The Bronco defense batted down the hatches the whole second half and allowed Sunray only six first downs. Honorable mention for outstanding defensive play to Donny Chambliss and Michael Moore. While the Bronco defense was shutting down the Bobcat attack the CHS offense was bustin loose on their own as Michael Adams scored on a 20 yd. run that followed a Randy Allen interception. Score at that point was 14-6 Sunray.

CHS continued to dominate the trenches in the third quarter and scored on an impressive drive starting at mid field and sparked by a pass from QB Che Shadle to leading receiver Cody Fletcher capped off by runs of 17 yds. and a one yard plunge by running back Brook Grisham score at that point was 14-12 Sunray.

As the fourth quarter started the momentum was definitely sitting on the visitors bench who from their own 10 yd. line the Broncos started the march for what would be the winning touchdown, but at their own 25 yd. line the ball was knocked loose and Sunray took over. Outstanding play by the offensive line against a much larger line allowed Bronco backs to bust loose for over 150 yds. on the ground.

## Students To Take ACT Assessment Test

As the new fall term opens, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation will move one step closer to college and other postsecondary plans by registering to take the ACT Assessment.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 3,000 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

Most students take the ACT Assessment during junior year or early in senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for post secondary education careers.

High school guidance offices have the information and forms students need to register for the ACT Assessment. ACT also provides free copies of the booklet, *Preparing for the ACT Assessment*, which contains information about getting ready for the examination, plus a complete practice test.

The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$11.50. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$12.00 late handling fee. For 1988-89, ACT has established this test date schedule:

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. The Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. It focuses on interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and the institutions and agen-

cies students specify.

The ACT Assessment is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

Funeral services for William Theodore "Bill" Weatherly, age 73, were held at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 13, 1988 in the First United Methodist Church in Clarendon with Rev. Terry Tamplen, Pastor, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Weatherly died at 1:02 a.m. at Hall County Hospital in Memphis after a sudden illness. He was born May 17, 1915 in Floydada, Texas and moved from there to Clarendon in 1919 where he had lived since that time. He married Jeanice Porter on December 5, 1937 at Hollis, Oklahoma. He had been in the building business most of his life having worked as a building contractor, carpenter, and lumber yard manager. He was the Clarendon City Manager for approximately four years prior to his retirement. Mr. Weatherly had attended Clarendon Schools and was a member of Clarendon Masonic Lodge #700, and the Confederate Decedent Society. He was a veteran of World War II having served in the US Navy and was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Jeanice Weatherly of Clarendon; two daughters, Jan Noble of Clarendon, Ann Burton of Stinnett; one son, William Theodore "Ted" Weatherly Jr. of Pullman, Washington; two sisters, Thelma Bennett of San Angelo, Betty Foxhall of Memphis; one brother, Harry Weatherly of Vernon; nine grandchildren; two great grandchildren; and one great grandson.

## Post Office To Adjust Window Hours

Good news for local residents was announced today by Clarendon, TX Postmaster Robert C. McCombs who said that window hours at the Clarendon, TX Post Office will be adjusted starting Saturday, September 10, 1988.

"We've got time for you" is the theme of the program which will establish new hours of 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Several months ago the U.S. Postal Service found it necessary to reduce Post Office window hours the equivalent of one-half day per week in most facilities as a result of Federally Mandated Budget cuts. Locally, that action resulted in the Clarendon, TX Post Office adjusting daily hours.

"Recently, however," Postmaster Robert C. McCombs said, "Postmaster General Anthony M. Franks has made convenient window service at Post Offices a top priority for his administration. He has ordered savings in other areas which allow the adjustment of window hours starting September 10, 1988."

Postmaster Robert G. McCombs expressed gratitude to the community's postal customers for their patience during the past few months when window hours were curtailed.

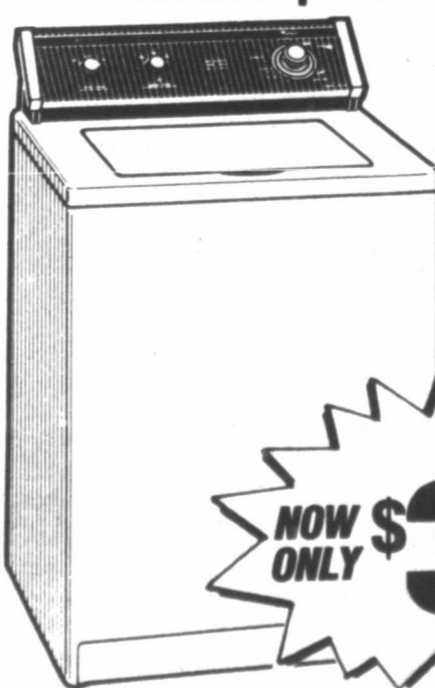
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## Crisis Pregnancy Center

