Over 225 CHS Alums to Return July 22-23

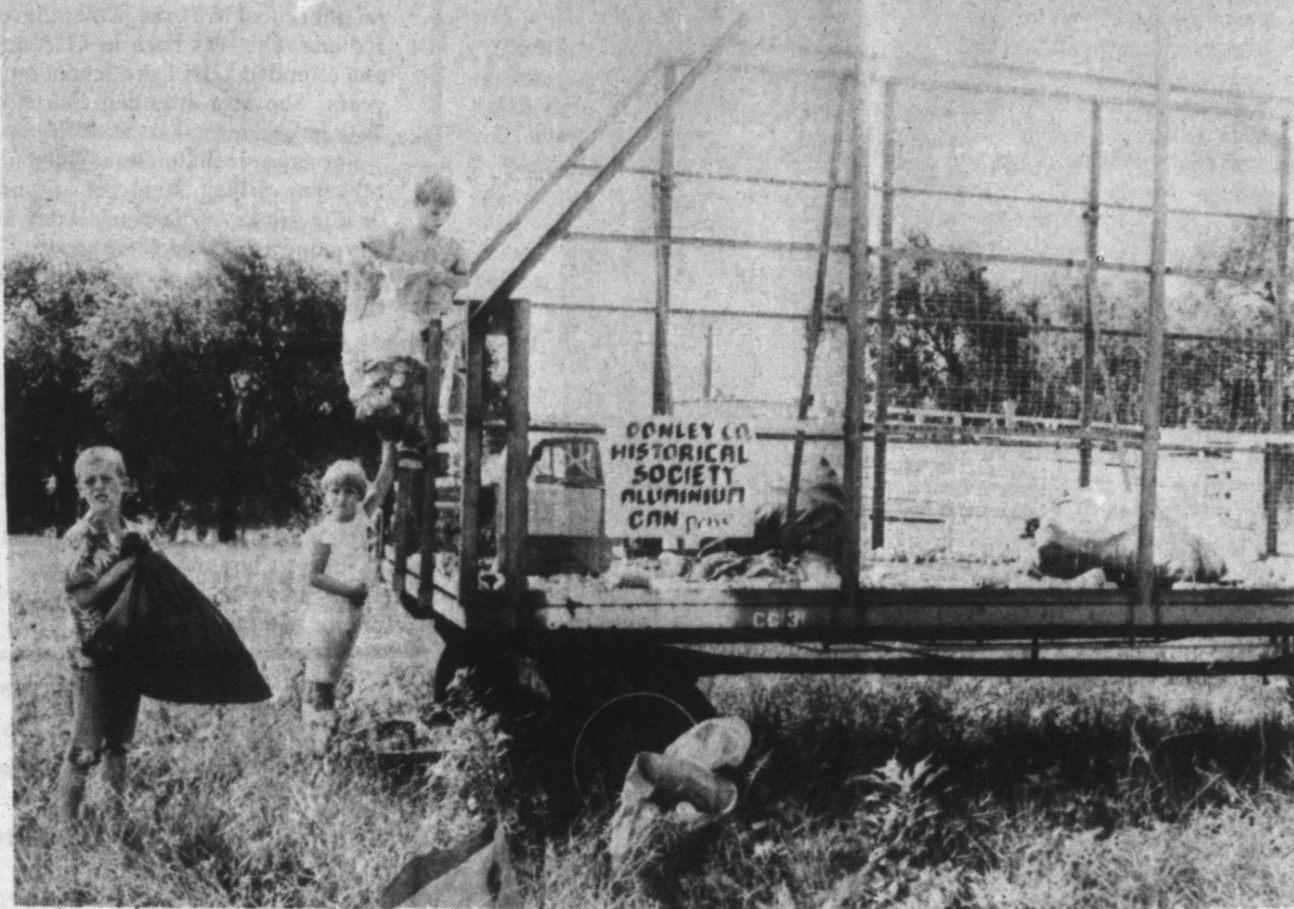

Historical Society Wants Brass

Clarendon's local Historical Society began collecting aluminum cans last week, but will also accept brass and copper alloys.

H.A. Green loaned a cotton trailer to the group for a depository for the cans, but the Green's trailer was so

tall that children could not throw cans over the sides. Wandall Luttrell then loaned a trailer to the Society, a trailer with lower sideboards in the front. The trailer is on Junior Spier's property across from the Post Office.

The Society urges all Clarendon

residents to set aluminum cans aside and deposit them into the trailer. Proceeds will be used to erect signs to direct tourists to the town's historic attractions. Some may also be used for other preservation work.

Donors should place brass and copper near the trailer, but not in it. The metals will have to be kept separate. Place aluminum cans and other aluminum scrap directly into the cotton trailer.

