BRUTES IN HUMAN FORM

(An Editorial) Man-made laws do not always prevent crime, but they do provide a penalty. Compliance with our laws in Donley county in the past has established a reputation for this section of a high order of citizenship. Very wisely our lawmakers provided the supreme penalty for certain crimes. The screams of ravished womanhood sounds the death knell for the brute in human form-by law. The stamnia and strength of character of a Donley county jury may be depended upon to mete justice to the malefactor. 
