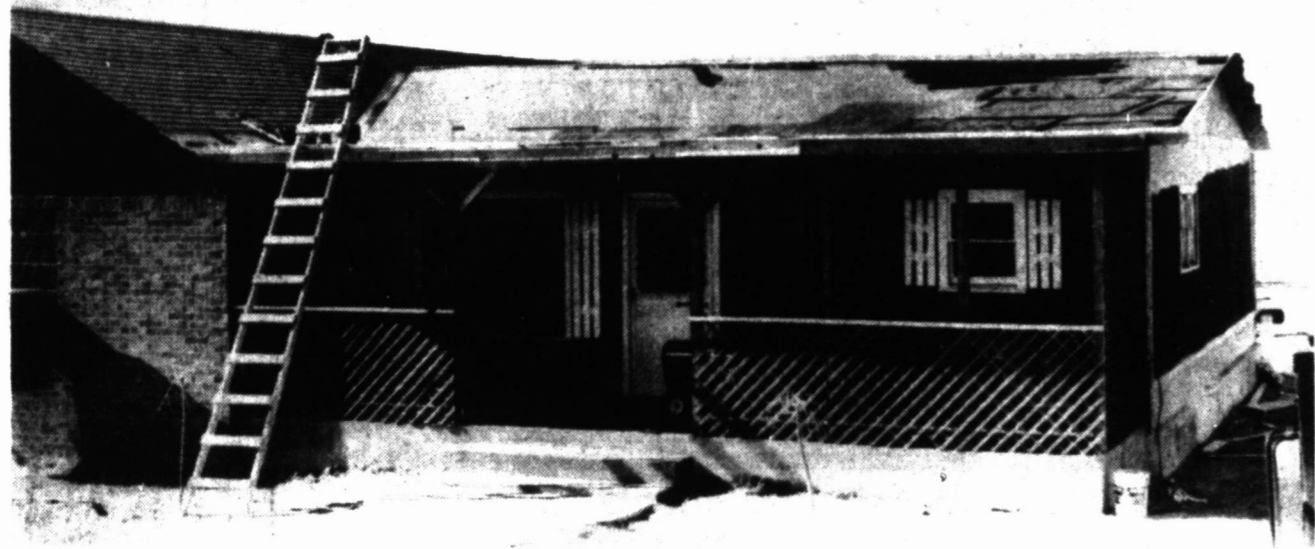

Agricultural Marketing Seminar for Women

Women in agriculture across Texas will have a unique opportunity on December 6-7, according to Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

A specially prepared 2-day marketing seminar for Texas women in agriculture is scheduled for the Amarillo Sheraton Hotel. The workshop is designed for women who want to learn the basics of commodity marketing. According to Gooch, topics covered will be how to develop a marketing plan, understanding marketing alternatives, and how to utilize the government programs along with marketing tools. Marketing has been identified as a critical issue by Texas agricultural producers, emphasizes Gooch.

Some questions that will be answered include: "What are Futures? What is hedging? and What is basis?" Seminar speakers will include women in agriculture that are helping make marketing decisions. Specialists from the Chicago Board of Trade and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will also conduct parts of the seminar.

Pre-registration for the seminar is required. A fee of \$35 covers three meals and cost of materials, says Gooch. For registration details and a brochure, please contact your county Extension office at 874-2141.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

SCS Ordering Trees

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District is taking orders for seedling trees. The Texas Forest Service and Colorado Forest Service provide us with the trees we have to offer. The evergreen trees come in a 2x27 inch container and range from 6 to 18 inches high. The hardwoods are a bareroot with a height of 12-30 inches. They are available for anyone interested in growing trees in their yard or for windbreaks on a farm or ranch. The Texas Forest Service also has available 4 Wildlife Packets - Quail & Pheasant, Deer, Turkey, and Squirrel. There are 4 different kinds of trees in bundles of 25, totaling, 100 trees in a packet.

