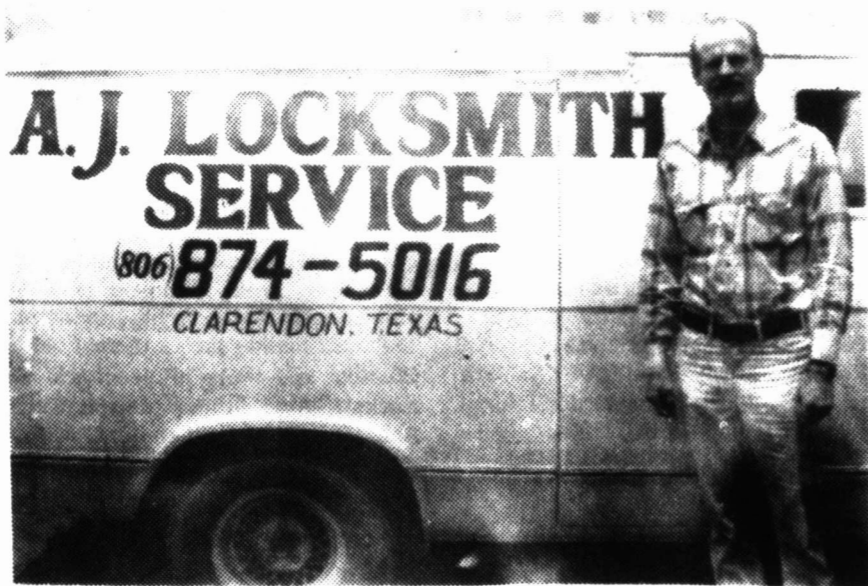

James T. Carter to retire June 12th

Since June 1985, James T. Carter has pastored the First United Methodist Churches in both Clarendon and Hedley. On Sunday, June 12, he will retire, not only from these churches, but from 43 years in the ministry, as well. Rev. Carter and his wife, Juanita, will make their home in Lubbock, returning to the place where his path to the ministry began.

Born October 23, 1922 in Cooper, Texas, Rev. Carter graduated from Frenship High School in Wolforth in 1939 and Texas Tech in 1947. While at Texas Tech, he pastored churches in Monroe, Becton and Lakeview. From 1947-48, he served as associate pastor at Asbury Methodist Church in Lubbock, before graduating from Perkins School of Theology in 1951.

After graduation, Rev. Carter was appointed the first pastor of Forest Hill Methodist in Amarillo, later moving to Polk Street Methodist where he served as associate pastor from 1954-56. Between 1956-72, he pastored in Panhandle, Lockney, Tulia, returning once again to Asbury United Methodist in Lubbock. From 1975-85, Rev. Carter served as associate pastor at Polk Street United Methodist before being appointed to the Clarendon/Hedley churches.

Rev. Carter has held and holds many positions within the Northwest Texas Conference. During his years of active service, he served on Boards of Education, Missions, and World Peace and was the Conference Health and Welfare Commission Chairman for six years. He was a member of the Wesley Foundation in Canyon-both board member and chairman for eight years. He held numerous other board and committee responsibilities, including Elementary Camp Director, District Youth Director (several times) and District Missionary Secretary.

The memberships of both churches have been very pleased and proud to have James Carter serve as pastor for the past three years. Members have been especially impressed with Rev. Carter's fine sermons and his dedication and sincerity in discharging his responsibilities as a pastor. The quiet and efficient way he goes about handling the many assignments that he has in the Conference outside of his pastorate is impressive. He and Juanita will be sorely missed, although all members wish them health and happiness as they begin this new journey of their lives. Perhaps they will have more time to

spend with their four grandchildren! Rev. Carter says both he and Juanita are looking forward to returning to Lubbock and becoming a member of the Asbury United Methodist Church, a place full of wonderful memories.

Replacing Rev. Carter will be Rev. Terry Tamplen from Snyder. He and his wife, Vicki, have two young children. As Clarendon and Hedley bid farewell to the Carters, both churches welcome the Tamplen family to this area.

