## Threatening clouds produce twisters as tornado season arrives

Tornado warnings were sounded in Hedley, Clarendon and Howardwick Sunday night, after several twisters were spotted.

Sheriff Jimmy Thompson called for volunteer firemen to act as spotters about 9:30 p.m. after the National Weather Bureau, in Amarillo, issued tornado warnings for Donley County, when a twister had been observed on the ground in the Silverton area heading in the direction of Donley County.

About 10:15 warning signals were sounded in Clarendon and Howardwick, spotters alerted about 75 campers around Greenbelt Lake, and they took shelter in Howardwick City Hall.

At 10:45 Sheriff Thompson advised Hedley Constable Blackie Johnson to blow the Hedley Warning signal after threatening clouds, high winds and rain came across the Giles hills.

The weather bureau tracked a twister on the ground about 6:10 miles south of Clarendon, but no apparent damage was done.

A second cloud was spotted about 11:15 in the Howardwick vicinity and Sheriff Thompson advised campers to stay at Howardwick City Hall.

There was a report that a tornado was on the ground at Quail, but a Quail fireman called and reported he had no evidence of one on the ground.

Memphis alert systems were sounded about 11:30 p.m.

There was hail as big as golf balls reported in parts of the county and heavy rains all over.

Finally at midnight the all clear was given by the weather bureau, and the county escaped without too much damage.

Monday spotters were out watching clouds, but no alert was sounded in the county.

## Charges filed against Amarillo youths for Cemetery vandalism

Two Amarillo youths have been placed into custody, one 17-year old and the other a 16-year old juvenile for the damage done in Citizens Cemetery May 6.

The two boys had been at Greenbelt Lake, and according to Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson, "wanted to have some fun".

Approximately \$20,000 dollars worth of damage was done, by turning over and breaking grave stone and curbing.

The 17-year-old was returned to Donley County Tuesday, but the 16-year-old juvenile remains in Randall County Juvenile Hall.

Authorities found the missing cross from one of the cemetery lots in the youth's home.

Charges of theft over \$750.00 and criminal mischief has been filed - both accounts are 3rd degree felonies.

Sheriff Thompson stated, "As far as we can determine no Donley County youths were involved."

## Dr. Rose to speak in Hedley and Clarendon Methodist churches

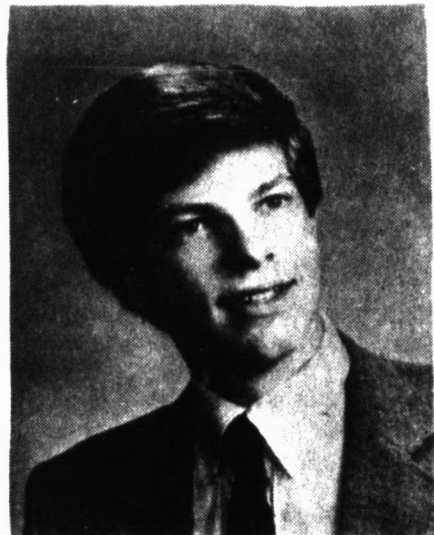

She holds a B.M. from West Texas State University, a M.A. from Eastman School of Music in New York and a Ph.D. from the University of California.



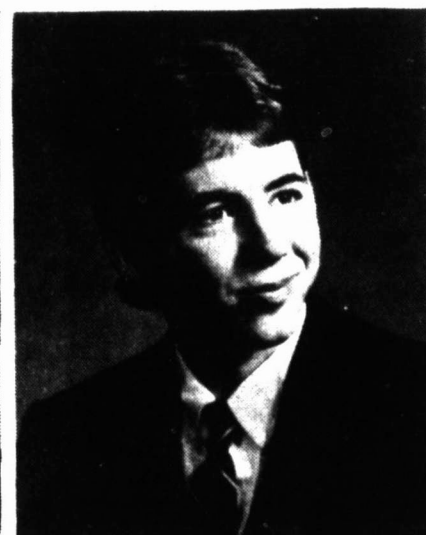

## Rabies clinic rescheduled

### for May 29th

Due to adverse weather conditions, the Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp. will hold the Rabies Clinic again this week. The Deyleh Veterinary Services, will provide a heart worm exam, dipping service, and Parvo vaccination.

