FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA WEEK FEBRUARY 21-28

The Future Farmers of America is a national organization of, by, and for students studying Vocational Agriculture in the public schools. The FFA is an educational, non-profit, non-political youth organization of voluntary membership, designed to develop agricultural leadership, character, thrift, scholarship, cooperation, citizenship, and patriotism. One of the requirements for membership is that the student must be enrolled in a high school class of Vocational Agriculture. The limit is 12-21. In these vocational agriculture classes, students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in all phases of agriculture.

Texas is the largest of the fifty chartered State Associations with over 10% of the national membership. Texas has 940 chapters with a membership of over 49,000. The national membership is over 450,000 and is sponsored by the State Department of Education. The

high school in Texas serve as local sponsors. The local vocational agriculture teachers as the local FFA Chapter Advisor.

The FFA provides training for those interested in production agriculture as well as those anticipating careers in off-farm agricultural occupations. The FFA, through the vocational agriculture classes, provide training for the entire agriculture industry, both on-farm and off-farm. Four out of every ten employed persons in the United States work in some phase of the agriculture industry.

The FFA strives to furnish well-trained leaders and citizens for responsible positions in agricultural business and industry, professional agricultural work, farming, and ranching. Presently Texas high schools are offering vocational agriculture classes in production agriculture, agricultural mechanics, horticulture, meat processing, forestry, and off-farm agriculture.

LOCAL YOUNGSTERS ENTER HOUSTON LIVESTOCK SHOW

BAIRD — 4-H Club youngsters from Baird will exhibit their steers in the 1970 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, to be held Feb. 25 through March 8. Steer exhibitors are Elizabeth Elliott, Ira Akers Jr., Barbara Akers, Nancy Henry, Marrian Odom, Geneva Finley, Kim Smith, Debbie Curtis and Guy Curtis.

FFA and 4-H Club exhibitors will be competing for \$94,000 in premium money, plus an estimated \$130,000 in auction premiums above market value. These premiums will be divided among exhibitors of 8 breeds of beef cattle, 4 breeds of dairy cattle, 11 breeds of sheep and angora goats, 5 breeds of swine, 5 breeds of horses, and many poultry and rabbit breeds.

The largest number of entries, ever, indicate tough competition for the championships. Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo General Manager E. C. Weekley predicts the largest Junior Show in its history.

Star performers for the 1970 show include Elvis Presley, making his only appearance in Texas this year, in matinee and evening performances on Feb. 27, 28 and March 1; Charley Pride will follow on March 2, 3 and 4; Bobby Goldsboro for one day only, March 5; and TV favorites Buck Owens and Roy Clark on March 6, 7 and 8.

Betty Crocker Homemaker Of Tomorrow Named At Clyde

CLYDE — Sharon K. Henry has been named Clyde high school's 1970 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. Selected on the basis of her score in a Dec. 2 homemaking knowledge and attitudes examination for which a record 646,041 senior girls in 15,040 of the nation's high schools were enrolled, she is now eligible for state and national honors. She will also receive a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational program.

Test papers of all school winners in the state are currently undergoing additional judging, and a State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named in March. She will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship; the second ranking girl in the state receives a \$500 educational grant. Additionally, first place winners from the 51 states and the District of Columbia - together with advisors from their schools - will receive an expense-paid education tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., this spring. Climax of the tour will be naming the 1970 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of To-

morrow, whose scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Three runners-up will also be selected and will be awarded \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships. National judging will center on personal observation and interviews during the tour.

Begun by General Mills in the 1964-66 school year, the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. During its 16-year history, more than 7 million young women have been enrolled in the program and scholarship grants total approximately \$134 million.

CITY ASKING PEOPLE TO VOTE FOR SALES TAX

GOAD RECEIVES 65 YEAR PRISON SENTENCE FOR MURDER

BAIRD — An 11-man, one woman jury deliberated over an hour Friday night before deciding that Curtis Sherman Goad Jr. was guilty of murder with malice aforethought, in the July 2nd shooting death of Cross Plains City Marshall Byron Richardson. The jury deliberated a little over an hour on the punishment and it was set at 65 years. The punishment range was from 5 years to life in prison or death in the electric chair.

District Attorney Ed Paynter and special prosecutor Bill Thomas asked for the death penalty in the case. Charles Scarborough, court appointed attorney for Goad, made no immediate comment on a possible appeal. He was assisted by his father Davis Scarborough in the case.

