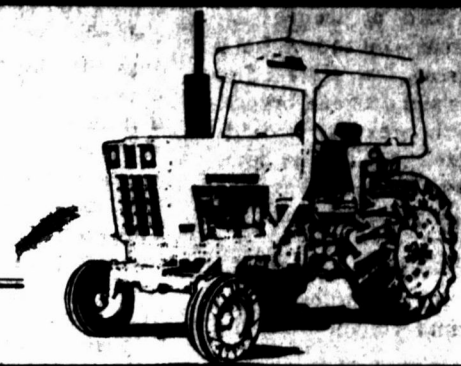

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## Kenneth King named to the Pro Bowl Team

Of all the Oakland Raiders, nobody wants to beat Houston more than ex-Oiler running back Kenny King.

Sitting at his locker after a practice for Sunday's National Football League wild-card playoff game, King tenderly unwrapped a bandage from the sore ankle that kept him out of last week's regular season finale.

"Nothing is going to keep me out of this game," said the man who came from Houston in an off-season trade for safety Jack Tatum and wound up being named to the American Football Conference Pro Bowl team.

"There will be more emotion for me than if we were playing Buffalo or Cleveland," conceded King. "I have a lot of friends at Houston, and I know they're going to be out to stick me. They won't be trying to hurt me, but they'll try to hit me as hard as they can."

King, who led Oakland with 761 yards rushing,

predicted that the Raiders will have "a pretty good day on the ground" against Houston.

"They run a pretty basic defense," he said. "If we can go out there and sustain some drives and keep the momentum, we'll have a good day against them."

"I know what I'm capable of doing against them."

King will be trying to outshine the man in whose shadow he played as a rookie, Earl Campbell. But even King would have to admit that Campbell has been spectacular this season, gaining 1,934 yards — nearly 500 more than the next best rusher in the NFL.

King, a Clarendon native and son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter King of this city, attended Oklahoma University and continued his football career from his play in Clarendon High School before joining the pro ranks as a Houston Oiler.

If Clarendon brags a little, remember that not every small town has a successful pro football player to brag about.

## Lone Star Gas Co. is prepared for winter weather

Texas and Oklahoma residents have already had a taste of cold winter weather, but Lone Star Gas Co. residential customers can anticipate clean, reliable gas heat even on the coldest days.

"We don't foresee an exceptionally long, cold winter this year," says Jack Cole, Lone Star's chief gas controller. "We anticipate a relatively normal winter, and we base that opinion on forecasts from the National Weather Service."

During the spring and fall when little gas heating or air conditioning is normally required, Lone Star takes millions of cubic feet of gas from producing fields and injects it into one of the company's nine active storage facilities located near Athens, San Angelo, Denton, Pottsville, Cisco or Wichita Falls.

On cold winter days when customer demand for natural gas is high, Lone Star can withdraw the stored gas from these reservoirs and route it to the homes and businesses where it is needed.

Efficient storage operations like these enable Lone Star to enter into gas purchase contracts that help hold down the cost of gas and, at the same time, assure dependable service to customers.

In the event Lone Star customers experience a long period of bitter weather, it is possible that some gas service to certain large industrial and electric generation customers might be curtailed.

"This does not mean that Lone Star does not have the gas to serve all its customers," Cole explains. "It simply means that the Lone Star pipeline network is designed to carry less than a peak-day load. Designing the system to carry the maximum load for only a few days per year would be like building a church large enough to handle the Easter Sunday congregation. The cost would be too high and would cause rates to go up."

In addition, Lone Star gas suppliers may experience weather-related reasons for curtailing deliveries to Lone Star. Frozen wellheads are one example.

"Our underground storage is instrumental in helping offset these short-term difficulties," Cole says. "Lone Star has not curtailed human needs customers, such as homes and hospitals. But large industrial users and electric generation plants contract for gas knowing that

their fuel may be cut back on a predetermined schedule during high customer demand periods."

As a result of those contracts, all industrial and electric generation customers facing possible curtailment are expected to have an alternate fuel supply available in case curtailments are necessary.

Lone Star curtailment procedures were approved by the Texas Railroad Commission in 1973.