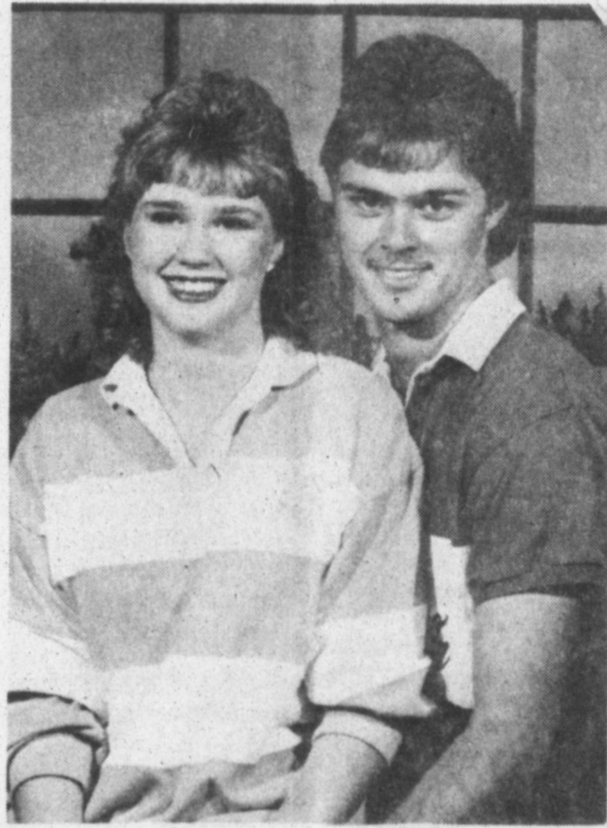

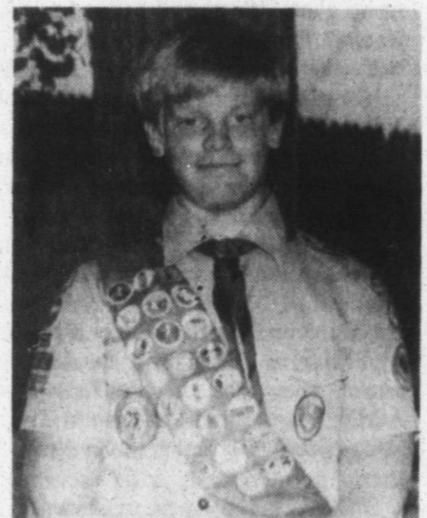

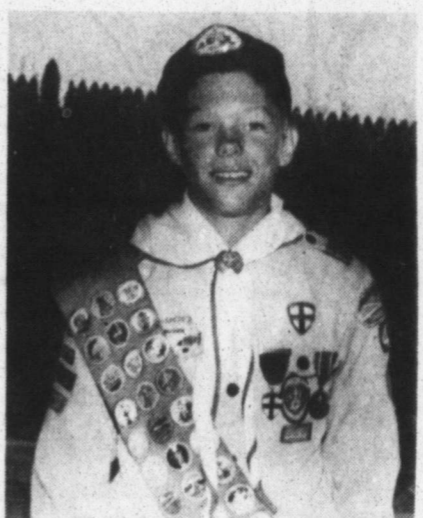

Bagworm Damage

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arborvitae, cedar and other shrubs is being found now, says County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Evergreens should be watched closely at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as controls include Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon or Dursban. The insecticide applications should be applied at seven to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested parts. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag. Gooch said.

Nonprescription Wart Medicines

Warts are caused by viruses. More than 15 different types of wart-causing viruses that affect human skin have been identified. Warts appear to be more common in children and teenagers, with the majority occurring between the ages of 12 and 16. Plantar warts (hard skin areas resulting from excessive pressure) are usually confined to the feet.

Nonprescription medicines are available to help remove warts or minimize the pain associated with warts. Since these medicines have no antiviral activity, they do not kill the skin virus. Topical nonprescription medicines for wart removal often contain salicylic acid, with or without lactic acid, in a liquid colloid base. Salicylic acid in concentrations of 10 to 40 percent softens hard skin. Colloid is used in wart medicines because it hardens into a rigid, clear film after application. Dead skin can be removed more easily when the film is peeled away.

Use nonprescription wart medicines carefully and see a physician if self-care is not effective. Diabetics should be especially cautious. Removal of warts in a physician's office (by freezing and other techniques) may be more effective in the long run.

