

## Juniors improve TEAMS Sunday morning a special service math scores, language arts scores drop

Clarendon High School Juniors improved their composite math TEAMS test scores in 1987 while dropping on the composite language arts scores. Statewide results show that average scores in math increased by 8 points while language arts average scores neither increased or decreased. However, 85% of Clarendon juniors passed both sections of the TEAMS test.

The juniors raised their composite math scores from 751 in 1986 to 776 in 1987, a 25 point gain. The state verage score for math is 769. School officials are pleased with the improvement in the math scores.

Weaknesses in math are measurement units with only 58% of the juniors passing, geometric properties with 61% passing and proportion with 64% passing. Also needing improvement are equivolencies, fractions and mixed numbers, and probabilities. The strongest areas in math are decimals with 97% passing, exponential, averages, and charts and graphs with 94% passing in each of the catagories.

The language arts scores dropped from a composite score of 802 in 1986 to a composite score of 779 in 1987. The state average score for language arts in 785.

The strengths in language arts are use of reference materials 100% and sentence combining 97%. The weaknesses are punctuation with only 55% of the students demonstrating mastery. Other areas of weakness are capitalization, spelling, proofreading, correct English usage and sentence structure.

Clarendon school administrators are aware that steps must be taken to correct weaknesses. Special tutorials sessions are offered during the school day as well as during evening hours to help students improve their knowledge.

School officials encourage concerned parents to contact the high school principal or counselor to discuss how to help their child improve. Parents need to actively support school faculty and administrators in thier efforts to educate all students. Also, students need to become aware of the importance of doing their best on all achievement tests. Clearly, we can increase our test scores with complete cooperation of students, teachers, administrators and parents.



Capsicum produces local irritation in a manner similar to methyl salicylate. Unlike methyl salicylate, it does not cause blistering or reddening of the skin.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the

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The following specific language is required by EPA in this notice:

environment.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women. Lead levels in your drinking water

are likely to be highest: 1. if your home or water system

has lead pipes, or

2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and

3. if the home is less than five years old, or

4. if you have soft or acidic water, or 5. if water sits in the pipes for several hours

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

The Greenbelt Water System has no lead joints or lead pipe in its system. According to the latest State Health Department Chemical Analysis (March, 1988) the Greenbelt Water System contains less than 0.02 parts

# VA observes National

#### Consumers' Week

The Veterans Administration, the agency that serves millions of consumers daily, will observe National Consumers' Week, April 24-30, says Waco Regional Office Director Stephen Lemons.

This year's national theme is "Consumers Buy Service." "No other federal agency is as consumer oriented as we are," said Lemons. "Texas' 1.8 million veterans and their dependents are all potentially eligible for VA benefits and services; including education, home loan, hospital care, pension or national cemetery

The Waco Regional Office is one of 58 benefits processing centers across the country, linked by computer to the VA's central records bank. "Our telephone unit benefits counselors handle some 32,000 calls each month from veterans and their dependents throughout the state who call for information and help in processing their claims. VA counselors see 200 veterans each week right here in our offices," said Lemons.

In addition to regional office counselors, Lemons explained that veterans are served by a vareity of experienced "consumer advocates" throughout Texas.

"Our VA Medical Centers have benefits counselors on board, as well as field service officers from groups like the State Department of Veterans Affairs, the American Legion, the Disabled American Veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and others," Lemons said. "Together, these experts have the experience and information needed to assist veterans in filing for more VA benefits on the spot.

Lemons said that last fiscal year the regional office administered payments of nearly \$752 million in compensation, pension, education and other direct benefits to veterans and their families in the jurisdiction of the Waco Regional Office. "That doesn't include the millions of dollars in home loans we guarantee on behalf of veteran home buyers, or the reimbursement we make to employers who hire Korean and Vietnam veterans under the Veterans' Job Training Program. Consumers really do mean 'business' -particularly VA consumers!"

## Check Alfalfa for weevils

This is a critical time for alfalfa producers in Donley County, cautions Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension agent.

This is the time when producers need to examine their alfalfa for the presence of alfalfa weevil larvae. Gooch said.

With the beginning of warm spring weather, overwintering female weevils begin laying eggs. The young larvae which hatch out are very small, yellow-green in color and feed in the growing tips and developing buds. Older larvae are green with a white stripe down their back.

"We expect to have our peak alfalfa weevil activity in late April or early May in our area," said Gooch. If larvae numbers are high enough to reach the economic threshold, one properly timed application should give control. Treatments should be applied in alfalfa 2 to 6 inches tall when two or more larvae are found per plant or when 30 to 50 percent of the plant terminals show weevil feeding damage. Taller plants 7 to 14 inches tall should be treated when 25 or more weevil larvae per square foot are present. Several effective insecticides are registered for alfalfa weevil

The alfalfa weevil has only one generation per year and is only a pest of first cutting, said Gooch. After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid-May in our area, the larva spins a net-like cocooon on the plant or in the soil debris. The adult weevil emerges from this cocoon and leaves

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the field. The weevils stay out of the alfalfa fields all summer and re-enter them in the fall. The adults overwinter in the field and the cycle then repeats itself.

Since the larva are a pest of first cutting, it is sometimes possible to cut a litter earlier than usual and avoid chemical treatments. Cutting results in exposure and a lack of food which kills many of the remaining larvae. Winter grazing by livestock helps reduce weevil populations.

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
