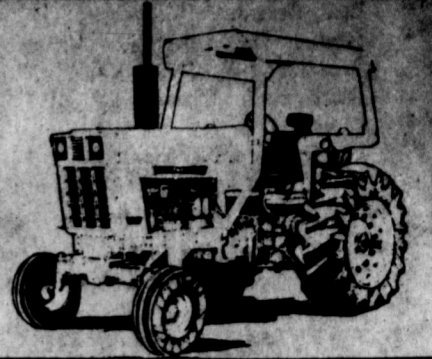

Resolution honors Texas Iranian hostages

Senator Bill Sarpalius introduced a resolution Wednesday, January 21, 1981 honoring three Texans who were among the Iranian hostages released Tuesday. The Senate passed the resolution unanimously.

The three Texans honored by the Panhandle Senator and the full Senate are Lieutenant Commander Robert Engelmann of Hurst, William Royer, Jr. of Houston and Marine Sergeant John McKeel, Jr., of Balch Springs.

The resolution praised the bravery of the three Texans, "held in captivity in Iran for 444 days by a group of barbaric fanatics". Sarpalius' resolution told of the three Texans being "subjected for 14 months to physical abuse by being bound, gagged, blindfolded, pushed and shoved often in the presence of mobs of maniacal, militant Iranians who taunted and flaunted their captives before the world."

Sarpalius, through his resolution, praised the courage and forbearance and dignity of the hostages, calling it "unsurpassed in history." The resolution also invited the three to visit the Senate for a personal welcome, heartfelt thanks, and recognition of valor. Additionally, each man will be presented with a Texas flag which was flown over the Texas Capitol on January 20, 1981, the day the former hostages were released.

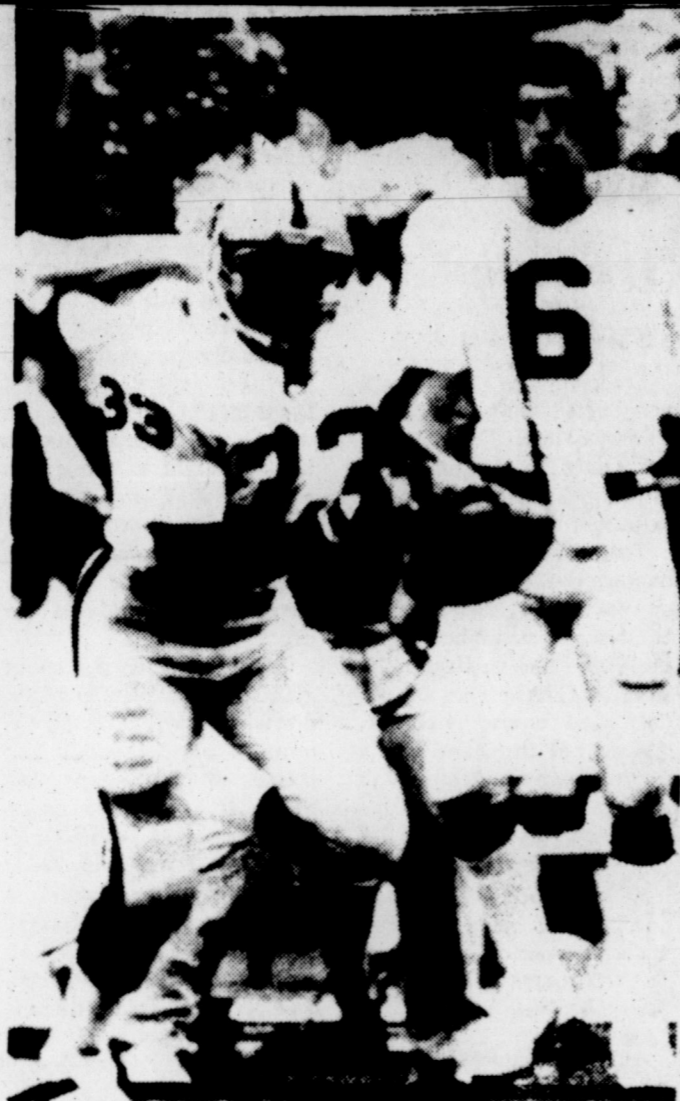

In the Other Breeds division of the heifer show Jamie McAnear exhibited the champion heifer with her Shorthorn winter heifer calf. Rodney McAnear's late spring yearling Shorthorn heifer was Reserve Champion heifer. Rodney also won first place with his Shorthorn junior heifer calf and Christie McAnear placed first with her Shorthorn senior heifer calf. Jamie McAnear also placed third with her Shorthorn heifer in the spring yearling class. They were competing with crossbred Chianina Limousin and Simmental heifers in the other Breeds and Crossbred Divisions.

