## Tax Rebates To Cities and Counties Increased In November

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reports the monthly tax rebates sent to cities and counties that collect local sales tax increased again in November.

"The payments to cities and counties continue to improve," Bullock said, "The state's economic recovery continues to pick up steam."

The Governor's office reports that statewide unemployment is down from last year and the year before. Personal income is up, that manufacturing productivity is soaring. Texas has increased an average of 342,000 more jobs during the first three quarters of 1988 compared to the same period in 1986.

Clarendon sale taxes has increased by 16.98% over the same period last year. The City of Clarendon has received \$82,381.30 this year. Howardwick has received \$6,660.68 while Hedley share came to \$5,123.00.

Surround cities and counties also report increase in sale tax reports. Claude is up 20.56%, Wellington 16.78%, Memphis 9.36%, from the sale period in 1987.

Cities in Donley County have received \$93,164.98 for the first 9 months of this year. These figures reflects taxes reported by and paid by the cities thru September. These sale taxes helps keep your property tax lower. How much more would we have to pay in property taxes if we did not receive this tax rebate.

## Panhandle Farm Management Symposium

Three diverse sessions on regulation changes which affect producers in 1989, alternative production enterprises, and ways to tap the wildlife market will be featured November 30 at the fourth annual Panhandle Farm Management Symposium at the Amarillo Civic Center.

The free symposium, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be from 9:45 a.m. until 3:45 p.m. It is a highlight of the Amarillo/Panhandle Farm Show.

The morning session on regulatory changes for 1989 will feature presentations on the farm labor act, by Dr. Richard Edwards, and the Texas hazardous chemical ("right to know") act, by Lavon Harmon. Edwards is an Extension agribusiness specialist from College Station. Harmon is with the Amarillo office of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

To round out the morning session, Dr. Brent Bean, Extension agronomist, and Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension entomologist, will discuss use and coming changes in registration on herbicides, insecticides and acaricides.

The mid-day session begins at 1:30 p.m. and will focus on two alternative production enterprises which have drawn a lot of interest, said Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension

economist and symposium coordinator.

Dr. Fred Thornberry, Extension poultry specialist from College Station, will discuss production costs, marketing and the future of the ostrich industry in Texas. Dr. George Ahlschwede, Extension sheep and goat specialist from San Angelo, will relate his experiences in sheep and goats to wheat pasture grazing and Panhandle agriculture.

The final session, "Tapping the Wildlife Market", begins at 3 p.m. It will feature presentations on all facets of the wildlife industry. Topics will include managing the wildlife population; public hunting programs; legal, social and business aspects of lease hunting, and a local community effort in marketing wildlife hunting leases.

More information about the symposium is available by contacting the county Extension Agent, Ronald Gooch, at the county Extension office, phone 874-2141.

## Parents Be On The Alert

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson has asked parents to impress upon their children how important it is that they not get into cars or go off with strangers. There have not been any incidents in Donley County involving strangers trying to pick up school children. But in recent weeks, there have been incidents in surrounding counties. Only last week a man described as being white, in his 30's, 6 ft., between 150-180 pounds, with a mustache, and driving a small old light blue car, tried to entice a Shamrock student into his car by trying to get the student to help him find a friend. Although the descrip-

tion of the man is very general, it is the same description that has been reported in Childress, Memphis, Canadian and Miami. The best defense in this situation lies in the hands of parents.

Parents need to talk to their children and make sure they understand not to get in cars or go off with strangers. If a child has to walk home try to arrange it where they are not walking alone.

Sheriff Thompson stated, "This is a problem we all need to be aware of and report immediately if any incident like this happens here in our county."

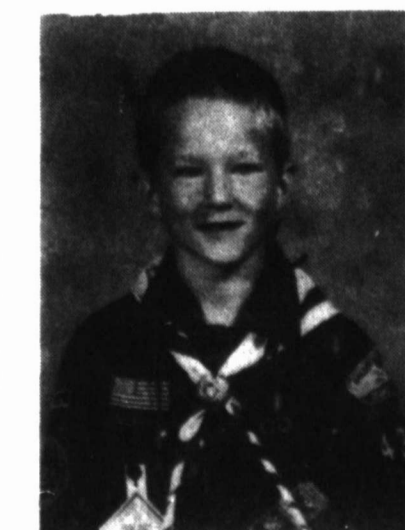

## SPRAYING CONTROLS DISEASES

Fall is often the time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer, said Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Gooch said that applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage, Gooch said. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly.

He advises spraying when 70 percent of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later on.

Fungicides containing chlorothalonil can also be used for the control of peach leaf curl.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide, but NOT fungicides containing chlorothalonil, Gooch said. But again, it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliar burn with the copper fungicide.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the main trunk and main limbs.

A fall spray in Donley County is most often applied from late October to November 15. Application time will vary with the season, so check your fruit trees closely.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees, Gooch said, because there's no other time when peach leaf curl of peach and plum trees can be controlled.

## The First Thanksgiving Proclamation of the United States—1789

Issued by President Washington

Whereas, it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits and humbly to implore His protection and favor; and

Whereas, both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me "to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness;"

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November next to be devoted to the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our service and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquility, union and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil

and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions, to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a government of wise, just and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us), and to bless them with good governments, peace and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally, to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

Given under my hand, at the city of New York, the third day of October, A.D. 1789.

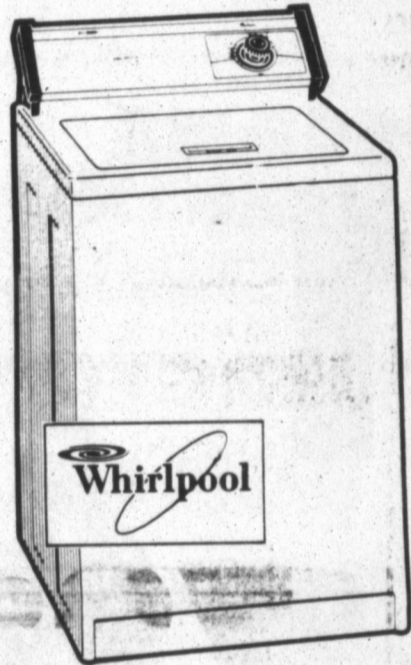
other area entities, and comparison of total tax rates of all entities with area towns. Mr. SoRelle also informed us that his office operated for approximately 7% of the money collected compared to

Antacids are frequently used to relieve indigestion and heartburn as well as the discomforts associated with excessive eating and drinking. Antacids are frequently prescribed by physicians in treatment of peptic ulcer disease. Ingredients in these nonprescription products include:

**Calcium Carbonate:** Calcium carbonate reacts with hydrochloric acid in the stomach to form calcium chloride, a soluble compound that is absorbed from the stomach and a good source of calcium.

**Aluminum Hydroxide:** Aluminum hydroxide also neutralizes stomach acid to form aluminum chloride, a compound that is not absorbed and sometimes produces constipation.

**Magnesium Hydroxide:** Magnesium hydroxide and other magnesium compounds are often combined with aluminum hydroxide to overcome the constipating effects sometimes experienced.

**Other Ingredients:** Simethicone, an antifoaming agent, is included in some antacid products to help dissolve intestinal gas. Flavoring agents and sweeteners are usually added to make chewable and liquid antacids more pleasant to use.