## County gives jail contract

The Donley County Commissioners Court met December 24, 1980 at 9 a.m. in a special called session with these members present: W.R. Christal, County Judge, Gene White, Commissioner, prect. 1; Claude Moore, Comm. prect. 2; Buford Holland, prect. 3 and Wm. Chamberlain Comm. prect. 4 and P.C. Messer, County Clerk and ex-officio clerk of the court.

The following business was transacted, after a lengthy discussion, motion

was made by White and seconded by Moore that the Commissioner's Court enter into a contract with Gail Binkley of Amarillo, Tex. to build a jail in the amount of \$284,780.00, and enter into a contract with Southern Steel Co. for jail equipment in the amount of \$76,877.00 and allow the county judge permission to sign the contract for the court. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

## Governor's recommendations on education

It is my prediction that the Texas Legislature in 1981 will direct the most significant changes in our Texas public school system since the Guilmer-Aikin laws were enacted more than 30 years ago.

My recommendations in the area of education hopefully will point the way to making our elementary and secondary schools second to none in the nation.

They are based on the year-long study and report of a blue ribbon group, the Governor's Advisory Committee on Education, made up of 20 outstanding Texans from all parts of the State and headed by Dr. Willis Tate, president emeritus of Southern Methodist University.

Texasans are well served by their schools. But the schools must continue to improve to meet the needs of all our students. We must develop an educational program that is right for Texas.

I firmly believe that Texasans want a return to basics in the schools, and that is the heart of the proposals I will submit to the Legislature. The current curriculum is an aggregation of elements mandated by state law, State Board of Education policy, school board policy and federal law and regulation. Subjects are added to address perceived social ills or single interest purposes. None are ever deleted. The total curriculum has become fragmented and diluted.

Existing laws that mandate courses to be included in the curriculum should be repealed, and the State Board of Education should be given the authority to establish and implement a state basic curriculum. Reading, writing and arithmetic should be emphasized along with other basic subjects such as the physical and social sciences, the arts, physical education and vocational education.

I will also ask the Legislature to require a state competency test for teachers before they are certified and as a prerequisite for admission to approved teacher education programs. (The bill "grandfathers" present teachers and students enrolled in teaching programs).

Teaching excellence must be encouraged and rewarded. Toward this end, I am recommending an increase of about 22 per cent over a two year period in teacher salaries, plus increases in retirement pay and fringe benefits. I also advocate establishment of the position of master teacher for those who consistently demonstrate a high level of classroom performance. The designation would carry with it a raise in pay grade. It will keep good teachers in the classroom and aid recruiting of future teachers.

Some of the other priority items in my public school improvement program include:

—Establishment of a summer school pilot program to help students who are having learning difficulties and need help in certain areas, as well as to provide enrichment opportunities for the gifted.

—Creation of guidance centers for pupils with behavioral problems or character disorders who are disruptive in the classroom.

—Development of a comprehensive and efficient state vocational-occupational training program, based on actual and projected needs of the job market.

—Elimination of so-called social promotions.

—Encouragement of school district boards to relieve classroom teachers of excessive paperwork which reduces instructional time and effort.

—Cooperation of state and local policymakers to influence federal law and regulations from a Texas position on educational matters. Local control of our public schools must be maintained. Federal decision making is not the key to meaningful school improvement.

I am confident that a big percentage of these recommendations will be acted upon by the Legislature during the 1981 regular session. Toward that end, I have renewed the membership of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Education to assure strong, coordinated support of this program before the Legislature.

## Land Bank loans to increase to 10 1/2 percent

Talmadge P. Porter, manager of The Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Texas' billing rate on farm and ranch land and rural residence loans will be increased from 9 1/2 percent on farm and ranch loans to 10 1/2 percent. The rural residence loans will be increased from 10 1/4 percent to 11 percent effective January 1, 1981.

In making this announcement, Mr. Porter stated that

the increase in the billing rate became necessary because of the continued high cost of funds to finance the Banks' lending operation.

"While we regret that this action is necessary; even with the increase in our rate, it is still substantially under rates being offered by other lenders."

The Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout this area.

## You may purchase wildflower calendar titled "Beautiful Beautiful Texas"

Not many Texas wildflowers dare to bloom during mid-winter, but nearly two dozen of them blossom all year long around the border of a giant poster calendar which is both educational and colorful.

Titled "Beautiful, Beautiful Texas," the big calendar—nearly 2 by 3 feet—has individual portraits of 22 different wildflowers. The centerpiece is a peaceful landscape riotous with pasture flowers, a country cabin, oak trees and a windmill.

