

#### **Preparation** of **Holiday Turkey**

Turkey is one of today's best

meat buys, both nutritionally and economically. Whole trukeys are sold oven-ready: dressed, washed, inspected and packaged. After turkeys leave the processing plant, no hands touch them until time for kitchen preparation.

A defrosted whole turkey requires only six minutes to prepare for roasting (without stuffing).

If stuffing is desired, we suggest it be prpared separately, placed in a covered casserole and cooked with turkey during last hour of roasting time.

Following label instructions for roasting, or use these simple directions to obtain a beautiful golden brown, ready-to-carve-andeat turkey.

1. Thawing: (if turkey is not frozen, begin with step 2.) DO NOT THAW POULTRY AT ROOM TEMPERATURE. Leave urkey in original nackaging and use one of the following methods:

and return legs to hock lock, band of skin or tie loosely. Tuck tips of wings"akimbo" under back of turkey. Neck skin should be skewered with a poultry pin or round toothpick to back of turkey to provide a nice appearance for

serving at table. the turkey is now completely ready for roasting to a delicious golden brown.

3. Open Pan Roasting: Place turkey, breast side up, on flat rack in shallow roasting pan, about 2 inches deep. Insert meat thermometer deep into thickest part ot thigh next to body, not touching bone. Brush turkey skin with vegetable oil to prevent drying. Turkey is done when meat thermometer registers 180 to 185 degrees F. and drumstick is soft and moves easily at joint.


Carving White Meat: Traditional Method: 1. Hold turkey breast firmly on cutting surface with fork. Place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible. Make deep cut into breast cutting toward

ribs. This makes a base cut. Each breast slice will stop at this horizontal base cut. 2. Slice breast by carving downward, ending at base cut. Keep slices thin and even. Kitchen Method: 1. Hold turkey breast firmly on cutting surface with fork. Using a sharp knife, carve each 31/2 to breast half away from ribs by cut-ting along keel bone and rib cage. 4 to 5 2. On cutting surface, carve each 4 1/2 to breast half into thin, even slices against grain of meat. Storage: Cut all turkey meat from bones before storing leftovers. Cooked turkey will keep up to 2 days in covered containers when refrigerated at 40 degrees F. or below. Stuffing: For those whose Thanksgiving is not complete without stuffing a turkey, follow these directions. Spoon prepared dressing loosely into body and neck cavities of turkey just prior to roasting. The stuffing should reach an internal temperature of 160 to 165 degrees F. to be sufficiently cooked. Remove stuffing from turkey immediately after roasting. Approximate Roasting Time

No Hurry: Place wrapped turkey on tray in refrigerator for 3 to 4 days; allow 5 hours per pound of turkey to completely thaw.

Fastest: Place wrapped turkey in sink and cover with cold water. Allow about 1/2 hour per pound of turkey to completely thaw. Change water frequently.

2. Preparation for Roasting: All equipment and materials used for storage, prparation and serving of poultry must be clean. Wash hands thoroughly with hot soapy water fefore and after handling raw poulty. Use hard plastic or acrylic

cutting boards to prepare poultry. Remove plastic wrapping from thawed turkey. Remove giblets and neck from the body and neck cavities. To remove neck, it may be necessary to release legs from band of skin or wire hock lock. Rinse turkey inside and out with cool water, pat dry with a paper towel



Carving a Turkey: Here are two excellant carving methods- the "traditional," often used for carving at the dining table, and the "kitchen method." As the name implies, the "kitchen method" is done in the privacy of kitchen and prepared slices are served at dining table. Dark meat is carved the same way for both methods.

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
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### Seminar on **Suicide - Drugs** and Prevention for Parents

The seminar serves as a forum where county tax assessor-Collectors from across the state can share ideas and discuss common issues related to their offices.

Wilma Lindley explained that Tax Assessor-Collectors can prepare themselves to meet future chalenges by participating in professional seminars such as the one at Texas A&M University. "The best way to insure smooth operation of the Tax Office is to stay proficient in your field and this requires training on a continual basis, " said Wilma Lindley.

## THANKSGIVING DINNER SHOWS TEXAS' AGRICULTURAL BOUNTY

Thanksgiving may have started in Massachusetts, but the foods that are eaten at this traditional meal have also become important Texas agricultural products.

The star of Thanksgiving dinner is the turkey and about 7.4 million of these are grown in Texas each year.

According to Dr. David Mellor, a poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas is about the 11th largest producer of turkeys in the country.