Goad showed little emotion when the guilty verdict was returned, but his wife, Sherry burst into tears.

said, "I knew he couldn't arrest me for DWI because I wasn't driving at the time." Goad then testified that Richardson said, "I'm making it easy on you, I want you to fix me up with your woman." Goad said Richardson told him to stay at his car (Richardson's) and that Richardson walked up to the parked pickup. Sherry Goad had her foot on the brake of the pickup so it would not roll. Goad said he followed Richardson to the pickup and saw him place his right hand here (on his wife, indicating his thigh), then Richardson saw me, he turned around and knocked me against the door of the pickup. When Scarborough asked him what happened next, Goad replied, "The next thing I remember, we were in the park - a siren was screaming and I was scared."

Richardson had written out a warning ticket, but it had never been torn from the ticket book.

Mrs. Goad testified that Goad reached over her and got the .22 rifle. She said that she grabbed his arm and told him, "Curtis, it's just not worth it." She said there a number of shots fired but she didn't know how many. The next thing she knew Goad came running and jumped in the truck and they took off. They drove to Turkey Creek and he bandaged his wounded hand and painted his name off the doors on the pickup. The rifle had been thrown away in a field and was later recovered when Mrs. Goad showed officials where it was. The Goads were arrested in Cisco and then placed in Callahan County jail.

Mrs. Goad was no-billed and released and her husband indicted and had been in jail here since being arrested.

Mrs. Louise Richardson and her daughters made their first appearance at the trial last Friday evening. She heard the summation of the lawyers and the decision of the jury as to the guilt of Goad.

District Attorney Ed Paynter said he was satisfied with the decision of the jury and felt that justice had been served.

During the final days of the trial the court room was filled to capacity. All seats were taken and people were lined up each side and back of the room.

Many people in our community who attended the trial learned many things about the law and the procedures of law they did not know before the trial. Many have seen court room action on TV, but when you really get down to real lawyers, judges, and victims, and you know these people, it certainly puts a different light on the trial.

BAIRD — Tuesday, February 24th, the citizens of Baird will go to the polls to accept or reject the 1c retail sales tax for Baird. The City Council realizes the importance and necessity of carrying this election, and sincerely requests the support of the voters.

Probably the fairest of all taxes, if there is such a thing as a "fair" tax, is the retail sales tax. This distributes the load more evenly for everyone. Property owners have been taxed until there is little left to be taxed. Those people who do not own property, get, in a manner of speaking, a comparatively free ride. Through the sale tax everyone pays his equal share.

Due to the increased cost of operation of the City, it will be necessary to obtain additional funds for normal operations in the very near future. The City of Baird has not raised property taxes in 15 years, and has no desire to do so now, if the operation of the City can be financed otherwise. The Council believes the 1c sales tax is the answer. The city of Clyde received \$2,678.21 the third quarter of 1969, and by comparison the City of Baird could expect at least \$10,000 or better per year.

To raise this amount by city taxes, valuations would have to be raised 50%, as the tax revenue is now approximately \$20,000.00.

Some people who opposed this project in the beginning indicated they would support the tax if the money was earmarked for a specific purpose - this cannot be legally done, as the law prohibits putting this money up for a specific purpose. However, this money will enable the City to do some things needed that would not be possible otherwise, and the actual cost to the individual is exceedingly small.

Most of the businessmen have indicated they are for this project. The Callahan County Luncheon Club has endorsed it, the majority of the Lions Club members favor voting for the tax.

More than 350 cities in Texas have already voted the 1c retail sales tax and more are adopting the same as time goes by. Most of the elections held have carried from 2 to 1 to 4 to 1 majority. Very few towns have rejected the sales tax.

Nearly all towns in our area have voted for the tax, but we receive no benefit unless voted in Baird. According to Mayor Ault, each citizen has the opportunity to vote for or against the proposal and he urges each one to go to the polls and vote. It is a chance to support your City government, and can help relieve a financial situation.

Masons To Meet February 21

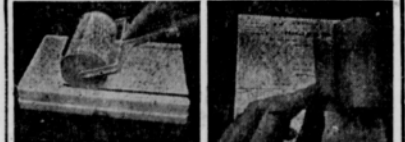
BAIRD — Masonic Lodge No. 322 of Baird will hold their regular meeting Saturday night Feb. 21.

