Donley County was represented in Best in Show by Mike Moore and Ace; Jason Sharrar and Bud; and Jennifer Davis and Ben.

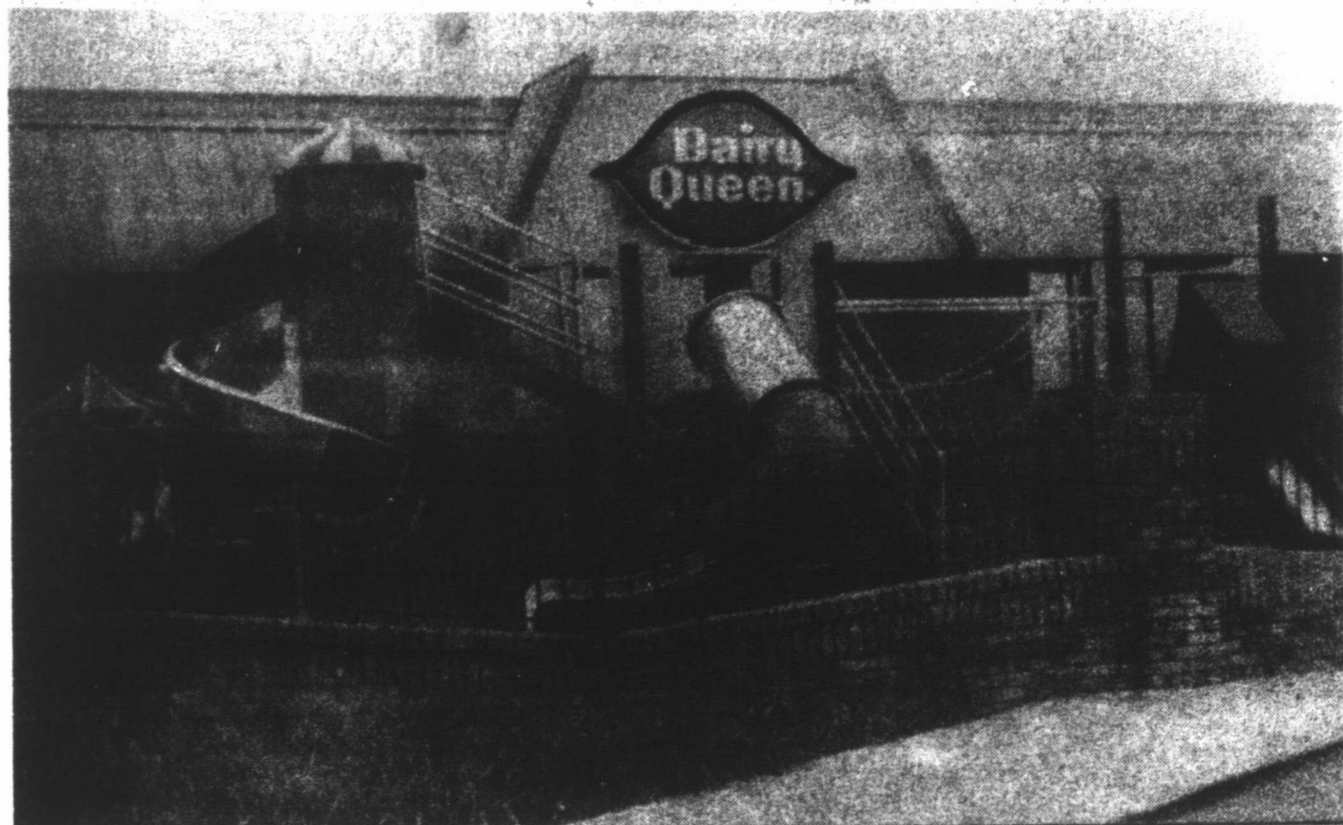

## Neighborhood watch organization meeting

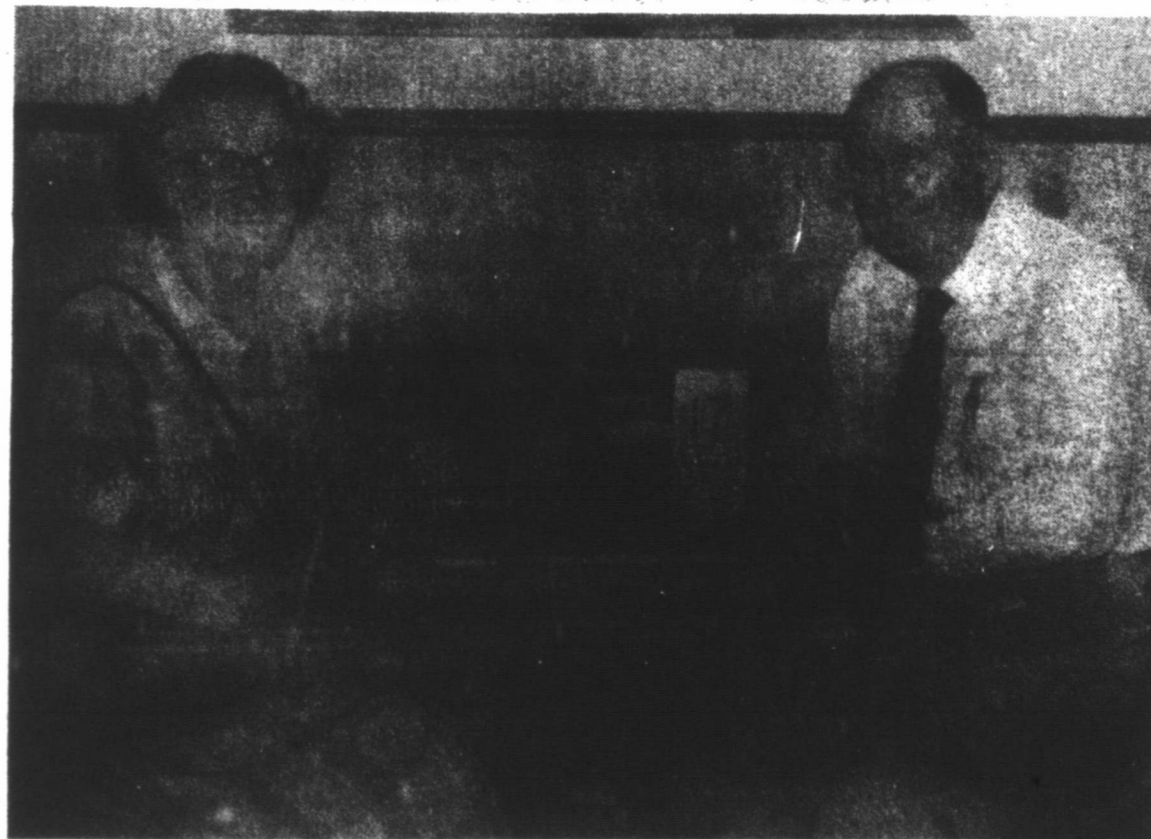

## Goldaster weed control tour

Problems which are confronting farmers, ranchers and livestock producers of the Eastern Panhandle area will be examined Tuesday, September 9, during a range tour of Donley County.

Goldaster weed control will be featured on the tour, said Ronald Gooch, county Extension Agent.

The program will also include information on new brush and weed control methods and chemicals and management practices for increasing profit in beef cattle operations.

The tour will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Fowler camp of the RO Ranch. The camp is located on Highway 273, fifteen miles south of McLean or 14 miles north of Hedley.

Goldaster is rapidly becoming a notorious "Ranger Robber", infesting thousands of acres in the south-eastern panhandle. Goldaster is highly competitive with native grasses and greatly reduces forage production where ever it occurs in dense stands. Grass production on an area infested with goldaster is often less

than one-third of the production on a similar area free of the weed.

The tour will feature goldaster control plots which the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has conducted demonstrations on for the past nine years. Producers will see plots where aerial controls were applied this year and other plots that were sprayed with a ground rig in 1984 through 1986.

## Bob Bullock Report

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said the Texas Supreme Court's decision to rule against higher civil court fees puts additional pressure on the state's budget deficit.

"The \$24 million that the state will lose isn't the whole budget ball game, but it's darn sure going to be tagged as an error in the fight for a balanced budget," Bullock said.

Bullock had previously warned state leaders that losing a challenge to a law that increased the cost of

filing civil lawsuits from \$25 to \$75 would aggravate the state's budget picture.

Because of the pending lawsuit, Bullock removed expected revenue from the filing fees from revisions to his revenue estimate this past February.

The court fee bill allowed the state to get \$40 and the county to keep \$35 from each civil lawsuit.

It was included in a long list of fee hikes that the Legislature used to balance this current budget.

Bullock said all but a handful of Texas counties had been sending the fees to his office, but that the money had been in escrow because of the lawsuit.