In the Hereford Heifer Show Melody Moreman placed fourth with her junior heifer calf.

King, Raiders win Super Bowl

For the average football fan, the Superstar players (and even just the good ones) are simply distant people, far away from the television screen—and far away from average people. Often, one feels like a lonely face in the crowd, and at times we'd love to get to know the heroes we idolize on Sunday afternoon. Kids dream of being on the field, quarterbacking a championship team, or running over Mean Joe Green, tackling Earl Campbell, or playing alongside the likes of "Too Tall" Jones.

Everyone in Clarendon was proud of All-State Running Back Kenneth King as he was rushed by numerous College Scouts following his senior year in high school. I recall one occasion when we all swore that Darrell Royal was eating with Kenneth in the cafeteria. THE Darrell Royal, of University of Texas fame. I was awed.

Our pride swelled further as we watched Kenneth (somebody renamed him Kenny) running through the likes of Nebraska, Texas, and Missouri on television. We felt a distinct twinge of resentment his senior year as he blew open gaping holes for Billy Sims to run his way to the Heisman Trophy two years ago. Somebody saw his talent, however, as he was drafted and signed by the Houston Oilers last year.

Earl Campbell was too big a shadow for a talent like King to hide in for any period of time. He had to go somewhere where he could play. In the spring of 1980, King was traded to the Oakland Raiders for strong safety Jack (they call me assassin) Tatum. Sportswriters snickered. "Tatum for King? Ridiculous!" King didn't buy that. He went to Oakland, as enthused as a school boy. Clarendon football fans were excited to see the results of the trade.

Not much was said until the start of the season when King took a wide pitch and sprinted 89 yards for a touchdown. It made Howard Cosell's "Monday Night Football" halftime highlights. King and the Raiders improved greatly throughout the season, including a big win over Pittsburgh. The Raiders were rolling. King was hobbled by a bad ankle in midseason, but was spectacular the times he played.

In the Houston game, the Raiders took a wildcat victory and King was spectacular in victory. The Raiders beat Cleveland in the ice and snow of Municipal Stadium to set up a berth in the AFC championship game against San Diego. King caught a bomb from Jim Plunkett to give the Raiders a lead they never relinquished.

The Super Bowl told its own story. The Raiders jumped out to a 7-0 lead on a Plunkett to Cliff Branch pass of 9 yards. On their next possession, Plunkett was pressured, sidestepped Philadelphia defensive end Dennis Harrison, and uncorked a pass to King on the left sideline. Escorted by wide receiver Bob Chandler, King raced to the endzone untouched. The play was for eighty yards, the longest play from scrimmage in Super Bowl history. It will one day be a great trivia question. Who holds the record for the longest play from scrimmage in Super Bowl history?

Let me guess: Lynn Swann? Bart Starr? Terry

Bradshaw? Roger Staubach? Drew Pearson? NO.

The 67th Legislature has begun, and we want the people of the 31st District to have the opportunity to become acquainted with some of the main issues affecting us in the Texas Panhandle. To help accomplish this, we will be writing in this paper on a weekly basis regarding current legislation. Austin may be a long way from the district, but the laws we pass here affect each and every person in the state. That's why we want to keep you informed.

We want to do more than just communicate to you through a newspaper column. We want to know what is on the minds of the people we represent, and we encourage you to write us or call us whenever you want. Our address in Austin is P.O. Box 12068, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. Our phone number is (512) 475-3222. Our district office phone number is (806) 622-2302.

The primary organization through which the Senate does its business is the committee. All the committee members have now been named. Our district will have a seat on three committees, all of which will be considering legislation important to the people of our district. They are Economic Development, Human Resources, and Natural Resources. I am chairman of the Agriculture Subcommittee and will also serve on the Subcommittee on Public Health.

Every bill that is to become a law has to go through a committee. The popular misconception of the way the Legislature works is that all the Senators stand on the floor of the Senate and argue about a bill, but that is really a rare occurrence. Most of the real battles go on in the committees. We expect that about 4,000 bills will be introduced this session, and with such a number of pieces of legislation, committee work is essential.

For example, our Agriculture Subcommittee will study bills that concern agriculture. If we like the bill, we will prepare a favorable report to the full Natural Resources Committee, which then will report to the whole Senate. If we do not like the bill, we either will prepare an unfavorable report or simply keep the bill in our committee until the session is over, concentrating on more important legislation. That's when a bill "dies in committee."