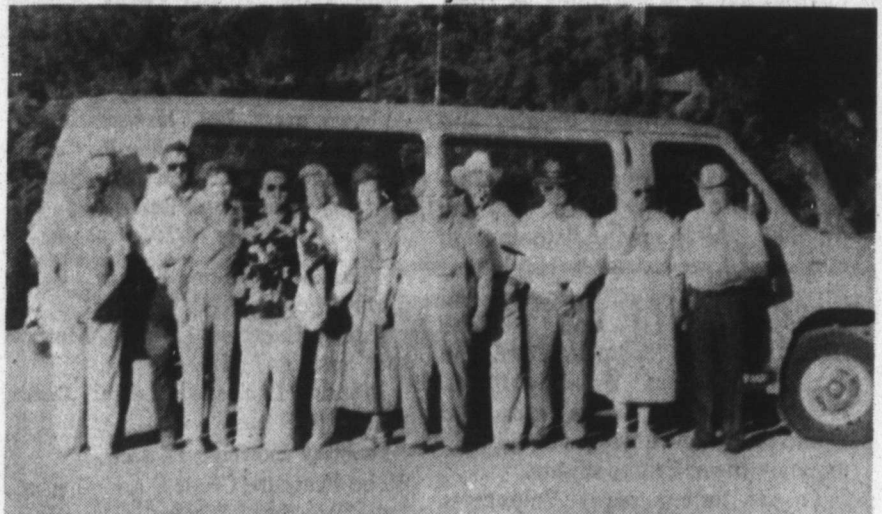

October 22, 1922. He passed away February 4th, 1965 at the age of 67.

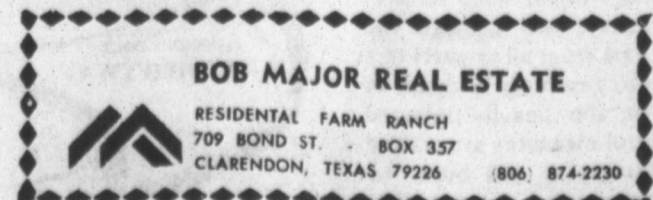

Latter Rain

"It's partly cloudy outside right now with a present temperature of eighty-six degrees. Tonight, scattered showers with a ninety percent chance of rain. Tomorrow's forecast: more of the same, with a ninety percent chance of rain. We should expect one to one-and-a-quarter inches of precipitation tomorrow afternoon."

"It's hot out this morning with a present temperature of ninety-one degrees. We should look for a high of one hundred and eleven for today and a low of eighty for tonight. There is not sight of rain in the forecast for the next three days. Sunny and hot!"

As we listen to the local and national weather we hear much of the same. Hot and dry in the central portion of the plains and wet and sultry in the lower half of the country.

The Bible has much to say about weather and it's condition and effect on our daily lives. The weather, in particular rain and thunder storms, was even used as an instrument to watch for the last days. Veterans Can File New Disability Claims

Recent discovery of duplicate military medical records by the National Archives will enable thousands of World War II and Korean Conflict Army and Army Air Corps veterans to file for Veterans Administration disability compensation payments.

To speed these claims, the VA has introduced special procedures, collectively called Project Expedite, which involves a massive cross-checking of files to determine cases that can be reopened.

Using the new records, VA benefits counselors now hope to assist many veterans whose claims had been denied because no record was available to confirm medical disabilities that occurred during military service.

Veterans and survivors unsure whether their disability compensation claims are affected should contact the nearest VA regional office. A toll-free number of the nearest VA regional office is listed in the Federal Government section of telephone directories.

The National Archives and Records Administration on June 15 advised the VA that it had located a collection of computer tape containing some 10 million Army medical records that partially fill a gap created when a 1973 fire destroyed millions of military files at a federal warehouse in St. Louis. The newly found records cover the years from 1942 to 1945 and from 1950 to 1954. For certain veterans whose claims

for disability compensation were denied since the fire, the VA may now be able to establish documentary evidence to support their claims.

The St. Louis fire destroyed or seriously damaged some 18 million service records, making future disability claims difficult and, in some cases, impossible to process. The newly found medical records were provided to the National Archives by the National Research Council, a private organization that had been engaged in analysis of Army hospital records in the 1950s. The computerized information reflects battle injuries treated in Army hospitals and a sample of hospitalizations for other reasons. The records cover personnel who served in the Army and Army Air Corps.

