned [with equal parts of turpentine, kerosene, and boiled linseed oil] the brass hardware polished, and the walls recovered.

Fortunately, our supervisor was blessed with skilled craftsmen as the plumber, the electrician, and the carpenters were painstaking workmen. However, for covering the walls, making pads and cushions for the bay areas, and draping the many windows, a specialist was needed. One might say, "the Lord provides" as such a person, with the proper expertise, was Theresa Orcutt from twenty miles away.

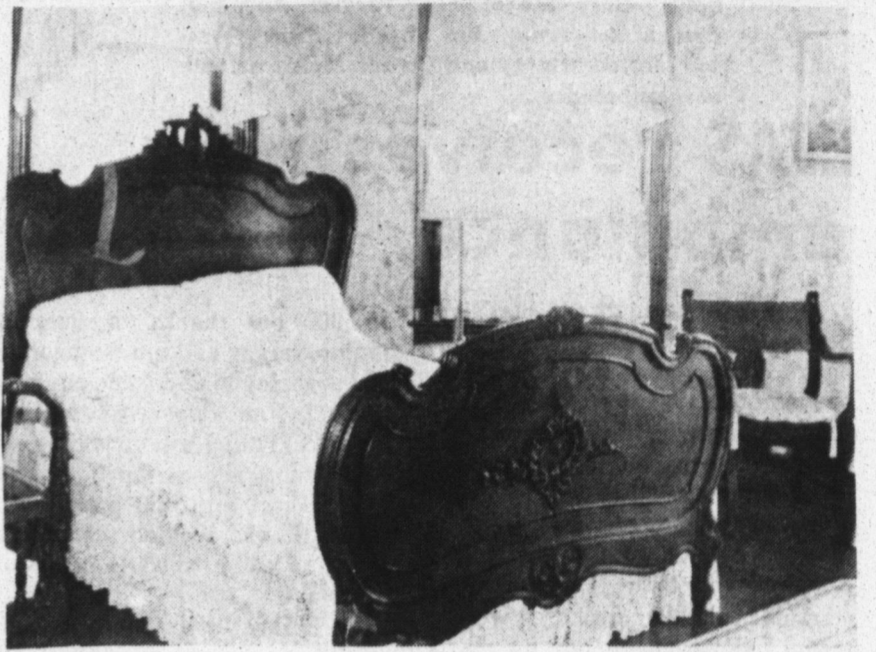
After the old paper was stripped from the eleven and twelve-foot walls, sheets of foil were applied on top of which a thin layer of padding was added. Then, a covering of beautiful fabrics, some from New York, in soft shades of patterned and solid colors was the final finishing touch. Theresa Orcutt's artistry with the lovely fabrics, frills, ruffles, and

frounces, and the laces on the windows lent an ambience to the Victorian decor.

Not only is the restoration of this old residence worthy of recognition, the "mistress of the mansion" deserves special attention. Born, one of five children, of James Pinkney and Beulah Clara Rodgers in Clarendon, Texas, Zell Rodgers finished high school and two years at the Clarendon Municipal College before beginning to teach at the one-room Bairfield school house west of town. From that time on, teaching was her chosen profession. After years of study along with her continued teaching, Dr. Zell R. SoRelle retired in 1977 with a Masters and Doctors degrees in linguistics.

It was in 1977 too that Zell was one of ten University professors in Texas to receive the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation Award for excellence in her profession. One might say she went out with colors flying. Three times she was invited to Japan to give papers before the International Phonetic Congress.

Dr. SoRelle had travelled extensively; to Williamsburg and Charleston, to the ruins in Rome and Greece, around the world. Through the years, she had deplored waste and ruin, even worried that the little



Bairfield school house was falling into disrepair. She even had an artist make a sketch of it as it was when she last saw it. Some ten years later, when it was moved to the Ranch Headquarters at Tech in Lubbock, the sketch was used as a model for the restoration and Zell SoRelle was present at the dedication there. Maybe Zell SoRelle was always a preservationist at heart.

Be that as it may, the restoration of the Martin-Lowe homestead seems to have been an answer to her needs after retirement. And truly, this Victorian dream house is a likely haven for memorabilia collected during her travels to Europe, the Orient, and East Asia. In fact, the furnishings she already had seem made for their places in the house. Only four pieces were added to her collection: a beautiful old candenza in the entry way and the gold-framed mirror hanging above it; a magnificent hand-carved cherry-wood bed upstairs, and an old-fashioned bath tub, with ball and claw feet, in one of the three bathrooms in the second story.

At long last, Zell wrote "finis" to her venture and the eighty-year-old house was opened for visitors this April 1986. A fitting salute to our 150 years of tradition. Completely restored, displayed at the beginning of the front walk is a Texas Historical Medallion and a plaque from the National Registry designating this Victorian model as an Historical Landmark. To have the house registered was an integral part of Zell SoRelle's dream come true.

Through this Sesquicentennial year, the S.W. Lowe house will be open without appointment Saturday and Sunday afternoon. A party of

twenty visitors for a fee is specially treated to a tour of the house and a Victorian "high" tea. An escorted tour of the house is a delightful experience.

Once you arrive at 507 West Fifth Street and, after a pause to read the plaque and medallion, you start toward the house along the red brick walk bordered on either side by Texas wild flowers, Zell SoRelle, "the mistress of the mansion" will be waiting on the porch to greet you.

Besides wanting to do something purposeful with her time and energies following retirement, Zell hoped to share this indelible example of Victorian architecture with future generations, to give meaning to their heritage. So, through the summer months, young ladies of the teenage persuasion will act as 'tour escorts'. For further information or an appointment, please call 806-874-3332, Clarendon, Texas 79226.