The clinic will be held Friday, May 29, 1987, at the County Jail facility from 3:30-5:00 p.m.

The cost of services are as follows:

Dipping \$8.00 ex-par, 21 day residue, kills fleas, ticks and lice; heart worm direct exam and filter exam \$7.00; rabies \$6.00 vaccination plus \$1.00 for city tag, for a total of \$7.00;

## West Texas files for increase

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new coal-fired power plant as making the move necessary.

"We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklaunion Power Station was completed," said Jerry Chambliss, WTU's local manager in Clarendon, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago.

The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 per cent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.

Chambliss said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 625 kilowatt-hours per month would pay \$10.83 more per month than previously. A commercial customer using 1,500 kilowatt-hours would pay \$29.94 more.

"To put this request in its proper perspective, our overall residential revenues will be only six to eight per cent higher than they were two years ago," Chambliss said. "The decline in fuel costs since then just about offsets this increase."

The Oklaunion Power Plant, situated near Vernon, went into commercial operation Dec. 24, 1986.

WTU's share of the cost as majority owner is \$275 million, which increased the Company's total investment in facilities by 75 per cent.

"Until this cost is reflected in our rates, the Company does not have the opportunity to recover its expenses and earn a reasonable return on its investment," Chambliss explained.

Construction at Oklaunion started in May 1982, and the plant was completed on time and well within the original budget. Industry surveys show that Oklaunion was the most economically constructed coal-fired power plant built during the mid-1980s.

The plant will provide 25 per cent of WTU's total generating capacity. The long-term contract for low sulphur western coal diversifies the Company's fuel base and will help stabilize fuel costs, which in recent years have been affected by sudden changes in natural gas prices.

Other company's owning shares of the plant are Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both associated with WTU as members of the Central and South West System; the city of Brownsville and Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority.

Usual procedures at the PUC indicate that a full-scale hearing of WTU's case would be held in late summer, with a final order by the Commission coming late this year. This would make it almost three years since WTU's last change in basic retail rates.

She was a state certified Emergency Medical Technician since 1980 and had served as a volunteer with the Clarendon Emergency Medical Services since that time.

She was certified in MAST Trousing and Crash Extrication skills. She was a charter member of the Clarendon EMS Association and was elected co-recipient of the Panhandle EMS System EMT of the Month Award in June 1981.

She was a past member of the Clarendon Art Studio Art Club from 1978 to 1984 and had served as President in 1982 and as Vice-President in 1984. She was a member of the Amarillo Women's Soccer Association in 1983-84 and was named to Personalities of America in 1983. She has served as church pianist and organist since 1976 at the Clarendon Church of the Nazarene

where she was a member.

Survivors include her husband, Patrick Wayne Robertson of Clarendon; one son, Charles Wayne "Chuck" Robertson of Clarendon; her mother, Mrs. Joy Estene Black of Wellington; two brothers, Charles Glen Black of Memphis, Roger Norman Black of Fort Wayne, Indiana; her maternal grandfather, Claude Black of Wellington, three nieces; and three nephews.

She was preceded in death by her father, Elmer Glen Black in 1974 and a sister, Linda Joy Black in 1944.

She has won 22 medals, 12 of them gold, she won 7 of the 12 this year. Larinda also throws the shotput,

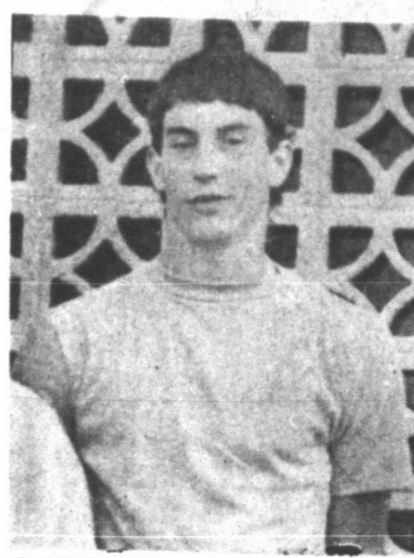
she won district and qualified for regional, missing finals by an inch.