BAIRD CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN FEB. 23 THRU MARCH 21st

BAIRD — The official Clean-Up Campaign has been set by the City Council as the period beginning February 23rd and ending March 21st.

Since it is the time of year when people are trimming trees, hedges, etc., the Council decided the Clean-Up Campaign should be started early.

Where tree limbs and other rubbish, other than normal garbage, is to be disposed of, it will be necessary that limbs be

but in lengths of three to four feet, in order that one man can handle them. All rubbish and tree trimmings, etc., must be placed near the garbage cans, or easily available by trucks.

If these rules are observed, the City will haul, free of charge, during the campaign. After March 21, charges will be made for extra hauling.

Last year our Clean-Up campaign was disrupted by rain, but we hope that the hauling can be handled more efficiently this year.

Everyone should start early in cleaning up their property and maybe we can have a reasonably clean town by March 21st.

Lone Star Gas Co. Reports Record 1969 Performance

DALLAS — Lone Star Gas Company earning increased in 1969 to \$1.59 per share, and a record consolidated operating revenue was also achieved, Louis G. James, president announced.

Consolidated net income for Lone Star and its wholly owned subsidiaries totaled a record \$23,311,000, a \$2,230,000 increase over 1968. Per share earnings of \$1.59 were up 15 cents. Record consolidated operating revenues of \$236,577,000 were up \$13,516,000, or 6%.

James also announced that on January 30 Lone Star Producing Co. entered into a contract with Glover Hefner Kennedy Oil Co. under which it will acquire for \$7 million, half of CHK's interest in approximately 70,000 oil and gas leasehold acres covered multi-pay prospects in the Anadarko Basin of Oklahoma. This capital outlay is in addition to budgeted 1970 capital expenditures of \$40.9 million announced earlier. Another \$2.2 million will be invested to increase the size and capacity of a previously announced Granger to Waco pipeline from 24" to 35" scheduled for construction in 1970.

James said that a program begun late in 1969 to increase rates for gas sold to residential and commercial customers in Texas is over 90% complete. Although the rate program had only a minor effect on 1969

RURAL DELIVERY SERVICE AVAILABLE FOR CITIES

CLYDE — Postmaster Dan South said today that a new order from Postmaster General Winton M. Blount will mean substantial improvements in mail delivery services.

Postmaster General Blount has advised the local postmaster of provisions of a new order making home delivery services available for the first time to four million Americans.

The service improvement applies to persons served out of 18,700 first, second and third class post offices over the country that do not have city delivery services. Affected are those postal customers living more than a quarter mile away from these offices and less than a half mile away. Persons living less than half a mile away previously had not been provided this service.

Discussing the local area effects of Mr. Blount's new order, Postmaster South explained "I don't, at this time, know

how many of our patrons will desire this Rural Delivery Service. Under these revised regulations some 40 percent of our city patrons will be eligible for service if they desire it."

To get the new service it is only necessary that those living in the eligible areas ask their postmaster to provide it, and a majority of those to be served must want the home service.

Under Mr. Blount's order, those living less than a quarter of mile from the post office will continue to pick up their mail at those offices.

"But," the postmaster noted, "that's no more than a few blocks." This order however, will make the home deliveries available wherever desired by the majority of those living beyond a quarter mile.

"The distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail; in areas where large numbers of older

persons are living, or in more remote sections when even a little distance may mean a lot in terms of travel difficulties."

The expansion of services should be virtually complete in all of the affected delivery service areas under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting on recommendations of local postmasters by Feb. 1, 1971.

It will be accomplished principally by adding delivery stops

to already existing rural delivery routes, or by expanding the area served by some shorter rural route for the purpose, and, a limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in some instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post offices for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.

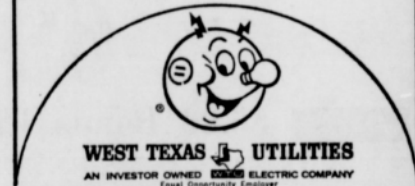

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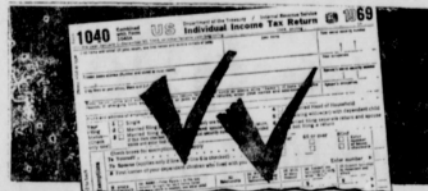