Rate increase for GTE

After failure to gain acceptance of an offer to withdraw its 1984 rate filing and failure to negotiate a settlement concerning tax and expense issues, GTE Southwest has filed updated rate schedules in accordance with directives of the Public Utility Commission of Texas to update the company's unresolved 1984 filing for \$84.8 million of additional revenues. The financial information contained in the updated rate filing demonstrates the company has an \$81 million revenue deficiency based on a rate of return which is actually lower than the commission's last authorized rate of return.

GTE Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley said, "The last time the company raised rates was in 1983. We have known with increased expenses and capital investments that eventually we would have to ask for increased revenues. With the downturn in the Texas economy we wanted to delay this as long as possible. However, since we are being required to update the current financials and process the merits of the rate filing, we have decided to seek the rates necessary to cover the revenue deficiency."

The company filed a petition early in 1987 to withdraw its 1984 filing, but some participants in the case resisted the move, voicing concern the company could be overearning because of changes in state and federal tax laws. As a result, the company was ordered to prepare the updated information by April 30. An extension was granted to allow for additional negotiation, but the parties to the case were unable to resolve the issues.

Langley said the four-year delay in the rate proceeding illustrates the complexities caused by deregulation and other major changes affecting the telecommunications industry in the 1980s.

GTESW initially filed for \$84.8 million in additional revenues in February 1984. Prior to hearings, the case was suspended to await a

decision in another commission proceeding concerning changes brought about by the AT&T divestiture and competition in long-distance service. Due to the many complexities associated with these issues, a final order was not issued in this proceeding until September 1986.

"Our updated financials show we are not overearning," Langley said. "We have factored in all the changes affecting the company, both positive and negative, and the result is that the company still has an \$81 million revenue deficiency."

"The reduced expenses, such as the reduction in both state and federal taxes, have been more than offset by increases in other expenses and in our investment in providing service in the state," he said.

The company now expects the administrative law judge in charge of the company's filing will set a schedule of dates to allow other parties in the case to file appropriate testimony and data, and set hearing dates to consider the new proposed rates.

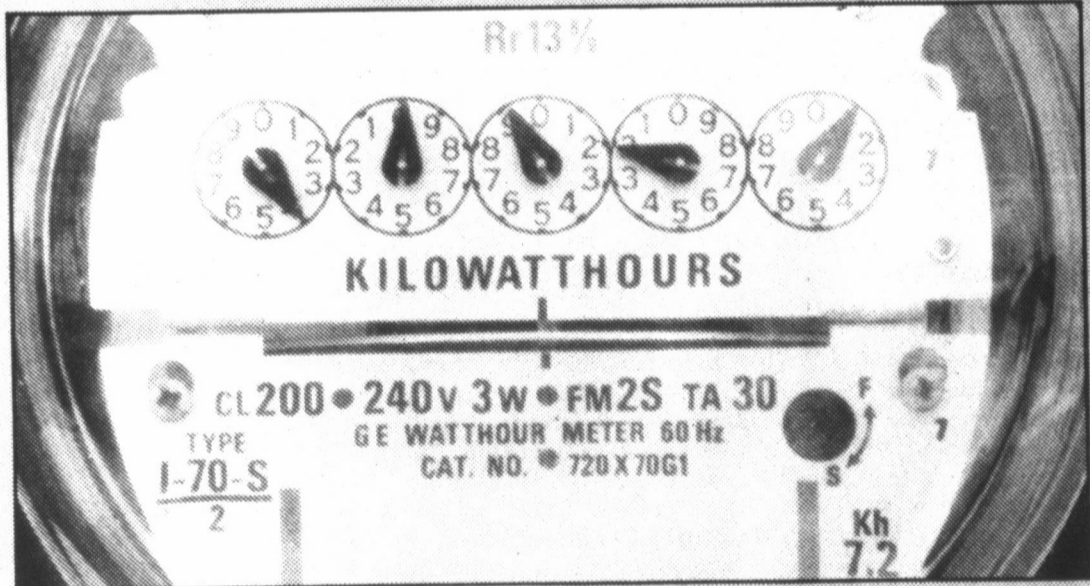

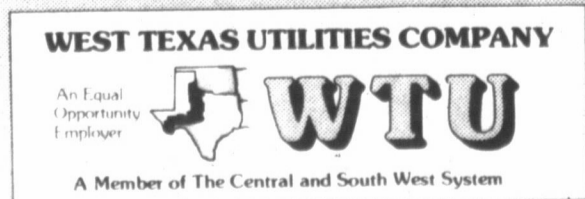

Minutes of the May 10, 1988 meeting were read and approved.

