#### Wheels for Life Bike ride fights Childhood Cancer



The Oath of Office was administered to David Davidson, James ambulance bay. Motion carried. Thomas, and Benny Osburn by City Secretary Donna Edwards.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Motion was made to appoint Lloyd McCord Mayor pro-tem. Alderman Lloyd McCord nominated Alderman Gene White. Motion to appoint Lloyd McCord carried by the vote of 3 for

McCord, 1 for White. Lucinda Mann and Debbie Chadzinski, Animal Control Officers, met with the Board to discuss the services they provide to cities for animal control. Motion was made to hire an Animal Control Officer on a part-time basis to clear up the problem of cats and dogs running loose in Clarendon pending working out of specifics. Motion carried. Motion was made to amend Ordinance #202 to bring it up-to-date. Motion carried.

A motion was made to pass a Resolution authorizing the Mayor to act as the City's Chief Executive Officer and authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the City's participation in the Texas Community Development Block

Grant Program. Delbert Robertson met with the Board to discuss moving the Associated Ambulance Authority to the Fire Station so that all vehicles would be at one central location. He discussed

the ambulances while the Fire Station building project is underway. This could be done now at less expense than in future years. The total cost of the additional bay would be \$10,000.00 with the City's portion being 1/3 or \$3,500.00. Motion was made to contribute \$3,500.00 for the

Motion was made to approve the part-time library helper working full-time during the period June 1 through August 31. Motion carried.

The problem with bats getting into the Library was discussed. The Librarian has asked for approval to hire a pest control company to try to discover where they are getting in. It was decided that the City personnel would continue working on the problem and the City would not hire

a pest control company at this time. Mayor Davidson asked for input from the Aldermen concerning what they would like to see done for Clarendon and why they were interested in serving on the City Council. Mayor Davidson also discussed his ideas which included having the Council set some long term goals and objectives, maintaining a positive attitude, developing job descriptions for City employees, improving communication between different organizations within the community and keeping the public informed.

Bills for the month of March were presented and ordered paid.

The Hall County Hospital District bill has been passed out of committee and should be passed in the House next week. The Senate should have it passed shortly thereafter.

The Collingsworth County bill, validating the newly voter-approved Water District, was signed by approved a budget for the years 1988-1989. This budget would be Governor Clements April 15, 1987.





**ORDINANCE #202 AMENDED** ANIMAL WARDEN ORDINANCE An Ordinance creating the office of Animal Warden and providing that Animal Warden's duties and compensation shall be fixed by the City Council; declaring it unlawful for any person who owns, possesses, or has the duty of caring for any animal, fowl, or reptile usually caged, penned or restrained by leash to permit such animal, fowl or reptile to run at large, prohibiting keeping, bringing or maintaining non-domestic animals, fowls, and reptiles, within corporate limits of City, and defining as a nuisance the failure to restrain such animals as provided; prohibiting a dog or cat to be at large upon public highways, streets, alleys, courts, squares, parks, sidewalks, other public lands, unfenced lots, tracts, or parcels of land within the corporate limits of city; defining "at large" "person", and "owner". Providing for decision to muzzle or keep within an enclosure or destroy a dog or cat which bites a person and which is found to be vicious or dangerous; declaring the act of permitting a dog's barking such as to disturb the community a nuisance; prohibiting the keeping of a dog or cat without a collar or harness and attached vaccination and license tags; providing for a license fee, tag, and the application therefor, for commercial annual license fees, and the exemptions from licensing; providing for vaccination against rables, the certification therefor, presentation of vaccination certificate upon application for license, appointment of duly licensed veterinarians as Deputy Tax Collectors and their duties and obligations; prohibiting transfer of license, tags, and vaccination certificates from one dog or cat to another dog or cat; acceptance of proof of vaccination; providing the duty of Animal Warden or Deputy to seize and impound dogs and cats running at large in violation of this Ordinance; permitting any person to take up and deliver any dog or cat found trespassing or running at large on their private property; prohibiting any person except those authorized from destroying any dog or cat; providing for the giving of notice by such person to Animal Warden and delivery without fee or charge of such dog or cat to Animal Warden, and the holding by Animal Warden of such dog or cat delivered; permitting the entry on any unfenced lot, tract, or parcel of land by Animal Warden, his deputies and/or Sheriff's Deputy, for purpose of chasing and impounding any dog or this ordinance; providing the duties of the Animal Warden to keep certain records of dogs and cats impounded, to keep unlicensed dogs or cats three [3] days and licensed dogs or cats five [5] days, after which if not redeemed by owner such dogs AND/ or cats are to be sold or destroyed providing the methods and fees for dogs and cats both licensed and unlicensed to be redeemed by owners; providing for the sale of unredeemed dogs and/or cats for the destruction thereof if not sold; providing for the right of redemption from the purchaser at such sale by the owner at any time up to thirty [30] days after sale by Animal Warden and the expiration time of such right of redemption; providing for the collection, records, and disposition of monies collected by Animal Warden in such sales; declaring interference with Animal Warden or other officer in catching or impounding a dog or cat running at large in violation of this Ordinance to be a misdemeanor, declaring the refusal of any person to deliver on demand any unlicensed or unvaccinated dog or cat to Animal Warden to be a misdemeanor; providing a requirement for vaccination of all dogs or cats over three [3] months old and the duties, records, certificates, and tags by veterinarians; providing for the taking of possession and detention for observation of any dog or cat or other animal displaying symptoms commonly associated with rabid animals and any dog or cat or other animal which is known to have bitten any person, providing for detention of any animal for rables observation for ten [10] days, destruction of such animal, release and detention fee of such animal, vaccination and licensing if required prior to release; providing that Animal Warden may take any dog, cat, or other animal which Animal Warden has reason to believe is infected with rables and making it unlawful to interfere with such taking; placing a duty on any person notified by Animal Warden that dog, cat, or other animal in such person's possession is infected with rables or other disease to deliver such dog, cat or other animal to animal warden or person designated by him for quarantine and observation; making it unflawful to knowingly keep, harbor, or maintain any dog, cat or other animal infected with rables or any