The Natural Resources Committee, as its name implies, reports on all bills that have something to do with oil, gas, coal, or any other form of resource. This appointment came at a good time for the people of our district, just when the natural resource industry in our area is booming. We intend to use our position on that committee to do everything we can to help the Panhandle and South Plains natural resource industry to continue

to grow. This committee has three subcommittees which are important to us—agriculture, energy, and water resources. We want to devote a lot of time and effort to the Natural Resources Committee because our economy is based on these three things.

The Economic Development Committee deals with matters concerning not only business and industry but also insurance and banking. We don't want to understate the importance of agriculture or natural resources to our district, but we hope to continue to diversify our economy, and we hope to use our position on that committee to bring this about.

The Human Resources Committee deals with health care issues as well as child care issues. Many of the agencies reviewed under the Sunset process will also go through the Human Resources Committee. These issues are important not only to our district but also to all the people of the state.

Education group organizes

Fifteen teachers, administrators, and paraprofessionals from the Clarendon Public School met Tuesday, January 20, 1981, to form a local organization of the Association of Texas Professional Educators. The purpose of this organization is (1) to further education as a service and as a profession through support of public schools in the Clarendon district and (2) promotion of activities, services, and training for education and (3) development and maintenance of high standards of professional ethics among all professional educators. Membership is open to any person interested in public education who will support the stated purposes.

Two of the men who were instrumental in organizing the first several dinners were the late George Dillman and his brother-in-law Emil Urbanczyk. Along with the help of members like Dick Sullins, who this year is in charge of the hall during the dinner and supper, made them a success. All three have sons that will be working now as members.

Each year of success meant that the men were serving the finest of dinners and could finance their various works. For example, the monies realized from this year's dinner will go to the deaf program of the Knights of Columbus in Texas plus several community and youth programs.

Very few know of the extent of the deaf program in Texas. Not only does it fund the training of the deaf to become better Christians by providing religious education, but it helps develop their individual potentials to the fullest extent. There is a program training the deaf in the use of sign language, this is also taught to those who will be living and working with the deaf day to day. Expensive equipment now is furnished to those in need, opening new worlds to the user.

HEATS ON

Eating wheat or soybean sprouts usually means blending them into a tossed green salad. But there are hundreds of ways to fix sprouts that will save you money on buying meat, save you calories and will add variety to your menu planning.
Sprouts are inexpensive to produce. One pound increases six to eight times. The crop grows in two to four days and they can be grown in the kitchen. The vitamin content of soybeans increases more than 500% by the third day and most seeds or beans are five times more nutritious in sprout form than in seed form.

There are two easy ways to sprout seeds without buying any equipment. Method I: Place 1/4 C of clean washed wheat in a quart jar. Cover with warm water and soak overnight. Drain off water.

Rinse the wheat, drain and put the jar of drained wheat in the cupboard where it is warm and dark. Gently sprinkle a little water over the wheat three or four times a day to keep the wheat damp. Drain off any excess water. Disturb the wheat as little as possible when watering. For good ventilation of the wheat, place a piece of nylon stocking over the jar opening and secure with a rubber band, then put the jar on its side.

Method II: Soak the seeds overnight then spread two or three tablespoons of them at a time on several layers of dampened paper towels. Fit towels into a colander and enclose the colander in a dark colored plastic bag to provide the darkness and humidity required. Rinse the seeds two or three times a day in the colander. One end of the bag should be left loose for air ventilation. When the sprouts appear, change the seeds to a clear plastic bag to allow the sunlight in and then refrigerate.

Eat the sprout when it is the length of the kernel, about 1/4 inch. At first the grain will begin to put out a sprout and three roots. The sprout will be ready to eat in about 48 hours depending on conditions. To stop growth and keep fresh, place in the refrigerator. Before sprouts are used they can be placed in direct sunlight to increase color.

Other grains and seeds can be sprouted the same manner with the exception of soybeans, they need to be soaked for 24 hours. Wheat, alfalfa and other sprouts are great in salads, chow mein, in soup or raw. Here are some recipe ideas.

Sprouted Wheat Bread
1 C scalded and cooled milk
2 TBS oil
2 TBS sugar
1 tsp salt
1 cake yeast in 1/4 C warm water
1 egg, beaten
4 1/4 C whole wheat flour
1 C chopped wheat sprouts
Mix together and add half the flour to make a sponge. Add sprouts and rest of flour. Let rise double in size and bake for 1 hour at 350°. Sprouts are added late because the chemical reaction in the beans kills the yeast. Makes 1 loaf.