Last spring, The Amarillo Area Crisis Pregnancy Center was opened to serve the needs of women throughout this area who are facing unplanned or crisis pregnancies. The Center emphasizes compassionate alternatives to abortion. A woman experiencing stress during pregnancy is under great emotional and financial pressures, and she needs practical help that will address complex problems. The Crisis Pregnancy Center (CPC) is prepared to meet her needs with a variety of excellent services. The CPC offers free pregnancy testing, confidential counseling, referrals and financial assistance for medical, legal and adoption services, educational programs for schools and other groups, maternity and baby clothing, and even "loaner cribs" to those needing assistance. Most important, though, is the spiritual support offered to troubled women at the CPC who need more than physical support.

Another important service provided at the CPC is post-abortion counseling. More than 1,500,000 abortions take place in America each year, almost one third of all pregnancies. Although the physical and emotional trauma related to

abortion is often denied by the medical professionals who profit from abortions, counselors nationwide are finding that severe problems often develop. There are a variety of difficult problems for those who choose to end a stressful pregnancy. The CPC strives to deal with these problems rather than to ignore them, and to help grieving women deal with the past in a compassionate way.

## 4-H Food Workshop

## 4-H Tasty Snacks

Now that school days are here again, families face the task of fixing tasty snacks and lunches for kids. But this doesn't have to be daily drudgery. Try a sandwich freezing session.

Some day when the kids feel creative, help them make and freeze enough sandwiches for a month's supply, said Terry Floyd, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This activity can be a learning experience as well and can fit in well with the 4-H bread program.

Kids can enjoy creating new combinations with cheese spreads, canned tuna, peanut butter or cold sliced meat. These are all foods that freeze well. Better yet, use a butter or margarine base to help the bread from getting soggy.

Frozen sandwiches make for hassle-free mornings. Kids can snatch a nutritious sandwich from the freezer as they go off to school. By noon, the sandwich is thawed and

ready to eat, Floyd said.

Here are a few DONT'S. Stay away from mayonnaise, salad dressings and jelly because they soak into the bread. Celery, lettuce and tomatoes get soggy. Avoid hard-cooked eggs because the whites get rubbery.

When kids get really interested, they might even want to make the bread for their sandwiches, said Floyd.

Young people in the national 4-H bread program can beat the "school lunch blues" by becoming bakers as well as expert freezers of what they bake, Floyd said. Bread to a 4-H member means everything from banana bread to pretzels to Parker House rolls.

4-H'ers with a scientific bent enjoy investigating the chemical reactions that make bread rise. Creative types like to experiment with breads of other lands. Some enterprising young people use their newly acquired skills to set up small businesses.

4-H bread projects and activities are supervised by the Extension Service and supported by Fleischmann's Yeast, Inc. Young people can earn awards at all levels of participation, including six scholarships nationally, expense-paid trips to National 4-H Congress each year in Chicago for state winners, and one medal of honor for the county winner.

Youths interested in getting into the bread making act and learning more about interesting and nutritious snacks for school lunches should contact the county Extension office, Floyd said.

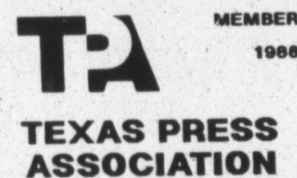

## Make It With Wool

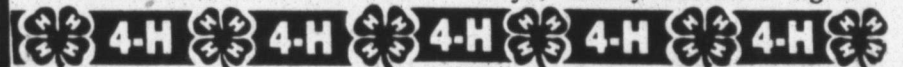

Fabrics used in garments for the contest must be at least 60% wool or mohair.

There are four age divisions: Pre-teen - under 14; Junior 14-16; Senior 17-21; and Adult - over 21, enabling all interested amateur seamstresses to enter.