dog, cat, or other animal about which

animal warden has notified that there

is good reason to believe such dog,

cat, or other animal is infected with

rables or other disease; providing a

severability clause and a penalty clause; and providing for this ordinance to be cumulative of all other ordinances upon the same subject. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF **CLARENDON, TEXAS:** 

SECTION 1: There is hereby reated the office of Animal Warden. The Animal Warden shall be appointed by the City Council and shall perform such duties and receive such compensation as shall be prescribed by the City Council and this ordin-

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for any person who owns, possesses, or has the duty of caring for any animal, fowl, or reptile in its natural state or any such animal, fowl, or reptile usually confined to cages, pens, or restrained by leashes, to permit any such animal, fowl, or reptile to run at large on any public place or private property.

SECTION 3. The owner or other erson having responsibility or caring for any domestic animal, fowl, or reptile shall not keep, maintain, or bring such animal, fowl, or reptile within the corporate limits of the City of Clarendon, Texas, except under conditions as shall be set by the City

SECTION 4. Any person who shall willingly or negligently fail to restrain by cage, pen, or leash or other manner any animal, fowl, or reptile shall be guilty of maintaining a

SECTION 5. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or cat to permit or allow such dog or cat to run or be at large upon any public highway, street, alley, court, square, park, sidewalk, or other public land, or public property within the corporate limits of the City.

SECTION 6. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or cat to permit or allow such dog or cat to be at large upon any fenced lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the City.

SECTION 7. For the purpose of this ordinance, the following words or terms shall have the meaning assigned to them in this section:

AT LARGE. At large shall mean not under the control of the owner either by a rope, cord, chain, or other suitable material attached to a collar or harness, or not restrained securely within an enclosure or fence.

PERSON. Person shall mean an individual, corporation, partnership or firm, whether composed of one or more individuals.

OWNER. Owner shall mean any person owning, keeping, harboring or having control of a dog, cat or other animal, fowl, or reptile.

SECTION 8. If any dog or within the city shall bite, scratch, or otherwise attack any person, and the person so attacked was not at the time trespassing on the property of the owner or person having control of such dog or cat, or if it cannot be proved beyond a reasonable doubt that the person so attacked was provoking or teasing such dog or cat, the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas, shall have the authority to order and hold a hearing and, if such Council shall determine at such hearing that such dog, cat, or other animal, is vicious or dangerous to persons or other animals the Council may order that such dog or cat or other animal be kept muzzled, or that such dog or cat be kept within a sufficient enclosure, or that such dog or cat be delivered to the animal warden to be destroyed.