He said that his office will begin work making some \$5.5 million in refunds which have been collected since the new fees went into effect on September 1, 1985.

Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of July, our troopers investigated 8 fatal accidents, 92 personal injury accidents, and 106 property damage accidents. There were 9 persons killed and 188 persons injured in

these accidents."

Sgt. Brad Park of Tullis stated, "In Donley county, our troopers investigated 1 fatal accident, 2 personal injury accidents, and 5 property damage accidents in the month of July. 1 person was killed and 11 persons were injured in the accidents."

### "ITS PUREST FORM"

LUBBOCK -- A lady called me the other night with a complaint. The overemphasis on athletics -- namely football -- was out of hand.

"And you promote it," she charged. "It's as much your fault as anyone else's. You and the rest of the news media prey on the kids, on the fans, on everybody. You cater to their need for this sort of stuff. You make it more important than it really is..."

Guilty. I'm guilty as charged. But how can you blame me? I love high school football. I don't say it's more important than school work, I don't profess that high school athletics have any bearing on the state of the world at any given time.

Preparation for life? Give me a break. The breeding ground for leaders of the future? Balderdash. Pure coincidence that several of our national and state leaders played football in school. It's of no more significance than the ones who played in the band.

Let's get down to brass tacks. I like high school football. I think it's good, beneficial, whatever you want call it for one reason and one reason alone.

It's football. It's not Tony Dorsett screaming at the top of his lungs about a guy just as fast and eight years younger than Dorsett himself making more money than Dorsett himself.

It's not an athletically gifted college senior muddling through academic oblivion while wasting four years of eligibility, or that same senior's roommate who takes payoffs from a booster.

It's high school football. It's the

twelve minute run on the first day of practice. Hurt so bad, yet it hurt so good.

It's the pep rally in the Clarendon High School gym and that shower of confetti. That football jersey I wore proudly. The locker decorations and the endless pieces of posterboard tacked onto the school walls.

It's that high school band, and that fight song. The disorganization of the sidelines after a touchdown.

It's sitting in the stands, chewing nervously on ice when the temperature is dipping into the twenties -- just because you're nervous.

More than anything, it's the ginel of game day. You know the feeling; that excitement that grips every West Texas community every Friday night. And it's the same everywhere: Amherst, Clarendon, Memphis, Tahoka, Littlefield, Dalhart. You name it. Business stinks, farming is terrible, the "awl biddeness" has hit rock bottom.

Yet, for a while this fall, it will be something we can all put behind us for a spell. Forget how tough times are...the kids have a game tonight...they're playing 'em there, and it'll be tough...but we're leaving early to get a good seat...taking the blankets and a coffee thermos..."

No, it's not the most important thing in the world by any means. And, certainly, it's not a perfect situation. But it's positive. It's clean. It's part of this culture...a big part. An important part.

My conversation with the lady I discussed earlier didn't last long. I thought long and hard about what she told me. How I overemphasized high school football...winning and losing...the whole nine yards. I thought about her theory that if I would just keep it off television, the pressure would be off the kids, and that people would quit putting so much stock into something so unimportant.

Maybe she's right, but I don't think so. To me, high school football is Americana. It is a rallying point for a lot of people who have bloody little to rally around, especially in West Texas.

As a sport, it is football in its purest, most unadulterated form.

And I for one can't wait until kickoff.

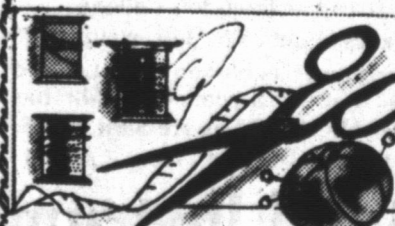
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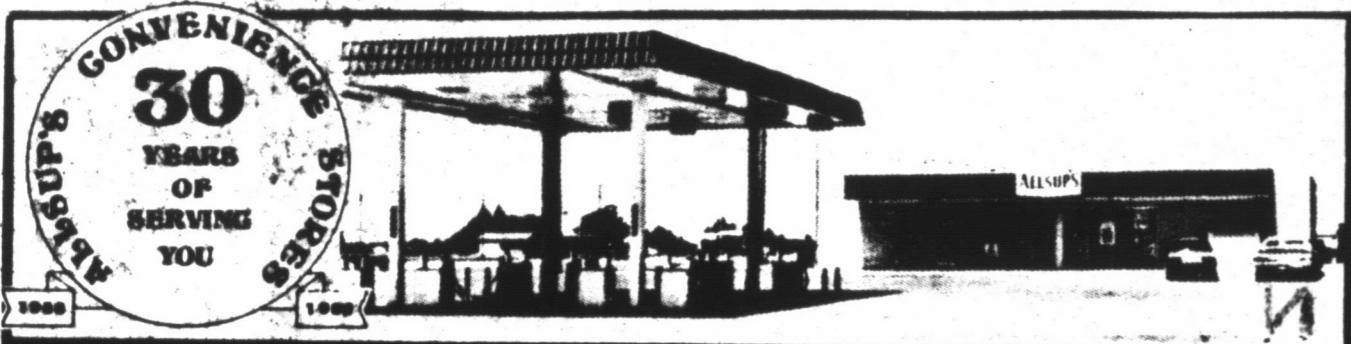

