

ALLRED DEFENDS SCHOOL INTERESTS.

Governor Allred is in Washington appearing before the House Judiciary Committee to oppose a congressional resolution which might lead to federal claims to submerged oil lands along the Texas gulf coast. The Governor was requested to represent the school interests of Texas by H. L. Mills, chairman of the permanent school land committee, and the State Board of Education.

In the meantime, the oil land leasing investigation continues in Austin where the state land commissioner is alleged to have practically given away valuable oil land leases to the detriment of the state school fund. Attorney General McCraw has been drawn into the investigation, a committee seeking to learn more about McCraw's bank account in Dallas. The committee has allegedly been refused access to the records in question, by the bank.

Commenting upon the matter, Senator Holbrook, chairman of the senate investigating committee stated, "We want it known that we will go anywhere the public interest takes us."

Where Cost Comes In. The postal department continues to blame the deficit of their de-