SECTION 9. The act of permitting a dog to bark in such a manner as to unreasonably disturb the inhabitants of the community is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

SECTION 10. It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain or keep a dog or cat more than three [3] months of age on any premises within the corporate limits of the city, unless the dog or cat wears a collar or harness securely attached to its body to which shall be securely attached a tag issued for the dog or cat by a licensed veterinarian, showing that the dog or cat has been, within the current year, vaccinated against rables as required by this ordinance and also securely attached to such collar or harness a license tag showing the dog has been licensed by the City of Clarendon.

SECTION 11. There is hereby levied on every dog and cat more then three [3] months of age on any premises within the corporate limits of the city, unless the dog or cat wears a collar or harness securely attached to its body to which should be securely attached a tag issued for the dog or cat by a licensed veterinarian, showing that the dog or cat has been, within the current year, vaccinated against rables as required by this ordinance and also securely attached to such collar or harness a license tag showing the dog has been

licensed by the City of Clarendon. SECTION 11. There is hereby levied on every dog and cat more than three [3] months of age, which is kept, harbored, or maintained by the owner in the corporate limits of the City, a license fee of one dollar [\$1.00]. Dog and cat licenses shall be issued at City Hall upon payment of the license fee and application made upon printed forms provided for such The Clarendon Press, Thurs., April 23, 1987

purpose which application shall state the name and address of the owner or keeper of such dog or cat and the name, breed, color, and sex of the dog or cat being licensed.

SECTION 12. Every person engaged in the commercial business of buying, selling, breeding, or boarding, or who owns, harbors or keeps three [3] or more dogs and/or cats in a kennel, shall pay an annual license fee of ten dollars [\$10.00] provided, however, that any person operation such kennels may elect to license dogs and/or cats as provided in this ordinance.

SECTION 13. Exemptions from licensing:

A. Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by a licensed veterinarian for the care or treatment of animals are exempt from the provisions of the preceeding article, except for such duties as are expressly stated.

B. The licensing requirements of this ordinance shall not apply to any dog or cat belonging to a non-resident of this City and kept within the the City for no longer than thirty [30] days, provided all such dogs or cats shall at all times while in the City, be kept within a building, enclosure, or fence or by restraint by the owner.

SECTION 14. Upon payment of the license fee, City Hall shall issue to the owner of any dog or cat a tag for each dog or cat which is licensed.

SECTION 15. City Hall shall not issue any license or license tag for any dog or cat without a certificate from a veterinarian, licensed to practice veterinary medicine in this state that such dog or cat has been vaccinated for rabies during the year for which the license applies.

SECTION 16. Dog and cat license tags shall not be transferred from one dog or cat to another dog or cat, and it shall be unlawful for the owner or person having custody of any dog or cat to transfer such license tag from the dog or cat to which the tag was issued to any other dog or cat.

SECTION 17. The City Secretary or City Clerk or any other person designated is authorized to accept proof that a dog or cat has been vaccinated in the current year in another place rather than the City of Clarendon, Texas, provided sufficient proof is given.

SECTION 18. It shall be the duty of the animal warden or any of his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy on duty to seize or impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, dogs or cats found running at large in violation of this ordinance, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise.

trespassing or running at large on tion shall be administered by a duly any person's private property may be taken up by that person and delivered to the animal warden or his deputies; but no such person is authorized hereby to destroy such dog or cat, said authority for the destruction of any dog or cat being hereby specifically reserved to the animal warden of any of his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy.

SECTION 20. Every person, other than a Sheriff's Deputy, the Animal Warden or his deputies, who takes up any dog or cat under the provisions of this ordinance shall immediately thereafter give notice thereof to the animal warden, and every such person, or any person in whose custody the animal may in the meantime be placed, shall deliver such dog or cat to the animal warden without fee or charge, and the animal warden shall thereupon hold and dispose of such dog or cat as though such dog or cat had been found running at large and impounded by

SECTION 21. The animal warden. his deputies and Sheriff's Deputy, are authorized to enter upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land for the purpose of chasing and impounding any dog or cat running at large thereon.