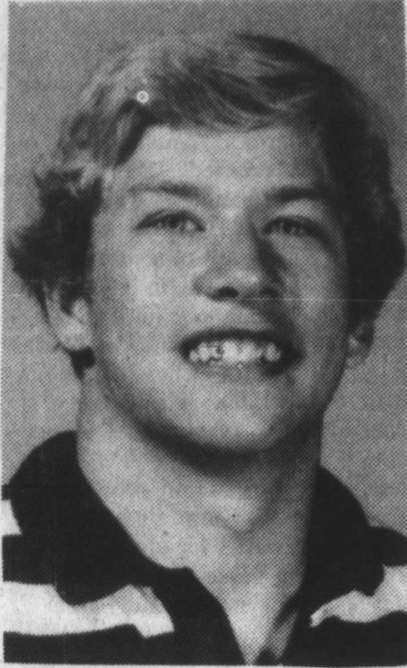
Delbert Robertson discussed the City Hall/Fire Station roof with the Board of Aldermen. Motion was made and carried to advertise for bids on replacing the roof.

Deuteronomy 6:7-9
FEAR NOT

By JON LEGGITT

The consistent message of the Lord in both Old and New Testaments to his troubled people is: "Fear not, I am with thee."

Let's take a brief look at some of the trying situations Biblical characters found themselves in when God's loving, calming voice came, and, flooding them with His peace that passes all understanding, said, "Fear Not!"

In Genesis 15:1, the Bible says, "After these things the word of the Lord came unto Abram in a vision, saying, Fear not, Abram: I am thy shield, and thy exceeding great reward." "These things" could refer to several difficult situations: the call of Abram at age seventy-five to leave his homeland for an unknown destination (Genesis 12:1), famine and

other troubles in Egypt, or the rescue of his nephew Lot from invading kings. And what of the vision itself? Would not that be terrifying to almost anyone? Abram -- later to become Abraham -- had found himself in many frightening positions, but the Lord says to him, "Fear not."

Ten of the twelve sent out by Moses to spy out the land of Canaan (Numbers 13:17) brought back a fearful report of Anak, which come of the giants: and we were in our own sight as grasshoppers, and so we were in their sight" (Numbers 13:33). But the Lord, through the mouths of Joshua and Caleb, said, "...their defense is departed from them, and the Lord is with us: fear them not" (Numbers 14:9).

After the terrible greed and disobedience of Achan which brought defeat for the Israelites, and dreadful, heart-sickening punishment to Achan's house, "...the Lord said unto Joshua, Fear not, neither be thou dismayed. ..." (Joshua 9:1).

Joshua 10:25: "and Joshua said unto them, Fear not, nor be dismayed, be strong and of good courage, for thus shall the Lord do to

all your enemies against whom ye fight." This word came after the awesome display of the Lord's power in making the sun and moon stand still, and after yet another bloody bout between the war-sick Israelites and their enemies.

The psalmist, who had been through about as much difficulty as any man could imagine, could still say, in Psalm 118:6, "The Lord is on my side; I will not fear: what can man do unto me?"

In Mark 6, Jairus, a ruler of the synagogue, came to Jesus requesting healing for his daughter. As they were on their way to bedside, a servant met Jairus with the news that the girl had died. "Be not afraid, only believe," said Jesus, and in verses 41 and 42, the daughter was brought to life again.

From these few examples, we see God's people in some of life's most traumatic circumstances: war, famine, trembling at the awesome display of God's supernatural power, outnumbered and outclasses militarily by giants, uprooted from familiar surroundings, heartsick from the results of sin, in the depths of sorrow at the passing of a loved one. Yet,

Do the circumstances of your life have you cowering in fear, not knowing what will happen, or where to turn? Have daily cares, like financial matters, caused you to become disheartened? Does it seem that the Lord is not aware of your situation, or that He does not care? Do you have a giant of a problem in your life? Listen as He speaks to those concerned about both the big things and the little things of life in the twelfth chapter of Luke: "...your Father knoweth that ye have need of these things..." (verse 30. "...Seek ye the kingdom of God; and all these things shall be added unto you" (verse 31). And what better summary of what God wants for you could be found than in verse 32: "Fear not, little flock: for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom."