There will be eight district contests held throughout Texas during October. The winners from each district

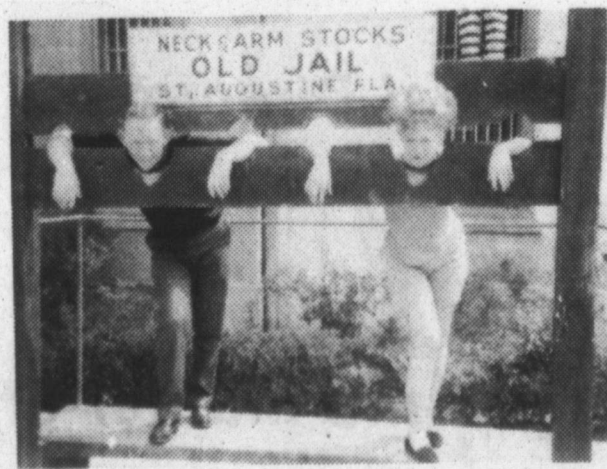

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

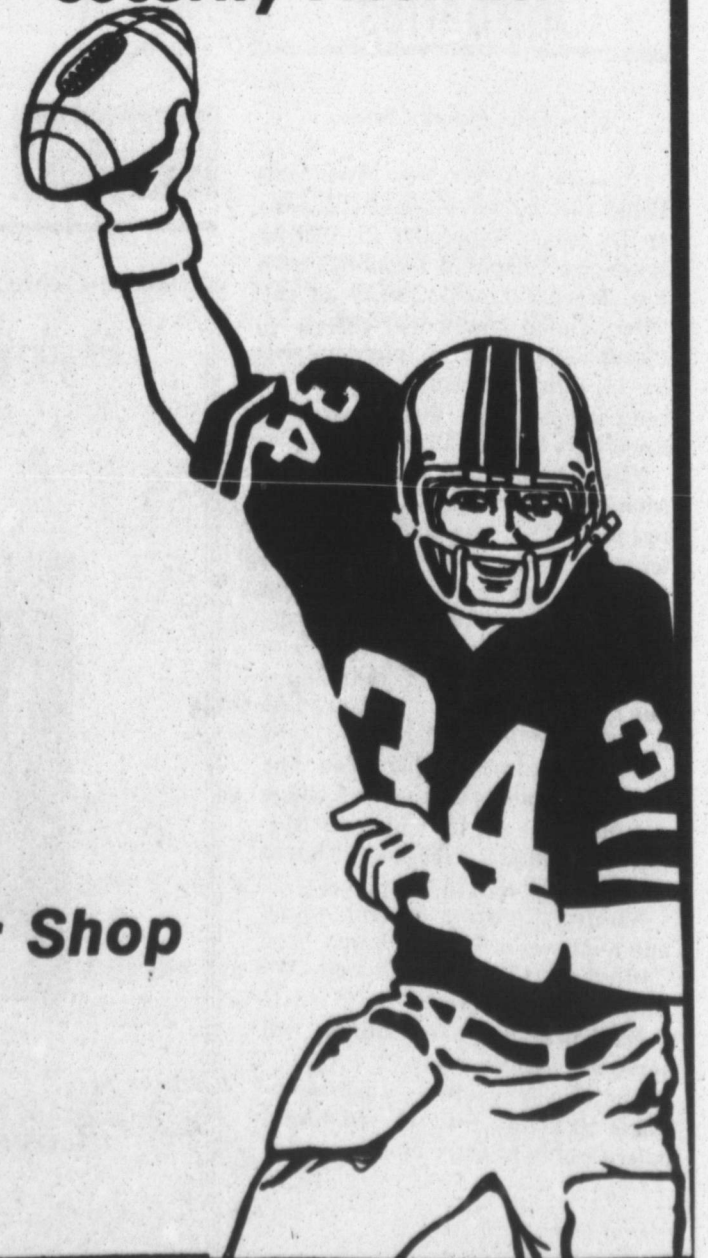

## Health Care Issues

One of the things that seems most neglected when discussing nursing home care is the area of resident's rights. Many casual observers feel that when someone enters the nursing home they forfeit their rights and are restricted as far as exercising those rights. I hope that today's article will dispell many of those thoughts.

The following excerpts are taken from the Texas Department of Human Services' SNF/ICF Standards for Participation. Though this isn't an exhaustive study on the subject I hope it will give a general overview to the requirements of the Standards:

(1) The facility must protect and promote each resident's right to a dignified existence, self-determination, communication with and access to persons and services inside and outside the facility, and to

exercise his legal rights.

(2) Each resident must be permitted to receive visitors and to associate freely inside or outside the facility with persons and groups of the resident's choice unless medically contraindicated (as documented by the attending physician in the resident's medical record).