The originator—Carroll Abbott of Kerrville, the state's only full-time wildflower seed and plant collector—says the calendar has amuch longer life than the year for which it was printed.

"After the year is over," Abbott explains, "lots of folks frame the individual portraits or use them in craft projects such as note cards and decoupage. Some people even laminate the centerpiece as an unusual place mat."

The calendar is \$3.90, which includes sales tax and mailing costs, from Green Horizons, 500 Thompson Drive, Kerrville TX 78028.

Abbott has been in the business of helping save the wildflowers of Texas for more than 10 years. He has been in debt for the same number of years. Sales of the calendars help keep him going during the long, slow winters.

Abbott's unique idea of conservation is to make seeds available so that Texans can plant wildflowers in their homescapes and at their country places, schools and parks.

"I don't think you can save wildflowers just by passing laws," says Abbott. His mail-order seed com-

pany—Green Horizons—lists seeds from more than 200 different wildflowers, plus dozens of tree, shrub and cacti seed. He has just published a 24-page, colorful catalog, which costs \$1.

"But that's a bargain," Abbott says, "because each catalog has a \$1 seed coupon in it."

## Final tax payment due soon for 1980

Taxpayers who did not have enough 1980 federal tax withheld, or whose amended income estimates for 1980 changed substantially during the last quarter, are required to pay the final installment of estimated income tax by January 15, 1981, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The IRS notes that there is an exception to this rule for those taxpayers who file their returns and pay all taxes due by February 2, 1981. This exception applies whether the declaration is an original

or amended one. Generally, taxpayers must file estimated tax if their tax is expected to be \$100 or more and if they have more than \$500 in income not covered by withholding.

For additional information, a free copy of IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," can be ordered by calling the IRS number listed in the local telephone directory. If more convenient, it can also be picked up at most IRS offices.

## Rolling Plains Production Credit Assn. will have new building

**Texas Facts**  
AREA: Texas contains 275,416 square miles—large enough to accommodate 15 of the 50 states within its borders and still have 1,000 square miles left over. Texas extends 801 straight-line miles from north to south and 773 miles from east to west. Brewster, in West Texas, is the largest of the state's 254 counties with 6,204 square miles, an area larger than the State of Connecticut. The smallest county is Rockwall in North Central Texas with 147 square miles.

**BOUNDARY:** The boundary of Texas extends 3,816 miles with Louisiana on the east, Arkansas on the north-east, Oklahoma on the north, New Mexico on the west, and Mexico and the Gulf of Mexico on the south. The Rio Grande forms the longest segment of the boundary, 1,248 miles. Second longest segment, 726 miles, is formed by the Red River. The tidewater coastline extends 624 miles.

**WEATHER:** Characterized by generally mild temperatures, Texas weather ranges from a summer mean of 78 degrees in the Panhandle to 84 degrees in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, and from winter means of 40 degrees in the Panhandle to 61 degrees in the Valley. Average annual rainfall varies greatly—from more than 59 inches along the Sabine River (more than New Orleans), to less than 8 inches in extreme West Texas (as little as Phoenix).

# HEATS ON

It is highly probably that all of you have gained a few extra pounds over these holiday months. Some of us have gained enough to spare and some of us have just put on a little pound. Nevertheless, all of the folks in America are starting New Year's resolutions that begin: "I will lose weight". Let me suggest some nice vegetable recipes to help you along your lighter way.

Broccoli with Grapefruit

Sections  
2 lb fresh broccoli or 1 pkg frozen broccoli  
salt and pepper  
2 TBS butter  
1 grapefruit sectioned

Wash broccoli, split lengthwise all stalks thicker than 1 inch. Cook in 1 inch boiling salted water (go sparing on salt since that helps retain water and make you look fatter) Cook covered for 10 to 12 minutes. If frozen broccoli is used, cook according to directions on package. Drain; season to taste using very little salt. Add grapefruit sections, heat to serving temperature, turning once carefully. To serve, turn broccoli into serving dish, arrange grapefruit sections over top.