Cotton Fleahopper

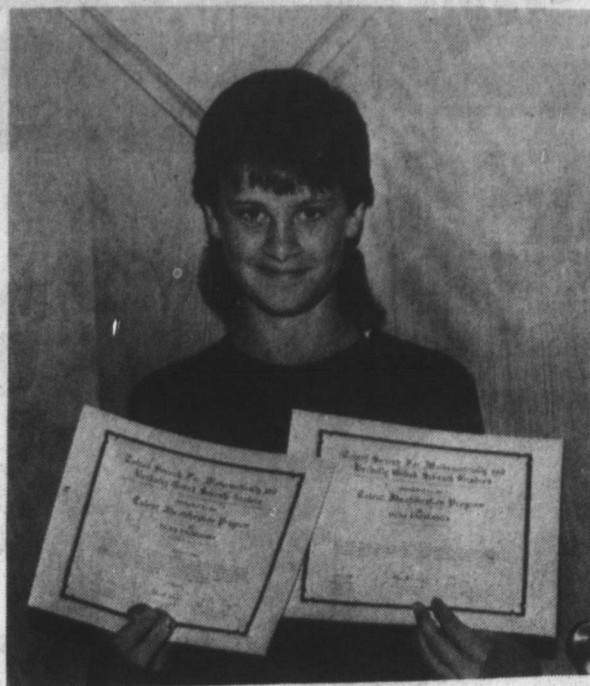
The cotton fleahopper, a major pest of cotton, attacks the crop during the early fruiting stage and can cause heavy damage.

Fleahoppers migrate in from weed hosts and feed on small pinhead-sized squares, says Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent. Damaged squares turn black and fall off, so heavy infestations can prevent or delay fruiting of the cotton plant.

Scouting of cotton fields is critical to determine fleahopper damage, says Gooch. When plants are setting less than 75 percent of their fruit and fleahoppers are present, insecticides should be applied to control the pest.

The economic threshold for fleahoppers during the first three weeks of squaring ranges from 25 to 35 fleahoppers per 100 plants. This varies with the variety, weather conditions and available moisture. Producers should check plants to see if they are setting fruits with the numbers of fleahoppers present within this range.

For information on chemicals recommended for cotton fleahopper control, contact the county Extension office, notes Gooch.

In the Verbal section Kelby received special recognition in Natural Science.

Seventh graders from Texas who participated in Duke University's Eighth Annual Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students were honored at ceremonies held at Trinity University and Baylor University on June 17th and June 18th. All students invited to the ceremony had earned scores on at least one section of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Testing Assessment (ACT) equal to or greater than the scores obtained by 50 percent of college-bound high school seniors. These very capable seventh graders took these college

entrance tests as participants in Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

"TIP was established in 1980 to

identify bright young students, to help develop their special abilities, and to direct them toward special academic programs for the gifted and talented. The 1988 TIP Talent Search involved nearly 46,000 students and covered 16 southern, southwestern, and midwestern states. It is one of four university-based talent searches which together cover the entire United States," said Dr. Robert Sawyer, Executive Director of the Program.

The 1966 students invited to the Texas Ceremonies had attained at least one of the following criteria: an SAT-Math score equal to or greater than 500 (for boys) or 450 (for girls); an SAT-Verbal score equal to or greater than 430; a TSWE (Test of Standard Written English) score equal to or greater than 52; an ACT-Math score equal to or greater than 21 (for boys) or 17 (for girls); an ACT-English score equal to or greater than 24; an ACT-Social Studies score equal to or greater than 20; or an ACT-Natural Science score equal to or greater than 25. All participants received Certificates of Distinction in recognition of their achievement; the highest scorers also received scholarships and books.

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Safety Warning on Deli Foods

The combination of summer heat, uninsulated containers and prepared deli foods can add up to an unwelcome bout of foodborne illness.

There's no doubt that supermarket delis are the latest fast food phenomenon. Industry figures show that almost 62 percent of supermarkets now have delis with salad bars and prepared foods for a quick lunch, completely prepared dinner or instant picnic.

It's not the deli food itself that has food safety experts concerned, but how people handle the food once they buy it.

"In-store delis and salad bars have to meet health department standards in keeping hot foods at 140 degrees and cold foods below 40 degrees. In both cases that inhibits the growth of bacteria in the food," said Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"But if you buy a carton of cold food, take it out to a hot car and then run a few errands before you eat it, the food may become warm enough for rapid growth of bacteria," she said.

"Protein foods, such as those containing meat, eggs, poultry and milk are most susceptible to the growth of salmonella bacteria when not handled properly," said the specialist.

"Many of the most popular deli items, like smoked meats, potato or macaroni salads and puddings fit in

this category," she said.

The specialist said that when planning a picnic of deli foods, it's safest to buy hot foods as close to your destination as possible so they can be eaten right away.

"Carry an insulated cooler with ice for cold deli foods. Cardboard or styrofoam containers do not provide adequate insulation," she said.

"If you buy prepared foods for a dinner, be sure to take them right

home and serve immediately. After the meal, promptly refrigerate the cartons of leftovers," said Cooksey.

Whenever cartons of food have been sitting out for more than two hours, the specialist said they should be discarded.

"With a few precautions consumers can enjoy the convenience of supermarket delis without the discomfort of flu-like symptoms from a foodborne illness," she said.