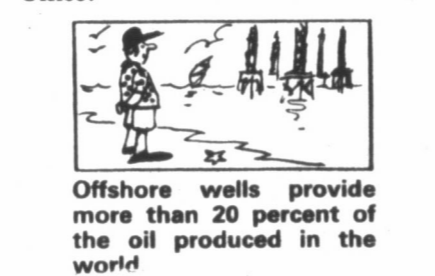
## Two Clarendon residents named to Scholastic honors list

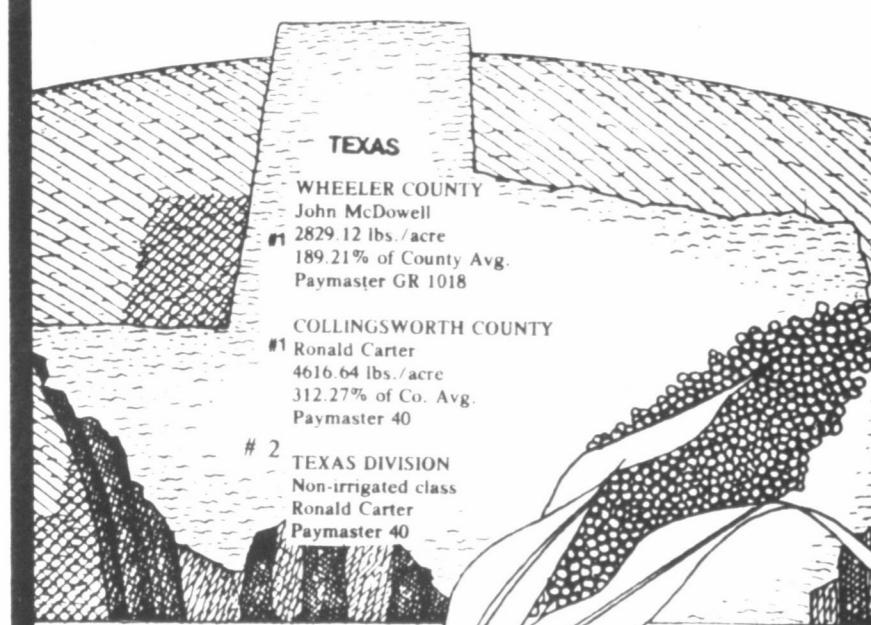

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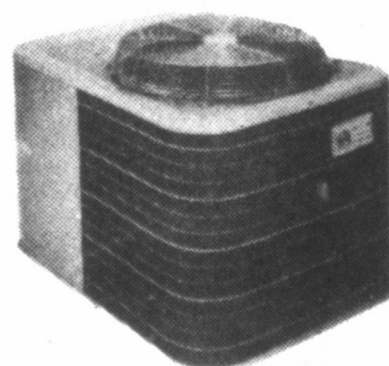

## Word Processing offered first session by CC Business Dept.

BAS 142 Word Processing I will begin Tuesday, June 2, and will continue each Tuesday and Thursday evening between 6-10 p.m. through July 9. Instructor for the course is Mrs. Pamela Denney. In this course, students will learn to operate the IBM Personal Computer using Word Perfect, one of the most popular pieces of word processing software on the market today. Students will also obtain enough general information about computers to become "computer literate".

This course is designed primarily for the student who has never used a computer or who knows nothing about word processing. However, those with computer and word processing experience may also take the course. The only prerequisite is that students already know how to type. A speed of about 30 words a minute or better will be adequate.

## Individualized Business Courses offered first session at CC

Three individualized courses will be offered at Clarendon College beginning June 2 by Mrs. Pamela Denney. These courses are: Office Machines, Legal Machine Transcription, and Executive Machine Transcription. Each of these individualized courses allows the student to work at his or her own pace until the work is completed. Students should meet with Mrs. Denney at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, June 2, in order to arrange

their schedules.

