John Rhea broke up a band of thieves working from East Texas to Arizona in the 1870s. He captured the notorious killer Cooney Mitchell in Colorado after 18 months of tracking, and carried him back to Granbury, Texas to be hanged on May 27, 1876.

John Rhea married Mary Jane Edens in 1871 and they named their first child Saul.

Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday, Febru-ary 18, said 960 Texas cities shared nearly \$100 million in city sales tax rebates in February.

Bullock said his office sent at total of \$91.5 million to cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

He said the January-February payments to cities this year is more than \$30 million higher than the same period last year.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller.

Clarendons net pay this period was \$12,471.43; net pay same period last year \$5,238.63. Net pay for 1981to date \$18,268.95; same period in 1980 was \$13,775.32 a 32% increase.

Parks and Wildlife Manage ment gave the program for February the 13th. He showed pictures of the wildlife found at the Buffalo Lake Refuge, Although the lake has been drained on account of the deterioration of the dam and spillway, there is much water there in the creeks. Thousands of ducks and geese winter there. One picture showed was of three whooping crane - an endangered species. There are less than a hundred but due to careful management, they are increasing in numbers. At the Aransas Pass refuge, their permanent winter headquarters, the count is up in the seventies. Thesecranes nest in Canada. The Buffalo Lake area is a flyway. All wildlife is carefully

guarded, even rattlesnakes.







The total per month mini-mum cost to a water meter customer would be \$24.00. This is the necessary cost to retire the revenue bonds which would have to be voted if the improvements are



Kenny King's perforotheil season for the Oak-and Raiders made the city of adon swell with pride. After an illustrious career with the Clarendon Broncos, King went on the play at the University of Oklahoma. He was drafted and signed by the Houston Oilers following his senior year at OU in 1978. Traded to Oakland in the spring of 1980. King became a starter for the Raiders as they went on to cap a Cinderella season with a 27-10 victory over Philadel-

phia in the Super Bowl.

This is the first of a two-part series in which I discussed with Kenny different aspects of his football career, and his outlook on the future. Ecstatic from the Super Bowl win, I found King eager to discuss the season and he was an easy interview.

It is my hope that this two-part series is an enjoyable one. Kenny King is a man that this town can be proud of, I know I was proud to talk to him.

Q-Kenny, I'd like for you to describe the difference in the levels of football that you've played: High School, College, and Professional.

King- Well there's a big difference. High School is a learning process, you're just learning how to play the game. You've learned the game once you get into college, and you're more developed than in high school. College is a stepping stone, just the final step in becoming a professional athlete. Once you get in the pros, you've become the best. You've got to be the

O-What about the coaches you've had in your career-How does coaching vary

throughout? King- It's different, but the thing is you've got to know to coach an individual, instead of coaching a team. You've got to treat each person as an individual because each player is different with a different outlook on life. High school coaching is different because it's not as complicated. College coaches have a lot of homework, but in the pros there's so much to

be done, and so much home-work. Coaches may stay at the office until 12 or one

o'clock in the morning. Q-Let's talk about your stay with the Oilers. I'd like for you to describe your experiences with Houston, what type of adjustment was it for you? King- I was very excited

about going to Houston. A lot of people before the draft were telling me that I'd be going to Houston and I'd be playing in the same backfield with Earl Campbell, that they'd mix power and speed. So I was excited until I got there and realized that they were not planning to use me that way. They wanted me to be a blocker, and in the professional ranks I'm not a blocking back. I'm basically a halfback. I had a great experience in that I disciplined myself, I kept my confidence because it was a very difficult thing to do, sitting on the bench when you know you're capable of playing.

Q-Have you changed your running style since high school?

King- I think my running style now is the same as it was in high school. I was a halfback, and I am now with Oakland. I'm beginning to come back and see more things that I didn't see as a fullback in college, because I was blocking. Now as a halfback you've got to see blocking schemes, and you've got to know how to read the defense. It's very technical, but you've got to be dedicated and you've got to be on your toes.

Q-You've played with some great backs - Sims, Campbell, VanEeghan, and others. Would you contrast their styles.

King- The best back I ever played with was Joe Washington (now plays for the Baltimore Colts). The man is sensational. You're not going to find many backs who can move like Washington. He's in a class of his own. Mark VanEeghan is a great back and a super blocker. This year we complimented each other so well that he was able to get his thousand yards. Billy sims is a great back. He has great power, speed, and determination. Horace Ivory (King's teammate at Okla-

That's what I mean when I talk about coaching people, coaching individuals.

about going to Oklahoma? King- No, I don't regret it. I'd go back. But if I did we'd sit down and we'd do things differently, because by me going to O.U. and being pushed into a fullback role. it hurt my chances of being drafted number one and definitely made me lose a lot

Q-Do you have any regrets

Q-While we're on the subject of going to college and being recruited, what was it like for you as a small town athlete, with Barry Switzer coming here and other big name coaches coming to

King- I was impressed. I was impressed because I never felt that I was a great athlete, and to go to a school like Oklahoma you've got to know that you're great, that you have a lot of talent in order to make it. It was a great transition for me to go to a major university like that because if you've never been over 60 miles away from home you're likely to get homesick. There were a lot of

home because you're on your own, making decisions yourself. It's hard for anyone going from a small town to a large town.

Q-Let's talk about the trade from Houston to Oakland. Were you hesitant about it at all?

King-No. I was happy because I knew I had chance. I knew that Oakland needed running backs, and I knew that my chances of going there and becoming a starter were very good. I was so excited because it's like getting a chance to re-live your life, a whole new start. It's like a cat with nine lives -I feel that I've had two.

Q-You were traded for Jack Tatum, a great Raider player for a lot of years. Did that help you to put a value on yourself?

King- I felt that I had bargaining power then, but the thing about it was that Jack Tatum was, and still is, a legend in Oakland. I didn't find out until later in the season, but Jack Tatum was loved in Oakland. So I had some big shoes to fill in the eyes of the fans. So once I got there I was able to do things that made them recognize me on the football field, and maybe made them forget about who I was traded for. After the season got underway, players started coming to me and telling me, "Man you better be glad that you've done well because if you hadn't the fans wouldn't love you. They'd boo you' because you were traded for Jack Tatum.



TUFF TOPS

Since 1972, there has been a dramatic decrease in the number of accidental drug poisonings in children. Why? The wide-spread use of child-resistant closures (tops) is surely the single factor most responsible for this decrease.

Asprin was once the number one source of accidental poisonings in children. Ingestion of plants is now the most common single source of childhood poisonings. According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, we have had a 60% decrease in accidental aspirin poisoning and a 45% decrease in accidental poisonings caused by prescription medicines.

While child-resistant closures have been successful in preventing many poisonings, they have caused inconvenience for many people. Those who have difficulty grasping and turning vial and bottle tops may find child-resistant closures to be "locks for which they have no keys". The elderly and those having arthritis may have particular trouble opening these sometimes contrary closures.

Although the "tuff tops" on asprin and prescription containers may cause inconvenience, the prevention of childhood poisonings...and sometimes death...justifies their use.

JOSHUA CH is the first Australian Cattle Dog in Texas to receive the Champion Dog Title. He finished his championship at Muskogee Kennel Club October 31, 1980. He is possibly the first of his breed to become a male champion in the United States.