Glyndol Holland, retiring president, presented information on the Lion's Club accomplishments during

the fiscal year. The following information is from that report:

The Hedley Lions' Club began an active year of community service in July. Members held a goal setting meeting and outlined community service projects as the number one goal for the year.

Five major fund raising projects were held this year. The Cotton Festival was the major project. Others included two trap shoots, a broom sale, and a pancake supper. Proceeds from all of these events were directed back to community projects.

Tiffany Wilkinson was also supported in her efforts to be Miss Pre-Teen America with a \$50.00 donation. In all, approximately \$6,200.00 was returned to the community through these projects.

Mr. Holland also reported that the maintenance of the Lions' Den serves as a valuable asset to the community. The Den provides a meeting place for

various community groups, funeral meals, family reunions, etc. The Lions' Club spent approximately \$2,750.00 to maintain and upgrade the Lions' Den during this fiscal year. Donations for Den use brought in only \$375.00.

The Club also participated at the state and international level. A donation of \$125.00 was given to the Girl's Town Coat and Shoe Fund. Eye specialists commonly use one or more medicine groups to treat this condition. Each group has its own special advantages and disadvantages.

Beta Blockers: These medicines reduce eye pressure by slowing the production of aqueous fluid within the eye. *Timolol* was the first of the beta blockers used in glaucoma.

Adrenalin-Like Agents: Epinephrine and related compounds are thought to ease eye pressure by improving eye fluid drainage.

Cholinesterase Inhibitors: *Physostigmine, demecarium bromide, and echothiopate iodide* cause drainage of aqueous fluid from within the eye for prolonged periods of time (several days for some of these drugs).



Burial flag benefit explained by VA

In 1987 the Veterans Administration issued more than 350,000 American flags for burial or memorial purposes. The flags are used to drape the caskets of deceased veterans and are presented to the next of kin or close friend or associate of the deceased. Flags are issued at VA regional offices and most local post offices.

In recent years, many VA cemeteries and other VA facilities have adopted an innovative way to honor the memory of those who served through the creation of an "Avenue of Flags" program.

Last year alone, over 4,000 flags which had been presented to families or friends of deceased veterans, were donated to the VA. When a flag is donated, a Certificate of Appreciation is presented to the donor and the flag becomes the property of the VA.

On roadways or along walkways at VA facilities throughout the country, standard burial flags are flown from uniformly spaced staffs. VA facilities which participate in the "Avenue of Flags" program erect the display on Veterans Day and Memorial Day. They may also do so on other days of patriotic observance such as Flag Day and Independence Day. If more flags are received than needed for display, a rotation system is used to insure they all are eventually flown.

VA's Department of Memorial Affairs administers the National Cemetery System comprising 111 national cemeteries in 38 states and Puerto Rico. Burial in a national cemetery with available grave space is open to all veterans discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, as well as eligible dependents of veterans.

Information on burial flags and other benefits is available by contacting the nearest VA office listed in the phone directory under U.S. Government.

VA's home loan guaranty program revised

Legislation recently signed by President Reagan has made sweeping changes in the Veterans Administration's Home Loan Guaranty Program, Administrator of Veterans Affairs Thomas K. Turnage has announced.

The Veterans' Home Loan Program Improvements and Property Rehabilitation Act revised the calculations for determining the amount of the loan guaranteed by the VA. Previously, the maximum VA-guaranty on a conventional home loan was \$27,500. Under the new law, for loans of \$45,000 or less, 50 percent of the loan is guaranteed, up to a maximum of \$36,000, but not less than \$22,500. The changes apply to any loan closed on or after February 1, 1988, unless a guaranty commitment was made on or before Dec. 31, 1987.

In addition, the new law reinstated the one percent funding fee on VA-backed home loans, effective 21, 1987, through Sept. 30, 1989.