BAS 131 Office Machines helps a student learn to operate a calculator using the touch-method on the ten-key pad. Students will apply this skill to work all types of business math problems. Students will also learn to operate other office machines, such as the electronic typewriter, duplicating equipment, and machine transcription machines.

BAS 244 Legal Machine Transcription is a good course for anyone who plans to work in a legal office as a receptionist/typist, secretary, stenographer, or research assistant or in a court-related job such as a court reporter. This course helps a student learn the skill of listening to dictation from a transcription machine and typing the document while listening. Students also learn hundreds of legal terms during the course. Prerequisite: A student must be able to type.

BAS 246 Executive Machine Transcription also teaches the skill of using transcription machines. A student may choose 9 out of 12 different simulated types of businesses to work for during the course, spending about 4-5 hours working for each business. Grammar skills are also reinforced by use of special language skills prepsheets before certain lessons on the transcription machine. Prerequisite: A student must be able to type.

## Congressman Beau Boulter Reports from Washington



### OF DOCTORS AND BANK ROBBERS

I have often noted that with regard to the Texas Medical Foundation and peer review of rural doctors, bank robbers and other criminals have enjoyed more due process.

For example, if a man is convicted of a crime, he has the opportunity to appeal his sentence before he ever serves a day in jail for his crime. However, under the peer review process used in Texas, a doctor is considered guilty until proven innocent. He does not enjoy the right of appeal until after his sanction is in effect.

Because this is unfortunately true, several of my Texas colleagues and I in the U.S. House of Representatives have introduced legislation to restore fairness and due process to the Texas Medical Foundation's peer review process, which is used to insure that Medicare patients receive quality health care.

And while no one wants to defend a truly negligent doctor, in rural or urban areas, a disproportionate number of rural physicians have been sanctioned by the Texas Medical Foundation (TMF). Because we in Texas have a bureaucracy out of control, the Texas Medical Foundation, and because Medicare patients in many small towns represent more than 50% of the family doctor's practice, my colleagues and I have felt compelled to improve the peer review process.

My concern is that rural doctors are being unfairly treated, and, as a result, many rural communities like Perrytown and Lockney and Henrietta and Archer City and Canadian—all towns under 5,000 people in my district where doctors have been targeted by the TMF—will be left without adequate and readily accessible medical care.

### Firebelles attend district convention

On May 16, 1987, Clarendon Firebelles Becky Lane and Tammy Taylor attended the Panhandle District Firemen's and Firemarshal's Association annual convention. The meeting was called to order by the Panhandle District President, Tommy Bledsoe, the President of the State Firemen's and Firemarshal's Association of Texas, was present

in fact, of the 23 doctors in Texas that have been sanctioned by the Texas Medical Foundation, none of those doctors are in towns larger than 12,000 people. Does this mean there are no bad doctors in Dallas or Houston or Austin or San Antonio?

Of course not. But the TMF has adopted procedures and criteria that are simply unfair to rural doctors.

To correct this situation, Charlie Stenholm (D-Stamford) and Ralph Hall (D-Marshall) and I have proposed legislation on the floor of the Congress to bring fairness and due process to this system.

This legislation would give our rural doctors (and any urban doctors, if ever sanctioned) the opportunity to appeal sanctions before they go into effect, a basic right doctors in Texas and other states do not presently enjoy.

This bill would also require that peer review organizations, like the Texas Medical Foundation, place greater emphasis on educating rural doctors. I was shocked to learn that any money to be used for educational programs for local doctors must be taken out of the TMF's operating budget. As a result, plush offices for the Texas Medical Foundation in Austin have won out over bringing our good doctors up to speed with medical advancements and medical regulations.

As a member of the Rural Health Care Coalition's steering committee, I will continue to work to see that those of us who chose to live in the smaller communities of rural America still enjoy the high standard of medical care we are used to insure that our local doctors are treated fairly by the Texas Medical Foundation.