Kory Pounds Qualifies for National Finals

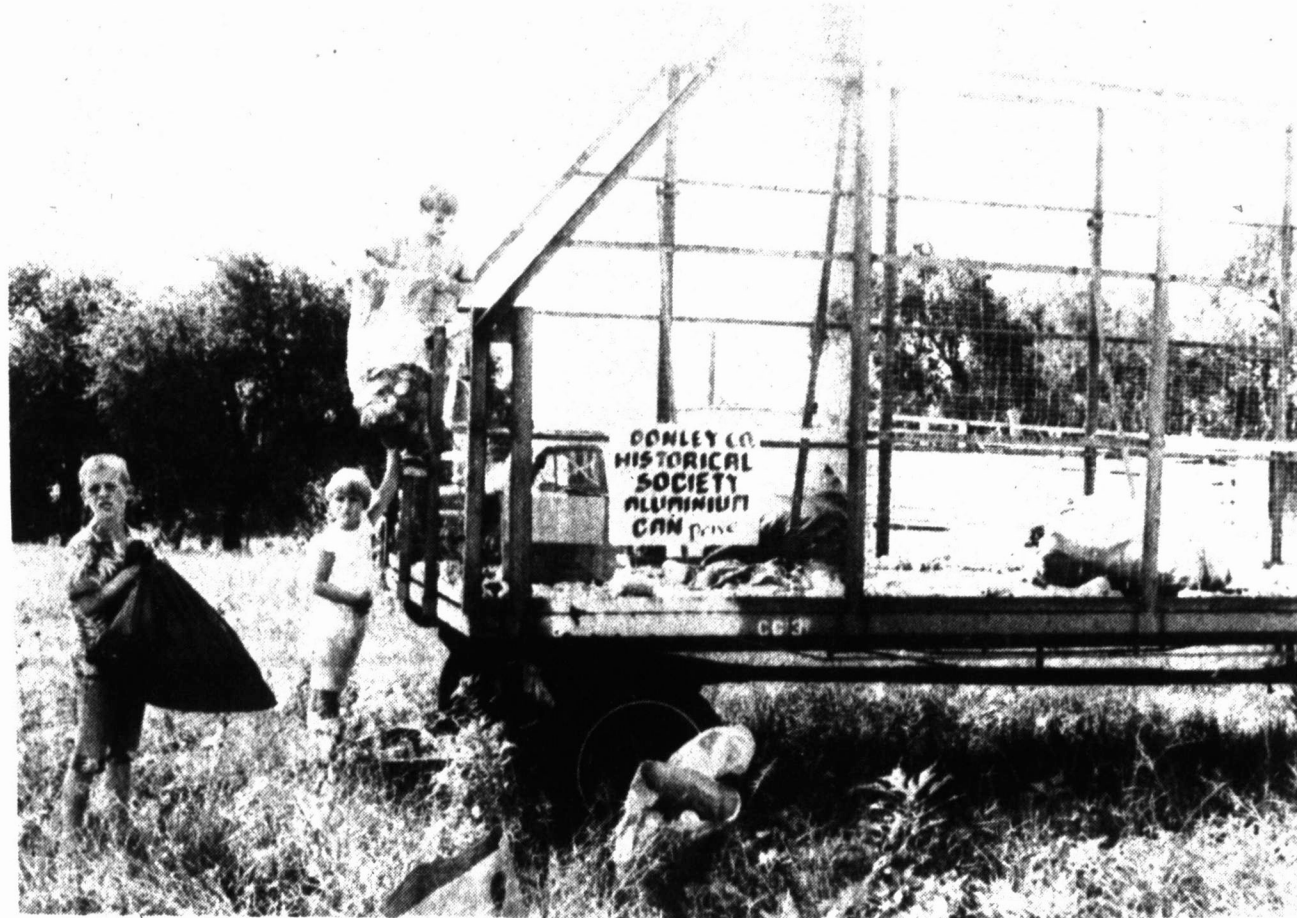

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Nonprescription Wart Medicines

Warts are caused by viruses. More than 15 different types of wart-causing viruses that affect human skin have been identified. Warts appear to be more common in children and teenagers, with the majority occurring between the ages of 12 and 16. Plantar warts (hard skin areas resulting from excessive pressure) are usually confined to the feet.

Nonprescription medicines are available to help remove warts or minimize the pain associated with warts. Since these medicines have no antiviral activity, they do not kill the skin virus. Topical nonprescription medicines for wart removal often contain salicylic acid, with or without lactic acid, in a liquid colloid base. Salicylic acid in concentrations of 10 to 40 percent softens hard skin. Colloidion is used in wart medicines because it hardens into a rigid, clear film after application. Dead skin can be removed more easily when the film is peeled away.