Other changes in the loan guaranty program include:

- *A limitation on refinancing of existing loans to 90 percent of the appraised value of the property. This limitation takes effect Feb. 20, 1988, and does not apply to veterans refinancing an existing VA loan with a new loan at a lower interest rate.

- *A five percent downpayment of VA-guaranteed loans for manufactured homes. This change applies to any manufactured home loan closed on or after Feb. 1, 1988.

- *Restrictions on the assumability of a VA home loan. Veterans intending to sell their homes before the loan is paid in full must notify the lender. If the lender or the VA finds the purchaser is not a good credit risk, the unpaid balance may be declared immediately due and payable. If the purchaser is acceptable, the veteran will be released from liability to the VA. This change applies to loans for which guaranty commitments are made on or after March 1, 1988.

- *A relaxation of occupancy requirements for new loans and refi-

nanced loans. For interest rate-reduction refinancing loans only, previous occupancy by a veteran or active-duty service member will now satisfy the requirement that the veteran occupy the home in order to be eligible for the VA-backed loan. For new loans and other refinancing loans, the occupancy of the spouse of an active-duty service member will satisfy the occupancy requirement if the member is unable to occupy the property because of his or her duty status. These changes apply to loans made on or after Jan. 21, 1988.

Further information can be provided by contacting the nearest VA regional office listed in the telephone directory under U.S. Government.

The VA Home Loan Guaranty Program was established in 1944 as part of the original GI Bill to help returning World War II veterans. The program helps veterans finance the purchase of homes at a favorable rate of interest and with little or no downpayment. Since the program began, VA has guaranteed more than 12 million home loans.

- All ingredients should be at room temperature for best results.
- Using a pastry brush to grease a Bundt pan will help assure a thorough job without messy hands.
- To prevent sticking, leave the cake in the pan to cool only for the specified time.
- Serve slices of Cream Cheese Pound Cake buttered and toasted for breakfast.

Cream Cheese Pound Cake

- 1 1/2 cups (3 sticks) butter or margarine, softened
 - 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, at room temperature
 - 3 cups sugar
 - 6 eggs
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
 - 3 cups sifted Martha White All-Purpose Flour
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - Confectioners' sugar
- Preheat oven to 325° F. Grease and flour a 10-inch tube pan or 12-cup bundt pan. Beat butter and cream cheese until well blended; add sugar and cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Blend in vanilla. Sift together flour and salt; blend into creamed mixture. Spoon batter into prepared pan. Bake 1 hour 10 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 5 minutes; turn out onto wire rack and cool completely. Dust with confectioners' sugar, if desired.

Customer relations key to businesses

"Word of mouth" often can "make" or "break" a retail business. Research indicates that a dissatisfied customer typically tells about 10 other people, and most retailers, especially in smaller towns, can not afford to lose that much business.

The key to a successful retail business is customer satisfaction, says Dr. Don Stebbins. Recent surveys show that it's not unusual for consumers in small towns to spend more than half of their income in larger cities, notes Stebbins, a community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. To a large extent, higher prices are not the problem. If necessary, most consumers are will-

ing to pay slightly higher prices and support local merchants if they are satisfied in other ways.

That means excellent customer relations - a low cost, effective way for merchants to keep present customers and gain new ones.

Good "word of mouth" advertising is the cheapest and best advertising that a merchant can get, emphasizes the specialist. More merchants need to do a better job and make sure that satisfied customers are spreading the word.

Good customer relations include asking questions to understand customer needs. Many times customers need assistance in selecting the correct model, size or quality of some product. It's important to know enough about the product to help the customer make the best choice.

A sincere smile on the face of a courteous, well-groomed salesperson who is giving a customer full attention can make a favorable impression. On the other hand, an indifferent attitude by the sales person can easily send a customer to a competitor.

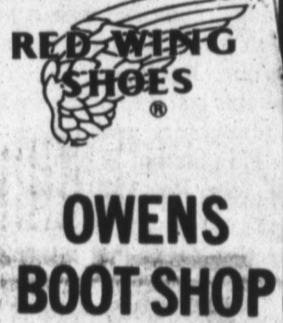
Even the best managed store will occasionally have a dissatisfied customer.