# 'Texas' ends 1986 season

"Texas" actors, singers, dancers and horsemen played to the largest audiences in the 21 year history as the musical drama ended its 1986 season under the stars on Saturday, August 23.

New sound and light effects accented with colorful Sesquicentennial surprises drew record crowds totaling 105,423 persons this summer for the 64 performances.

The renowned musical drama, set beneath the towering cliffs of Palo Duro Canyon near Amarillo, played every evening except Sundays to audiences from every state and most foreign countries from June 11 through August 23.

Final tally brought the total to over 1,700,000 persons who have been "Texas" since 1966.

The largest audience prior to this season was in 1976 with 98,310 in attendance. Last year saw 89,404 persons at the production.

Its milestone of 100,000 in attendance this year was reached during the evening of Wednesday, August 20. The crowd joined the fanfare to celebrate the achievement.

Surveys indicated this year that 28 percent of the audiences came from over 500 miles, with 40 percent travelling from 120 to 500 miles and 32 percent living 0 to 120 miles from the theatre.

The Pioneer Amphitheatre seats

1742 people. The average crowd this season was 1647 filling the theatre to 94 percent capacity. Based on the house size, "Texas" is now the most attended outdoor theatre in the United States.

The story of "Texas," written by Pulitzer Prize winning author, Paul Green, tells of the hardships of the prairie as seen by the farmers, cattle ranchers and Indians during the 1890's.

Under the direction of Neil Hess, "Texas" is a history of the Texas Panhandle set to music and dance by 80 talented actors, actresses, singers, dancers and musicians.

Dramatic special effects bring a realistic thunderstorm with lightning into the canyon, recreate the blazing flame of the prairie fire and produce a sparkling shower of stars on the face of the towering 600 foot cliff which serves as the backdrop for the production.

Hundreds of props include horses, wagons, a windmill, surrey, cabin and even an authentic antique train with cabooses.

The 22nd season of "Texas" will begin June 10, 1987 and play nightly under the stars except Sundays through August 22. Reservations are accepted now by calling the box in Canyon at 806-655-2181 or by writing "TEXAS," Box 268, Canyon, Texas 79015.

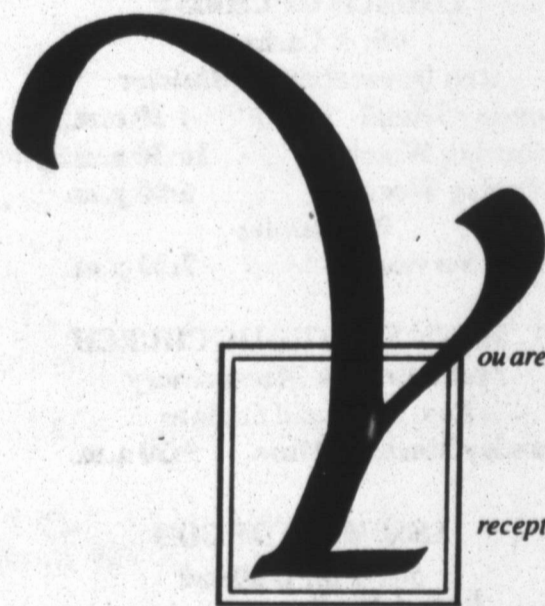

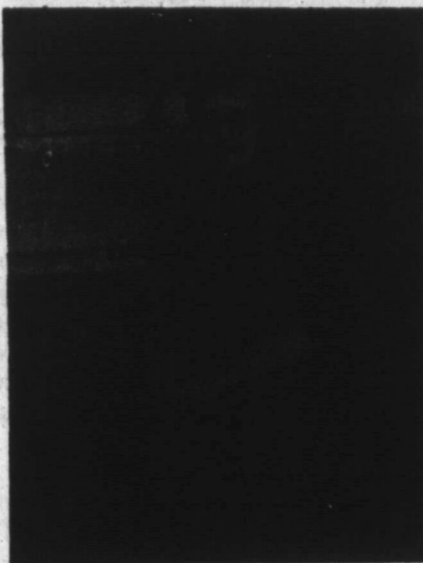

In the girls events, Linda Hill did a great job in the barrels. Lisa Burch ran a 20.607 in the barrels and a 24.956 in the goat tying.