SECTION 22. The animal warden or his designated deputies, upon receiving any dog or cat shall make a complete registry entering the breed, color and sex of such dog or cat and whether licensed and the place and time of taking into custody. If the dog or cat has been licensed, he shall enter the name and address of the owner and the number of the license tag, and shall place a written notice

in the mail to the owner thereof. SECTION 23. It shall be the duty of the animal warden or any other person designated by him to keep a licensed dog or cat for a period of not less than five [5] days from the date of mailing notice to the owner as provided in Section 24 thereof. If at the expiration of said five [5] days, such dog or cat has not been redeemed by the owner, it may be sold or destroyed.

SECTION 24. It shall be the duty of the Animal Warden to keep a non-licensed dog or cat for a period of not less than three [3] days from the date of impounding. If, at the expiration of said three [3] days from the date of impounding, such dog or cat has not been redeemed it shall be destroyed or sold as provided for in this ordinance.

SECTION 25. The owner of any licensed dog or cat impounded may redeem such dog or cat at any time

prior to sale or destruction by having such dog or cat duly licensed, vaccinated against rables and the payment of fifteen [\$15.00] impounding fee and eight [\$8.00] per day board fee for each day such dog or cat shall have been impounded.

SECTION 26. At any time after the expiration of the period of time for redemption for an impounded dog or cat, as set out in this ordinance shall have expired, the animal warden or any person designated by him, may without further notice and without advertising in any manner, sell for cash not to exceed expenses incurred, any dog or cat not redeemed or reclaimed. All dogs and cats not redeemed or claimed or sold after the period of time for redemption has expired, shall therewith be destroyed by the Animal Warden or any person designated by him.

SECTION 27. The owner of any dog or cat at the time it is impounded may, within thirty [30] days afte such dog or cat is sold, redeem the same from such purchaser by paving to him the amount of purchase price paid by him to the Animal Warden and in addition thereto the licensing fee and vaccination charge, if any were incurred, and, in addition thereto a charge of One Dollar [\$1.00] per day for the number of days from the time of sale to the date of redemption. At the end of thirty [30] days from the time a dog or cat is sold, the right to redeem shall

**SECTION 28. The Animal Warden** or any person designated by him shall keep such records as are required to show in detail the disposition of all animals impounded and the money collected by him and such other records as are required by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas. All money collected shall be delivered as required to the City Hall, and shall be deposited into the General Fund.

SECTION 29. Any person who shall interfere with or attempt to prevent the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy from catching or impounding any dog or cat running at large, whether on public or private property, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 30. Any person who shall refuse to deliver any unlicensed or unvaccinated dog or cat to the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy upon demand for impounding, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 31. The owner of any dog or cat over three [3] months old is hereby required to have such dog or cat immunized for rabies by means SECTION 19. Any dog or cat found of anti-rables vaccine. The vaccinalicensed veterinarian. The veterinarian is to administer the vaccine and issue to the owner of the dog or cat a certificate of vaccination stating the name and address of the owner and the date of vaccination. The veterinarian shall also deliver to the owner of the dog or cat vaccinated a tag, on one side of which shall be stampted the words "rabies vaccine administered" or words of similar report, and the date of vaccination.

SECTION 32. When any dog, or cat or other animal displays symptoms commonly associated with rabid dog cat or other animal, such condition of the animal shall constitute good cause for the Animal Warden or his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy to reduce such animal to possession or cause the same to be done for observation.

SECTION 33. Whenever any person has been bitten by any dog, cat or other animal, the Animal Warden or the Sheriff's Deputy is fully authorized to order such animal to be impounded and/or quarantined for observation at such place as may be selected by the Animal Warden or Sheriff.

SECTION 34. When any animal has been impounded by the Animal Warden or the Sheriff, or any other person designated by them shall make such observations as are deemed necessary to determine whether such animal is infected with rabies. Such animal shall be kept for the purpose of observation for a period of not less than ten [10] days from the date of confinement.

SECTION 35. If any animal impounded or reduced to the supervision of the Animal Warden or the Sheriff or any person designated by them under the provisions of this ordinance, becomes restless, irritable, or shows signs of paralysis, it shall be killed under the direction of the Animal Warden, Sheriff, or any person designated by them and the head sent to a proper laboratory for diagnosis.

