

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

Q and A Q: What if I disagree with the value the tax assessor places on my property?

A: If you have rendered your property, and if the assessor has disagreed with you by raising the value you rendered, he must notify you of the time and place of the board of equalization (BOE) meetings for the taxing jurisdiction he represents. You then may appear before the board of equalization and

Q: Under what circumstances will the BOE make an adjustment in my taxable value?

A: First, if you can find and submit evidence to the BOE which indicates that the value assigned to your property exceeds local market values, then you would be entitled to a reduction in valuation. Second, if you can show that your property is being valued higher than similar properties in the jurisdiction, you should be entitled to a reduction in the value assigned even though the assessor's estimate did not exceed the acutal market

To become a sculptor never entered his mind until about three years ago after carving a set of knife handles from a piece of stag horn, he decided that he could carve whole scenes out of the horns. The bone marrow served as the shadows he needed to create each piece. His first piece was from the tip of the horn. and he carved a beautiful heron that stands about six inches tall. This led to even larger scenes, one of which consists of a mountain lion and her two cubs. He now has a total collection of about 12 pieces. each an original work of art. These carvings were seen by an artist friend who suggested that Sandy take up bronze sculpturing.

He entered his first open competition on September 8, 1977, at the National Juried Artist Studio Exhibition in Amarillo, Texas. where he walked away with three top awards. His success from this show eventually led to an invitation to appear as Guest Artist at an art show in Pagosa Springs. Colorado. And so began his career as a sculptor.

Not having any formal art training. Sanders says, "It comes easy to me, it is a God given talent." As a boy growing up in East Texas, he could always be found whittling at something. He would carve small horses, boots, saddles, and even once a whole 20 mule team, which he would give away to friends and relatives. He grew up around ranches, and worked with an uncle that helped gather the last of the longhorn steers from the Matador ranch.

He is an avid sportsman and has always loved the lore of the west. His love of nature, and the knowledge he has of the old west clearly shows up in each piece that he does

Shell and devein shrimp, leaving tails on. Combine eggs, 1/4 C cornstarch, flour, 1/4 C chicken broth and salt, beat until smooth. Dip shrimp in batter and fry in deep hot fat (375) until golden brown, about 5 minutes. Drain and keep warm. In skillet, saute green pepper, carrot and garlic in cooking oil until tender but still crisp. Add to vegetables, broth, sugar, vinegar and soy sauce. Bring to boil 1 minute, blend water slowly into remaining cornstarch and stir into vegetables. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbling. To serve, arrange hot shrimp over rice and pour sauce over shrimp and rice. Serves 4.

SHIMPOREE CREOLE

Add all other ingredients except parsley and rice and cook until sauce is thickened. Taste for salt and pepper and add more if needed. Stir in parsley. Serve over hot rice. Serves 4.

Here is a favorite when you get really big fish such as walleye or giant bass or even big old catfish. The meat tends to taste a little fishy to me, so this is the recipe of choice when and if we ever get big fish to cook.




Hello, Land Lubber!





Q: Is there a law requiring a person to have a license to peddle. goods or services from door to door in Texas?

A: There is no state law in Texas requiring such a license. However, any retailer should make provisions to collect and pay state sales tax if he is required to do so. Contact the nearest field office of the State Comptroller for details. Some municipalities attempt to prohibit, limit or license door-to-door salesmen. Check with your local City Hall

on this matter. O: I own a mobile home. Is it against the law for me to pull off to the side of the road at night or must I pay to rent space at a trailer park? Can I park overnight at a rest stop?

A: The Texas law prohibits parking a vehicle on the paved portion of any highway. Because many shoulders of highways are paved, parking on the shoulder would probably be illegal. There is a provision for emergency parking, but police officers are authorized to move any vehicle that is in violation of this law. However, you may park overnight at a rest stop or roadside

ters to the same people by first class mail. If the answers are unsatisfactory to you, take the lease and the letters to a lawyer to determine whether you might sue for three times damages and other penalties.

