Election set for May 7th

Citizens of Donley County will go to the polls May 7th to elect the men and women who will represent them on the Clarendon and Hedley School Boards, the Clarendon, Howardwick and Hedley City Councils, Clarendon College Board of Regents and the Donley County Hospital Board. These citizens will make the rules and regulations which will govern our cities, hospital district and schools. They will budget and spend your tax money. It is important that these boards have informed and interested citizens to serve on them. None of these board members receive any money compensations. If you do not like the way any of these governmental bodies are being run, or the way your tax dollars are being spent, now is the time you may sign up to serve on one of these boards, or encourage someone who you would like to see serve.

Sometimes it seems that no one appreciates the time and effort it takes to serve on these boards, you work all day, attend meetings that last for hours, then a lot of the time you get criticized for your decisions. But this is our right as Americans, to govern ourselves thru elections.

You are urged to give these boards a lot of consideration and choose if you would like to serve on one of them. It does not cost a filing fee to sign up. The City of Clarendon will have three places open for election, they are now held by Steve Smith, Bubba Newhouse and Gene White. The City of Howardwick has three places, they are held by C.I. Pettit, Huell Bingham and Charles Boren. Hedley has three places open they are held by Henry Stephens, Connie DeBord and Myrl Whitaker and Jon Leggett's mayor position.

Susie Shields and Ted Shaller places on the Clarendon ISD will expire, and in Hedley ISD board members who's places are up for election are Dana Bell, G.L. Wilkinson and Cary Don Neeley.

Delbert Robertson, Bob McCombs and Clyde Price, Jr's places on the Board of Regent of Clarendon College will expire.

Donley County Hospital has four positions open, they are now held by C.C. Ayers, place 6; Johnny Leathers, place 4; Chuck Rogers, place 5; and place 7 which was held by Ronald Castner is vacant. Castner resigned due to health reasons several weeks ago.

Monday, February 22 was the first day a candidate could sign up for one of these positions. The last day one may file will be March 23 at 5 p.m.

Each year FFA Week is held during the week of George Washington's birthday (traditional) to recognize the leadership and commitment to American agriculture. The National FFA Center is located on part of

Over three-fourths of CHS students "AT Risk" of quitting

We continue to be a nation-in-crisis when it comes to the perplexing and continuing problem of school dropouts. Texas ranks behind only six other states in the number of dropouts. Not only does Texas have one of the highest dropout rates in the nation, it also has one of the highest prison populations. Eighty-five percent of that prison population is made up of high school dropouts. Even if TEA (Texas Education Agency) had not mandated that schools become concerned for the "at risk" student, it is time for school officials, parents and citizens to become aware of the dropout problem and to take action to correct the situation. As academic requirements for graduation increase, CHS is seeing more students dropout of school.

A study, using TEA criteria, has been completed for Clarendon High School. While TEA criteria may catch several good students who will not be dropping out, it does provide an alert to school districts of possible dropouts. The following lists by grade.

The following lists by grade, race, and gender the percentage of Clarendon High School students determined to be at risk of dropping out of school according to the five Texas Education Agency criteria.

The criteria target students who:
 -are behind their age group and experiencing academic difficulty
 -are two or more years behind their grade level in reading or math
 -won't graduate in four years
 -failed at least one section of the most recent TEAMS test, and
 -face family, economic, or social problems that could affect schoolwork.

Springer completes emergency requirements and tests

LaMoss Springer is currently employed by the Hedley School district where she is teaching Science and coaching Junior High girls athletics. She has been an Emergency Medical Technician for six years where she has served as a first responder for the Hedley area. A special skills EMT is trained to perform advanced life saving skills such as IV therapy, to help prevent shock and serve as a direct life-line for the medications they may administer, endotracheal and esophageal intubations, which will help the patient to breathe, plus other advanced skills in medical emergencies.

The course began September 21 and lasted through January 25. The course was offered by PEMESS and the Texas Department of Health in cooperation with McLean, where the class was held. Students from McLean, Hedley, Memphis, Shamrock, Canadian, Skellytown, and Groom participated in the course.

This course consisted of 239 total hours. Time was spent in the classroom, clinical hospital hours in ICU/CCU Respiratory therapy, with IV teams, in the operating room, in OB/GYN department, Emergency room, Surgery/Recovery, and laboratory. In addition to these clock hours, they were required to perform such skills as IV's, oral and tracheal intubations, blood draws, suctionings, vital signs, patient assessments, ambulance time (12 advanced life saving), birth and delivery, and general basic skills, and also to pass a basic PEMESS test and a State

test. "The people in the Hedley area and those traveling through here are important to me. These special skills will better enable me to help people in emergency situations."

Shake Well Before Using

Most of the medicines that carry "shake well" labels are suspensions. A suspension is a liquid with fine particles of active ingredients dispersed throughout water or other solvents. When first manufactured, the particles are evenly dispersed. With time, these particles either settle to the bottom or rise to the top of the container.

A potential hazard associated with suspensions that are not properly shaken before being used is that they may deliver doses that are too strong or too weak. If active ingredients settle to the bottom, for example, the doses first taken may contain only water or flavoring agents. The last doses would contain the concentrated drug product.

Drug manufacturers frequently prepare medicines in a variety of dosage forms in order to avoid problems associated with suspensions. This is not possible, however, in the case of every medicine. When instructed to shake the medicine well before using, do so with a vigorous side-to-side rotating-type motion while holding the container near the top. Don't forget to keep the bottle cap closed tightly.

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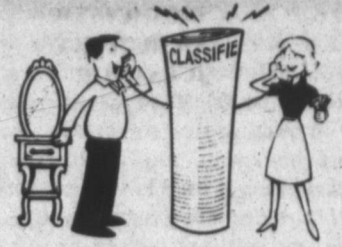

The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Clarendon may use the Texas Community Development Program funds and TDOC will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. Objections to State Release of Funds Texas Department of Commerce will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by TDOC; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision

finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure [24 CFR Part 58.75] and may be addressed to Texas Community Development Program; Texas Department of Commerce, First City Center, 816 Congress, Suite 1200, Austin, Texas 78701.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by TDOC. No objection received after April 1, 1988 will be considered by TDOC. The Chief Executive Officer of the City of Clarendon is David Davidson, Mayor.

Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of March. All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the prior year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, motorcycles, boats, and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

January 1 of each year is the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1.