Use nonprescription wart medicines carefully and see a physician if self-care is not effective. Diabetics should be especially cautious. Removal of warts in a physician's office (by freezing and other techniques) may be more effective in the long run.

Bagworm Damage

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arborvitae, cedar and other shrubs is being found now, says County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Evergreens should be watched closely at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as controls include Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon or Dursban. The insecticide applications should be applied at seven to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested parts. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag. Gooch said.

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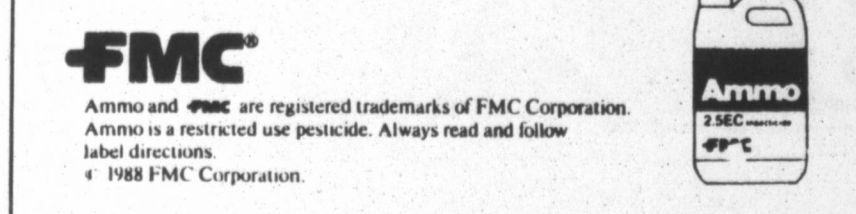

Latter Rain

"It's partly cloudy outside right now with a present temperature of eighty-six degrees. Tonight, scattered showers with a ninety percent chance of rain. Tomorrow's forecast: more of the same, with a ninety percent chance of rain. We should expect one to one-and-a-quarter inches of precipitation tomorrow afternoon."

"It's hot out this morning with a present temperature of ninety-one degrees. We should look for a high of one hundred and eleven for today and a low of eighty for tonight. There is no sight of rain in the forecast for the next three days. Sunny and hot!"

As we listen to the local and national weather we hear much of the same. Hot and dry in the central portion of the plains and wet and sultry in the lower half of the country.

The Bible has much to say about weather and it's condition and effect on our daily lives. The weather, in particular rain and thunder storms, was even used as an instrument to watch for the last days. Veterans Can File New Disability Claims

Recent discovery of duplicate military medical records by the National Archives will enable thousands of World War II and Korean Conflict Army and Army Air Corps veterans to file for Veterans Administration disability compensation payments.

To speed these claims, the VA has introduced special procedures, collectively called Project Expedite, which involves a massive cross-checking of files to determine cases that can be reopened.

Using the new records, VA benefits counselors now hope to assist many veterans whose claims had been denied because no record was available to confirm medical disabilities that occurred during military service.

Veterans and survivors unsure whether their disability compensation claims are affected should contact the nearest VA regional office. A toll-free number of the nearest VA regional office is listed in the Federal Government section of telephone directories.

The National Archives and Records Administration on June 15 advised the VA that it had located a collection of computer tape containing some 10 million Army medical records that partially fill a gap created when a 1973 fire destroyed millions of military files at a federal warehouse in St. Louis. The newly found records cover the years from 1942 to 1945 and from 1950 to 1954. For certain veterans whose claims

for disability compensation were denied since the fire, the VA may now be able to establish documentary evidence to support their claims.

The St. Louis fire destroyed or seriously damaged some 18 million service records, making future disability claims difficult and, in some cases, impossible to process. The newly found medical records were provided to the National Archives by the National Research Council, a private organization that had been engaged in analysis of Army hospital records in the 1950s. The computerized information reflects battle injuries treated in Army hospitals and a sample of hospitalizations for other reasons. The records cover personnel who served in the Army and Army Air Corps.

Cotton Fleahopper

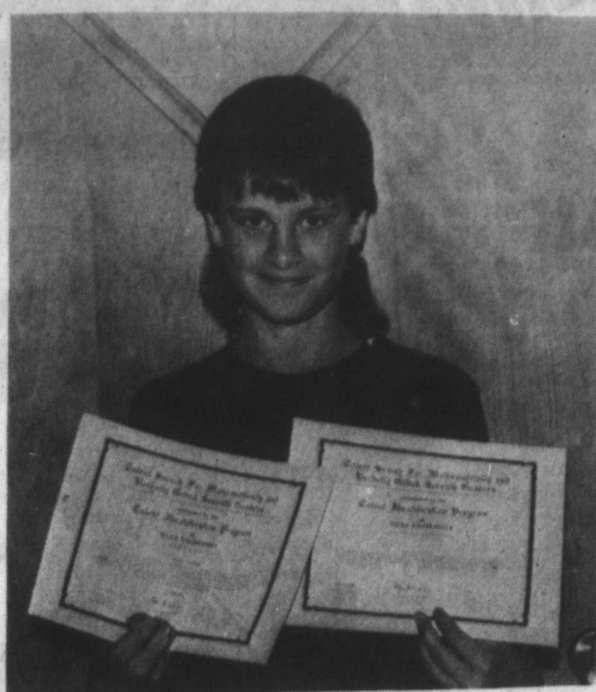
The cotton fleahopper, a major pest of cotton, attacks the crop during the early fruiting stage and can cause heavy damage.

