BAIRD BEARS BLITZ CROSS PLAINS BUFFALOES, 55-16

BAIRD — The Bears exploded in the second half of last Friday's game, and routed the Cross Plains Buffaloes 55-16. The halftime score was 21-16 in favor of the Bears.

Fullback Cecil Faircloth again had a big night carrying the football. He found running room to collect four touchdowns and 248 yards for his night's efforts.

The Bears started slowly and found themselves trailing in the first quarter 8-0. On the first play from scrimmage following the Cross Plains score, quarterback Gary Goble hit tight end Ricky Vestal for a 43 yard touchdown. The game remained a close one throughout the first half.

On the second play of the 2nd half, Faircloth struck like lightning for a 59-yard scamper, and was pulled down on the 9-yard line. Two plays later he scored and the stage was set for the Bears biggest scoring night in quite some time.

The Bears running back all had good gains from scrimmage. David Strickland netted 77 yards, and had a beautiful run

called back due to a penalty. The Bears also excelled in the penalty department. The flag was dropped enough to give them 120 yards total in penalties.

On defense, the Bears held the Buffs to 180 yards rushing and 89 yards passing Johnny Robinson, Ricky Vestal, Freddy Greenway, Butch Barron and Danny Vestal were defensive stalwarts.

This week the Bears begin District 7-A play, when they host the Roscoe Plowboys at the Bears Den at 7:30 Friday. This should be an excellent ball game. Back the Bears!

BAIRD SCHOOL BOARD CALLS NEW BOND ELECTION OCT. 31

BAIRD — The Board of Education of Baird Independent School District, meeting in special session Tuesday, Oct. 13, voted to call a school bond election on October 31, 1970.

The bonds will consist of two issues, one totaling \$125,000 to cover the elementary library, elementary science laboratory and classroom, P. E. dressing facilities, vocational building, and improvements to existing facilities; and the other for \$110,000 for a new physical ed-

ucation building. The original issue was for \$275,000.

Inasmuch as the Board realizes that improvements recommended by the Texas Education Agency must be made in order to maintain accreditation, much time was spent in consultation with building experts and Texas Education officials in order to offer citizens of the Baird Independent School District the most economical solution for providing the necessary facilities for Baird school children.

The reduced amount of these bonds is due largely to the decision by the Board to use basically steel-like structures, rather than the conventional type buildings, as originally planned.

The election will be held in the American Legion Hall, with Jon Hardwick serving as election judge. Voting hours will be from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Absentee voting will be held at the school tax office from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., October 20 through October 28. Mrs. Margaret Gilliland will serve as absentee election judge.

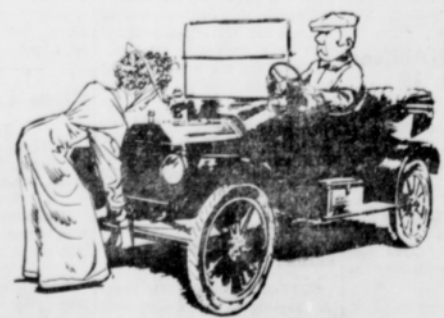
