West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new, coal-fired power plant as making ne move necessary. the move necessary. "We have said over "We have said over and over again rates when our Oklaunion Power Station Station was completed," said Jerry Chambliss, WTU's local manager in Chambliss, WTU's local manager in Clarendon, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago. The rate changes being sought would add $\$ 50,361,475$ to the Comwould add $550,361,475$ to the Com- pany's annual retail revenue. This is pany's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 per cent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.