Sprout Cakes
Make cake slow according to favorite recipe. Add 1 C raw soy sprouts.

1 C sprouted wheat
1 C nuts
1 C raisins
1 C coconut
Grind the above in food grinder using fine blade. Mix well and shape into balls the size of marbles. Roll in fine coconut. Refrigerate.
Here is a great tip on what to do with left over fruit syrups. Use the syrup in gelatin salads for part of the water to add more flavor. Thicken the syrup with corn starch for glazes or dessert sauces. Syrup with mayonaisse makes fruit dressing. Use it to flavor sweet milk for a drink the kids will enjoy.

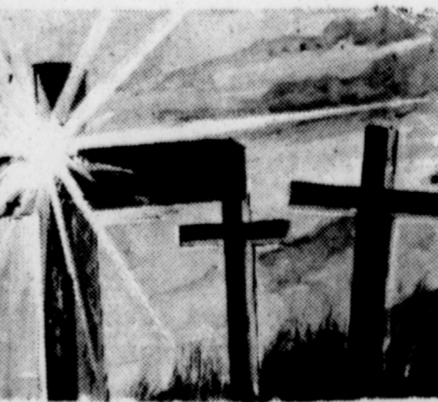

Geese die off due to pesticides

Several weeks ago, over 500 geese had been reported killed on a playa lake near Dumas. Biologist Dave Dvorak went up to the scene of the die-off to collect some of the dead birds to be taken to the Texas A & M Diagnostic Laboratory in Amarillo. The A & M Lab diagnosed the element that killed the geese to be a type of pesticide. To determine the exact type of pesticide, the lab sent the geese to A & M for further testing.

A farmer across from the playa had recently sprayed his wheat with parathion and the geese may have been feeding there. There might be a connection between the contaminated field and the death of the geese, but until the Federal Game Agents have completed their study, nothing definite can be determined.

Biologist Dvorak says that if the geese had been in the field when the farmer was actually spraying, the geese would have fled before getting any contact contamination. If they had eaten the grain immediately after the wheat had been sprayed, there is a possibility that they could have died as a result of such concentrated dosage. He further states that the parathion dissipates within a short time, so the chances of the geese eating freshly sprayed wheat would not be high. It wouldn't be likely for it to happen frequently.

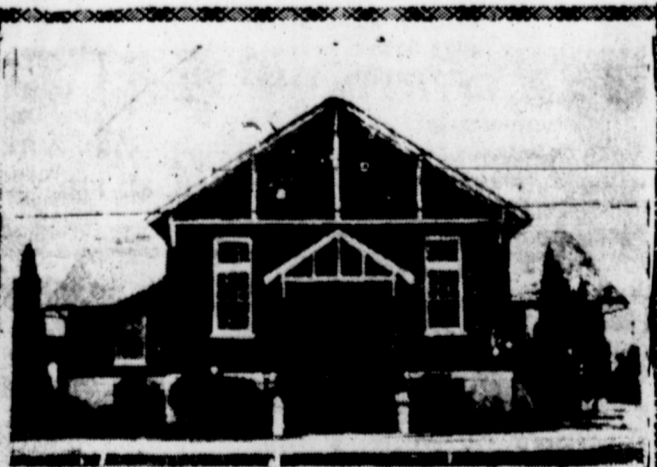

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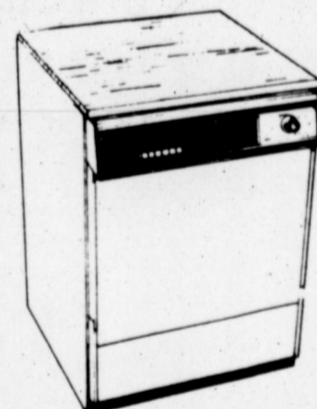

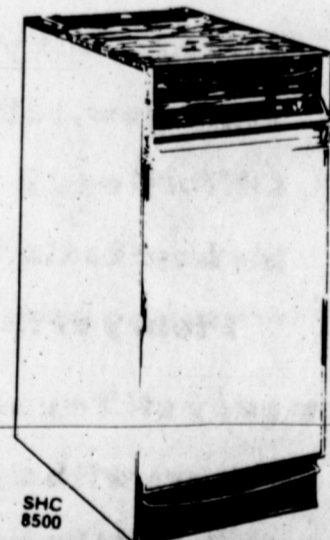