SECTION 36. If, at the end of the period of observation, any animal mpounded under the provisions of this ordinance is normal and healthy, it shall be returned to any known claimant thereof when a fee of three dollars [\$3.00] has been paid in full by the owner. When any dog or cat is impounded or otherwise retained for observation and tests for rables or other diseases, and such dog or cat is currently not licensed or vaccinated, such dog or cat shall not be returned to the owner or claimant at the end of the observation period unless such owner or claimant has caused the dog or cat to be duly licensed and vaccinated and fees therefor have been paid in full, as provided for in this ordinance.

SECTION 37. Whenever the Animal Warden or his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy has good reason to believe that any dog or cat or other animal is infected with rables, he shall notify the keeper, harborer, or persons claiming any such animal of his belief and it shall thereafter be unlawful for any person having such notice to in any manner interfere with such officer or his authorized representative in taking possession of the animal for the purpose of examination to determine if such animal is in fact infected with rabies or any other disease.

SECTION 38. When any perso has been notified by the Animal Warden orhis deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy that any dog, cat, or animal in his possession or custody or control is infected with rables, or is reasonable suspected of being infected with rables, or any other disease, it shall be the duty of such person to immediately deliver such animal to the Animal Warden or to any person designated by him for the purpose of quanrantining and observing of such animal.

SECTION 39. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly keep, harbor, or maintain any dog, cat, or other animal within the corporate limits of the City which is infected with rabies, or to keep, harbor, or maintain any dog, cat, or other animal after having been notified by the Animal Warden or his deputies or any Sheriff's Deputy that such animal is infected with rables unless the animal is kept under directions and conditions required by the Animal Warden or the Sheriff.

SECTION 40. Whenever in this ordinance an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a -misdemeanor, or wherever in such ordinance the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, where no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars [\$200.00], provided, however, that no penalty shall be greater or less than the penalty provided for the same or a similar offense under the laws of the State of Texas. Each day any violation of this ordinance shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 41. The sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by a valid judgement or decree of a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this ordinance.

SECTION 42. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances upon the same subject.

SECTION 43. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval, passage and publication as required by law.

#### Where are the Wildflowers?

With spring in the air, wildflowers are blooming abundantly along Texas roadsides. Bluebonnets, Indian paintbrushes, pink evening primroses, and phlox present a vibrant display of Mother Nature's harvest of hues.

But where do the wildflower seekers find their favorite tapestries of color as the blooming season progresses in summer?

For the many motorists who will be scouring the countryside looking for the most colorful displays, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation provides a special service. Representatives in the department's 24 district offices have available the locations of the most bountiful wildflowers in their districts. (Amarillo 806/355-5671 or Childress 817/937-2571). The department's 11 tourist bureaus also have this information.

With more than a million acres of highway right-of-way to maintain, the highway department is the nation's largest landscape gardener, giving Mother Naure a little help through native plant and wildflower seeding programs. The programs, in all 254 of the state's counties, cut maintenance costs, save water, and also control soil erosion on the roadsides.

"All the conditions are right to have an outstanding year for wildflowers," said Craig Steffens, supervising landscape architect for the department. "The late freeze confused the plants, but we're just now having warm nights which will tell the plants to burst out in beautiful colors."

#### Texas A&M researchers study cancer-fighting ability of selenium

COLLEGE STATION - The cancer-fighting ability of the trace element selenium and its most common compounds is studied increasingly these days, and two Texas A&M University researchers say they might find some answers with a system first developed

Hardly anyone knows what happens to selenium in the body after it is administered, said the scientists, veterinary pathologist Dr. George Stoica and chemist Dr. Kurt Irgolic.

But by using sophisticated chemica analysis in Irgolic's lab, he and Stoica believe they can identify selenoproteins and other selenium compounds present in rat tissues and in tissue samples grown from culture.


That would correctly show how selenium changed during normal body metabolism, information vital to understanding which actions of selenium are the most effective against cancer, the researchers noted. They also want to compare selenium compounds in normal and cancerous cells.

Several studies in America and abroad found that selenium wards off breast, lung, colon and rectal cancer. The Texas A&M researchers said selenium seems to reduce the number of Mayor tumors and lengthen patency periods.






