CALLAHAN COUNTY MAN CONVICTED ON CATTLE THEFT

An accomplice, Johnny Robert Windham, 18, of Lawn, is also under indictment in the same cattle theft case, and also faces the revocation of a five-year probation for burglary.

all been indicted for the January theft of eight head of cattle from Cecil Goble of Cross Plains. Goble pleaded guilty and is now serving a prison sentence.

BULLDOGS SMASH HAMILTON 38-8; SEASONS RECORD 6-4

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs smashed Hamilton 38-8 here Friday night to finish 6-4 for the season. This win made them only one of four teams in the past 17 years to log a winning season in Clyde.

The Bulldogs gathered 24 first downs and 472 yards on offense while holding Hamilton to four first downs and 98 yards.

Clyde's front line blocking was excellent as Bobby Gray, Rick Gilmore, Walter Bruton, Phillip Hamilton and Scott Kniffen drove out Hamilton defenders. Running backs Gary Barr, Tommy Ross, Dennis Dugan, Jimmy Richards and Engate Hawk rushed for 429 yards for the night.

Barr led all rushers with 209 yards on 26 carries. Quarterback John Hoffman went 59 yards for a touchdown on one keeper for the longest run of the night.

The offense controlled the ball in the first half, allowing Hamilton only six rushing

plays. The Bulldogs had drives of 82, 61, 87 and 58 yards for touchdowns. Dennis Dugan got the initial tally and Gary Barr got three others. Tommy Ross hit left guard for a two-pointer.

The blocking of fullbacks Dugan and Richards was outstanding. Punter Jimmy Newman took a screen pass on a fake punt for 41 yards in the 2nd quarter. Hoffman used passes to receivers Hawk, Rosinbaum and Pierce to keep drives alive.

The defense never got their jerseys dirty as Hamilton did not pick up a first down until the 4th quarter.

Jackie Fleming looked good as he quarterbacked the last Bulldog drive. Clyde gave up no fumbles or interceptions and Hawk stole one of Hamilton's aerials.

Other outstanding defenders were Kyle Scott, Ray Ramos, Steve Whitley, Al Windham, Van Arms, Wayne Cloud and Manuel Ramos.

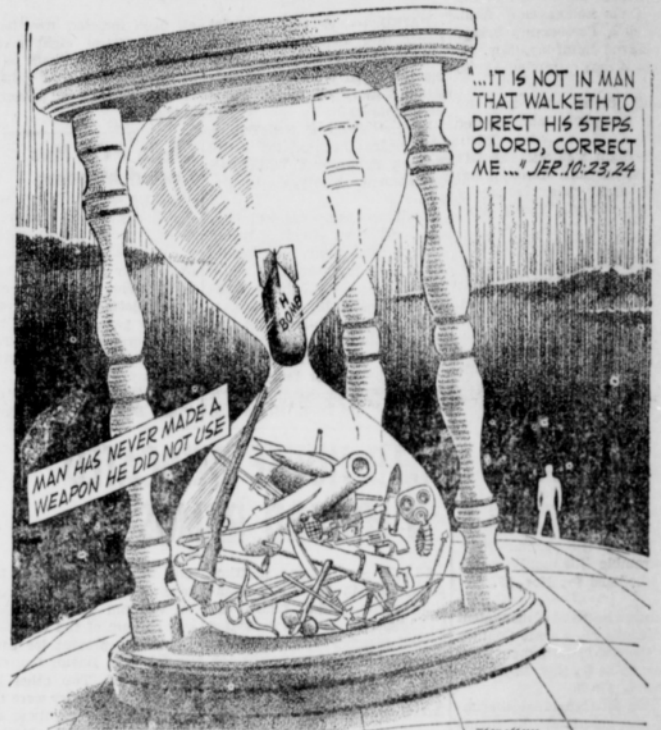

To deny that baptism saves us is to flatly contradict the word of God. Peter says, "The like figure whereunto baptism doth also now save us, (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God), by the resurrection of Jesus Christ." (1 Pet. 3:21). No one can have the answer of a good conscience toward God without baptism.

The water in baptism does not save, but the efficacy is in the blood of Christ (1 John 1:7). We reach the blood when we are baptized into Christ's death where His blood was shed. (John 19:34, Rom. 6:3-4). Baptism is not an act of human merit, but an act of faith in the merit of Christ. "Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead" (Col 2:12).

Petroleum Industry Produces 1,620,630 Barrels Of Crude Oil

Callahan County's petroleum industry produces 1,620,630 barrels of crude oil valued at \$5,200,998 and 1,587,313 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$217,462 for an economic value of \$5,418,460.

The figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, show the county ranked 125th among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.

Texas production which has registered an increase over each previous year during the past decade hit another all-time high in 1969 with 1,151,775,000 barrels, according to U. S. Bureau of Mines statistics. This is a production increase of 24.2 percent since 1960.

"Production from Callahan County helped meet this record demand," says Kenneth E. Montague, Association President. "We are now calling on it and the rest of Texas to meet an even greater demand as events in the Middle East have again forced us to dip into our declining reserves. Unfortunately,

the price for Texas oil is inadequate to stimulate enough exploratory drilling to replace reserves."

Callahan County landowners and others with mineral interests received \$677,308 in royalty payments last year. Texas received \$239,246 from crude oil production taxes and \$15,440 from natural gas production taxes.

Estimated drilling expenditures totaled \$2,585,762 with \$1,082,610 of that amount spent on dry holes yielding nothing for the driller. Ira Rinehart's Yearbook showed drillers completed 56 oil wells and 69 dry holes. Eighteen wildcats were drilled with 17 of them dry.

The county's oil and gas processing plants also added to the economy. The Oil and Gas Journal listed 2 natural gasoline plants with a capacity of 10 million cubic feet daily.

Reports from the Texas Employment Commission show some 71 persons were directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county with an annual payroll of \$275,324.

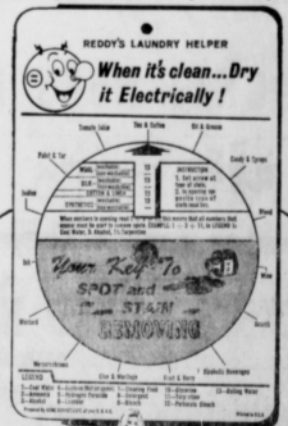