Fleahoppers migrate in from weed hosts and feed on small pinhead-sized squares, says Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent. Damaged squares turn black and fall off, so heavy infestations can prevent or delay fruiting of the cotton plant.

Scouting of cotton fields is critical to determine fleahopper damage, says Gooch. When plants are setting less than 75 percent of their fruit and fleahoppers are present, insecticides should be applied to control the pest.

The economic threshold for fleahoppers during the first three weeks of squaring ranges from 25 to 35 fleahoppers per 100 plants. This varies with the variety, weather conditions and available moisture. Producers should check plants to see if they are setting fruits with the numbers of fleahoppers present within this range.

For information on chemicals recommended for cotton fleahopper control, contact the county Extension office, notes Gooch.

In the Verbal section Kelby received special recognition in Natural Science.

Seventh graders from Texas who participated in Duke University's Eighth Annual Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students were honored at ceremonies held at Trinity University and Baylor University on June 17th and June 18th. All students invited to the ceremony had earned scores on at least one section of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Testing Assessment (ACT) equal to or greater than the scores obtained by 50 percent of college-bound high school seniors. These very capable seventh graders took these college

entrance tests as participants in Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

"TIP was established in 1980 to

identify bright young students, to help develop their special abilities, and to direct them toward special academic programs for the gifted and talented. The 1988 TIP Talent Search involved nearly 46,000 students and covered 16 southern, southwestern, and midwestern states. It is one of four university-based talent searches which together cover the entire United States," said Dr. Robert Sawyer, Executive Director of the Program.

The 1988 students invited to the Texas Ceremonies had attained at least one of the following criteria: an SAT-Math score equal to or greater than 500 (for boys) or 450 (for girls); an SAT-Verbal score equal to or greater than 430; a TSWE (Test of Standard Written English) score equal to or greater than 52; an ACT-Math score equal to or greater than 21 (for boys) or 17 (for girls); an ACT-English score equal to or greater than 24; an ACT-Social Studies score equal to or greater than 20; or an ACT-Natural Science score equal to or greater than 25. All participants received Certificates of Distinction in recognition of their achievement; the highest scorers also received scholarships and books.



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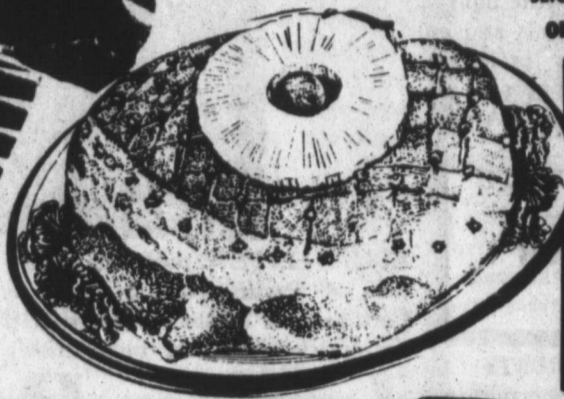
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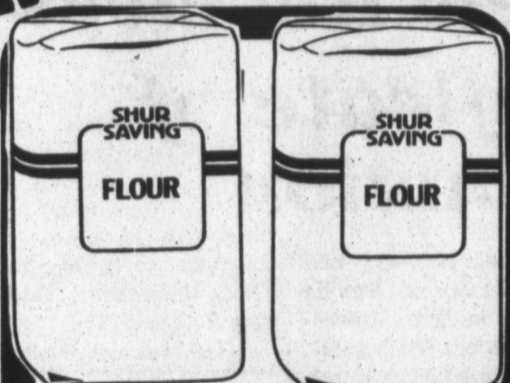
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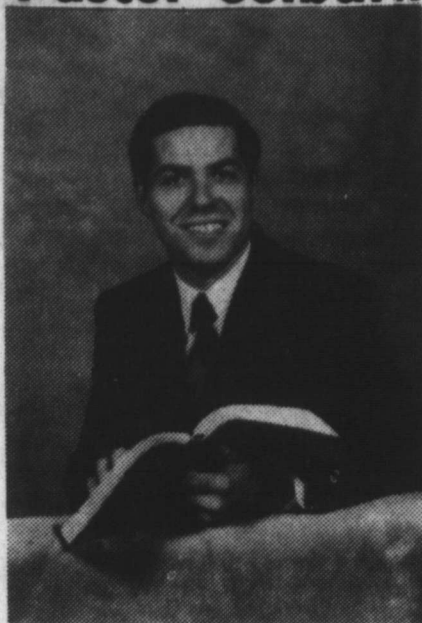