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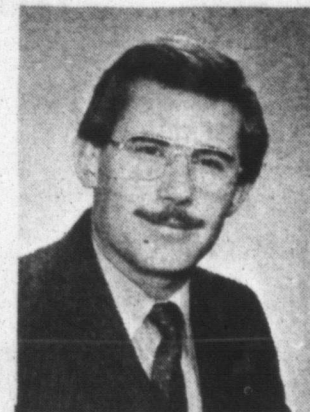

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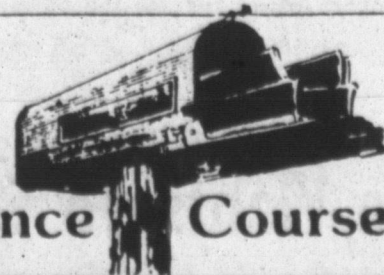

Parents also can become 4-H leaders. 4-H leaders can be organization leaders, project leaders, activity leaders, teen advisors, recruiters, organizers, resource persons

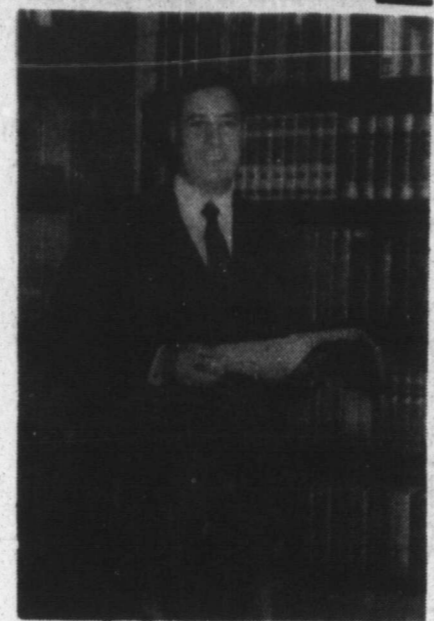

CHRIST MUST BE LIFTED UP

The fourteenth verse of John chapter three is a portion of scripture we must not overlook. It is almost overshadowed by verse sixteen and yet if the requirement of verse fourteen were not fulfilled, verse sixteen would not be possible. We are told that as "Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up." This is an allusion to the story of the Brazen Serpent in Numbers 21:1-9. It is a beautiful Old Testament picture of Calvary and how God through Christ provided a healing for sin.

"The Children of Israel had been delivered from Egyptian bondage by the mighty hand of God. They had been nourished by heavenly bread. They had been refreshed by water from the rock. And yet they still had not learned to trust God. They murmured against God and against God's man (Moses). Their sin was actually rebellion, the same sin that led Adam to disobey God in the garden. That same sin causes men to reject Christ and leads Christians contrary to God's will.

In response to their murmuring God sent fiery serpents to torment the people. This was a direct

judgement of God. Numbers 21:6 tells us that "much people of Israel died." Death is the end result of sin. But God is always open to the repentant heart. The people began to cry out and ask God for forgiveness. God then instructed Moses to make a serpent of bronze and place it upon a pole and if the people would just look in faith upon the Serpent they would be spared alive. It was not the serpent that saved but rather their faithful obedience to God's command, The Serpent therefore typified Christ. Jesus said, "If I be lifted up from the earth I will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32) If a man or woman is to be saved they must place their faith only in the work of Christ on the cross. It was not enough for bulls and goats and lambs to be slain. Jesus had to die. There was no other way for sinners to be redeemed to God.

"All my iniquities on Him were laid, He nailed them all to the tree, Jesus the debt of my sin fully paid. He paid the ransom for me."

"These estimates will be very important this year because of the severe economic conditions facing many of the state's producers. These estimates will also be the first measure of the impact of participation in the 1987 government farm programs," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their marketing plans."

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The mid-year cattle inventory will be published June 30, and the 1987 acreage forecast will be published July 9.

"TASS will be trying to keep survey cost at a minimum this year because of the budget cuts made during the 1986 special legislative session. Despite these cuts, we still plan to do our best to provide Texas farmers and ranchers with accurate, unbiased information they can use in making their day-to-day production and marketing plans," Findley added.

"Texas producers need all the information they can get just to help them survive these severe economic times."