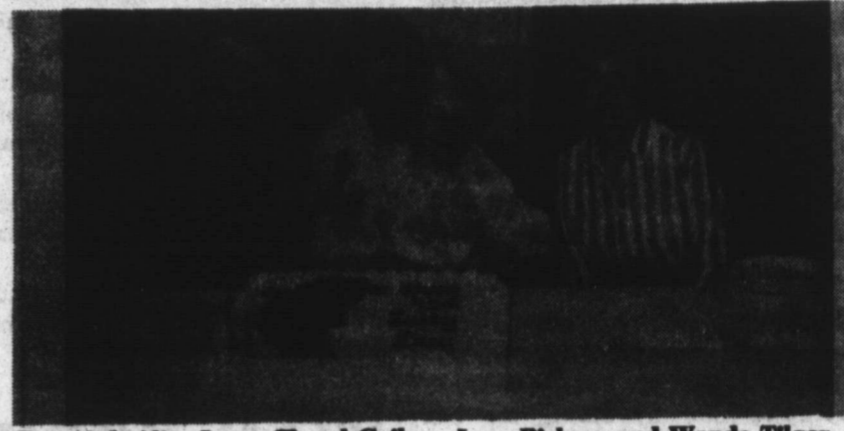
We all got a little dirty, but we had lots of fun doing it. We just hope that September 6th and 7th will be a little big dryer.

Before the party began, the residents were shown a film, "Shane."

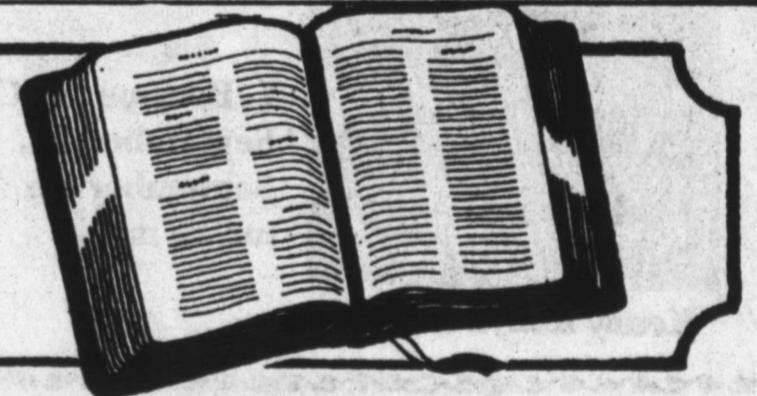

Policy easily assigned to cover life requirements on loans.

tion or permit it to continue; and all such persons in violation, shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects required to reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten (10) days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

Section 5: Validity. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

Section 6: Publication. The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance, together with the penal provision, for the time and manner provided by law, and an alternate method of publication.

Section 7: Date of effect. It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

Passed and approved this the 12th day of August, 1986.

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I noted with interest, the Donley County farm news section of your August 7, 1986 edition concerning the highly erodible land conservation rules. Information in the article is accurate but I believe needs to be expanded on a bit.

The sodbuster provision of the Food Security Act of 1985 concerning highly erodible lands covers two different situations. In the case where new lands are being brought into cultivation, the law specifies that the highly erodible land must be farmed according to a conservation plan the first year that it is used to produce an agricultural commodity as well as in following years. For highly erodible land that was farmed prior to the enactment of the farm bill in December 1985, the producer is required to be actively implementing a conservation plan by January 1, 1990, and have the plan fully implemented by January 1, 1995, in order to retain eligibility for USDA programs.

As you can see, with land that was

cultivated in any of the crop years between 1984 and 1985, the producer has a "grace period" before a conservation plan is required in order to retain eligibility for program participation. I would recommend, as you did in the article, that farmers contact the local ASCS or SCS office for further clarification and information.