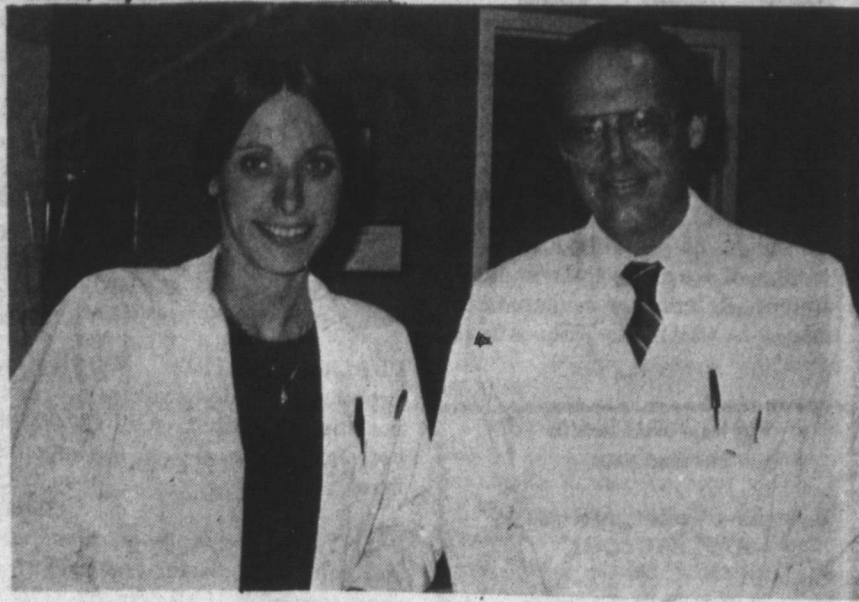

Safety Warning on Deli Foods

The combination of summer heat, uninsulated containers and prepared deli foods can add up to an unwelcome bout of foodborne illness.

There's no doubt that supermarket delis are the latest fast food phenomenon. Industry figures show that almost 62 percent of supermarkets now have delis with salad bars and prepared foods for a quick lunch, completely prepared dinner or instant picnic.

It's not the deli food itself that has food safety experts concerned, but how people handle the food once they buy it.

"In-store delis and salad bars have to meet health department standards in keeping hot foods at 140 degrees and cold foods below 40 degrees. In both cases that inhibits the growth of bacteria in the food," said Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"But if you buy a carton of cold food, take it out to a hot car and then run a few errands before you eat it, the food may become warm enough for rapid growth of bacteria," she said.

"Protein foods, such as those containing meat, eggs, poultry and milk are most susceptible to the growth of salmonella bacteria when not handled properly," said the specialist.

"Many of the most popular deli items, like smoked meats, potato or macaroni salads and puddings fit in

this category," she said.

The specialist said that when planning a picnic of deli foods, it's safest to buy hot foods as close to your destination as possible so they can be eaten right away. "Carry an insulated cooler with ice for cold deli foods. Cardboard or styrofoam containers do not provide adequate insulation," she said. "If you buy prepared foods for dinner, be sure to take them right

home and serve immediately. After the meal, promptly refrigerate the cartons of leftovers," said Cooksey. Whenever cartons of food have been sitting out for more than two hours, the specialist said they should be discarded.

"With a few precautions consumers can enjoy the convenience of supermarket delis without the discomfort of flu-like symptoms from a foodborne illness," she said.

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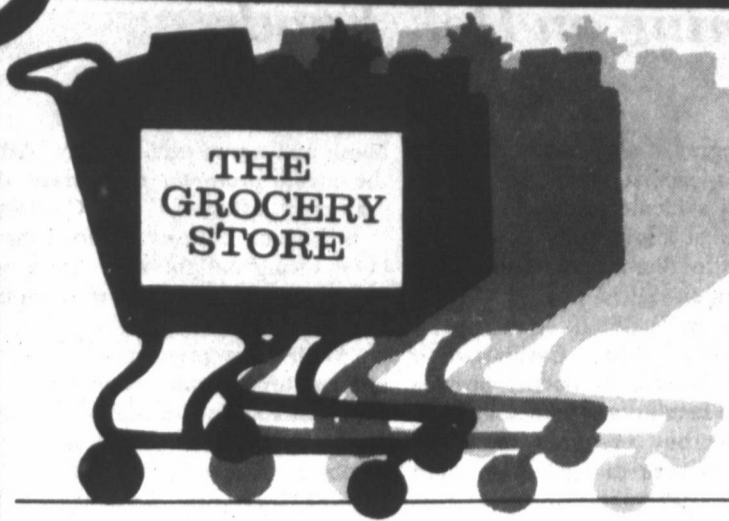