Experts in customer relations tell us that there are effective ways to deal with the irate person. The most important thing is to allow the unhappy customer to express his feelings and then find a agreeable solution.

Stebbins advises community business leaders to take the initiative in encouraging and assisting merchants to adopt improved customer relations procedures.

Everyone in the community benefits if the retail trade and service sector is pleasing to customers. Businesses are more likely to be profitable, customers happier and jobs in retailing more secure. And more dollars stay in town to possibly create more job opportunities.

Community development specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service offer training in customer relations. Interested merchants can contact their local county Extension Agent to arrange a training program.

Farm Bureau News

The Texas Farm Bureau and five of its members have filed suit against Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng and the USDA, seeking inclusion of hay as a perishable crop under the Immigration Reform and Control act of 1986.

In a letter to Lyn, TFB President S.M. Tru of Plainview, explained that hay is "perishable, labor intensive, and has critical and unpredictable labor demands." True said Hay's inclusion as a perishable crop will alleviate serious labor problems experienced by hay producers.

Hall-Donley County Farm Bureau President Melvin Srygley said, "making hay a perishable crop will make it eligible for the Special Agricultural Workers (SAW) program. This is a chance to help livestock producers who have been shut out of this important source of labor."

A similar suit was filed in Lubock last year seeking inclusion of cotton in the Act. That suit resulted in cotton being classified as a fruit, making it eligible for the SAW program. The five plaintiffs joining Texas Farm Bureau is the suit are Surphur Springs dairyman Don Smith, trinity cattleman Russ Arnold, rancher James Wood of Gilmer, and Warren and Anna Madson, ranchers from McLennan County.

BLUEBERRY CREAM CHEESE PIE

- 1 1/4 C. graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 C. melted butter or margarine
- 1/4 C. firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/4 C. ground pecans
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 (8 oz.) pkg. softened cream cheese
- 1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
- 1/3 C. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 C. fresh blueberries
- 1/2 C. sugar
- 1 1/2 T. cornstarch
- 1 1/2 T. lemon juice
- 1/3 C. water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Combine cracker crumbs, butter, brown sugar, pecans and cinnamon. Press into 9-inch pie pan. Bake 5-10 minutes or until lightly brown; cool. Cream softened cream cheese with electric mixer. Add sweetened condensed milk, 1/3 cup lemon juice and vanilla, blending until smooth. Pour into cooled crust. Chill 2-3 hours. Meanwhile, combine blueberries, sugar, cornstarch, 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice and water. Cook over medium heat until boiling mixture is thickened and clear. Cool. Spread evenly over top of pie. Makes 10 servings.

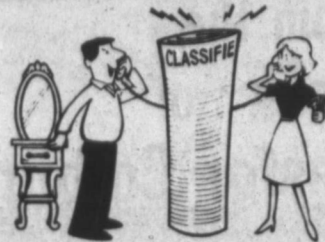

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NOTIFICATION

This notice is being furnished as required of all public water systems in the United States by the Environmental Protection Agency in 40 CFR 141.34.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) set drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

- if your home or water system has lead pipes or
- if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, or
- if the home is less than five years old, or
- if you have soft or acidic water, or
- if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Clarendon's water is well below acceptable limits for lead and is tested to insure delivery of minimally corrosive water to you. However, tap water may contain higher levels of lead leached from pipes in your home. Some home water treatment devices make water more corrosive and thus can increase the amount of lead leached from your pipes.

You can do the following to minimize exposure:

1. Flush each cold water faucet until the water is as cold as it will get before using the water from this faucet to drink or for cooking. This is especially important if the water has set in the pipes for several hours. Please remember other household water use such as toilets, bathing, and laundry will flush water thru the pipes and reduce the time the tap should be flushed.
2. Do not use hot tap water for drinking or cooking. Hot water dissolves lead faster than cold water. Especially avoid using hot tap water to make baby formula. If hot water must be used for drinking or cooking, use cold water after flushing the tap and heat.
3. Make certain only materials conforming to the federal law regarding lead content are used for any plumbing repairs or new plumbing work in your home.

The City is replacing lead joint lines as they come across them.