Q: I have heard that in Texas a person does not have to will his children any of his real estate, money, or possessions. Is this true?

A: Yes, it is true that in Texas a person does not have to leave anything by will to his children. The Probate Code does, however, provide for a family allowance to give minor children of the deceased parent an amount sufficient for care and maintenance for one year from the parent's death. This allowance is only available in cases where the minor children would not have sufficient property of their own to

provide for their support. Q: I have heard that first-time offenders can have their criminal record wiped clean if they commit no further crimes during a specified time period. Is this true? Also, if a person has committed a crime, are there any limits as to what kind of work a person can obtain? A: Following guilty pleas and





The rule was originally designed to stop "recruiting" of outstanding athletes by high schools. After countless court battles, the League has abolished the controversial rule in favor of a more comprehensive rule which would allow transfer students to compete in varsity athletics, if the parents of the athlete and the school submit statements saying that the move was not made for athletic purposes. Trends in

Diagnosis and Treatment

of cancer

Cancer management today is becoming increasingly individualized both with respect to diagnostic procedures and treatment. Early detection is followed by a precise staging of the disease, and the use of more than one kind of therapy, often in combination.



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on, a natural body ce known to co uses, has shown promise preliminary tesearch on advanced human cancers of the bone, breast and lymphstic system.

*Retinoids, synthetic 'cousins" of Vitamin A, have prevented bladder and breast cancers in mice and rats, and may also work against cancers of the lung, esophagus and pancreas in humans.

About fifty drugs have been found effective against certain cancers, and others that are still being tested hold promise.

*Surgery now is more precise than in the past because of improved diagnostic equipment and laser instruments, and rehabiltation is improved through advances in plastic surgery.

*Experiments have been conducted with simple, inexpensive blood tests, based on unique chemical substances, to determine whether an individual has cancer and where it is. Good preliminary results have been obtained in selected cases by using the procedures to detect cancers of the breast, pancreas and other sites.

*Intense drug therapy befor surgery has been successful in the treatment of children with bond tumors and is being adapted to help fight some of the more common cancers in adults.

*A series of chemical injections near the spine can act as a nerve block, relieving certain cancer patients of debilitating pain.

*Common denominator approaches to cancer prevention may include the study and manipulation of "oncogenes" - cancer-causing genes which normally are dormant but which may be activated by radiation, chemicals and viruses. Researchers have learned how to suppress oncogenes in some animals, and are determining whether the same thing can be done in humans.

*A new technique makes high and potentially lethal doses of the cancer drug, methotrexate, safe and effective for the treatment of some cancers.

•Many patients with bond cancer now are treated successfully by removing and replacing a section of bone

rather than by amputatin the leg or arm. Drugs and radiation therapy also are being used effectvely following surgery, resulting in dramatic improvement in survival.

•High-frequency sound waves (ultrasound), instead of X rays, are being used to locate tumors deep in the body. For patients undergoing radiation therapy, ultrasound may enable the therapist to pinpoint the tumor more precisely in order to provide more accurate radiation dosage and location of the tumor.

*Immunotherapy holds hope of harnessing the body's own disease-fighting systems to combat cancer with essentially no overt toxicity. In laboratory animals, substances such as BCG can stimulate immune mechanisms. These substances now are being used in humans alone or with other forms of treatment.

*Because environment factors have been found for virtually every major cancer. it is becoming possible to "profile" individuals according to their cancer risk factors, and therefore select the most appropriate time for diagnostic tests.

"The transfusion of blood components is becoming increasingly available and effective for cancer therapy. Platelets are used to prevent hemorrhaging and white cells to treat infection as well as the cancer itself.

*Computerized tomography uses X rays to exam-ine the brain and other parts of the body. Cross-section pictures are contructed which show a tumor's shape and location more accurately than is possible with conventional x ray techniques.