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## Governor sends letters to superintendents

The letter, written by Governor Bill Clements, was sent to every school superintendent and school board president in Texas.

The governor wrote the letter after learning that several education groups, chiefly the Save Our Schools organization, has been spreading misinformation about his budget proposal.

Part of that group's campaign includes a letter-writing campaign in which elementary school children are encouraged to write the governor decrying various proposals within his budget, including his alleged plans to dismiss one of four teachers to help balance the budget.

The governor is committed to quality education. His letter and fact sheet are below.

Dear Superintendent:

As you are well aware, Texas is experiencing a fiscal crisis unsurpassed in this state's history.

Those working in the Texas Capitol -- myself, Senate and House members, and a variety of staff -- are working at a fevered pitch to find a way to develop a two-year state spending plan that can finance critical public programs.

Public education is one of those critical programs. It is vital to our state's future, and I continually have pledged to maintain a strong state commitment to education.

Now, the job of developing a live-within-our-means budget is neither an easy task nor a popular one. It is a job, however, that is ill-served by the spreading of budgetary falsehoods in a bid to drum up support for massive increases in state spending that can be neither justified nor funded.

Every day new figures are displayed to prove how severe the situation is regarding various program areas. Education is a frequent target.

Information has been sent to school districts showing the impact of severe funding cuts on public education when in reality no proposal has suggested cutting state funds or raising local property taxes as much as has been suggested.

Such tactics are numerous, and cannot be condoned. I know that you and I can work together in facing the challenges ahead, and I encourage you to contact my office when you are confronted with budgetary figures spread by the ill-informed that forecast dire consequences for your district.

My staff stands ready to provide accurate information.

### The facts about the Governor's Education Budget

The governor's budget proposes that Texas spend \$11.35 billion on Texas Education Agency programs during the two fiscal years starting Sept. 1, 1987. That is a \$124.7 million reduction from current level spending, or a decrease of only 1.1 percent.

Scenarios presented by some education groups -- the loss of jobs, elimination of programs and school closings -- are inflammatory, misleading and a misrepresentation of the facts.

Fact sheets distributed by those groups are based on old numbers. The groups apparently are reacting to an early House budget proposal published in February, since modified substantially, that suggested

across-the-board reductions in every category of state spending.

It is irresponsible and dishonest to imply that either the Legislature, or the governor, support such radical reductions totaling \$2.8 billion in education cuts during the 1988-90 biennium.

Nonetheless, the education groups peg their cuts on that proposal. Doing so is nothing short of a blatant misrepresentation of the facts.

Those groups falsely allege that teacher salaries will be substantially reduced. Nothing in the governor's budget proposals calls for reducing minimum teacher salaries.

The fact is that local independent school districts have broad ranging powers over the personnel, including setting salary levels above the minimum.

Although local boards govern funding for their independent school districts, state law dictates the opening and closing dates for schools

and the length of the academic year.

Thus, by law, the school year cannot be shortened, and nothing in the governor's budget suggests or implies that it would.

These education groups, in another misguided attempt to scare the public away from the issue of accountability to the taxpayers, claim that state funding to local school districts will be decreased by 13.74 percent, resulting in substantial property tax increases.

Again, such an assertion has no basis in fact under budgets proposed by the governor and the House and Senate.

Since 1984, an additional \$5.67 billion dollars in taxes have been collected from Texans.

The bottom line in the governor's budget proposal is that education leaders, both on the state and local level, should prioritize their programs and reduce inefficiency before seeking more from those taxpayers.

Kami: In six years, we see KIM SHARRAR starring with Smokey the Bear in a Forest Fire Prevention commercial.

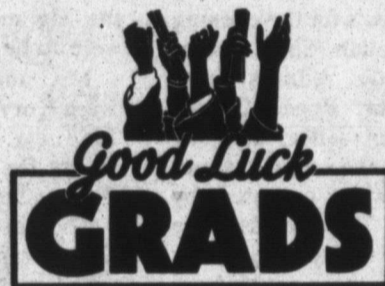