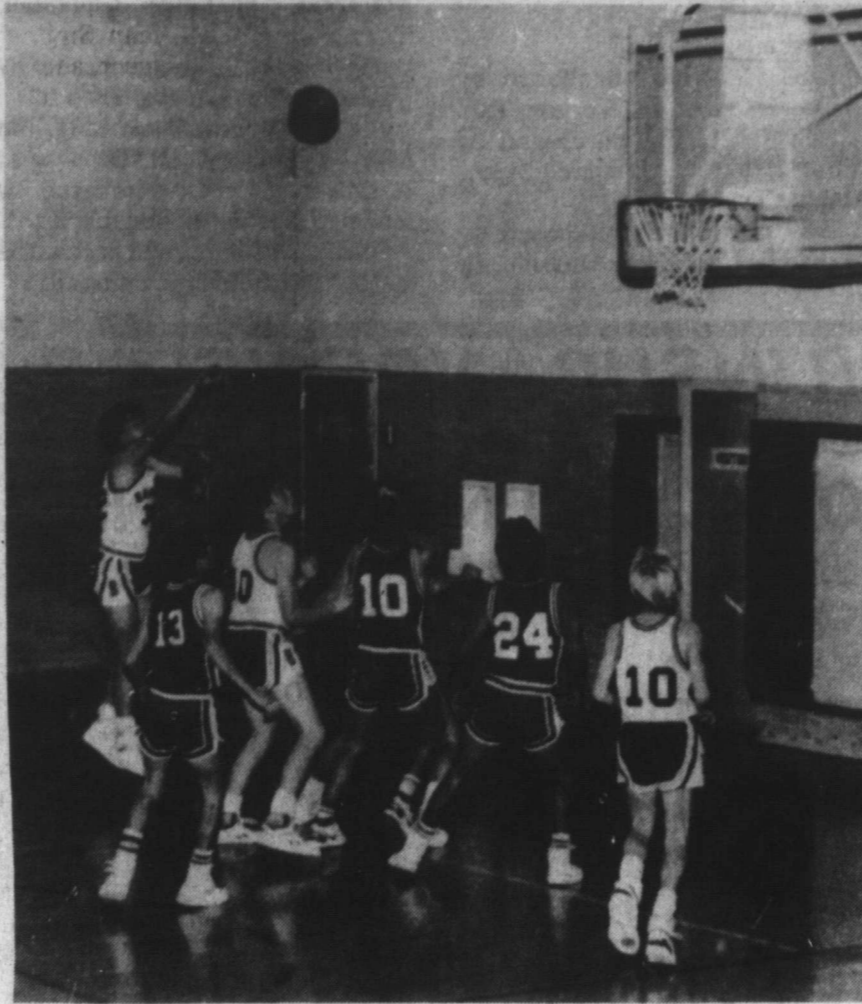
It was announced that West Texas Utility is having an open house that will be an interest to all. It will be Nov. 29 from 10 to 3 and should give us all some good Christmas ideas.

The Bronco Junior Varsity in action.