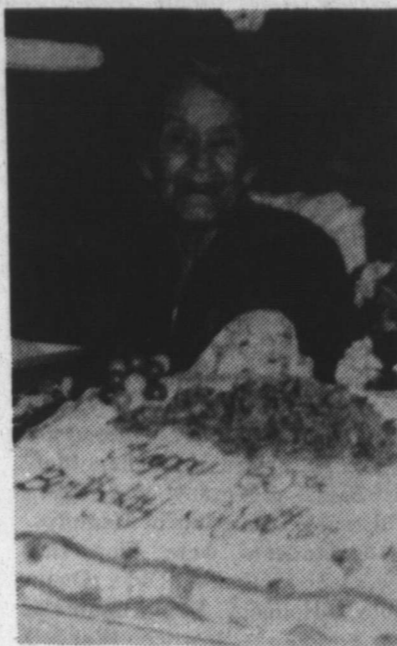
(3) The facility must permit the formation of a resident's council by interested residents, must provide space for meetings, and must assist residents to attend meetings. Examples of the council's functions are to:

a) Consider issues and complaints about conditions in the facility.  
b) Relay complaints and suggestions to the facility administrator.  
c) Relay complaints to the Texas Department of Health or any appropriate agency.

The resident council at the Medical Center is very active and meets on a monthly basis. they discuss plans, programs, and any other items they feel are important to their care at the nursing home. They even plan a meal of their own choosing each month. Our dietary staff then has the responsibility to prepare that meal.

Some of the other rights the residents have include right to privacy, confidentiality of records, maintenance of property, the right to manage personal funds, as well as the right to be actively involved in the planning of their care. This includes the right to receive complete, accurate, and current information regarding his medical condition, diagnosis, treatment, and prognosis in terms that they can understand.

In these days of everyone demanding their rights, we need to be sure that the elderly are allowed the very same privilege. Next week we'll take a look at the Social Services provided in the nursing home setting.

Following the potluck lunch, a business meeting was held. President Willard Cook was unable to attend the reunion. Redell Henson presided during the business meeting. It was reported that two previous

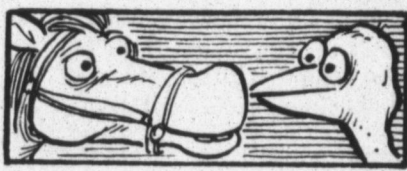

### Ulcer Medicines

Ulcers are open sores that develop in the mucosal lining of the stomach and small intestine, with the duodenum (first portion of the small intestine) being the most common site. Gastric (stomach) and duodenal (small intestine) ulcers result from the corrosive action of hydrochloric acid and pepsinogen, digestive juices secreted from the lining of the stomach.

Nondrug approaches to ulcer treatment include discontinuation of smoking and alcohol ingestion, dietary changes, rest, and learning how to handle excessive levels of stress.

Popular antacid formulas contain aluminum hydroxide, calcium carbonate, and various forms of magnesium. Antacids have been used for decades to neutralize excessive acid.

Prescription medicines are also used to treat ulcers. Coating agents such as *sucralfate* appear to bind to gastrointestinal tissue and form a protective coating over ulcers. Special antihistamines (H2 receptor blockers) including *cimetidine* and *ranitidine* reduce the secretion of acid and pepsinogen into the stomach. *Anticholinergics* such as *proprantheline* block the action of acetylcholine, thereby decreasing the stimulation of stomach acid production.

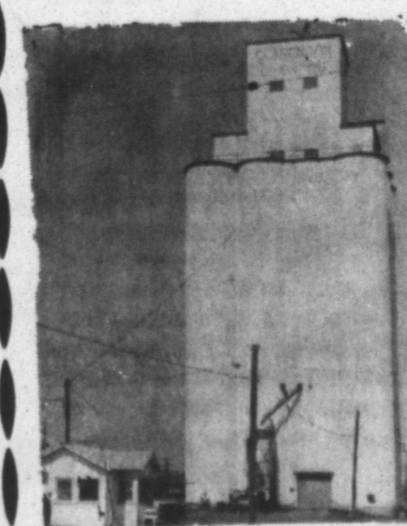

OF PROPOSED

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**

GENERAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

**PROPOSITION NO. 1  
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

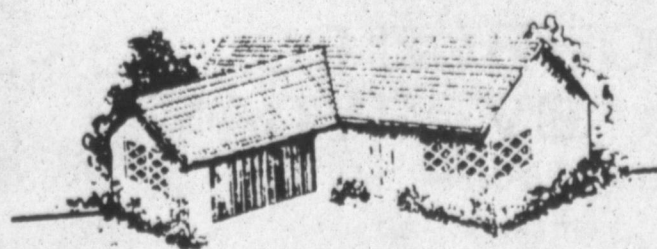

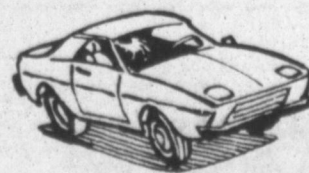