However, chances are that the whole turkey carved at your Thanksgiving table won't be from Texas.

"Most of the Texas-grown turkey ends up in value-added products such as cooked boneless breasts, luncheon meat and prepared products which are sent to the East and West Coasts," said Mellor.

In the meantime, fresh and frozen whole birds are shipped in from Arkansas, Missouri and other producing states for the Thanksgiving feast.

From the corn meal for cornbread stuffing to the whipped cream for your pumpkin pie, just about every dish served at Thanksgiving is produced in some form in Texas.

For example, if you're making candied or whipped sweet potatoes or sweet potato pie from fresh sweet potatoes bought earlier this fall, they're probably from Texas.

Sweet potatoes are produced in central Texas around Elgin, in the Lubbock area and in east Texas where they're harvested in the early fall.

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White potatoes are grown in Texas too, although by Thanksgiving most white potatoes are coming from Idaho and other northern states. The Texas white potatoes are harvested in July and Augusts. Fresh fall vegetables for your

dinner, especially winter squash, cauliflower, broccoli, carrots and spinach come from Texas' Rio Grande Valley and the winter garden area of southwest Texas.

Although many of these vegetables are shipped out of state for processing, they are also offered fresh through stores and farmer's markets.

For dessert, both pumpkin and pecan pies are Thanksgiving favorites. This year Texas produced about 39 million pounds of pumpkin. Many of them wound up as jack o'lanterns, but others will find their way into fresh pumpkin pie.

Pecans are grown commercially in 183 Texas counties. This year's crop is estimated at 45 million pounds. Altshough the pecans are slightly smaller due to the drought, they're of excellent quality. It's unlikely that cranberries

will ever be grown in Texas because they require a cold, wet climate.

If you make cranberryorange relish, however, you can add a touch of Texas by using oranges from the Rio Grande Valley. The Texas citrus harvest began in October and will continue through June.

The Thanksgiving meal illustsrates the fact that Texas agriculture is increasingly diverse. Although meat animals and cotton are still the major income-producers for the state, Texas produces hundreds of other crops.

In addition to producing food, agriculture provides another kind of bounty for the state. Dr. Carl Anderson, an agricultural economist with the Extension Service, said the economic impact of agricultural production in Texas is estimated at about \$33 billion and businesses related to agriculture employ more than 20 percent of the state's work force.

## **Statistics Service to Research Farm Conditions**

Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contracting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1988 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

"Changes in the national farm program and this summer's dry weather certainly had an impact on Texas agriculture, and these surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1988," State Statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Sound production and marketing decisions require good, reliable information and some advanced planning, and our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their plans," Findley added.


The Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum this year because of budget cuts, so

Findley is urging producers to return their mailed questionnaires as soon as possible.


"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contracted it is important to provide the requested information, since on producer represents similar operations of the same type and size our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley noted.







science teachers in Texas are eligible for a grant program providing opportunities for school enrichment and professional development.

The program, called Growth Initiatives for Teachers (GIFT), is entering its fourth year in Texas under the sponsorship of GTE and GTE Southwest. Texas Water Development Board To Conduct Water Conservation Workshops at Farm and Ranch Show

Workshops to help farmers learn about efficient irriga-

tion methods will be conducted by the Texas Water Development Board at the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show on Nov. 29-Dec. 1.

"At the workshops, we'll discuss modern irrigation techniques and show how they can save water and money for farmers," said Comer Tuck, head of the state agency's Agricultural Conservation Unit.

"Information about assistance programs that are designed to help farmers evaluate existing irrigation equipment and buy new equipment will also be provided," Tuck said.

Through its Agricultural Conservation Unit, the Board administers the state's Grants to Districts program. Grants are available to local soil and water conservation districts, surface water irrigation districts, and underground water conservation districts for the purchase of portable testing equipment. Tests can evaluate the efficiency of on-farm irrigation systems and other water conservation practices.

The Board also administers another state program that provides local conservation districts with money to loan to farmers for the purchase of efficient irrigation equipment.

The Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show workshops will begin at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 29, and Wednesday, Nov. 30, and at 3 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 1.

Since starting the program in 1983 as a pilot effort in North Carolina, GTE has expanded the program to eight states and the District of Columbia. Over 500 math and science teachers, including 128 form Texas, have won the grants.

The GIFT grants allow experienced math and science teachers to broaden their subject knowledge, network with other talented teachers, and carry out a classroom-based project for the benefit of students and school. The program is designed to offer new opportunities and enhance secondary school teaching.