Crunchy Cabbage

1 medium cabbage  
2 tsp cooking salt, try salt substitute instead  
8 C boiling water  
4 TBS oleo  
1/2 tsp pepper

Remove outside leaves of cabbage; cut into quarters. Remove core; cut into 1/4 inch shreds. Place in rapidly boiling salted water, cover. Allow to boil rapidly for 3

minutes; turn off heat. Let stand for 3 minutes on burner. Cabbage should be crisp and crunchy. Uncover; drain. Add butter and pepper, serve immediately.

**Baked Shredded Carrots**  
4 med carrots  
salt and pepper to taste, go sparingly on salt  
2 TBS oleo

Grate carrots with medium grater. Place carrots in casserole dish lightly coated with oleo. Season and dot with oleo. Bake, covered, at 325 for 25 minutes.

**Braised Cucumbers**

1/4 C cold water  
1 cube chicken bouillon  
1 TBS oleo  
2 large cucumbers, peeled

Boil water, bouillon cube and oleo until cube is completely dissolved. Cut cucumbers into 1 inch slices; add to bouillon. Simmer, covered for 10 minutes or until cucumbers are tender. Drain; serve immediately.

**Lettuce Scramble**

1 med. head of lettuce  
1 TBS onion juice  
1/4 C water

2 TBS cooking oil, use sunflower or safflower  
4 large or 6 small eggs  
1/2 tsp salt

Discard bruised outside leaves of lettuce. Cut remainder in bite-sized chunks. Place in large skillet with onion juice, water and oil. Cover; cook about 10 minutes. Uncover; add eggs and salt. When egg whites begin to set, scramble. Place on platter, garnish with bacon bits (artificial bacon) or pieces of melba toast.

increase in the rates, tariffs and charges of West Texas Utilities Company for electric power and energy sold within the City be approved in an amount such that the adjusted total systemwide operating revenues for the Company be increased \$9,547,197 per annum, based on the adjusted test year ending June 30, 1980, which constitutes an increase of approximately 6.20%. Such Schedule of Rates, as are approved in accordance herewith, are those under which said Company shall be authorized to render electric service and to collect charges from its customers for the sale of electric power and energy within the corporate limits of the City until such time as said Rate Schedules may be changed, modified, amended or withdrawn, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen.

SECTION 2: The attached Schedule of Rates and Tariffs, being the same Schedule of Rates and Tariffs filed with approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas in its Docket No. 3473, are based upon the increase in total operating revenues prescribed herein and are hereby approved as filed. Such Schedule of Rates and Tariffs shall apply to all power and energy used by each customer on and after December 15, 1980.

SECTION 3: The kilowatt hours used in designing the rates resulting here from shall not be adjusted for price elasticity.

SECTION 4: Fees charged for the use of the streets, alleys, and public places within the City, up to 2% of the assessable revenues collected by WTU within the corporate limits of the City, shall be included within the Company's base rates. Any such use fee charged by the City in excess of 2% of the assessable revenues collected by WTU within the corporate limits of that City shall be allocated directly and surcharged to the customers within the corporate limits of the City.

SECTION 5: That the action of the Board of Aldermen enacting this Ordinance constitutes, on the date of its final passage, a final determination of rates for West Texas Utilities Company within the City of Clarendon in accordance with Section 43(e) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act.

SECTION 6: Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall be construed now or hereafter as limiting or

modifying, in any manner, the right and power of the City under the law to regulate the rates and charges of West Texas Utilities Company.

SECTION 7: If for any reason any section, paragraph, sub-division, clause, phrase, word or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by final judgement of a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, jurisdiction, clause, phrase, word or provision of this Ordinance for it is the definite intent of this City that each of such be given full force and intent for its purpose.

SECTION 8: That all Ordinances, Resolutions or parts of Ordinances or Resolutions in conflict herewith are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

If the retiree does not have a sufficient amount withheld from his or her annuity, an estimated tax must be paid in installments, which are due for 1981 payments on April 15, June 15, September 15, 1981, and January 18, 1982.