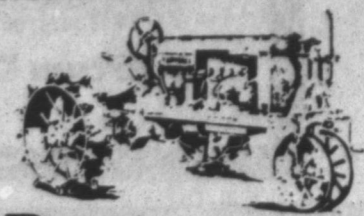

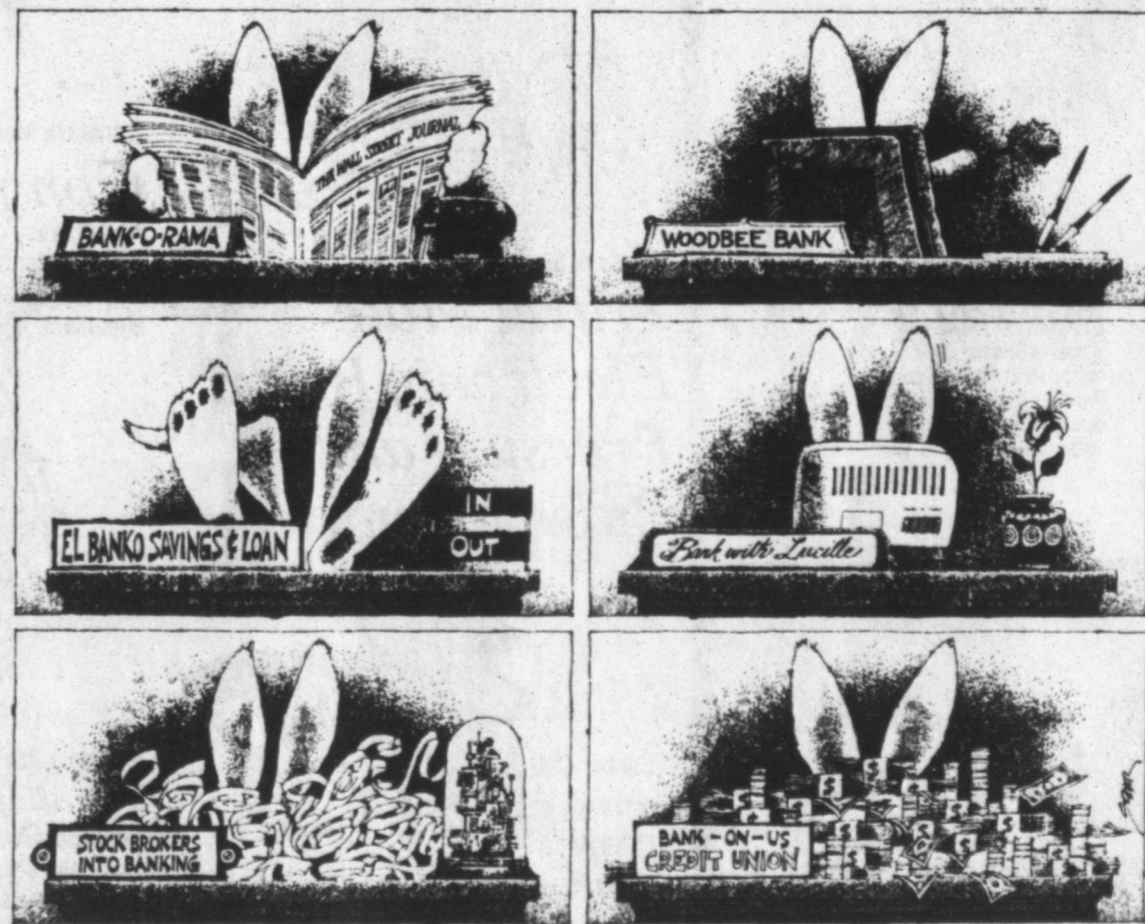

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

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New Space-Age Hearing Device Available Soon

Knoxville - Clear Corporation of Knoxville, Tn, has announced the development of a tiny, new hearing instrument, small enough to fit entirely inside the canal of the ear, yet powerful enough to change the way millions of Americans hear. This amazing device, called the Word Sorter Crystal Canal, utilizes a space-age microchip which functions like an electronic "brain" to sort words out of noisy environments, thus providing the wearer better clarity and understanding of speech.

The development came from an eleven-month project set up by Clear Corp., which combined with its engineering department a four-member team from the firm that earlier designed and built President Reagan's hearing instruments. Clear officials announced that the team will remain in Knoxville indefinitely for production supervision of the new Crystal Canal instrument which is scheduled to be released later this month in Tennessee as well as sixteen other states.

Advertising ... A Must For Your Small Business

Did you ever wonder why customers are not beating down your door and business isn't booming? Maybe it is because you are not promoting and advertising your business effectively. Advertising is crucial to the existence of your business and no business, particularly a retail operation, can stay alive without it. If a small business does not advertise, its sales and profits will be swallowed up by larger companies who do advertise on a regular basis. In order to insure the longevity of your business, advertising is an absolute necessity.

But, selecting the type of advertising that fits your business needs and deciding what is the most effective, economical way to give your customers the information they need isn't always easy. Should you use TV, radio, print or a combination? How can you make your advertising dollars work best for you? Small businesses have a unique set of problems when deciding how to spend their advertising dollars, but armed with a clear understanding of what advertising is and how it works, you can make advertising your most effective tool in winning profits.

WHY ADVERTISE?
The purpose of advertising is simple --make the buyer aware of the seller. You have to let people know that you are in business by delivering a message. That message

is communicated through the media and word of mouth. In addition, advertising serves to:

- * create a positive image
- * develop a need for services and products
- * persuade customers that your products/services are the best on the market.
- * increase profits
- * capture customer attention/enhance customer action

The most effective advertisements share some common elements, which you should keep in mind when developing your advertising campaign. They are all simple, clear, honest, informative, customer-oriented and attempt to answer who, what, where, when, why and how.

WHAT IS THE BEST APPROACH?

In most situations in life, working without a specific goal or objective is unwise. The same is true for advertising. Spending advertising dollars with no purpose can do more harm for your business than good. Even advertising with a specific plan in mind is no guarantee for success.