**Postal Service seeks to halt envelope stuffing scheme**

U.S. District Judge Barefoot Sanders has issued a preliminary injunction allowing the United States Postal Service to detain incoming mail addressed to American Service Directory, American Service, and American Commercial Publications, at four separate Dallas addresses, pending the outcome of a Postal Service attempt to obtain a mail stop order for mail addressed to the companies. The Postal Service claims that the three Dallas firms have misrepresented work-at-home projects in advertisements soliciting home workers for envelope stuffing jobs. Classified advertisements placed by the companies in publications throughout the United States claimed that persons could make up to \$2500 per month addressing and stuffing envelopes at home. Other advertisements read, "Home addressers wanted, \$500 per week possible, no experience required." If successful in obtaining the mail stop order, the Postal Service will return to sender all mail received addressed to the firms relating to the work-at-home offers. Postal Inspector in Charge W.R. Newsome stated that the action being taken against the firms was the result of an investigation by Postal Inspectors from the Dallas Office. Inspector Newsome indicated that the issuance of the mail stop orders was one of several methods currently being used by Postal Inspectors in their continuing efforts to prevent postal customers from being defrauded through the U.S. mails. **Farmers must pay estimated tax soon**

Individuals who earned at least two-thirds of their 1979 or 1980 gross income from farming have until Thursday, January 15, 1981, to make a 1980 declaration of estimated tax and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says. However, farmers who plan to file their 1980 income tax return and pay the total tax balance by March 3, 1981, are not required to make an estimated tax declaration, according to the IRS.

Additional information is available in the free IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax." These publications can be ordered by mail using the order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS number listed in the local telephone directory. If more convenient, they can also be picked up at most IRS offices.

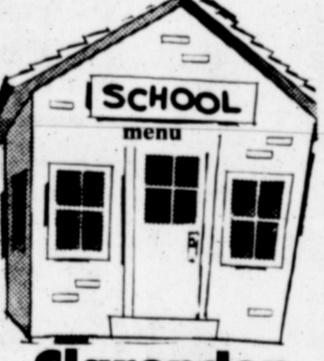

metal firebox and flue. This type can be installed to look like the traditional version, including enclosing the metal flue within a chimney. The third type is the free standing pre-fabricated unit that can be placed anywhere in the room. Each of these types should be safe and satisfactory if installed correctly and made of proper materials.

Several sizes of fireplaces are available. The size you choose determines the size of the logs you can burn. You should also decide what options you want, such as a gas or butane starter or an outside door or special drawer for ash removal. Also consider some of the heat-circulating devices that are designed to improve the ability of the fireplace to heat an entire room. Some of these could prove to be worthwhile investments for those of us who want our fireplaces to provide a major source of heat.

Before you decide upon a

contractor it is always wise to get several bids and to check carefully what you want before any of the actual work begins. Reputable companies and individuals are generally happy to show you examples of their work. After you have reached an agreement be sure a contract is completed which specifies what work is to be done, and the price and the timetable for completion of the job. While many contractors have drawn up their own standard contracts you should still be sure to review such a contract carefully to see that it states the precise agreement you have reached.

One final tip from our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division is to be wary of paying too much money before the work is completed to your satisfaction. A good rule of thumb is to hold back a substantial portion of the purchase price until the job is completed.

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**ANTIBIOTIC KNOW-HOW**

Antibiotics have been called the **miracle** or **wonder** drugs of medicine. Before their availability, what we now regard as simple infections frequently caused death.

There are a number of things we can do to help ensure antibiotic safety and effectiveness...**antibiotic know-how:**

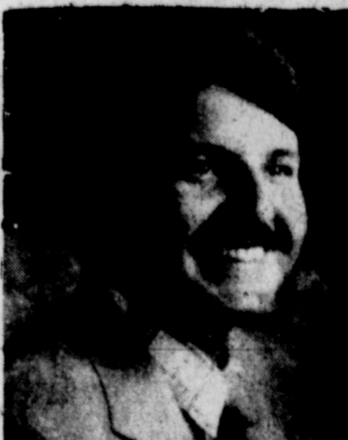
\*Always follow directions on prescription labels...take exactly as directed (before meals, after meals, and so forth),

\*Store medicine as directed on label; keep containers tightly closed; many liquid preparations require shaking before use.

\*Discard antibiotics after expiration date on label (ideally, there should usually be **no** antibiotic left after a round of treatment). If no expiration date is shown, use after a few months for capsules and tablets is questionable.

\*Do not stop taking antibiotics after only a few days even if you "feel better". It may take several days for antibiotics to achieve their full beneficial effect.

\*Do not take **tetracycline-like** antibiotics with milk or antacids containing calcium, magnesium, or aluminum...this may destroy the antibiotic's effectiveness.