A business should have both long-range (5,10, or 15 years) goals and short-range (3,6, or 12 months) goals. Some areas for goal setting might include:

What market do you want to reach?

What image do you want for your company?

What products/services do you want to emphasize?

What sales do you expect?

How much money do we have to spend?

When is the time right?

These areas are by no means inclusive. As you sit down to plan your company's goals, you may use these four areas as a start. Other ideas will surely follow.

While setting your goals, remember to make them specific. Generalities are nearly as detrimental as no goals at all. Don't just say "We want increased sales." Specify how much the increase should be. Do you want sales to increase by 20 percent or \$10,000? Define what time period you are working with? Rather than "let's increase customers", decide by how many. Instead of saying "we want better name recognition", determine how broad the recognition should be and how you will get it.

You will not be able to determine the answers to all of these questions on your own. Market research may be necessary before beginning your campaign. Small businesses cannot work as independently as they have in the past. You must utilize outside resources for analyzing advertising needs and problems. Being able to listen and incorporate their recom-

Veterans Administration Made a Cabinet Department

According to Doug Lowe, Veterans Service Officer for Donley County, President Reagan has signed legislation authorizing the elevation of the Veterans Administration to a Cabinet department. The legislation creates a Department of Veterans Affairs to be headed by a Secretary of Veterans Affairs who shall be appointed by the President subject to Senate confirmation. It also creates within the new department a Veterans' Benefit Administration and a Veterans' Health Services and Research Administration as successors to the current benefits and medical affairs directorates at the VA.

Recommendations is essential. Your initial investment into researching advertising needs may be high, but the returns will be greater.

Once you have some objectives laid out, you must prioritize those objectives. One advertising campaign never will or should be able to accomplish all of your goals at the same time. You must focus on one or two objectives at a time.

ADVERTISING MEDIUMS

Now that you know the who, what, where, when and why, you must answer how. Which medium should a small business use? Whichever medium your firm chooses, remember that a hit and miss approach will not be effective. Regular and constant repetition have proven time and again to be very productive. With this in mind, you must understand that a time commitment is involved no matter which route you choose.

NEWSPAPERS: Newspapers are probably the most widely used advertising media among small businesses. Newspapers have immediate impact and allow great flexibility in advertising. Because such a wide variety of newspapers exist, however, it may be difficult for you, the small business operator, to decide which one to select.

Try to match the market area of the newspaper to your market goals as closely as possible. If you run a small business in a large metropolitan area, advertising in the daily metropolitan paper will probably cover too large a market and might be out of your price range. Businesses in smaller towns may find the local weekly paper just what they need. Whichever paper you select, be sure to check the different types of advertising to get the best rate available.

Publicity is not limited to paid advertisements alone. Free advertising is available through the use of news releases informing papers of newsworthy stories about your business.

RADIO: A wide variety of stations exist, so you must match their

report directly to the Secretary instead of to the Chief Benefits Director as proposed by the Senate.

market audience to your market needs. The power (wattage), audience and programing should be considered in radio just as circulation and content are looked at in selecting a newspaper.

A station which has a powerful wattage may be too big for a small business. A station with limited geographical coverage, where the market area is limited and little circulation waste exist, may be just what a small business needs.

TELEVISION: In the past, TV advertising has been out of the question for small businesses. Rates for

stations affiliated with major networks are too high. But the expansion of cable television has changed that. More opportunities are arising for small businesses to advertise on TV. Because of that, you must do some careful research as to viewer age, income, viewing habits and so on to make TV advertising effective.

These are some of the advertising tools available to small businesses. As previously stated, any one or a combination of these or other advertising methods can be used to promote your business, products and services. The trick is to find the

method(s) that best meet the goals of your firm. You must constantly search for ways to improve your business in today's market place. The local "ad valorem" or property tax structure of the Hedley, Texas, area is administered through a combined Appraisal District - Tax Collection office.

By statewide law, all property is appraised at full market value and 100% of that value is assessed. Each local tax entity selects a tax rate based on that district's assessed value less certain exemptions; the rate is only sufficient to supplement other income to equal the budget for that tax district for each year.

Each local tax entity selects a tax rate based on that district's assessed value less certain exemptions; the rate is only sufficient to supplement other income to equal the budget for that tax district for each year.
